No charges filed after threats against ensign

Dallas man posts 'Tree of Woe' photo on Internet with threat to 'take care of' Navy ensign fighting anti-gay harassment by superiors

Navy Ensign Steve Crowston, the East Texas native who's made headlines of late with claims of anti-gay harassment by his military superiors, says he learned this week that federal authorities don't plan to file charges against a Dallas man who made a possible death threat against him on the Internet in August.

Crowston, 36, said the Navy Criminal Investigative Service informed him Tuesday, Sept. 7 that federal authorities in Texas don't plan to pursue the case. The unidentified Dallas-based suspect reportedly made the threat in response to media coverage of Crowston's harassment allegations, which are currently being investigated by the Navy Inspector General.

The suspect, using the name "Flugelman," posted a photo of a naked man tied to a "Tree of Woe" on a Naval Aviation-themed website called AirWarriors.com. The caption read, "Send Fagmiester back to the Goatlocker. We'll take care of him/her/it."

The "Tree of Woe" is an apparent reference to a tree the lead character was to be crucified on in the film "Conan the Barbarian;" "goatlocker" refers to the fraternity of Navy chiefs; and "Fagmeister" was among the anti-gay call signs members of Crowston's squadron recommended for him during a meeting in August 2009, prompting the harassment allegations.

"The guy obviously has issues with people

AG candidates polar opposites on gay issues

Radnofsky pledges to stand for equality; incumbent Abbott has record of fighting LGBT rights

Possibly no race in Texas this election cycle is as clear-cut about where the candidates stand on LGBT issues as is the attorney general's race.

Neither Attorney General Greg Abbott nor any-

one from his campaign returned calls seeking comment for this story. But Dallas County Republican Party Chairman Jonathan Neerman agrees that the choice in this race is clear for those who vote primarily on LGBT issues. Still, he suggested looking at Attorney General Greg Abbott's entire record.

Democratic challenger Barbara Ann Radnofsky stands by her positions on equality.

"I try to follow the Golden Rule," Radnofsky said.

In other races, candidates run from the issue.

Radnofsky was happy to talk about where she stands.

Radnofsky said she supports employment nondiscrimination legislation and she uses language on her website that is transgender-inclusive.

She said she would like to add gender identity and expression to the James Byrd, Jr. Hate Crimes Act, the Texas penalty enhancement law that applies to hate crimes committed in Texas.





Annual Steve Machart Benefit for AIN raised more than \$20,000 for AIDS service organization in '09



Last year, they raised more than \$20,000 for the organization. Bar owner Frank Holland said he planned to top that amount this year.



Shooting victim undergoes 2nd surgery



Tull in serious condition but is expected to recover; police say video from nearby bank camera did not record shooting or license plate

Doug Tull remained hospitalized this week after being shot during an aggravated robbery in Oak Lawn on Aug. 30.

At about 1 a.m. that Monday, two men jumped from a car directly in front of Tull as he walked along Brown Street, and robbed and shot him at point blank range.

A third man drove the car into the drivethrough lane of the American National Bank on Oak Lawn Avenue.

Tull made it to Pekers on Oak Lawn Avenue where co-owner Ron Nelson called for emergency help.

Tull was taken to Parkland Hospital where doctors repaired damage to his large and small intestines, liver and stomach. The bullet, however, remained in his body.

Doctors at first thought the bullet was lodged in Tull's rectum and they had hoped that it would pass naturally. But on Tuesday, Sept. 7, Tull began running high fever, and doctors operated to remove the bullet.

Tull remains in serious condition.

Police hoped to identify the car used in the attack from surveillance tape taken by the bank. However, a police spokesperson said that while they believe they saw the car on the video, the license plate is unreadable and the camera did not record the shooting, which happened across the street.

Tull said the car is an older, gray, four-door Nissan Altima. He identified the men as African-American, weighing about 150 pounds each and all in their early 20s.

The parking garage manager at the Crescent, at Oak Lawn and Cedar Springs, returned a check with Tull's address by mail that a cashier found in the lot. Tull confirmed that the check had been folded and in his wallet that was stolen.

When contacted by police, officials at the Crescent gave a copy of their surveillance tapes to police. But the cameras were not pointed in the direction of the car and a police spokesman said the tape was not immediately useful.

The police spokesman said they would retain the tape, which may prove useful for later corroboration.

"We will have a very special guest walking with Stonewall Democrats in the Alan Ross Pride Parade on September 19th. Bill White, the Democratic Nominee for Governor of Texas will be joining us and walking with Stonewall in the Parade! We are thrilled and honored that he will join us and look forward to a very special day."

We are happy to report that this will be our third year participating in Lone Star Ride.





against or harassment of LGBT students and teachers in Texas public schools.

Radnofsky campaign spokeswoman Katie Floyd said the candidate taught mediation for 15 years.

Radnofsky addressed another threat to gay and lesbian families that makes its way into legislative committees each session. She said that taking the best interests of the child into account, she supports guaranteeing foster and adoptive parenting rights to LGBT parents.

She would also like to provide domestic partner benefits to state employees and opposes any legislation that would prohibit private employers from offering those benefits.

On her website, Radnofsky also mentions supporting the Americans With Disabilities Act. While that doesn't seem controversial, the Texas Republican Party platform calls for gays and lesbians to be excluded from protections guaranteed under the ADA.

Greg Abbott recently won an appeal of the Dallas same-sex divorce case. In enforcing the antimarriage amendment passed in Texas in 2005, he appealed a lower court ruling that would have granted a divorce to a gay couple married in Massachusetts.

Abbott is equally clear on his website about his stand on marriage equality for gays and lesbians.

"Texas law defines marriage as an institution between one man and one woman," his website claims. "Attorney General Abbott has fought efforts to undermine Texas' law and the basic family structure in our state. He understands that traditional marriage is the cornerstone for a strong and stable family."

But Abbott goes further defending opposite-sex marriage by claiming studies support his stand without citing any of those studies.

"A wealth of empirical data demonstrates the unmatched potency of the family to combat social ills, foster strong communities, and promote happier, healthier lives," he claims in his official position statement.

Radnofsky, on the other hand, agrees with the ruling from the lower court in the same-sex divorce case.

"The Attorney General shouldn't intervene in

the non-violent, orderly wind-down of a relationship," she said. "He should leave divorce orders to the proper court decision-making, and get back to work on the problems facing our state.

