A big party for a big anniversary

20th annual LifeWalk steps off Oct. 10. will benefit 9 ASOs

Twenty years is a long time for a fundraising event to stay active, not to mention successful. And a 20th anniversary calls for a special celebration.

And that's exactly what AIDS Arms has planned for the 20th annual LifeWalk set for Sunday, Oct. 10 at



Lee Park. As the event marks its 20th year,

AIDS Arms Executive Director Raeline Nobles said, "One of things wanted to do, right out of the gate, was

increase our partnerships within the nonprofit community, to increase the number of partner agencies that would benefit from LifeWalk.

"We had four partner agencies last year. This year, we have nine. There are 10 organizations, counting AIDS Arms," she said.

LifeWalk was created in 1991 as a fundraiser for Oak Lawn Community Services. When that agency folded, AIDS Arms took over, each year inviting other AIDS service organizations in the community to participate.

School's dean says Harrisons' relationship violates St. Vincent's 'basic Christian values,' but mothers says discrimination is 'just not right'

BEDFORD — Four-year-old Olivia Harrison was disappointed to learn she won't be attending

St. Vincent's Cathedral School this year.

"We said, 'You realize that you're not going to go to the same school," said Olivia's biological mother, Jill Harrison. "She said, 'Yes I am, I want to go to that school, I want to play there.'

"They have a fish pond, and she said, 'Yeah, but I need to feed the fish and take care of them," Iill

Regardless of whether Olivia fully understands the decision, she can now tell you why she'll be starting pre-kindergarten at another school next

week, instead of St. Vincent's.

"They don't like that I have two mommies," Olivia says.

"She's just repeating, so we're careful about what we're telling her," said Jill Harrison. "I don't want her to think that she in any way shape or form did anything wrong."

Olivia, who'd been accepted into St. Vincent's earlier this summer, was set to start on Monday, Aug. 23. But school officials abruptly changed



YFT plans fundraiser to kick off Pride celebrations

Event intended to help make up shortfall in youth group's budget caused by economic downturn

Youth First Texas kicks off Pride with a fundraising party at the home of Jo Bess Jackson and Joanne Martin on Sept. 11.


"It's a great way for those in our community who want to celebrate Pride and support a great organization," said Youth First Texas Director of Development and Administration Sam Wilkes.

Advisory board member Renee Baker put out a call to members of the Women's Business Network to help raise money for the center after it moved to its new location. Jackson and Martin

While no admission to the party will be charged, Wilkes said they will showcase the services the organization offers and hope the community will be generous with its financial support.

"We'll probably have a short presentation. A youth or two will make an appeal," said board member Chris Hendrix.

He said the group was looking for monthly



donors who will make a multi-year commitment and challenge appeals.

Wilkes said that their Collin County group recently lost its space and is currently meeting at an office owned by Big Brothers/Big Sisters. The group is looking for a space of its own.

"We need a smaller, more secure spot," he said. "YFT Collin County is a more intimate group. We have a couple of things in the works and are looking for what will be the best fit."

The main Dallas center moved earlier this year to a new location on Harry Hines Boulevard.

Baker said the old space on Maple Avenue leaked, had air conditioning problems, was located near a meth clinic and had homeless people hanging out on the property. The new, more modern facility is safer and has attracted more

"As of last month, we served 1,300 individuals so far this year," Baker said.

That's about a 25 percent increase in the number accessing services, and with the safer location some attend more often.

YFT is gearing up for another increase later this year when DART's Green Line opens in De-

Market Center Station is across the street from their new building, making the facility even more

Jackson said she and her partner were delighted to open their house to help the organization continue to offer a variety of services.

Cars vandalized at ilume

Dallas police estimate that 20-25 vehicles were vandalized Sunday afternoon while parked in the garage at ilume, the posh new development on the Cedar

Sr. Cpl. Kevin Janse, a spokesman for DPD, said the vehicles appeared to have been "keyed," although the suspect could have used a screwdriver or anything sharp.

Janse said only four victims have called in reports to police thus far, but it's estimated that 20-25 vehicles were damaged. He added that there's no reason to believe the incident was an anti-gay hate crime.

Janse said police have no suspect description, and there were no security cameras in the area of the garage where the incidents occurred. Total monetary damages are unknown, but one victim who reported the incident estimated \$3,000 in damage to his Hummer.



My name is Jacob. I am 11 years old, and I just started sixth grade. This year, I am working on the Lone Star Ride Fighting AIDS pit stop crew with my mom, Sandra.

I like to ride my bike. Last year, when I was in fifth grade and the school I went to was closer to my house, I would ride my bike to

One day, I want to be a rider in Lone Star Ride. But that will have to wait until I am older and can ride farther.

Last year, my mom was riding her bike in Lone Star Ride. But she had a wreck and hurt her hand.

When she came home and I saw that her hand was hurt, I was upset, and I said I didn't want her to ride any more. But then she told me why she was riding.

She told me that the reason for Lone Star Ride is to raise money for people who have a disease called AIDS. She said that AIDS makes you really feel bad and you have to take lots of medicine all the time.

She also said that the medicines cost lots of money and it is hard for people to pay for the medicines they need, especially because AIDS makes people so sick that sometimes they can't work to make money.

So people who have AIDS sometimes can't pay for food or for a place to live. It made me very sad to think of that.

Mom told me that Lone Star Ride raises money to help people with AIDS get their medicine and have somewhere to live and food to

So when she said she was going to volunteer again this year, I told her I wanted to volunteer, too. I want to do something to help people who are already sick, and I want to help other people keep from getting AIDS.

One time this summer, Mom and I went to one of the Lone Star Ride training rides. We rode in our car to make sure that the people on their bikes were OK.

If someone started feeling bad or got too tired to ride any more, we picked them up and drove them back to the finish line.

It was so much fun. I love to work with my family and people that I know, and I love to meet new people and make new friends. Lone Star Ride is a great way to do that.

It was so much fun to go by the people on their bikes and cheer for them and wave to

It is fun to help people.

Why don't you come and ride with us or volunteer for the crew so that you can have fun helping people, too?

A note from Jake's mom: There are a lot of adults out there who either don't see the importance of participating in Lone Star Ride or other such events, or who aren't willing to give the time and put out the effort to be part of something that is so important.

And to know that my son, at 11 years old, is already thoughtful and kind-hearted enough to make this sort of commitment makes me very, very proud.

I know that it takes a lot of time and effort and dedication to ride a bike 150 miles over two days.

And yes, it takes time and effort and dedication to volunteer for one of the crew positions.

But that time and effort is nothing compared to the good that you can do for people living with AIDS who need your help.

Even if you can't ride or crew, you can donate to someone who is.

So come on — join me and Jake and do your part for the Lone Star Ride and the people it

Mechelle Marie Armstrong, 54, of Dallas died Aug. 13 at University Medical Center in Lubbock after being struck by a pickup truck while she was participating in the first of four bicycle races in the 2010 Senior Games.

Born Nov. 27, 1955, Armstrong was a native of Onaga, Kansas. She had lived in the Dallas area



for more than 30 years, worked in the Dallas Independent School District where taught math, English, physical education, health, sci-English for international stu-

dents. She also worked for many years as an instructor/supervisor for the Sears Driving School, and had spent time as a teacher in Guam, a time she remembered fondly.

Armstrong earned a degree in physical education from Kansas State University and attended Texas Women's University in Denton before leaving to take the teaching position in Guam. She was a member of the Matrix Cycle Club and the Pin Pushers Bowling League at Forum Bowling

Armstrong was working at a language academy, teaching English to non-English-speaking high school students when she met Ana, one of three girls she eventually "adopted" as her own. She and her partner of 25 years, Donna Hinckley, later gave two other girls, Diana and Norma, a home when they needed one, and the girls eventually came to consider "Ms. Mechelle" and "Ms. Donna" as their parents, and the two women were very proud of all three of their "daughters."

Armstrong was a parent, teacher, mentor and friend. She was known as a very athletic woman who grew up playing softball and who loved all sports. Later in life she rediscovered her love of sports through cycling. Although she and Hinckley often rode bikes with their adopted daughters

when the girls were young, Armstrong became "addicted" to the sport of cycling later on. That led to a daily exercise regimen and a passion for cycling that helped her lose more than 70 pounds. She was always proud to be able to tell her students that she could outpace much younger riders at cycling rallies.

Armstrong also inspired Diana's husband, Felipe, and Norma's boyfriend, Carlos, to take up

Armstrong and Hinckley went to Lubbock in early August to attend the Senior Bike Trials and had plans to ride with Norma and Carlos in the "Hotter Than Hell 100" race. But while in Lubbock, Armstrong was struck from behind by a pickup in her first race and fatally injured.

Armstrong was known as a very giving person who touched many lives, and someone who would always help anyone who needed help. She was full of energy and had stamina that was the envy of many much younger people.

Besides cycling, Armstrong was passionate about teaching, baking, camping and family.

She was preceded in death by her mother, Rose Marie Armstrong, and a brother, Rodrick Kent Armstrong, both of Onaga.

She is survived by her partner, Donna Hinckley of Dallas; her "adopted" daughters, Norma, Diana and Ana, all of Dallas; her "granddaughters," Ailyn, Sara Jane and Karen, all of Dallas; her brother, Richard Armstrong, of Kansas; her sister, Marty Matzke, of Kansas; her aunt, Dora fuller, of Plano; and many cousins, nieces, nephews, students and friends.

A memorial service will be held Saturday, Aug. 28, from noon to 3 p.m. at Cathedral of Hope, 5910 Cedar Springs Road in Dallas. Memorial contributions can be made to The Leukemia/Lymphoma Society, Youth First Texas or Lone Star Ride Fighting AIDS.