"Orderly divorce and family law allows the peaceful separation of the two disputants, property disposition, payment of taxes and debt, alimony, child support and custody," Radnofsky said. "That's the way civilized society is supposed to function. Ignoring or voiding an out-of-state marriage, suggested by the AG, is not a solution to these many issues and the need for courts to supervise peaceful, orderly solutions." Abbott lists his success in collecting more than \$13 billion in child support payments as his top issue.

"He's very strong on going after deadbeat fathers for child support," Neerman said. "He fights for the interests of children."

Neerman also mentioned Abbott's record on prosecution of white-collar fraud and online data protection.

"He's also been strong on fighting Internet predators," Neerman said.

He mentioned a number of areas where Abbott has protected rights of Texans. On behalf of 31

states, Abbott fought the District of Columbia's handgun law before the Supreme Court and won. But on LGBT issues, he has worked against equality.

Stonewall Democrats of Dallas President Erin Moore said, "Abbott's been a henchman for Republicans for years."

Moore called this one of the most important statewide races as far as LGBT rights are concerned.

"It's one of the ones we're keeping the keenest eye on," she said. "He's been malicious in his prosecution of LGBT rights. He's got to go." ■

who are perceived to be gay," Crowston said of the man who made the threat. "My big concern was the safety of my family back there [in Texas]."

Crowston said he plans to take up the matter with the office of Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, R-Texas. A spokeswoman for the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Northern District of Texas didn't return a phone call seeking comment about the investigation into the threat.

Crowston, who refuses to disclose his sexual orientation, told Dallas Voice he grew up in East Texas and lived in Mesquite for a few years before joining the Navy in the mid-1990s. Currently based in Virginia Beach, Va., Crowston plans to return to Dallas when he retires from the military in four years.


Crowston is an avid fan of the Dallas Cowboys, which led to his being given the call sign "Romo's bitch" in a vote by members of Strike Fighter Squadron 136 last year.

But Crowston said "Romo's bitch" isn't what bothered him; it was the other call signs that had been recommended and written on a white board in the meeting room, which included "Gay Boy," "Fagmeister" and "Cowgirl."

Those who voted on Crowston's call sign included the squadron's commanding and executive officers

Crowston's case has drawn attention in particular to the problem of offensive and inappropriate call signs, which can be used in official military ENSIGN, Page 12

correspondence and tend to follow someone throughout their career.

Crowston, who'd recently lost a friend to suicide following harassment in the Navy, took his concerns about the call sign incident to his superiors.

He said they retaliated by launching investigations of him and giving him his worst performance review in 16 years in the Navy. He said he endured months of harassment before filing a complaint in February.

The Naval Inspector General's Office initially found Crowston's complaint to be unsubstantiated. But Crowston has taken his fight to the Pentagon and Congress, alleging that the investigator was biased because she knew one of the commanding officers he'd named.

Last month, the Navy Inspector General announced it was reopening the case and launching an investigation into how it was initially handled.

"What I'm doing is I'm standing up for my rights, and I'm hoping it will make a difference for myself and others in the military," Crowston said.

He pointed to the case of Army infantryman Barry Winchell, who was murdered by a fellow soldier in 1999 pursuant to anti-gay harassment.

"The law says 'don't ask, don't tell, don't harass and don't pursue," Crowston said. "Why is it that we have senior leadership in the Navy still to this day violating the 'don't harass' policy?"

Servicemembers who are gay or perceived to be gay usually don't report harassment because they fear being outed under DADT, Crowston said.

Aaron Tax, legal director for the Servicemembers Legal Defense Network, agreed.

"It's very difficult under 'don't ask don't tell' to safely report harassment and not run afoul of the law, and I think a case like this highlights that," said Tax, adding that SLDN has been monitoring Crowston's case.

SLDN is a group dedicated to ending discrimination and harassment against military personnel affected by DADT.

Tax said legislation to repeal DADT originally included a provision that would have banned discrimination based on sexual orientation in the military.

But this provision isn't contained in the version that passed the House earlier this year, which is expected to be voted on by the Senate later this month.

"Even with repeal of 'don't ask don't tell,' there will still be a need for strong leadership and comprehensive training to make sure people are not harassed on the basis of their actual or perceived sexual orientation," Tax said. "What we're hoping is that President Obama will step up to the plate, and should we get repeal passed by Congress this year, that he will step up to the plate and sign an

KERN SUPPORTERS START SLINGING MUD AT NOVOTNY

It appears that the mudslinging has started in the race for the District 84 seat in the Oklahoma House of Representatives, where incumbent Republican Sally Kerns of Oklahoma City is facing Democratic challenger Brittany Novotny, a transgender woman also from Oklahoma City.

The Oklahoma Conservative Political Action Committee sent an e-mail to its members on Tuesday, Sept. 7, in which Novotny was described as "a confused 'it'" who hates God.

The e-mail, signed by Charlie Meadows and headlined "Sally Kern's opponent in Hollywood for a fundraiser," said, in part:

"Brittany used to be a 'he,' had a sex change operation to make him into a 'her' but turned out to become a confused 'it.' Some have suggested that having a sex change operation is a person's greatest act of rebellion and hatred toward God for His making them what they were.

"It is truly sad to see people reject God's love for them by being willing to mutilate themselves. If they would submit their life to God, they could find the true the joy in life that will forever elude them while on their path of rebellion."

Crowston, meanwhile, is awaiting the outcome of the Inspector General's investigation and plans

Kern is the legislator who in 2008 was tape recorded telling a Republican group that LGBT people are a bigger threat to America than terrorism. She recently defended those remarks, telling an Oklahoma City TV station that while there have been only three "real big" terrorist attacks on the U.S., society is constantly "bombarded with the message that homosexuality is normal and natural."

In a statement released Thursday, Sept. 9, Novotny responded: "If Rep. Kern and her allies spent as much time focusing on Oklahoma's future as they seem to spend worrying about my past, maybe we could keep teachers in the classroom and rebuild our crumbling infrastructure.


"This type of personal attack is what Oklahomans are tired of, and it shows why Kern and her political allies continue to be out of touch with mainstream Oklahoma values," Novotny added.

Novotny also said that OCPAC's claim that she hates God is "ridiculous," and noted that she attends services at United Church of Christ.

Dallas doctor chosen for new oversight board

Dr. Brady Allen chosen based on work with Dallas County Medical Society on substance abuse issues

Dr. Brady Allen has been appointed to the board of the new Texas Physician Health Program.