Officials at Resource Center Dallas announced last week that the agency has received "a sizable donation of quality used kitchen equipment and appliances" from the local franchisee for Red Mango yogurt.

The equipment will primarily be used to support the center's weekday hot lunch program for people living with HIV/AIDS.

The equipment includes three stainless steel under-counter refrigerators, a double-door stainless steel freezer, an iced tea/coffee brewer, a refrigerated deli display case, a countertop convection oven, a couple of ice cream dipping cabinets and three stainless steel trash cans.

Officials said the refrigerators, freezer, tea/coffee brewer and trash cans were put to immediate use in the meals program.

Since the early 1990s, the center's hot meals program serves a lunch to more than 100 HIV-positive clients each Monday through Friday.

Bret Camp, associate executive director for health and medical services at the center, said, "This generous donation from Red Mango will allow the meals program to easily store perishables and supplies for our lunches, and increase our ability to accept donations of perishable food products.

"We're always grateful when businesses in our community support the center's programs," he added.

The franchise holder for the Dallas-area Red Mango stores, Bill Chinn, acquired the equipment when he took over a former restaurant space for a store location. The equipment had been in storage

when the manager of the Red Mango at the Ilume on Cedar Springs read about the center's "Hell Freezes Over" fundraiser to buy a new ice machine, and he suggested that the equipment could be put to use in the center's hot meals program.

The Red Mango at Ilume also has a donation box in the store for the center, and so far has collected more than \$400 for Center programs and services.

"I'm a cheerleader for them," Jackson said. "What they do is not duplicated by anyone else."

She was referring to the way YFT integrates social activities with group and individual counsel-

"We offer community dinners to develop peer groups not based on drugs and alcohol," Wilkes said.

Baker said she's participated in movie nights, arts and crafts activities and cooking classes.

Twice a month, a gender identity group helps transgender youth gain self-acceptance. Lawyers work with the group pro bono to explain the steps needed to change legal papers, and counselors help them with a variety of questions and help them deal with pent up anxiety.

A six-week coming out series helps youth cope with family, friends and school.

YFT provides additional, unlimited free indi-

vidual counseling as well. They partner with AIDS Arms and Resource Center Dallas to provide free HIV testing.

Wilkes said the agency works with a number of youth who are living on their own and strug-

"Our food pantry is cleaned out and restocked each week," he said.

Jackson and Martin have opened their North Dallas home to other groups many times, Jackson said. She is an estate-planning attorney who works with a number of transitioning people and with same-sex couples and single gays and lesbians.

"We have to protect ourselves even when the law doesn't," Jackson said. "We have to be creative."

She said that's exactly what YFT does that for LGBT youth and hoped the community would offer its support.

California bill would protect clergy refusing to sanction gay marriages

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — Clergy who refuse to sanction same-sex marriages would be protected under a bill sent to Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger's desk by the state Senate.

Sen. Mark Leno's bill, approved 22-11 Wednesday, Aug. 25, could become necessary if a federal appeals court upholds a judge's ruling this month striking down Proposition 8, the state's voter-approved gay marriage ban.

The bill says religious institutions from faiths that object to same-sex unions could not be stripped of their tax-exempt status if their clergy refuse to perform weddings for gay couples.

Leno, a gay Democrat from San Francisco, defended the measure when it was opposed by Sen. Roy Ashburn, an openly gay Republican from Bakersfield. Ashburn objected that the bill defines same-sex marriages as civil relationships, which he says puts them in a lesser class than heterosexual marriages.

Trans woman mistreated at hospital satisfied with promised changes

MUNCIE, Ind. — A transgender woman said she was satisfied with changes promised by a hospital after she complained of being ridiculed by medical staff and denied treatment in its emergency room last month.

Ball Memorial Hospital announced Tuesday, Aug. 24, that all employees would receive mandatory LGBT awareness training starting in September and that it was updating its nondiscrimination policies to include language specific to sexual orientation and gender identity.

Erin Vaught, a transsexual who has transitioned from male to female, complained that she was referred to as a "he-she" and "it" by hospital staffers after she arrived at the emergency room coughing up blood on July 18.

Vaught said that during face-to-face meetings with Ball Memorial President Michael Haley and others at the hospital, she felt that they "would do the right thing."

"I'm happy with the outcome," Vaught told The Star Press. "I think that we reached a positive resolution."

The hospital said it would work with the advocacy groups Indiana Transgender Rights Advocacy Alliance and Indiana Equality in deciding on its response to Vaught's complaints.

"Simply put, we failed to live up to our brand promise of care in regards to Erin and we apologize to her for that," Haley said in a hospital statement. "In the last month, I have heard from many team members who share my disappointment with Erin's experience at BMH."

Vaught said last month that when she, her wife and son went to the hospital's emergency room coughing up blood, she was entered into the computer system as male despite an ID that stated she was female. Vaught said she was kept waiting for two hours without any treatment before seeing a doctor who said she couldn't treat her because of

her transgender condition.

Her treatment prompted complaints from the advocacy groups and others.

Vaught said she and her family would return to Ball Memorial in the future.

"My goal from the outset was to try to make sure that my experience wasn't repeated," she

Police increase patrols after spate of anti-gay attacks in city's bar district

COVINGTON, Ky. — Police have boosted patrols in a bar district in this northern Kentucky city following attacks that appeared to target gays.

Two people suffered slash wounds and two others had minor injuries in an Aug. 14 knife attack at a gas station in which anti-gay epithets were yelled at the victims, police said.

Police said they will start tracking incidents of ethnic and anti-gay slurs and hate speech, The Kentucky Enquirer reported. Also, a group of residents has formed "Zero Tolerance for Hate Crimes in Covington" and will host an event at six bars in MainStrasse on Saturday to raise money for an anti-hate campaign.

"We have had three incidents in the last several months and it has got to stop now," said Mayor Denny Bowman.

Recent crimes spurred the Covington City Commission and more than 80 people to gather Tuesday, Aug. 24, at City Hall to denounce hate crimes and reaffirm support for the human rights ordinance passed in 2003. The ordinance prohibits discrimination based on sexual orientation and gender identity.

City Commissioner Shawn Masters said he moved to Covington partly because of its diversity and is proud that the city has a human rights ordinance.

Police Chief Lee Russo said two additional officers recently were assigned to the MainStrasse beat during peak hours. Also, the two patrol officers who roam throughout the city are focusing on MainStrasse, Russo said.

The police also want people to report slurs and hate speech to police so it can be tracked, Russo said.



Gay couple files suit challenging Wyoming's anti-gay-marriage law

CHEYENNE, Wyo. — A gay couple has filed a federal lawsuit challenging the Wyoming law that defines marriage as existing only between a man and a woman.

David Shupe-Roderick and Ryan W. Dupree of Cheyenne say the Laramie County Clerk's Office has refused to issue them a marriage license. They're asking U.S. District Judge Alan B. Johnson to stop the state from enforcing any laws that block gays and lesbians from access to civil marriage. Wyoming Attorney General Bruce Salzburg declined comment Tuesday, Aug. 24, saying he hadn't reviewed the lawsuit yet.

Shupe-Roderick and Dupree are acting as their own attorneys in the case.





Nobles said organizers this year made a point to reach out to all the ASOs still in existence that had benefited from AIDS Arms in the past, asking them to participate again.

And the nine that are partnering with AIDS Arms for the event have the opportunity to add significantly to their coffers, she said.

"Every partner agency gets all the tools they need to have a successful LifeWalk team," Nobles said. "They can potentially make a lot of money for themselves. It's sort of the same model as the Black Tie Dinner. With Black Tie, beneficiaries can more or less write their own check, depending on how many tables they sell, how many raffle tickets they sell and how many volunteer hours they put in.

"What they get in return is the infrastructure for a very established event here in Dallas, and they can use that to benefit their organizations," Nobles said.

It's very similar with LifeWalk: Each agency works to get people to raise money and walk, and the money raised in an agency's name goes to that agency, she explained.

Nobles said that LifeWalk strives each year to bring in enough sponsorships to completely cover the costs of staging the event, and they have reached that goal again this year. That means that "every penny that the walkers earn" goes to either AIDS Arms or one of the nine other beneficiary organizations.

"Of every dollar the beneficiaries raise, they keep 75 cents. The other 25 cents comes back to LifeWalk for next year's event. That allows us to create an investment account to secure the future of the event, and it gives every beneficiary unrestricted funds to use however they need to," Nobles said.

LifeWalk, Nobles continued, is a great example of the benefits of working together.

"The issue of collaboration is so important in this [HIV/AIDS] community. We all depend on each other so heavily these days, and this is one more opportunity for us to come together under one cause and help each of our individual organizations grow stronger.

"We [as organizations] may be very different from one another. We may not always agree with each other. But we are all here for the same reason," she said. "And LifeWalk is an excellent platform to show the community that we can and do work together and partner together on behalf of our clients."

In another nod to the past, all of the previous LifeWalk chairs have been invited to participate in the 20th anniversary celebration, Nobles said.

"We are hunting down, if you will, all the previous chairs, and we have been able to locate quite a few of them. Many of them still live in Dallas," she said. "There is a group of previous chairs who have reaching out to the community, working to remind folks about LifeWalk, telling them, 'Hey, this is why we were involved, and still are involved, in this event. This is the impact it can have on our community."

Nobles said it has been gratifying for her to

hear the stories of past LifeWalk chairs and to hear that so many of the people who were involved in past years are still supportive of the event

"Many of them still attend LifeWalk every year, and they have some very personal reasons for doing so. It has been very moving for us to hear those stories," she said. "Many of them will be at the 20th anniversary, and we are very proud that we can have them there to let everyone acknowledge the history and their contributions and what they have been able to build through this event."

LifeBark — the LifeWalk co-event created several years ago to allow people to bring their dogs to the event and use their pets to widen their fundraising options — is "still howling," Nobles said.

"There will be registration available for all the pups who want to walk and wag their tails for a good cause. There will be doggie games and treats and all kinds of vendors. And Operation Kindness will be there, too, with dogs available for adoption," she noted.

LifeWalk representatives will be selling raffle tickets for the 2011 Mercedes Benz that will be raffled off during Black Tie Dinner in November, and there will be free HIV testing available to anyone who wants to get tested. Plus, there will be LifeWalk raffles for a new living room suite and for two American Airlines tickets to "anywhere American flies," Nobles said.

The Buster Brown Band, which Nobles described as a "lively jazz band," will be entertain-

ing in Lee Park for LifeWalk, as will Darcell, a Dallas native who is coming back from Los Angeles to perform. And Dallas Pride Cheer will be on hand as well.

Nobles said AIDS Arms is proud that Life-Walk is one of the first local events to get the "family-friendly" seal of approval from the Human Rights Campaign's local Family Equality Committee.

"There will be lots of things for the kids and teenagers to do, as well as the adults," she said.

Although some teams have been working for months to raise money for LifeWalk, there will be plenty of people there walking as individuals, too, Nobles said.

And individuals will be able to register and participate right up until the time the walk steps off

"All you have to do is show up at Lee Park that day and pay the \$30 registration fee and get the T-shirt that comes with the registration fee," Nobles said. "You can download the form from LifeWalk.org and turn it in that day, or you can register online, or you can just come out and register that day. Just show up at noon and walk. It's as easy as that."

Although LifeWalk is permeated with an air of celebration and fun, Nobles said she also wants people to remember the very serious reasons behind the walk.

"The HIV epidemic is doing nothing but growing right now in Dallas," she said. "There are some great things happening to help fight that epidemic, and LifeWalk is a very important avenue for people to use to help us reach the goals we've set to be successful for our clients.

"We hope everyone will come on out, enjoy the anniversary celebration, enjoy the party and enjoy doing something good for somebody who really needs your help."

their mind last week after learning that her parents, Jill and Tracy Harrison, are a lesbian couple.

St. Vincent's is part of the Anglican Church in North America, a group that broke away from the Episcopal Church USA a few years ago, in part over the denomination's acceptance of gays.

Since the school's Aug. 19 decision to revoke Olivia's acceptance, the story has made national news, being picked up by CNN in addition to several media outlets in North Texas.

Jill and Tracy Harrison said despite the initial shock and devastation of the school's denial, they're glad they've able to get the word out that anti-gay discrimination is alive and well.

"It's been a whirlwind for the last few days, but it's been worth every moment," Jill Harrison told Dallas Voice during an interview at their home on Tuesday, Aug. 24. "I put up a blog on Facebook the other day that said, 'Today's probably the proudest day that I could call myself a parent, because I stood up for something that I believe in for my daughter."

'Just not right'

After touring the school in June — and thor-

oughly researching it online — the Harrisons settled on St. Vincent's because of its solid academic reputation and its small class sizes, as well as the fact that it's so close to their home.

They also said they wanted Olivia to learn the basic tenets of Christianity, such as the Golden Rule and the Ten Commandments.

However, they were clueless about the school's history and its split from the Episcopal Church.

Jill and Tracy Harrison were legally married in Canada in 2006. Both Olivia and their 2-year-old son, Spencer, were conceived with the help of a sperm donor.

Jill Harrison said she crossed out "father" on Olivia's application to St. Vincent's, replaced it with "mother" and inserted Tracy's name — something they've done routinely on paperwork since Olivia was born.

On Tuesday, Aug. 17, the Harrisons attended parents night at St. Vincent's, and they said they felt it went well. Among other things, Jill and Tracy Harrison requested stickers for each of their vehicles so that Tracy could drop off Olivia and Jill could pick her up.

Two days later — and four days before school was to start — St. Vincent's officials called Jill Harrison and asked her to come to the school and meet with them.

After inquiring about Jill's relationship with

Tracy, the school revoked Olivia's acceptance.

"I was absolutely hysterical when I left there," Jill Harrison said. "It's her first time in school. We've made a really big deal about it."

Ryan Reed, dean of St. Vincent's, said this week that officials told Jill Harrison that, "the values taught at the school were in conflict with those at home."

"We thought this might put Olivia in a very conflicted situation to which Jill agreed," Reed said. "We don't dispute God's love for this family, just that one of the basic Christian values that we subscribe to is sexual activity inside a faithful, lifelong relationship between a husband and wife. As best we could ascertain, this was not something that Jill was in agreement about."

Asked why it took so long for school officials to realize the situation, Reed claimed that they tried repeatedly to contact the Harrisons over the summer to inquire about the altered application form.

Reed also said the school would have accepted Olivia if Jill Harrison were single and a lesbian but agreed to remain abstinent.

The decision was pursuant to a strict school policy that was also used to deny admission to a gay couple's daughter two years ago, to terminate an unmarried teacher who became pregnant, and to ban a parent — a husband who left

his wife for another woman, Reed said.

"We are simply asking people to strive toward the traditional Christian teaching in matters of how we live our lives," Reed said. "We don't follow people around if they are single and dating to make sure the date stops at the front door," he said. "We don't monitor what husband and wives are doing. But if something becomes public, we try to handle it in a pastoral and private way."

Asked how the school justifies punishing Olivia over her parents' identity, Reed said, "It seems far from punishment to me, in fact, it seems more loving to refer them to a school that can accommodate their family situation rather than put her in a situation where the moral legitimacy (and still in Texas the legal legitimacy) of her mom's relationship is called into question."

Jill and Tracy Harrison agreed that they wouldn't want Olivia to attend a school that doesn't accept their relationship.

But they denied that school officials tried to contact them before parents night, and they questioned why it took so long. They're also still struggling to come to terms with something they said they'd never experienced before.

"If persecution happens to just us, we're adults, we can handle it," said Tracy Harrison, who identifies as a "recovering Baptist."

"But they've taken it a step farther than that. They've discriminated against us because we're gay, and took it out on our 4-year-old daughter. And that's just not right. There's no part about that that's right."

Legal implications

Jill and Tracy Harrison said they'll likely never forget some of the vicious comments that have been posted about their family online in response to the story.

They also denied rumors raised on some blogs that they plan to sue and try to force the school to accept Olivia, who's now scheduled to begin attending a local fine arts preschool Monday, Aug. 30.

One LGBT legal expert confirmed that if the Harrisons did try to sue, they wouldn't have a case, because the school appears well within its constitutional right to religious freedom and expression.

"There are some areas where there is some gray, but pretty much a religious school is off limits," said Ken Upton, a senior staff attorney for Lambda Legal who's based in Dallas. "The truth is, religion is still a very powerful thing in America when it comes to the law. They get a lot of free passes to do terrible things. That's unfortunate, but that's the way the First Amendment works."

Although the Harrisons don't plan to sue St. Vincent's, the school remains embroiled in litigation with the Episcopal Diocese of Fort Worth.

"They're occupying Episcopal Church property, and they're using our name," said Katie Sherrod, a spokeswoman for the diocese.

Initial media reports referred to the school as St. Vincent's Episcopal School. As of Thursday, Aug. 26, the school's website had been changed to say St. Vincent's Cathedral School, but Reed remained defiant.

"[The Episcopal Church USA] does not own the term Episcopal," he said. "There is in this country the Charismatic Episcopal Church for example or in other places the Scottish Episcopal Church. In conversation, I refer to myself as an Anglican but until the lawsuit is settled we are still the Episcopal Diocese of Fort Worth, 'province of the Southern Cone' (which is part of South America)."

Sherrod acknowledged that it could be years before the issues are resolved in court.

"They left the Episcopal Church over the issues of the ordination of women and over the blessing of same-sex unions and the fact that we have two openly gay bishops," Sherrod said. "I'm not at all surprised that the leadership at St. Vincent's school made this decision. It's consistent with what they've been doing for years. I'm saddened by it, but I'm not surprised by it."

Sherrod is among those who've contacted the Harrisons to offer her support and condolences.

"Jill had to sit Olivia down and say, 'Nope, you aren't going to get to go,'" Sherrod said. "That's just heartbreaking."

To shop or not to shop?

That is the question for LGBTs angry over donations by Target, Best Buy to anti-gay politician

Although Target and Best Buy have a 100 percent rating in the Human Rights Campaign's Corporate Equality Index, they were removed last week from HRC's Buying for Equality guide.

Fred Sainz, HRC vice president of communications and marketing, called the move "unprece-

At issue are donations the companies made to MN Forward, a political action committee supporting anti-gay Minnesota Republican candidate for governor Tom Emmer.

Target donated \$150,000 and Best Buy contributed \$100,000 to the PAC.

Emmer supports a constitutional ban on samesex marriage. He is affiliated with the Christian rock band You Can Run But You Cannot Hide, which has advocated violence against LGBT peo-

Gays "play the victim when they are, in fact, the predator. On average, they molest 117 people before they're found out," the band's front man, Bradlee Dean, has said.

"These are nice people," Emmer said of Dean, who has also said that Muslims are upholding the laws of God by calling for the execution of gays.

Sainz said the corporate index measures a company's workplace practices as they relate to their employees. Most of the score is based on certain fixed criteria such as offering domestic partner insurance and having nondiscrimination policies in place that cover sexual orientation and gender

Sainz said that up to 15 points can be added for outreach and marketing to the LGBT community. The same number of points may be deducted for contributing to organizations that fight equality or to discriminatory ballot measures.

"Target and Best Buy got 100 percent and deserved the score at the time," he said. "It's just a snapshot in time."

Buying for Equality is made up of companies listed in the CEI that consumers would use. While Lockheed Martin received a 100 percent rating, few people reading the buyers' guide shop for aircraft engines, Sainz said.