For the first time, physicians in Texas can report themselves voluntarily for substance abuse and physical and mental health issues without jeopardizing their medical licenses. Friends, relatives, patients or co-workers who have reason to suspect problems may also make referrals.

The law creating this new board passed in the last legislative session. The board was formed last November and includes six medical doctors.

In addition to Allen, who is openly gay and is one of the area's foremost HIV specialists, the board includes Dr. Allison Jones, a psychiatrist from Austin who is lesbian.

Allen said he was chosen for experience he has working with the Dallas County Medical Society on substance abuse issues. But he thinks inclusion of gay and lesbian members on the board sends a message that this new program is safe and welcoming.

"We're hoping to be physician advocates," Allen said.

Previously, doctors referred to the Texas Medical Board for substance abuse issues would be investigated for disciplinary action.

Allen said that when the board was created, about 150 physicians were transferred to them for their recommendations and oversight. He said the board is hoping to get about 60 new referrals a year.

"Other states that have done this have had great success," he said. "We're modeling ourselves after other successful programs."

Doctors can be referred for drug and alcohol abuse. Those found with addiction problems can be referred for treatment and then followed for a period of five years.

For the first year, they undergo random urine testing weekly. When they successfully complete that year, the monitoring and testing schedule can be reduced.

Allen said that most doctors entering this program go for an extended 90-day treatment program rather than the more common, but less successful, 30-day treatments.

Doctors may be referred to the panel for mental and physical problems as well.

A variety of conditions may prompt concern.

Dementia, bipolar disorder or Parkinson's Disease are three Allen mentioned.

A doctor with bipolar disorder might need his or her medication checked and the panel could require supervision of a psychiatrist. Parkinson's, which causes shaking, might require a surgeon to stop operating. A physician with Alzheimer's could be monitored to determine when he needed to retire.

Some mental problems are a result of daily stress, Allen said, adding that the routine stress could be compounded for lots of gay and lesbian professionals who are not out at work. He said he wondered whether that contributes to self-destructive behaviors.

Allen said he thinks the program will be very successful.

"We have a big economic hammer over their head," he said. "If their license is in jeopardy, they could lose their livelihood."

While confidentiality for the doctor is assured, patient safety is also important. To maintain confidentiality, a doctor signs an agreement with a long list of conditions. Failure to comply with any of them can move the case to the medical board for punishment.

The program is self-sustaining, costing physicians who participate \$1,200 annually. Those subject to random testing pay for their own screenings.



Laser treatment offers alternative to smokers who are trying to quit

Study: LGBTs smoke at more than twice the rate of non-LGBT peers

According to a report released in July by the American Lung Association, the smoking rate among gay and lesbian Americans is twice as high as among other Americans.

The report — "Smoking Out A Deadly Threat: Tobacco Use in the LGBT Community" — says that gay, bisexual and transgender men are two to two-and-a-half times more likely to smoke than straight men. Lesbians, bisexual and transgender women are one-and-a-half to two times more likely to smoke than straight women.

And, the report notes, bisexual boys and girls have the highest smoking rates when compared to both heterosexual and LGT peers.

Why? Well there are a number of reasons, the ALA suggests in its report: "possible contributing factors to the LGBT smoking rate includ[e] stress and discrimination related to homophobia, the tobacco industry's targeted marketing to LGBT consumers, and lack of access to culturally appropriate tobacco treatment programs."

And quitting smoking is not easy. Studies have indicated the relapse rate for those who quit to be between 75 and 80 percent, even with aids like gums, patches and pills.

But Xena Sebastian believes she has a solution that is almost sure-fire: laser therapy.

Sebastian, a registered nurse, said she spent most of her professional career working in cardiovascular intensive care units, "but I got a little old for ICU duty, which is pretty intense."

So she began working doing infusion treatments, and from there learned about laser therapy. She now operates Anne Penman Laser Therapy of Dallas.

Sebastian explained that the laser is a holistic, drug-free method of treatment developed by Anne Penman of Scotland specifically to help smokers become non-smokers. And, Sebastian added, the success rate for laser treatments is "higher than any other kind of [stop smoking aid], including gums and patches and pills. The best part is that it is non-invasive, drug free and pain free."

Penman is based in Scotland, and according to

her website, she used laser therapy to end her 60cigarette-a-day habit in 1991 after her husband, also a longtime smoker, had a heart attack at age 39. That same year, she trained to become a laser therapist, and quickly developed her own protocol for the treatment. By 1994, she was training others to use her protocol.

Sebastian said that laser therapy works along the same lines as acupuncture, using the laser instead of needles to target energy points throughout the body, causing the release of seratonins and endorphins, "the same chemicals that are released when you workout."

The laser, Sebastian said, "is a healing light that works on an intracellular and cellular level" to help detox the body, flushing out harmful substances, and to dampen that craving for nictotine.

Laser therapy can also be used for pain management and to reduce stress, and there are other applications, as well, although Sebastian said she does not promote laser therapy for those.

All Anne Penman clinics use the Thor Laser, which has been approved by the FDA for "tissue healing, inflammation, pain relief and wounds," according to the Thor Laser website.

The smoking cessation packages at Sebastian's clinic cost \$499 for three treatments. She said patients come in for their first treatment and are then asked to return within 48 hours for the second

treatment. The third treatment can be used down the line if the patient relapses.

Sebastian said many patients are ready to quit smoking after the first treatment, and almost all of them quit after the second treatment.

The package price also includes a supply of nutritional supplements and vitamins that help the patient detox and reinforce healthy habits.

Sebastian acknowledged that the nearly \$500 price tag seems high to many people. She also noted that few insurance plans cover the cost of laser treatment to quit smoking.


But, she said, "If you smoke one pack a day and this treatment helps you quit, then you have paid for the treatment in a month and a half" of not buying cigarettes.

Sebastian said she is not condemning other smoking cessation treatments that use pharmaceuticals. "I am a registered nurse. I certainly believe pharmaceuticals have their place. But if you can [quit smoking] without them, with a holistic and non-invasive treatment, then try that first," she said.



1. We have the opportunity this year to elect and re-elect two capable, openly gay candidates. Electing supporters is great, but nothing beats electing your own.

As your Dallas County district clerk, my exemplary stewardship of the office is well known and a matter of public record. I have saved taxpayers millions in cost-saving initiatives, come under-budget every year since I took office, and initiated innovative new projects to bring Dallas County into the 21st century.