The guide "sends the message to support these companies," Sainz said.

Target bookends Oak Lawn with one store at Central Expressway and Haskell Avenue and another on Marsh Lane at Northwest Highway, just

past Love Field.

Best Buy has an active LGBT employees group in the Dallas area. A local representative of the group said any statement on the issue should come from corporate headquarters, but the corporate spokesperson did not return calls.

Target has a gay employee group but none active locally. North Texas GLBT Chamber of Commerce President and CEO Tony Vedda said that those groups are more common at retail companies' corporate headquarters and distribution centers than in the stores themselves.

Sainz said that consumer anger has been directed more at Target than Best Buy.

"We go to Target once a week," he said. "We feel personally betrayed."

He said that Best Buy is where he goes for electronics but shops there much less frequently.

No formal boycott of either store has been organized, but many in the LGBT community as well as allies and others concerned with social justice issues have stayed out of both Target and Best Buy since the donations were made public.

Employees at Target at Cityplace refused to say whether or not their business has been affected and told this reporter to leave the store.

Neither company reports a financial impact, but three investment funds controlling \$57.5 million in stock have filed shareholder complaints.

Liz Cappon said she disagrees with the donations both companies made but is not boycotting.

"I can guarantee that there are tons of other stores that have done or are currently doing the same thing with candidates and PACs but maybe they just aren't receiving the same attention right now," she said.

She said some friends of hers have switched to Wal-Mart. That company's CEI score is 40 percent.

"I would prefer to shop somewhere that treats their gay employees well," she said.

"Target wants to sell me socks, and I want to buy socks from Target, but first I have to feel good about where my sock money is going," Ethridge said.

Ethridge said it's too early to know what longterm impact the reaction to Target's donation will have.

Sainz held talks with Target that produced no immediate results. He said his talks with Best Buy continue.

"I think there's a silver lining," he said. "We, as a community, sent a message to corporations to factor in our issues."

He said that there's no way to measure the effect the boycott of Target has had, but thinks companies that care about public reaction will be more careful about their political donations in the future.

Making use of a chance to educate

Instead of working to block controversial film, TENT wants to put transgender issues on the front burner at Austin film fest by sponsoring discussion of movie

ecently, Transgender Education Network of Texas has made a very difficult decision. We have been following the controversy surrounding the film, "Ticked-Off Trannies With Knives." We have been discussing the issue with Austin Gay and Lesbian International Film Festival (AGLIFF) and both organizations believe that there needs to be dialog surrounding the

To that end, AGLIFF will bring the film to their well-attended festival in the fall, and TENT will facilitate a discussion afterward. This was not a decision we made lightly and we want to take a moment and clarify our position.

Many trans activists, as well as GLAAD, have been very vocal critics of this film and the "negative portrayal of trans people in it."

The majority of our board has screened this film and, though many of us don't think the film the greatest piece of celluloid art out there, we all pretty much agree that on its surface, it doesn't portray trans folk too negatively.

Quite to the contrary, it shows drag queens (part of the trans community) fighting back against people who want to hurt them (and are very successful ... at least physically).

I'd like to lay all of our cards on the table here. Originally, we were looking at this film to use as a fundraiser for TENT. After all, with all the controversy and shouting, it was bound to be a money-maker.

And we felt strongly that we needed to have a conversation around what was really making us angry; as an organization whose mission is to educate folks about the gender diverse, we felt an obligation to facilitate a conversation.

But after our second viewing and subsequent discussion, it became clear to many of us that using this film as a fundraiser would be adding more fuel to an already over-stoked fire.

We also felt that doing nothing was not an option either. You know, if folks didn't raise a fuss about this film it may not have even made a ripple in our community.

As a matter of fact the controversy, arguments and protests have done more to pique the interest of viewers than any standard marketing that La Luna Entertainment had planned to

So, it is out there; we can't do anything about that. So we feel it is necessary to talk about it.

We also feel that to have an intelligent discussion about the film, it is necessary to actually see it. Many of the protesters have not seen it and


don't plan to for fear of giving the appearance of condoning the film. We hope they change their minds when it comes to Austin.

Let's take a moment to talk about what the critics are saying.

One of the biggest issues early on was the use of the murders of Angie Zapata and Jorge Mercado in the trailers marketing the film.



The film gives a nod to the "blacksploitation" films of the 1960s and is graphically violent, shot in high contrast and is very campy. The protesters (rightly, in my opinion) strongly objected to the use of the two very real and very tragic murders in the marketing of this admittedly violent and campy film.

The filmmaker listened to the critics and quickly removed those quotes. I didn't see that trailer (it had already been pulled) and when I spoke to Israel Luna, the maker of the film, I said to him that had I seen the original trailer, I would probably be equally as offended.

I asked him if he understood that and he answered, "Yes, and that is why I removed those references.'

Although they have been removed from the trailer, this is still an issue that the critics hold on to as a reason to protest.

The other reason that the protesters and GLAAD would like to see the film banned is because "... it demeans actual transgender women who struggle for acceptance and respect in their day-to-day lives."

We're not so sure we agree with this statement. Whereas drag queens are not indicative of all or even most of the gender diverse community, they are a part of the community and, I for one, am proud to stand side by side with them.

After all, it was the drag queens that hurled the first bottles to start the protest at Stonewall, a protest that launched a movement.

Now drag queens, by definition, are usually caricatures of women. We all know what it means to wear "drag queen" make-up, and few women wear the exaggerated make-up and clothing on the street in their day-to-day lives.

But that is the nature of being a drag queen; they are performers wearing a costume. And guess

what? They exist in real life. I know quite a few and are honored to call them friends.

In my opinion, the drag queens characterized in the film are pretty darn accurate. For the most part, I liked these characters. They were real! Yes,

Finally, there are a couple of criticisms that I may agree with. The first is the title.

I don't condone the use of the "T" word; I don't use the "T" word, and I advocate that no

The other criticism that has a bit of credence is the speed in which the film goes from a relatively realistic portrayal of horrendous violence perpetrated against these trans women to a "check your brains at the door" campiness. I have some real problems with that and would have a few suggestions for Mr. Luna for a re-edit if he wants to hear them.

But, all of those things aside, it is time to watch the film and talk about it.

It is for that reason that we are not blocking AGLIFF from bringing it to the film festival. In interest of full disclosure, we were given the opportunity to block it; if TENT said "no," AGLIFF would not have brought it in.

But we feel strongly that this controversial film can open a dialog that can do a lot of good. So we said, bring it in and let us sponsor the discussion after. We hope to have the filmmaker, the critics, the supporters, and GLAAD all participate in this important discussion.

Making hay out of hate

Journalists, politicians generate fear for personal gain over plans for mosque near site of 9/11 attack

recently saw a video clip that sent chills down my spine of a supposedly "grassroots" rally Loutside a closed Burlington Coat Factory in New York City where protesters were chanting against building a mosque on the site. They were chanting words this publication wouldn't print.

The hatred was so great that, at one point, a carpenter working on the new building that will replace the World Trade Center passed through the crowd and was verbally and physically attacked. Apparently the hate-filled crowd thought he was a Muslim. He was simply a black man with a skullcap. The level of vitriol was hard to watch: So much anger — and at what?

The truth is not nearly as sensational as the people at Fox News would have you believe. Cordoba Center, the building that is proposed, is not just an Islamic Cultural Center, it will also contain interfaith spaces for Christian and Jewish worship and meditation. Of course you have not heard that story in the news, because it is easier and more sensational to call it the Ground Zero Mosque and show pictures of scary guys in turbans for ratings.

The fundamentalists and right wing have grabbed onto this issue like a chew toy and are shaking it for all the fear and hatred it is worth. That is what bothers me the most. Fear and hatred are two tools that have been used to galvanize people against us for centuries, and I suspect we are uniquely attuned to recognize them.

It is easy to see where all this is coming from as well. It is a great deal the fault of the right-wing media, like Fox News with their demagogues Glenn Beck and Bill O'Reilly. But it also has become a cause célèbre for politicians seeking a little extra boost. It would be easy to look at these videos and events and see a "clash of cultures" building. But that is not the reality of the situation.

What we are seeing is a carefully orchestrated fear mongering narrative guided by some pretty cynical folks. Just think back a few years ago when candidates were using the fear of homosexuals to rile up their base.

Fake research groups like the Family Research Council published papers claiming that "35 percent of pedophiles are homosexuals and a child molester is 17 times more likely to be homosexual than heterosexual." Both these figures are intentional misinterpretations of the actual studies done by real researchers.

The point is, both these "issues" are really no more than jingoistic talking points that rally people

into a frenzy. These kinds of false controversies only feed on the underlying real issues of racism, homophobia and xenophobia and blur the picture.

That leaves the question of why? Why would anyone want to stir up this kind of anger? Again, I look to the cynical folks causing it.

For fundamentalist preachers and organiza-

tions it is an "easy sell." Every tent revivalist knows you can get a much fuller collection basket when the congregation is riled up.

The same holds true for the organizations like American Family Association. Fear fills their coffers. For politicians, the answer is obvious. As Sarah Palin says, "mama grizzlies," once angered, are hard to stop. A populace who is scared will vote for whoever offered them "security."

Hardy Haberman Just look to the previous administration and how they successfully manipulated a manufactured war to win re-election. For the "news" organizations like Fox, fear sells. Why spend money on real reporting when you can create events?

As a sidenote, it is further proof of the cynical nature of right-wing media that Al-Walid bin Talal,

a Saudi financier, owns a big chunk of Fox News and is also funding the "Ground Zero Mosque" through his charitable contributions. You'll never hear in the fear narrative being pushed by Fox.