Of the 67 elected judges in Dallas County, not one is openly gay, in spite of the many LGBT members of the bar. This year we have the opportunity to change that by electing Tonya Parker to the 116th Civil District Court. Parker is a young, successful and energetic attorney who is already a rising star.

Parker has the kind of talent that leads to the federal bench, but she cannot get there without the enthusiastic support of this community both financially and on Election Day.

2. By electing Elba Garcia, we have the best chance in 16 years to unseat a county commissioner who has proven time and again that he is no friend to our community.

For those of us who live in North Oak Cliff, Dr. Garcia is a household name. We are proud of her outstanding leadership on the Dallas City Council, and I can think of no other candidate better suited for the Commissioners Court.

Of all the races on our ballot, this is the one where LGBT voters can have the greatest impact.

3. It is critically important for this community to stand up for its allies and friends. Judge Tena Callahan's courageous ruling in a gay divorce case last October proves that judicial philosophy matters. Her integrity and courage is just the kind of thing we need to keep on the bench. Supporting Judge Callahan not only shows our gratitude, but also gives us the chance to stand with the litigants and their attorneys who rejected the prophets of pusilanimity and asserted their rights under the law regardless of the outcome.

4. The experience of the LGBT community since the beginning of the HIV epidemic in the 1980s has proven to us that government plays a vital role in ensuring the health and safety of cit-

izens. Reps. Allen Vaught, Carol Kent and Robert Miklos are legislators the LGBT community can be proud of.

In District 105 in Irving, we have the opportunity to elect Loretta Haldenwang and replace an incumbent whose ethics are ill-suited for public office.

True diversity is more than labels

Late last year I received a rather unhappy email from a couple that had visited our community one Sunday. "Dear Rev. Weldes," it began, "We had heard that the Center for Spiritual Living was an open and affirming congregation, so we came to check it out."

The e-mail went on to point out that this couple had seen no evidence, much to their disappointment, that we were an open and affirming community. So they informed me they were going to another church where they felt accepted.

I have to say I didn't know whether to laugh or cry. You see half our staff is gay, and at least 30 percent of our community is, as well. But they were obviously looking for outward signs that we were a "gay-friendly church."

A couple of years ago, a lovely African-American couple came to a community retreat, one eagerly and one not so eagerly. "Why would I want to spend the weekend with so many white people?" she openly admitted to the group at the end

of the weekend.

Needless to say, she had a transforming experience. Two years later, she came to me one Sunday morning, and said, "Now this is what an integrated church looks like," as our growing African-American population was happily sitting in and amongst everybody else that day.

The goal, I believe, is to be a truly inclusive community. This goes way beyond tolerance or even acceptance, but is actually about acknowledging and celebrating each person's individual uniqueness, and to treasure our diversity.

This means that every person is an integral part of the whole community, not just a sub-set. At the Center for Spiritual Living, we welcome and embrace and accept people, whatever their path or lifestyle.

Perhaps what our visitors didn't recognize is that a truly inclusive and diverse community has no need to draw attention to the labels that are given to people: gay, African-American, or what have you. No one is simply the label someone has given them or the one they adopt for themselves. Rather, each one of us is uniquely and exactly and precisely who we are, in our totality.

How many gay people do you know that only hang around other gay people? How many blacks only have black friends? How many Christians only interact with other Christians?

Someone once told me that the Sunday morning hour is the still the most segregated hour in America. This narrowing of our perspective effectively shuts us off from our brothers and sisters. It keeps us from ever having to learn to get along with those different from us.

And it effectively allows each of us to keep holding on to our own prejudices.

Even if we believe that "birds of a feather flock together," aren't we all just a little bit different anyway? One hates spiders; one loves to rock climb; one seeks to be financially wealthy, and one seeks to save the whales — and none of these differences are mutually exclusive.

Each of us has our own past, our own traumas, our own story, and our own path to healing and wholeness.

In a community that truly celebrates individual diversity, you won't see groups based around labels, but rather an overarching, profound respect for the inherent dignity, value and worth of each and every person, and isn't that what we are all looking for?

Don't condemn Mehlman

Since Ken Mehlman's coming out, we have seen numerous opinions from those who are outraged at his silence and his active role in some of the anti-gay rhetoric from six years ago. They decry his hypocrisy, espouse his cowardice and are incredulous that he now wishes to speak up and become an ally.

To those who hold these opinions and to all the gay community, I challenge those who have never remained silent to speak the first criticism.

At one time or another, even currently in our day-to-day lives, we have all remained silent when confronted by or exposed to intolerance, anti-gay rhetoric or insensitivity. It may have been something said or done by a family member, a stranger or co-worker, and we did or said nothing to correct them or raise their consciousness.

At times, we even "straight-wash" or coach our own language so we do not create an uncomfortable conflict or conversation; telling ourselves, it'd be too much trouble. Make no mistake; this passive action and activity is just as damaging, dangerous and destructive as the active acceptance that Ken Mehlman engaged in. We all become guilty of promoting the "rhetoric" when we do nothing to contradict it. At times, when there is real physical danger involved, keeping silent is necessary. But all to often in situations where this danger does not exist, we pass on correcting and confronting intolerance.

And when we do, we give a pass to the offending persons. We give a pass to let them think that their words, opinions, jokes, etc. are OK. After all, no one is saying otherwise, so you must agree.

Remember, silence equals consent.

Should we not be upset over Ken Mehlman's damaging involvement in being part of a policy that has set us back years in our quest for equality? No. We do have cause be upset, angry and hurt over it.

But we should also look at those three fingers that point back at ourselves when we point the fingers at others who don't speak up. We should make an effort in our own lives to speak up more than we do; strive to speak up every time we encounter someone or something that impedes us from true equality.

We should also realize that we cannot change what has been. We have no time machine to go back and fix it and make it right. We can only change what lies ahead of us. No matter how upset we may be with Ken Mehlman, that will never get us closer to the equality we seek.

The only thing that can get us closer is accepting every ally we can, no matter how late or by what means they arrive at the game. You can't deny that we need to make more allies than we do enemies.

Denim 'n drag How do the hyper-masculine world of leather and the camp of female

impersonation find common ground at the rodeo? With surprising ease

n Texas, cowboys are known for their 10-gallon hats. And drag queens are known for the 10-gallon wigs.

The Texas Gay Rodeo Association's (TGRA) Big D Rodeo 2010 kicks off this weekend in Alvarado, Texas (midway between Midlothian and Cleburne along Highway 67), and as always, there's a fun mix of boot-stompin', calf-ropin' and dress-wearin' — all in the name of charity.