We LGBT Americans know just how powerful fear and hatred can be. We need to look past the sound bites and bumper stickers and see the real

> issues behind this whole ruckus. It's about the right to be different. That is a founding principal of our country: Freedom to build a place of worship, a community center, an AIDS clinic or whatever should not be hindered by baseless fears. If we fall prey to the media spotlight beating the drums to "stop the mosque," we should not be surprised the next time that spotlight falls on us.

It isn't easy to see past the glare of this craziness. Like the lyrics to

the song from the musical Chicago say, "... how can they see with sequins in their eyes ... Razzle

Mama knows best

e like our mothers and grandmothers just the way they are: Ornery or pleasant, they are, for the most part, the only people who can get away with being themselves and remain dear to our hearts.

Tell this to comedian Vicki Lawrence. This Saturday, she's bringing her most famous character, Thelma Harper — or as we know her, Mama — to the Laugh With a Legend Gala at Casa Manana. But it might be fair to say this is Mama 2.0.

"Mama has changed a lot," Lawrence says. "I told myself for this run that I wouldn't be happy going back. We need to go forward, and so we set about making Mama incredibly modern."

Will our favorite ol' grump be tweeting her snarky retorts? That would be a "no." But Mama has come a long way since her inception on *The Carol Burnett Show*. Part of that evolution is thanks to Harvey Korman, whom Lawrence credits as really starting Mama's growth.

"She changed between *Burnett* and *Mama's Family,*" she says. "Korman really helped out. He made the point that people couldn't just come home, relax and watch her be mean to everyone. She had to become a fun and silly character. I learned the most about comedy from Harvey."

Lawrence plans to keep Mama topical because she apparently has opinions on BP and Mel Gibson. But she also has visions of Lil' Kim in her head. For this show, Lawrence will perform Mama's Rap to prove she's no fuddy-duddy and knows what's what.

Her metamorphosis mirrors Lawrence's. As the years passed, Lawrence grew from 20something comedy ingénue into pop culture icon — and grew a little closer in age to Mama.

"She became this wonderful peacock of a character," she says. "But I have to say, I tend to agree with her a little more as I get older. "

Through Mama, Lawrence has built her own gay fan base that surprised her initially. Her *Mama's Family* co-star Dorothy Lyman was the first to show Lawrence pictures of drag queens in old lady garb. But then it all seems to make sense for her.

"Everyone has a twisted family," Lawrence says. "And mother issues. But gay fans have been wonderful, and I guess they love that she is this outrageous female character — although probably not as much fun to dress up as as Cher."

Lawrence is spending more time on the stage than the small screen, touring with *Vicki Lawrence and Mama: A Two-Woman Show*. But her heart sounds like it's still in television. She's had bit parts

on *Roseanne* and *Yes, Dear* and even played against teen megastar Miley Cyrus as Hannah Montana's, grandmother Mamaw Stewart.

"That was a fun set, but if it's television versus the stage, well that's a loaded question," she says. "We taped *Burnett* like a bat out of hell. I miss that kind of TV. Stage is like that with the live audience and interaction. I miss TV. Now, everybody's putting their two cents in via committee."

Lawrence sees today's TV, at least behind the scenes, as far different from her heyday. It's harder to have fun than when she was new to the medium.

"I wrote to Carol when I was in high school. She changed my

life and told me I would have found showbiz anyway," she says. "The funny thing is I don't know how comedy found me. I was gonna go to college to become a dental hygienist, marry a dentist and be done with it!"

Of course, then we wouldn't have Mama, or any of her other characters. But Thelma Harper *is* Vicki Lawrence's comedic legacy — which is a duel-edged sword.

"I'm definitely in Mama's shadow — she gets all the good jokes," she laughs. "I need to be me before I'm not anymore. We were watching the Michael Jackson memorial and I think sometimes I wanna do that for Mama. The sad thing is, if I were gone, people would miss *her*!"

Gay TV

'Glee,' 'Modern Family' lead a queer wave at the Emmy Awards

We're used to the Tony Awards being gayer'n eight guys blowing nine guys. But when did it happen to the Emmys?

In truth, it's still no contest, though it lately seems like it. For decades TV has had the occasional *Soap* or *Will & Grace*; and reality shows have their gay contestants. But those always seemed tangential — marketing ploys or happy chances more than a systematic change. (Ian McKellen, for instance, is nominated for the miniseries *The Prisoner*, but there's nothing especially gay about the show.)

But this past TV season, the gay quotient has gone from in evidence to inevitable. And it's largely because of *Glee*.

Created by gay scribe Ryan Murphy, the musical comedy series is the frontrunner at the Emmys, which air Sunday on NBC. But all the nominated comedies except one (*Curb Your Enthusiasm*) have lots of gay: 30 Rock, Modern Family, The Office and Nurse Jackie.

In addition to writing, directing and the series itself, several openly gay actors are nominated for their performances, especially in the supporting categories: Jane Lynch as conniving Sue Sylvester and Chris Cofler as the flamboyant teen Kurt on *Glee* are the highest profile, but Cofler goes head-to-head against other gay actors (or characters): Jesse Tyler Ferguson (gay) and Eric Stonestreet

(gay on TV only) as the same-sex couple on *Modern Family*, and Neil Patrick Harris as a womanizer on *How I Met Your Mother*.

The guest performer categories include Kristen Chenoweth as the favorite playing an aging lush on *Glee* ... but she's up against Jane Lynch again as a therapist on *Two and a Half Men*.

30 Rock is one of the most inclusively amazing comedies on TV, with many gay plots and characters, including guest actor nominee Will Arnett; in the same category, Neil Patrick Harris faces his toughest competition from fellow *Glee* guest actor Mike O'Malley as Kurt's understanding father.

The dramas have less gay content, but some. The winner for the past two years, *Mad Men*, had

a heartbreaking plot involving the show's closeted art director, Bryan Batt (who has not appeared in the new season that just began airing), and *True Blood* from Alan Ball has sexy sodomites aplenty. Lily Tomlin took on a deeply serious role as a modern-day Lady Macbeth in this season's *Damages*; she'll probably win.

And of course there's Kathy Griffin, lobbying openly for another win for her *My Life on the D-List* show.

Oh, and the Tony Awards are nominated for variety special, giving host Harris three shots this year. The Tonys winning the Emmy with a queer host? How gay is that?

The 62nd Annual Emmy Awards air on NBC Aug. 29 at 7 p.m.

Pas de don't Movie about TBT director Sir Ben Stevenson mixes ballet with cliche

A great story and some amazing dancing are, unfortunately, sacrificed on the altar of cheesy melodrama in Mao's Last Dancer. It's hard to believe the great Bruce Beresford (Tender Mercies, Driving Miss Daisy) could have watched this, let alone directed it. And no one who even typed the scripts for *Shine* and *The Notebook* could have been responsible for this screenplay, let alone the person who wrote or adapted them (Jan Sardi).

This is the true-ish story of Li Cunxin (Chi Cao), who was invited to spend the summer of

1981 with the Houston Ballet and decided to stay in America. In a throwback to movies of several decades ago, Bruce Greenwood plays the ballet's artistic director, Ben Stevenson — now the artistic director of the Texas Ballet The-

ater — as an obviously gay man who lives alone and has absolutely no life outside of his work.

Li, by contrast, is obviously straight, because even as a boy, every time he partners a female on stage there is another female in the audience looking jealous.

Nine years prior Li, one of seven sons of a

peasant couple, was plucked from his humble village to be trained at the Beijing Arts Academy, along with 39 other Chinese children. They're given a standard indoctrination in Communism, including being taught that China has "the highest standard of living in the world," and capitalist nations the lowest.

When he arrives in oil-rich Texas at the height of the boom, Li is overwhelmed, having never seen such luxury, even in Beijing; he can hardly believe Ben has such a house to himself. But the

> Chinese consul has counseled him not to trust anyone, "especially women — they'll lead you astray.'

The early part of the film toggles between Houston and Li's early years in China, where he is unhappy until an old-school

teacher, later prosecuted for his teachings, makes him appreciate dance and his own skills.

When the Houston delegation visits Beijing in 1980, they're disappointed to see the students, except for Li, are more like athletes than dancers. In Houston Li gets a break but has only three hours to learn the pas de deux from Don Quixote.

Li meets aspiring dancer Elizabeth Mackey (Amanda Schull), who, in this screenplay, is more a device than a person. Afraid of what will happen to his family in China if he defects, Li learns he can stay in the U.S. if he marries a citizen. (Ben pitches a hissy fit.)

Unable to contact his parents, Li worries about them constantly. Years later, Ben arranges for them to surprise him by showing up in the audience for a performance. It must have taken months to arrange and could have taken a lot of stress off Li if he'd known it was in the works, but the surprise makes for a more upbeat (and corny) climax.

That may be the stupidest thing in the movie but there are countless smaller things, like people working in a Washington office in what must be the middle of the night. Even original twists are presented in such a way as to look clichéd.

The ballet sequences, choreographed by Graeme Murphy, are the saving grace of Mao's Last Dancer — if only we got a two-hour recital instead of the story. Not to be shortchanged is the principal dancer, Chi Cao, who is also a decent actor as far as the script allows. He'd be a natural for a new film biography of Bruce Lee — I'd pay to see Chi replicate Lee's fight choreography.

Satan's little helper

'Blair Witch' can go to hell — 'Last Exorcism' puts fright in the pseudo-doc

Pseudo-documentary horror movies seem to succeed in inverse proportion to their quality: the totally unwatchable *Blair Witch Project* and *Paranormal Activity* made gazillions, while the far superior *Cloverfield* was only a modest hit. So expect **The Last Exorcism** to sink like a stone.

Produced by Eli Roth and directed by Daniel Stamm, *Exorcism* has serious flaws, including an ending that won't please everyone, but when it's good, which is most of the time, it's terrific.