But the event also highlights a unique confluence of gay culture. This year, the two grand marshals are Don Jenkins (aka drag diva Donna Dumae from the United Court of the Lone Star Empire) and Robert Cantrell (aka Cleo), one of the founders of the Firedancers.

For anyone unfamiliar with the gay rodeo, the mix of drag and cowboys may seem a little counterintuitive, but to co-director Dan Nagel, the Big D Rodeo is the perfect marriage of camp and cattle needed to raise money for local organizations

"Drag is a huge part of making those charity dollars," he says. "TGRA is honored to have the support of so many of the other organizations and clubs in Texas, such as the UCLSE. We could not do all the good that we do with the support from our brothers and sisters throughout our communities working together as a team for a common goal: Charity."

According to Nagel, some of the biggest crowd pleasers at gay rodeo are the "camp events," which include competition in goat dressing, steer decorating and the ever-popular wild drag race (one rope, one steer and a man in drag — what could possibly go wrong?).

But the Big D Rodeo also features plenty of serious competitive sports you'd find at many traditional rodeos, including bull and steer riding, team roping, barrel racing and calf-roping on foot. And the skills it takes to succeed don't depend on sexual orientation or dexterity with a curling iron.

In his 13 years with the International Gay Rodeo Association, six of which he's worked with TGRA as well, Nagel has participated in six to eight gay rodeos per year on both sides of the proverbial fence, with a hand in everything from rough stock and speed events ... and his share of camp demos, just for good measure.

"The rush you get is incredible," he says. "Like any sport, the thrill is to compete and compete well."

"We have a great lineup of live music, from Nashville and Texas both, a vendor market, great food, beer, and cocktails," Nagel continues, "and cowboys and cowgirls from all over the country."

So pretty much, something for everyone.

"It's a party-like atmosphere with western lifestyle and heritage that come with all the rodeo hype," he says.

And the fact the leather and drag communities come out for it proves that the stereotype of the dour, hetero Texas cowboy is just that.

Yup.

He's been on *The View, Good Morning America* and *The Tonight Show* and has published dozens of books, but you might not recognize Joey Green if you saw him on the streets. He's more in the "OK, I know who you're talking about" vein of celebrity.

Green is famous for applying useful but unusual uses for everyday products. Did you know Spam makes a great furniture polisher, or that lemon Kool-Aid is ideal for rust removal? Those are the kind of crazy but engaging tips he'll bring to this weekend's Home and Garden Market Show at Dallas Market Hall.

Although married with kids, Green has a gay man's sense of camp (one of his books, which deconstructs *The Wizard of Oz*, posits that the Cowardly Lion was a friend of Dorothy in

more ways than one). Some of his advice is especially useful to gay people for their, let's say, intimate reasons —or sometimes just great for a drag queen's makeup case. In these economical times, it's better to take items in the house than going to the store for a specific cleaner.

Despite his mild-mannered tone, Green is fine discussing his shtick with risqué bravado — his uses for contraceptives and tampons are usually redlined by his editors. Take, for instance, the simple condom. Playing safe is still in, but Green says they have multiple uses.

"Condoms are good if you're hit in the nose or have a sore back," he says. "Just fill it with water, freeze and [you have an] instant ice pack. You can also put them on top a straight wooden handle shovel or mop or similar item — they work like a pencil eraser and keep it from sliding down and keep scruff marks off the walls."

Makeup and beauty tips are abundant in Green's books — many handy for a drag queen. In his newest, *Joey Green's Cleaning Magic*, he We get down and dirty about great gay uses of household items with home products guru Joey Green

puts nail polish remover, petroleum jelly and hair dryers to work beyond their original uses. But panty hose are a big item with Green.

"They are expensive," he says. "A lot of money is going down the drain. Save 'em, ball 'em up and they are great for polishing furniture. The nylon acts as a mild abrasive. They are great for cleaning car windshields and strainers, like for paint — just pour it through. Also, if a drag queen is late to a show because her fan belt gave out in her car, pantyhose can be tied in a knot and looped to replace it and get back on the

road."

"There are many uses for that. Crisco is all-natural made of soy-


bean and cottonseed oils. It's a great moisturizer. Just rub a dab on your skin. Keep some in the garage because it takes off oil and grease. And it gets lipstick stains out of clothes. "


Kinky and erotic does not escape Green. He could write an entire book with this angle alone, although instead he's working on a project that gives tips and cures for pets. But he's more willing to talk up the positives of a large roll of Saran Wrap in the house. Whether it's covering food, or the significant other, it's a godsend.

"Well, don't use it as a condom," he orders. "Saran Wrap is great for holding screws in position. [*Ed. note: Yes!*] If a small screw is hard to hold, put it through the wrap to hold. Putting it over a used tin of paint keeps it from hardening and it can cover small holes in windows."

Finally, he breaks a bit. Food has its place in fun romps, but he tells us what else a cucumber is good for.

"Well," he chuckles, "I know you can eat those."



According to Rob Laqui, he's pretty easy to spot. In MOMIX's *Botanica*, amid the vast imagery created by the cast, you'll *know* it when you see him onstage. And it's not because he has an inflated sense of ego.

"I'm the only Filipino guy!" he laughs. Laqui is soft-spoken but with

a sense of humor that's part dry, part snappy. He also has a flair for the poetic. As a gay man, he can see why the community might be fascinating by MOMIX, which brings its latest show to the Winspear Opera House this week, courtesy of TITAS.

"In my experience and in my opinion, there is this certain soft masculinity there," he says. "I think everyone responds to the beauty of the images of this show but especially the LGBT community. We like pretty things! But also, gays have a certain sensitivity to that [beauty]."

Laqui is starting his seventh season with MOMIX — quite a run for a man who started out as a musi-

cal theater major in college. Moving to New York City from Minnesota, he planned a career on the stage acting and singing, but something clicked in him that made him decide traditional theater wasn't exactly his thing. He began working on body movement that played into some of his characters and slowly surfaced into his interests. Then he saw MOMIX perform.

"I remember thinking that it was just awesome and I wanted to work with that," he says.

His dream came true. He describes MOMIX as "Cirque du Soleil Lite," but with a wink and a nod: In the same vein, but minus ethereal acrobatics and eerie clowns. Ultimately, though, Laqui considers the troupe illusionists.