Patrick Fabian stars as Cotton Marcus, the subject of the documentary-in-progress. He followed in the footsteps of his preacher father from age 10, and the style, incorporating card tricks, and exorcisms, is the family sideline (his father has done about 150).

The premature birth of his son triggered a crisis of faith for Cotton, who continued to function on automatic pilot. He felt his exorcisms benefited people psychologically — as long as they believed actual demons were leaving their bodies they were cured — but following an incident two years ago where a child died during one in Texas got Cotton out of the business.

As a parting gesture, he's making a documentary to expose exorcism as a scam. For his last one, Cotton and a two-person crew head to Ironwood, La., where superstitious drunk Louis Sweetzer (Louis Herthum) thinks his 16-year-old daughter Nell (Ashley Bell) is possessed and has been killing their livestock.

Cotton turns on his oily charm for Louis, Nell and Nell's hostile brother Caleb (Caleb Landry

Jones), while privately exposing his tricks to the camera. He performs the exorcism, taking the alleged demon into his own body and freeing Nell from possession. Happy ending — except the movie is only half over.

As strange things start happening for real, *The Last Exorcism* becomes a whodunit, with Satan one of the suspects. There's even a gay twist along the way to an ending that doesn't tie up all the loose ends. I would have liked a few more questions answered before the perfect final shot,

but it's still a hoot.

One major drawback is the lack of accents on the major characters, especially those who live in the Louisiana backwoods. Even in Baton Rouge it's unlikely the congregation would trust a preacher

who sounds like a Yankee — even if he is second-generation and turns it on a little in the pulpit.

With that exception, the acting is very good, especially that of Bell, who will erase Linda Blair from your memory for all time with her physical and emotional performance as Nell.

While there are some of the requisite shaky-cam shots, the fact that professional filmmakers are supposed to be behind the video camera keeps *The Last Exorcism* from causing nausea or otherwise being hard to watch. (Cat lovers will have a problem with one scene.)

The wit and subtle satire of the first half and the mystery and suspense of the second combine to make this a pleasant late-summer surprise that deserves to stay around until Halloween.

Rainbow connection

Jose Reyes, chair of the DSO's gala, makes a musical outreach to the gay community

When the Dallas Symphony Orchestra people began planning their season kickoff gala and after-party, longtime volunteer Jose Reyes had an a-ha moment: An ultra-lush soiree of society's finest that wasn't being pushed to the LGBT community? It didn't make sense.

When he chimed in that this should be a direction to consider, the DSO went him

"They asked me if I wanted to chair the event," Reyes says. "I said absolutely!"

This brought to light a bigger notion to Reves prompting, him to root out the connection between Dallas' premium philharmonic and the gay community. As a 20-year DSO supporter and a member of the gay community, the answer was really in front of him the whole time, and obvious to all Dallas gay ... whether they realized it or not.

"The Easter concert at Lee Park targets us," he says. "The DSO is keenly aware that the audience that day isn't just Mr. and Mrs. Jones, it's also Mr. and Mr. Jones and that is perfectly fine with them."

The annual event is right there among gay events with the Pride Parade and the Halloween block party in terms of visibility. With that, Reyes witnesses the DSO's support of the community upfront and now wants to turn that around. He knows there's a strong connection that needs to be realized.

"It's no secret the gay community is a huge supporter of the arts. We're the tastemakers aren't we?" he says. "That concert may be free to you and me, but it's very expensive to put on so I feel it's important we support them back."

Reyes figures this gala will do just that, because gays love a good party. This year, they gala — a fundraiser for education and programs by the DSO — will be a huge, saucy affair (see sidebar).

The gala concert with pianist Jeffrey Kahane and the after party experience is going to be fabulous and the only ticket in town. The Meyerson

lobby will be completely transformed into a romantic 18th century European garden in the time of Beethoven."

He thinks with a direct push to the community, it will respond. Sometimes all that's needed, according to Reyes, is an invitation. He assures this is the one to get.

'The gays are gonna love it," he assures. "And the DSO loves its gays."

Jose Reyes is not kidding that the DSO's kickoff gala will be over the top. The event is hosted by conductor Jaap van Zweden's daughter Anna-Sophia and they've commissioned designer extraordinaire Todd Fiscus, pictured, to create the lush look and transport partygoers back to 18th century Europe.

Fiscus' design concept for the event is described as an "elegant interpretation of Beethoven's garden with rich greenery, treelike decor and soft tonal florals." With some creative lighting, the ceiling will recall the night sky. This doesn't sound like an after-party as much as it does a dreamy oasis.

Don't fall for it. There is still a party to be had and van Zweden won't let you forget that. She hosts two "star bars" throughout the evening. In the first, DJ Lucy Wrubel will provide the dance tunes. In bar No. 2, they go live with local band Goga providing the live music.

Already the Dallas Symphony Orchestra is making an impression on the



Queer connections infiltrate lots of the upcoming season of arts

When you have a gay theater company (as Dallas does in Uptown Players) and another troupe dedicated to bringing Broadway musicals to town (as Dallas Summer Musicals does), you can be pretty confident in finding gay appeal in the lively arts.

But cast your gaze — and your gays — outside the usual focus, and there a lot more to discover across the arts in North Texas this season.

Chief among the highlights: The Dallas Opera's coup in snagging dreamy gay baritone Paulo Szot, who won a much-deserved Tony for the revival of *South Pacific*, in the title role in Mozart's **Don Giovanni** (Oct. 22). Director Stephen Lawless returns to helm **Anna Bolena** (Oct. 29). DallasOpera.org.

Of course, Uptown Players and DSM *are* getting into the action with their upcoming shows as well. UP's final production of their 2010 season is the American premiere of **Closer to Heaven**, written to the songs of the Pet Shop Boys. The musical drama opens Oct. 1 at the Kalita Humphreys Theater. The group will announce its 2011 season on Tuesday. Uptown-Players.org. And DSM's national tour of **Shrek** is the State Fair Musical this year, opening Sept. 28. (See story, Page S8). DallasSummerMusicals.org.

Next week, Theatre Three produces the local premiere of **Songs from an Unmade Bed**, a song cycle about a gay man working his way through a relationship. In previews from Sept. 3 in the Theatre Too space. Also in Theatre Too: Bruce R. Coleman's latest play, the puppet show **Tales from Mount Olympus**, and spring welcomes **Why Torture Is Wrong**, and the **People Who Love Them** by Christopher Durang. Next up on the main stage is *Laramie Project* creator Moises Kaufman's **33 Variations**, followed in December by the local premiere of **The Drowsy Chaperone**. Theatre3Dallas.com.

Contemporary Theatre of Dallas continues its presentation of Ed Graczyk's world premiere Texas-set comedy-drama with a gay twist, **Blue Moon Dancing**, which runs through Sept. 12. Its 2010–11 season kicks off in October, and includes



Some patients taking KALETRA can develop inflammation of the pancreas and liver problems, which can cause death. Patients may develop changes in heart rhythm, large increases in triglycerides and cholesterol, diabetes, high blood sugar, changes in body fat, and/or increased bleeding in people with hemophilia. Some patients may develop signs and symptoms of serious infections they already have after starting anti-HIV medicines. Please see Brief Summary for more details.

Patient Information

Read the Medication Guide that comes with KALETRA before you start taking it and each time you get a refill. There may be new information. This information does not take the place of talking with your doctor about your medical condition or treatment. You and your doctor should talk about your treatment with KALETRA before you start taking it and at regular check-ups. You should stay under your doctor's care when taking KALETRA.

What is the most important information I should know about KALETRA?

KALETRA may cause serious side effects, including:

- Interactions with other medicines. It is important to know the medicines that should not be taken with KALETRA. Read the section "What should I tell my doctor before taking KALETRA?"
- Changes in your heart rhythm and the electrical activity of your heart. These changes may be seen on an EKG (electrocardiogram) and can lead to serious heart problems. Your risk for these problems may be higher if you:
- already have a history of abnormal heart rhythm or other types of heart disease.
- take other medicines that can affect your heart rhythm while you take KALETRA.

Tell your doctor right away if you have any of these symptoms while taking KALETRA:

- dizziness
- lightheadedness
- fainting
- · sensation of abnormal heartbeats

See the section below "What are the possible side effects of KALETRA?" for more information about serious side effects.

What is KALETRA?

KALETRA is a prescription anti-HIV medicine that contains two medicines: lopinavir and ritonavir. KALETRA is called a protease inhibitor that is used with other anti-HIV-1 medicines to treat people with human immunodeficiency virus (HIV-1) infection. HIV-1 is the virus that causes AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome).

It is not known if KALETRA is safe and effective in children under 14 days old.

Who should not take KALETRA?

 Do not take KALETRA if you are taking certain medicines. For more information about medicines you should not take with KALETRA, please see
 "Can I take other medicines with KALETRA?" and consult with your doctor about all other medicines you take. Do not take KALETRA if you have an allergy to KALETRA or any of its ingredients, including ritonavir and lopinavir.

What should I tell my doctor before taking KALETRA?

KALETRA may not be right for you. Tell your doctor about all your medical conditions, including if you:

- have any heart problems, including if you have a condition called Congenital Long QT Syndrome.
- have liver problems, including Hepatitis B or Hepatitis C.
- · have diabetes.
- have hemophilia. People who take KALETRA may have increased bleeding.
- have low potassium in your blood.
- are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if KALETRA will harm your unborn baby. Birth control pills or patches may not work as well while you take KALETRA. To prevent pregnancy while taking KALETRA, women who take birth control pills or use estrogen patch for birth control should either use a different type of birth control or an extra form of birth control. Talk to your doctor about how to prevent pregnancy while taking KALETRA.
- take KALETRA during pregnancy, talk with your doctor about how you can take part in an antiretroviral pregnancy registry. The purpose of the pregnancy registry is to follow the health of you and your baby.
- are breast-feeding. Do not breast-feed if you are taking KALETRA. You should not breast-feed if you have HIV-1. If you are a woman who has or will have a baby while taking KALETRA, talk with your doctor about the best way to feed your baby. If your baby does not already have HIV-1, there is a chance that HIV-1 can be passed to your baby through your breast milk.

Tell your doctor about all the medicines you take, including prescription and non-prescription medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. Many medicines interact with KALETRA. Do not start taking a new medicine without telling your doctor or pharmacist. Your doctor can tell you if it is safe to take KALETRA with other medicines. Your doctor may need to change the dose of other medicines while you take KALETRA.

Medicines you should not take with KALETRA.

Serious problems or death can happen if you take these medicines with KALETRA:

- · ergot containing medicines, including:
- ergotamine tartrate (Cafergot®, Migergot, Ergomar, Ergostat, Medihaler Ergotamine, Wigraine, Wigrettes)
- dihydroergotamine mesylate (D.H.E. 45®, Embolex, Migranal®)
- ergonovine, ergonovine and methylergonovine (Ergotrate, Methergine), ergotamine and methylergonovine
- Ergotrate Maleate, methylergonovine maleate (Methergine)
- triazolam (Halcion®), midazolam hydrochloride oral syrup
- pimozide (Orap®)
- the cholesterol lowering medicines lovastatin (Mevacor®) or simvastatin (Zocor®)
- sildenafil (Revatio®) only when used for the treatment of pulmonary arterial hypertension. (See "Medicines that may need changes" and "What are the possible side effects of Kaletra?" for information about the use of sildenafil for erectile problems.)
- alfuzosin (Uroxatral®)

Medicines that you should not take with KALETRA since they may make KALETRA not work as well:

- the herbal supplement St. John's Wort (hypericum perforatum)
- rifampin (Rimactane®, Rifadin®, Rifater®, or Rifamate®)

Medicines that may need changes:

- birth control pills that contain estrogen ("the pill") or the birth control (contraceptive) patches
- certain anticancer medicines, such as nilotinib (Tasigna®) and dasatinib (Sprycel®)
- certain cholesterol lowering medicines, such as atorvastatin (Lipitor®) or rosuvastatin (Crestor®)
- certain other antiretroviral medicines, such as efavirenz (Atripla® and Sustiva®), nevirapine (Viramune®), amprenavir (Agenerase®) and nelfinavir (Viracept®)
- anti-seizure medicines, such as phenytoin (Dilantin®) carbamazepine, (Tegretol®), phenobarbital
- medicines for erectile problems, such as sildenafil (Viagra®), tadalafil (Cialis®), or vardenafil (Levitra®)

- medicines for tuberculosis (TB), such as rifabutin (Mycobutin®)
- inhaled steroid medicines, such as fluticasone propionate (Flonase®)
- inhaled medicines such as salmeterol (Serevent®) or salmeterol in combination with fluticasone propionate (Advair®). Your doctor may need to change to a different medicine
- · medicines for gout, such as colchicine (Colcrys®)
- medicines to treat pulmonary arterial hypertension (PAH), such as bosentan (Tracleer®) or tadalafil (Adcirca®)
- pain medicines, such as fentanyl (Duragesic®, lonsys™, Fentora®) and methadone

If you are not sure if you are taking a medicine above, ask your doctor.

How should I take KALETRA?

- Take KALETRA every day exactly as prescribed by your doctor.
- It is very important to set up a dosing schedule and follow it every day.
- Do not change your treatment or stop treatment without first talking with your doctor.
- Swallow KALETRA tablets whole. Do not chew, break, or crush KALETRA tablets.
- . KALETRA tablets can be taken with or without food.
- If you are taking both Videx® (didanosine) and KALETRA:
- didanosine can be taken at the same time as KALETRA tablets, without food.
- take didanosine either one hour before or two hours after taking KALETRA oral solution.
- Do not miss a dose of KALETRA. This could make the virus harder to treat. If you forget to take KALETRA, take the missed dose right away. If it is almost time for your next dose, do not take the missed dose. Instead, follow your regular dosing schedule by taking your next dose at its regular time. Do not take more than one dose of KALETRA at one time.
- If you take more than the prescribed dose of KALETRA, call your local poison control center or emergency room right away.
- Take KALETRA oral solution with food to help it work better.
- If KALETRA is being used for your child, tell your doctor if your child's weight changes.
- KALETRA should not be given one time each day in children. When giving KALETRA to your child, give KALETRA exactly as prescribed.
- KALETRA oral solution contains a large amount of alcohol.
- If a young child drinks more than the recommended dose, it could make them sick from too much alcohol. Contact your local poison control center or emergency room right away.
- Talk with your doctor if you take or plan to take metronidazole or disulfiram. You can have severe nausea and vomiting if you take these medicines with KALETRA.

- When your KALETRA supply starts to run low, get more from your doctor or pharmacy. It is important not to run out of KALETRA. The amount of HIV-1 virus in your blood may increase if the medicine is stopped for even a short time. The virus may become resistant to KALETRA and become harder to treat.
- KALETRA can be taken with acid reducing agents used for heartburn or reflux such as omeprazole (Prilosec®) and ranitidine (Zantac®) with no dose adjustment.
- KÁLETRA should not be administered once daily in combination with carbamazepine (Tegretol® and Epitol®), phenobarbital (Luminal®), or phenytoin (Dilantin®).

Avoid doing things that can spread HIV infection. KALETRA does not stop you from passing HIV infection to others. Do not share needles, other injection equipment or personal items that can have blood or body fluids on them, like toothbrushes and razor blades. Always practice safer sex by using a latex or polyurethane condom to lower the chance of sexual contact with semen, vaginal secretions, or blood.

What are the possible side effects of KALETRA?

KALETRA can cause serious side effects.

- See "What is the most important information I should know about KALETRA?"
- Liver problems. Liver problems, including death, can happen in people who take KALETRA. Blood tests in people who take KALETRA may show possible liver problems. People with liver disease such as Hepatitis B and Hepatitis C who take KALETRA may have worsening liver disease. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you have any of these signs and symptoms of liver problems:
- o loss of appetite
- vellow skin and whites of eves (iaundice)
- o dark-colored urine
- o pale colored stools, itchy skin
- o stomach area (abdominal) pain.
- Inflammation of the pancreas (pancreatitis).
 Some people who take KALETRA get inflammation of the pancreas which may be serious and cause death.
 You have a higher chance of getting pancreatitis if you have had it before. Tell your doctor if you have nausea, vomiting, or abdominal pain while taking KALETRA. These may be signs of pancreatitis.
- Increases in certain fat (triglycerides and cholesterol) levels in your blood. Large increases of triglycerides and cholesterol can be seen in blood test results of some people who take KALETRA. The long-term chance of getting complications such as heart attacks or stroke due to increases in triglycerides and cholesterol caused by protease inhibitors is not known at this time.
- Diabetes and high blood sugar (hyperglycemia).
 Some people who take protease inhibitors including KALETRA get new or more serious diabetes, or high blood sugar. Tell your doctor if you notice an increase in thirst or urinate often while taking KALETRA.

- Changes in body fat. Changes in body fat in some people who take antiretroviral therapy. These changes may include increased amount of fat in the upper back and neck ("buffalo hump"), breast, and around the trunk. Loss of fat from the legs, arms and face may also happen. The cause and long-term health effects of these conditions are not known at this time.
- Increased bleeding for hemophiliacs. Some people with hemophilia have increased bleeding with protease inhibitors including KALETRA.
- Increased risk of certain problems when you take medicines used for the treatment of erectile problems such as sildenafil (Viagra®), tadalafil (Cialis®), or vardenafil (Levitra®) with KALETRA:
- low blood pressure. If you get dizzy or faint, you need to lie down. Tell your doctor if you feel dizzy, or have fainting spells.
- vision changes. Tell your doctor right away if you have vision changes.
- penis erection lasting more than 4 hours. If you are a male and have an erection that lasts longer than 4 hours, get medical help right away to avoid permanent damage to your penis. Your doctor can explain these symptoms to you.
- Allergic reactions. Skin rashes, some of them severe, can occur in people who take KALETRA. Tell your healthcare provider if you had a rash when you took another medicine for your HIV infection or if you notice any skin rash when you take KALETRA.

Common side effects of KALETRA include:

- diarrhea
- nausea
- · stomach area (abdominal) pain
- · feeling weak
- · vomiting
- headache
- upset stomach

These are not all of the possible side effects of KALETRA. For more information, ask your doctor or pharmacist. Tell your doctor about any side effect that bothers you or that does not go away.

Call your doctor for medical advice about side effects. You may report side effects to FDA at 1-800-FDA-

How should I store KALETRA?

KALETRA tablets:

- Store KALETRA tablets at room temperature, between 59°F to 86°F (15°C to 30°C).
- Do not keep KALETRA tablets out of the container it comes in for longer than 2 weeks, especially in areas where there is a lot of humidity. Keep the container closed tightly.

KALETRA oral solution:

 Store KALETRA oral solution in a refrigerator, between 36°F to 46°F (2°C to 8°C). KALETRA oral solution that is kept refrigerated may be used until the expiration date printed on the label.

- KALETRA oral solution that is stored at room temperature (less than 77°F or 25°C) should be used within 2 months.
- . Keep KALETRA away from high heat.

Throw away any medicine that is out of date or that you no longer need.

Keep KALETRA and all medicines out of the reach of children.

General information about KALETRA

KALETRA does not cure HIV-1 or AIDS. The long-term effects of KALETRA are not known at this time. People taking KALETRA may still get opportunistic infections or other conditions that happen with HIV-1 infection. Some of these conditions are pneumonia, herpes virus infections, and *Mycobacterium avium* complex (MAC) infections.