"I will describe it as modern dance, but with us, the audience will look at our movements and then it takes a second for them to wrap their mind around what they are seeing, " he says. The eclecticism of the movements into images and shapes, is more than dancing; it's a challenge.

KALETRA once daily should not be given to children. KALETRA once daily should not be taken with efavirenz (Atripla[®] and Sustiva[®]), nevirapine (Viramune[®]), amprenavir (Agenerase[®]), nelfinavir (Viracept[®]), carbamazepine (Tegretol[®] and Epitol[®]), phenobarbital (Luminal[®]), or phenytoin (Dilantin[®]). There may be a greater chance of getting diarrhea with the once daily regimen compared with the twice daily regimen.

Use

KALETRA® is a prescription anti-HIV-1 medicine called a protease inhibitor that contains lopinavir and ritonavir. KALETRA is used with other anti-HIV-1 medicines to increase the chance of treatment response in people with human immunodeficiency virus (HIV-1) infection. It is not known if KALETRA is safe and effective in children under 14 days old.

KALETRA does not cure HIV-1 infection or AIDS and does not stop you from passing HIV-1 to others. You may still get opportunistic infections or other conditions that happen with HIV-1.

KALETRA Safety Considerations

Do not take KALETRA® if you are allergic to any of its ingredients, including lopinavir or ritonavir. Do not take KALETRA with certain medicines, as they can cause serious problems, death, or make KALETRA less effective against HIV. Some patients taking KALETRA can develop inflammation of the pancreas and liver problems, which can cause death. Patients may develop changes in heart rhythm, large increases in triglycerides and cholesterol, diabetes, high blood sugar, changes in body fat, and/or increased bleeding in people with hemophilia. Some patients may develop signs and symptoms of serious infections they already have after starting anti-HIV medicines.

Patient Information

Read the Medication Guide that comes with KALETRA before you start taking it and each time you get a refill. There may be new information. This information does not take the place of talking with your doctor about your medical condition or treatment. You and your doctor should talk about your treatment with KALETRA before you start taking it and at regular check-ups. You should stay under your doctor's care when taking KALETRA.

What is the most important information I should know about KALETRA?

KALETRA may cause serious side effects, including:

- Interactions with other medicines. It is important to know the medicines that should not be taken with KALETRA. Read the section "What should I tell my doctor before taking KALETRA?"
- Changes in your heart rhythm and the electrical activity of your heart. These changes may be seen on an EKG (electrocardiogram) and can lead to serious heart problems. Your risk for these problems may be higher if you:
- already have a history of abnormal heart rhythm or other types of heart disease.
- take other medicines that can affect your heart rhythm while you take KALETRA.

Tell your doctor right away if you have any of these symptoms while taking KALETRA:

- dizzinesslightheadedness
- lightneadednes
 fointing
- fainting
 connection of elements
- sensation of abnormal heartbeats

See the section below "What are the possible side effects of KALETRA?" for more information about serious side effects.

What is KALETRA?

KALETRA is a prescription anti-HIV medicine that contains two medicines: lopinavir and ritonavir. KALETRA is called a protease inhibitor that is used with other anti-HIV-1 medicines to treat people with human immunodeficiency virus (HIV-1) infection. HIV-1 is the virus that causes AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome).

It is not known if KALETRA is safe and effective in children under 14 days old.

Who should not take KALETRA?

 Do not take KALETRA if you are taking certain medicines. For more information about medicines you should not take with KALETRA, please see
 "Can I take other medicines with KALETRA?" and consult with your doctor about all other medicines you take. Do not take KALETRA if you have an allergy to KALETRA or any of its ingredients, including ritonavir and lopinavir.

What should I tell my doctor before taking KALETRA?

KALETRA may not be right for you. Tell your doctor about all your medical conditions, including if you:

- have any heart problems, including if you have a condition called Congenital Long QT Syndrome.
- have liver problems, including Hepatitis B or Hepatitis C.
- have diabetes.
- have hemophilia. People who take KALETRA may have increased bleeding.
- · have low potassium in your blood.
- are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if KALETRA will harm your unborn baby. Birth control pills or patches may not work as well while you take KALETRA. To prevent pregnancy while taking KALETRA, women who take birth control pills or use estrogen patch for birth control should either use a different type of birth control or an extra form of birth control. Talk to your doctor about how to prevent pregnancy while taking KALETRA.
- take KALETRA during pregnancy, talk with your doctor about how you can take part in an antiretroviral pregnancy registry. The purpose of the pregnancy registry is to follow the health of you and your baby.
 are breast-feeding. Do not breast-feed if you are
- taking KALETRA. You should not breast-feed if you have HIV-1. If you are a woman who has or will have a baby while taking KALETRA, talk with your doctor about the best way to feed your baby. If your baby does not already have HIV-1, there is a chance that HIV-1 can be passed to your baby through your breast milk.

Tell your doctor about all the medicines you take, including prescription and non-prescription medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. Many medicines interact with KALETRA. Do not start taking a new medicine without telling your doctor or pharmacist. Your doctor can tell you if it is safe to take KALETRA with other medicines. Your doctor may need to change the dose of other medicines while you take KALETRA. Medicines you should not take with KALETRA.

Serious problems or death can happen if you take these medicines with KALETRA:

- ergot containing medicines, including:
 - ergotamine tartrate (Cafergot[®], Migergot, Ergomar, Ergostat, Medihaler Ergotamine, Wigraine, Wigrettes)
 - \circ dihydroergotamine mesylate (D.H.E. 45°, Embolex, Migranal*)
 - ergonovine, ergonovine and methylergonovine (Ergotrate, Methergine), ergotamine and methylergonovine
 - Ergotrate Maleate, methylergonovine maleate (Methergine)
 - triazolam (Halcion®), midazolam hydrochloride oral syrup
- pimozide (Orap®)
- the cholesterol lowering medicines lovastatin (Mevacor®) or simvastatin (Zocor®)
- sildenafil (Revatio[®]) only when used for the treatment of pulmonary arterial hypertension. (See "Medicines that may need changes" and "What are the possible side effects of Kaletra?" for information about the use of sildenafil for erectile problems.)
 alfuzosin (Uroxatral[®])

Medicines that you should not take with KALETRA since they may make KALETRA not work as well:

- the herbal supplement St. John's Wort (hypericum perforatum)
- rifampin (Rimactane®, Rifadin®, Rifater®, or Rifamate®)

Medicines that may need changes:

- birth control pills that contain estrogen ("the pill") or the birth control (contraceptive) patches
- certain anticancer medicines, such as nilotinib (Tasigna®) and dasatinib (Sprycel®)
- certain cholesterol lowering medicines, such as atorvastatin (Lipitor[®]) or rosuvastatin (Crestor[®])
- certain other antiretroviral medicines, such as efavirenz (Atripla[®] and Sustiva[®]), nevirapine (Viramune[®]), amprenavir (Agenerase[®]) and nelfinavir (Viracept[®])
- anti-seizure medicines, such as phenytoin (Dilantin[®]) carbamazepine, (Tegretol[®]), phenobarbital
- medicines for erectile problems, such as sildenafil (Viagra®), tadalafil (Cialis®), or vardenafil (Levitra®)

- medicines for tuberculosis (TB), such as rifabutin (Mycobutin[®])
- inhaled steroid medicines, such as fluticasone propionate (Flonase[®])
- inhaled medicines such as salmeterol (Serevent[®]) or salmeterol in combination with fluticasone propionate (Advair[®]). Your doctor may need to change to a different medicine
- medicines for gout, such as colchicine (Colcrys[®])
- medicines to treat pulmonary arterial hypertension (PAH), such as bosentan (Tracleer®) or tadalafil (Adcirca®)
- pain medicines, such as fentanyl (Duragesic[®], lonsys[™], Fentora[®]) and methadone

If you are not sure if you are taking a medicine above, ask your doctor.

How should I take KALETRA?

- Take KALETRA every day exactly as prescribed by your doctor.
- It is very important to set up a dosing schedule and follow it every day.
- Do not change your treatment or stop treatment without first talking with your doctor.
- Swallow KALETRA tablets whole. Do not chew, break, or crush KALETRA tablets.
- KALETRA tablets can be taken with or without food.
- \bullet If you are taking both \mbox{Videx}^{\otimes} (didanosine) and KALETRA:
- didanosine can be taken at the same time as KALETRA tablets, without food.
- take didanosine either one hour before or two hours after taking KALETRA oral solution.
- Do not miss a dose of KALETRA. This could make the virus harder to treat. If you forget to take KALETRA, take the missed dose right away. If it is almost time for your next dose, do not take the missed dose. Instead, follow your regular dosing schedule by taking your next dose at its regular time. Do not take more than one dose of KALETRA at one time.
- If you take more than the prescribed dose of KALETRA, call your local poison control center or emergency room right away.
- Take KALETRA oral solution with food to help it work better.
- If KALETRA is being used for your child, tell your doctor if your child's weight changes.
- KALETRA should not be given one time each day in children. When giving KALETRA to your child, give KALETRA exactly as prescribed.
- KALETRA oral solution contains a large amount of alcohol.
- If a young child drinks more than the recommended dose, it could make them sick from too much alcohol. Contact your local poison control center or emergency room right away.
- Talk with your doctor if you take or plan to take metronidazole or disulfiram. You can have severe nausea and vomiting if you take these medicines with KALETRA.

- When your KALETRA supply starts to run low, get more from your doctor or pharmacy. It is important not to run out of KALETRA. The amount of HIV-1 virus in your blood may increase if the medicine is stopped for even a short time. The virus may become resistant to KALETRA and become harder to treat.
- KALETRA can be taken with acid reducing agents used for heartburn or reflux such as omeprazole (Prilosec[®]) and ranitidine (Zantac[®]) with no dose adjustment.
- KALETRA should not be administered once daily in combination with carbamazepine (Tegretol[®] and Epitol[®]), phenobarbital (Luminal[®]), or phenytoin (Dilantin[®]).

Avoid doing things that can spread HIV infection. KALETRA does not stop you from passing HIV infection to others. Do not share needles, other injection equipment or personal items that can have blood or body fluids on them, like toothbrushes and razor blades. Always practice safer sex by using a latex or polyurethane condom to lower the chance of sexual contact with semen, vaginal secretions, or blood.

What are the possible side effects of KALETRA?

KALETRA can cause serious side effects.

- See "What is the most important information I should know about KALETRA?"
- Liver problems. Liver problems, including death, can happen in people who take KALETRA. Blood tests in people who take KALETRA may show possible liver problems. People with liver disease such as Hepatitis B and Hepatitis C who take KALETRA may have worsening liver disease. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you have any of these signs and symptoms of liver problems:
- loss of appetite
- yellow skin and whites of eyes (jaundice)
- dark-colored urine
- pale colored stools, itchy skin
- stomach area (abdominal) pain.
- Inflammation of the pancreas (pancreatitis). Some people who take KALETRA get inflammation of the pancreas which may be serious and cause death. You have a higher chance of getting pancreatitis if you have had it before. Tell your doctor if you have nausea, vomiting, or abdominal pain while taking KALETRA. These may be signs of pancreatitis.
- Increases in certain fat (triglycerides and cholesterol) levels in your blood. Large increases of triglycerides and cholesterol can be seen in blood test results of some people who take KALETRA. The long-term chance of getting complications such as heart attacks or stroke due to increases in triglycerides and cholesterol caused by protease inhibitors is not known at this time.
- Diabetes and high blood sugar (hyperglycemia). Some people who take protease inhibitors including KALETRA get new or more serious diabetes, or high blood sugar. Tell your doctor if you notice an increase in thirst or urinate often while taking KALETRA.

- Changes in body fat. Changes in body fat in some people who take antiretroviral therapy. These changes may include increased amount of fat in the upper back and neck ("buffalo hump"), breast, and around the trunk. Loss of fat from the legs, arms and face may also happen. The cause and long-term health effects of these conditions are not known at this time.
- Increased bleeding for hemophiliacs. Some people with hemophilia have increased bleeding with protease inhibitors including KALETRA.
- Increased risk of certain problems when you take medicines used for the treatment of erectile problems such as sildenafil (Viagra®), tadalafil (Cialis®), or vardenafil (Levitra®) with KALETRA:
- **low blood pressure.** If you get dizzy or faint, you need to lie down. Tell your doctor if you feel dizzy, or have fainting spells.
- vision changes. Tell your doctor right away if you have vision changes.
- penis erection lasting more than 4 hours. If you are a male and have an erection that lasts longer than 4 hours, get medical help right away to avoid permanent damage to your penis. Your doctor can explain these symptoms to you.
- Allergic reactions. Skin rashes, some of them severe, can occur in people who take KALETRA. Tell your healthcare provider if you had a rash when you took another medicine for your HIV infection or if you notice any skin rash when you take KALETRA.
 Common side effects of KALETRA include:

- diarrhea
 nausea
- stomach area (abdominal) pain
- feeling weak
- vomiting
- headache
- upset stomach

These are not all of the possible side effects of KALETRA. For more information, ask your doctor or pharmacist. Tell your doctor about any side effect that bothers you or that does not go away.