Medicines are sometimes prescribed for purposes other than those listed in a Medication Guide. Do not use KALETRA for a condition for which it was not prescribed. Do not give KALETRA to other people, even if they have the same condition you have. It may harm them

Come back to West Texas, Ed Graczyk, Ed Graczyk

'Jimmy Dean' playwright goes back to the llano estacado for new play

Ed Graczyk is kicking the back of my chair. Like every other member of the audience, he's sitting in the dark watching the world premiere of *Blue Moon Dancing*, which opened last week at the Contemporary Theatre of Dallas (*see review below*). But unlike everyone else, he has a reason to be a bit antsy. After all, he wrote it.

"This is the first time actors have spoken these words wearing costumes," he says, emphasizing how, even though he spent three years writing the play, it's still a new experience for him. Even at 69, it's a thrill he doesn't forget.

Graczyk had one of his biggest professional triumphs more than 30 years ago, when he saw his first major play, *Come Back to the 5 and Dime, Jimmy Dean, Jimmy Dean,* mounted on Broadway (and later filmed) with Robert Altman directing and Cher starring. If left him agog.

"I was the new kid on the block, about to have my first play produced on Broadway and directed by Altman. I loved Cher, I loved the entire cast — probably Sandy Dennis more than anyone. Sandy was always my first choice. God knows the movie kept the play alive. But Cher had done television and was used to making up lines on her own, so I had words with someone. But everyone got along fine."

Graczyk began his passion for theater as a teenager, acting in community theater in his native Erie, Pa., then becoming a set designer. He became a playwright almost on a dare, first writing for children. After a while, he decided he needed to go in another direction.

"I needed to go somewhere I could use swear words," he says. He took over a community theater, where he programmed edgy stuff like *The Boys in the Band*.

As with Jimmy Dean, Blue Moon Dancing is set in the fictional town of McCarthy in West Texas, which could lead a viewer to believe that Graczyk is himself a Texan (certainly those boots he kicked my chair with suggested as much). But aside from a five-year stint working at a children's theater in

Midland in the late 1960s, he's a Midwestern boy, through and through. So what led him to set two major plays in Lone Star plains?

"Have you ever *been* to West Texas?" he asked rhetorically. "You know what it's like. I tried to set [*Blue Moon*] in Ohio, but it had to be geographically remote. People 300 miles from a major city, they have dreams and hope that keep them alive and make them get out of bed every morning. I find the people down there, espe-

cially the women, to be so open with their emotions. But these people live everywhere."

His characters, then, are closely analyzed, though not always observed from personal contact. He included a

transsexual character in *Jimmy Dean* — controversial and groundbreaking at the time, though now popularly performed by high schools — as a reaction to an effeminate boy who he knew at the Pickwick Players in Midland.

"He was always being picked on but he had a strong core and was a very special young man and talented actor," he says. "When you start putting this stuff together [for a play], you realize you're walking through life looking forward, but your periphery takes stuff in. This kid came into view."

Still, when he wrote *Jimmy Dean*, he had never even met a transsexual; he has been gratified that so many trans people have since said how accurate the emotional life of that character is.

Blue Moon Dancing also has a gay plot, first introduced by a raid on the local rest stop, but coming into focus when it's clear one of the characters is tragically closeted, even though it's

never said aloud (Graczyk himself is coy about his personal life, quipping, "I am a 69-year-old enigma with borderline senility who has never been married and has no regrets").

Graczyk shared agent Audrey Wood with Dallas' own Preston Jones (author of the "Texas Trilogy"), though the two never met; but they also share the style of Southern-fried charm. Still, he bristles at the idea he write comedies.

"I don't write one-liners, I write humor," he says. "Humor comes out of sincerity. When things get serious, I get nervous and I write jokes naturally."

That, and kick the chair in front of him.

They shoot homos, don't they?

Like guys on GRINDR, Contemporary Theatre of Dallas has a definite "type:" The sentimental Southern comedy. To Last Night of Ballyhoo, Steel Mag-



nolias and the Texas Trilogy, add Blue Moon Dancing. This twangy West Texas idyll lopes through the lives of small-town folk who dream of Dallas. There's a plot, but really, it's about character.

That means it rises and falls on its cast, and this one is top-notch. Cindee Mayfield, as the community theater queen with aspirations for the Dallas Theater Center, has the face of a clown, perfectly communicating happiness and sadness with heart-breaking familiarity. Jenae Yerger-Glanton as a naive would-be bride who may be marrying a gay man (Kevin Moore, both pictured) captures both hope and desperation excellently. Catherine Wall, made up like a drag queen, and Nye Cooper as a redneck get the most laughs with the least effort. Sounds like a day in West Texas to me.



Fugue state Circle Theatre scores (ahem) with Itamar Moses' lilting 'Bach in Leipzig'

I've always thought that there's one thing missing from classical music to make it relevant: slapstick comedy. Apparently, Circle Theatre and playwright Itamar Moses concur; hence, Bach in Leipzig: A Farcical Fugue.

There are no pies in the face nor romantic bedhopping among the allmale cast (pity, with sexy actors like Steven Pounders, Andy Baldwin and Stephen Levall onstage). No, the farce here is mostly of the intellectual kind: Puns and plots, but also swordplay and, yes, a bit of cross-dressing (as if wigs and stockings on men wasn't drag enough) — a restoration comedy with contemporary bite.



(a silly bit that somehow doesn't get tired). Fasch (Pounders) thinks he's the rightful heir to the position; Schott (David H.M. Lambert) craves a post he was

unfairly denied; Steindorff (Levall) wants it just to please his daddy; Graupner (David Coffee, bedecked to look and sound like Albert Finney) seeks it simply to one-up his archrival, Telemann. There are intrigues and sabotages, secrets and counterfeits, robberies, hoaxes, druggings and chases. And it's all fabulous.

Moses' banal baseball play written for the Dallas Theater Center last year, Back Back Back, was a hollow piece that felt observed by someone who didn't know or care about his subject matter. This play — which he might have titled *Bach* Bach Bach — is the exact opposite. There's a keen sense of character and form, and the enthusiasm for music and its potential to move the listener is palpable, like Amadeus with more jokes.

There's a whole lot going on beyond just the backbiting among musicians, although the civil catfights are juicy fun. Politics and religion, especially how minor differences in Protestant Reformation sects generate venomous enmity, feel entirely relevant, like something from The West Wing or Gore Vidal's play The Best Man. Putting it within the construct of a post-modern adapta-

tion of Moliere or A Midsummer Night's Dream just emphasizes its daring genius.

Much of the success, though, rests with director Robin Armstrong, who also designed the

> wondrous costumes (try counting the hundreds of buttons on these elaborate frocks if you get bored - but you won't get bored). She's wonderfully adept at staging and pacing comedy, with pinpoint en-

trances and exits (except a bungled missed cue on opening night from a performer whose only job it is to come and go four times). But she also delves into the music of the show, both the notes and Moses' lyrical wordplay.

Armstrong's cast of fey dandies serves her well. Andy Baldwin is always exhausting to watch, a perpetual-motion machine who makes campy self-awareness look beautifully overwrought. His forlornness is clownishly sweet. I've always like Pounders' wild-eyed energy, with its conspiratorial edge. He's an expert at making the audience feel complicit in his plans. Coffee's defeated grandeur, Chris Hague's cuckolded nincompoop, Lambert's froth-mouthed pretender and Levall's dashing milquetoast are equally good.

Although resplendent with running gags (the composers' names, the use of carrier pigeons to deliver messages) and heavy with set-ups and exposition, the play bounces along at a lively pace. Allegro vivace, con molto bravura. Bach in *Leipzig* is one of my favorite shows of the season — of the year, really. Bravissima! Ancora!

War before DADT

Late author's memoir tells of gay love for the Greatest Generation

In his memoir **My Queer War**, James Lord explains how a tiny fib to Uncle Sam changed the course of his life.

Lord hated college, just like he had hated prep school. A loner, he always felt awkward, and the higher the educational setting, the higher the level of discomfort. Finally, he did the one incongruent thing he could think to do: 19 and naïve, he enlisted in the Army Air Corps 11 months after the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor — and decades before "don't ask, don't tell."

By this time in his life, Lord suspected his attraction to boys, and he was horrified. He saw himself as abnormal, an "abominable thing." Still, when asked at his induction, "Do you like girls?" he paused. "And I, to tell the truth, had known a couple of likable girls, so I said, 'Yes. Yes. sir.'"

Much like his introduction to the Army, Lord's months of service were unique. Basic training

mostly of the hurry-up-and-wait kind, where boredom was rampant.


But Lord fell in love: First with a man who was a mentor but almost turned him in; second, with a confused longing. When the government sent him back to school, Lord, who was as green as grass, learned to cruise gay bars.

But the Army sent him overseas to France and Germany, assigned to the Military Intelligence Service, a job where he learned brutal truths about others and himself.

Several times in this book, the late author indicates his love of the arts, particularly the works of James Joyce and Thomas Mann. He also expresses a love of poetry. All this shines through, for the good and the bad.

My Queer War is a sometimes-painful, sometimes-shocking, surprisingly chaste account of a man hiding from himself and his government, lest he be ridiculed and shunned. Lord is a fine storyteller with his smart-aleck humor and his goosebump-inducing, just-the-facts, somberly gentle writing.


What's not enjoyable, though, is that this book is dripping with the influence of the aforementioned authors, as well as other creators of High Literature. While it gives this book a period fla-




LORD IN THE FOXHOLE | James Lord's account of his life in the Army is both shocking and sad.

vor, it also tends to bog it down more than I think the average reader will want to endure.

Still, in post-Prop 8 America, My Queer War may provoke thinking not only among gays but straights who think they already know all they need to about gays in the military.