Call your doctor for medical advice about side effects. You may report side effects to FDA at 1-800-FDA-1088.

How should I store KALETRA?

KALETRA tablets:

- Store KALETRA tablets at room temperature, between 59°F to 86°F (15°C to 30°C).
- Do not keep KALETRA tablets out of the container it comes in for longer than 2 weeks, especially in areas where there is a lot of humidity. Keep the container closed tightly.

KALETRA oral solution:

 Store KALETRA oral solution in a refrigerator, between 36°F to 46°F (2°C to 8°C). KALETRA oral solution that is kept refrigerated may be used until the expiration date printed on the label.

Clearly, you should watch what you say around Rob Halstead or it could turn into a song.

When a day-job co-worker of the Bible Fire songwriter went on a hostile rant against the gays, Halston ripped her a new one by putting it to music. The result was "Holly is a Homophobe," a single from the local band's new album *The Pursuit of Imperfection*. Unexpectedly, when the group performs, it's one of their most requested and popular songs.

"Holly is this girl me and Grant [Scruggs, the band's guitarist] both worked with," Halstead says. "She's an enigma to me because she's so

nice and caring and then prejudiced all the way around." An example of the lyric: *Holly is a homophobe / Disdainfully, she told me so / Her biggest fear is turning queer / And I just thought that everyone should know.*

After a misunderstanding, Holly had a freak out when she thought someone called her a gay slur. According to Halstead, she went on a rant that took him and Scruggs by surprise. He can see, though, she is sort of a victim to the usual checklist of items: "Country girl from out in the boonies, a generic Texas town, religious parents, ignorant."

It's not hard to hate someone you've never met / But face to face and still you've no regret / Holly, there's a reason that nobody agrees with you.

Interestingly, Halstead admits to have little exposure to gay the community beyond his wife's brother who is out and some curious treks to Oak Lawn in his younger days. But homosexuality isn't an issue with him *per se*.

"My stance is, it's your life," he says. "It doesn't affect me personally, but I'm not saying I don't care, I just can't care if I'm not directly involved. It's like I feel I can't have an opinion on abortion because it's a woman's issue and something only women experience and understand."

He makes it make sense. Straight men may not relate to gay issues, but Halstead doesn't feel that's reason for anti-gay (or fill in the blank) rhetoric. "I Just have problems when people or religion are hurting people or affecting rights."

He adds, though, that his wife is a huge advocate for gay rights because of her brother and even "punched a dude in the nose," for spouting off.

By contrast, drummer Chris Isaacs *does* have a strong connection to the community. The best man at his wedding was his gay best friend, and he's lost friends to AIDS. Even without contributing to the creation of the song, it rings

loudly with him.

"This runs deeper for me because my wife and I have had so many gay friends," he says. "We really detest this kind of behavior." You've got trauma, overprotected /

Odds are adding up to gay or molested / A baby raised in ignorance, passing on hatred / Rise above, write it off, recalculate it.

Perhaps Holly herself is a way-closeted lesbian, but Halstead doesn't figure that to be the case. "You would think, but no, I really don't be-

lieve she's closeted," he says. Congratulations we commend you / Dedicated hater's a full time job / Now let's all give a round of applause to Holly / Holly, take a bow.

Nor did the song really open her mind even though it rips her to shreds. Halstead's disappointed by this. He had hopes for the tiniest seed to be planted.

"Nothing is going to change people who make up their minds," he says. "I would like to think it changed her, but I don't really think so. She does come to our shows, though!"

Triple meh

Theatre Too's retooled 'Unmade Bed' is alive with songs but short on story

He might call it a song cycle, but Mark Campbell's **Songs from an Unmade Bed**, now at Theatre Three's Theatre Too space, is mostly a dizzying effect of music and theater. Written as a one-man show, director Terry Dobson has reworked it into a troika of actors playing nameless characters anchored by Gary Floyd as a bisexual in a relationship with both a straight woman (Patty Breckenridge) and gay man (Christopher Wagley). At about an hour long, it never has time to lag, but it is enough to confuse.

The story of the love triangle is told entirely through the course of 18 songs written by lyricist Campbell but composed from a number of pedigreed composers including Jake Heggie, Emmy nominee Lance

Horn and '90s alt-rocker Duncan Sheik. Floyd plays a fickle fellow torn between his affections for another man and a woman. The least

showy of the roles, Floyd does the everyman role justice with equal measures of sex appeal and humor. Through the songs "Man in the Starched White Shirt," "He Plays the Cello" and "Exit Right," we get his character is an actor who can't play the stringed instrument and he's a sort of player, but with heart. Floyd *cares* for his man but *lusts* after his woman.

Perhaps stemming from a one-man origins, the only character we ever really know is Floyd's. His lovers sing about and to him, offering insight to their desperation for his attention. This bias is humorous, even charming, but doesn't give the background needed to make me care about any of them. There were moments when I asked myself, "I need to know this because...?" Pathetic is too strong to describe these characters, but their drawn-out longing elicits more thoughts of "get a life" than "Awww!"

Each song depicts a vignette lives of relationships but it's frustrating, if not difficult. *Songs* sometimes feels like a trek through knee-high mud — tough but doable.

Through all that, the cast shines. Breckenridge runs with her role as an emotionally starved sex-

Theatre3Dallas.com. pot, playing the funny stuff with the precision of a TV sitcom (in a good way) and subtly stealing scenes with a look or inflection. It's like she's pulling the tablecloth from under a dinner set that remains in place. When she sings,

she conjures Disney princesses, but then she would lay on thick shtick in "Florence" and "Spring."

Wagley makes a strong local stage debut. A bear of a man, he has astonishing beauty in his voice that added to his presence (who knew Floyd was a bear chaser?). He kills in the uppity "The Other Other Woman" with funny physicality and is able to give great nuance — like Breckenridge, he can work a quick look to maximum effect. At times though, he almost sashayed over the top with his fey approach to the character who came close to being a caricature.


Songs' humor is worthwhile and the talent buoys the show, along with an amazing threepiece orchestra that sounded a whole lot larger. But if you're scratching your head after it ends, the best advice is to let the story go and remember the good times.




