

Funding set for Easter in the Park

Pooch Parade and Dallas Symphony will highlight annual event in Lee Park

Event coordinator David Berryman, working with the Cedar Springs Merchants Association, this week announced that he has put together funding from several sources to ensure the annual Easter in the Park will take place on April 24.

Krogers, Park Place Volvo and MetroPCS will sponsor the event, with Berryman's company Bravo Event Group of Texas coordinating it.

"We're all set to go," Lee Park Conservancy President John Williams said.

There was a question whether the annual event would proceed as usual when the Turtle Creek Association that sponsored the event in the past split the Pooch Parade from the concert. That group decided to stage a "family friendly" event a week earlier.

The Dallas Symphony, however, was still scheduled to perform on Easter Sunday and had committed \$60,000 for the performance to take place.

The Lee Park Conservancy, which operates Lee Park, was concerned about the DSO not having an audience despite having committed the funds to perform. And many in the LGBT community were angry over what they saw as an attempt to weed out participation by the LGBT community from Easter in the Park, which has always had a large LGBT contingent of participants.

Many saw TCA's "family-friendly" tag line as code for "no gays allowed."

After much discussion, though, the conservancy teamed with Berryman's company and the Cedar Springs merchants to ensure the traditional Easter Sunday event would take place.

Still, funding was needed to hire the required police and a rescue squad and to pay for trash removal that has to be contracted with a professional company.

The city waived permit fees to help the organizations stage the event.

Trans activists speak to commissioners

LGBT advocates urge Commissioners Court to add protections for transgender Dallas County employees to nondiscrimination ordinance

Three members of the LGBT community spoke Tuesday morning, April 5, during the Dallas County Commissioners Court's regular meeting, calling on the court to add protections for transgender employees to the county's nondiscrimination policy.

Transgender activist Kelli Ann Busey commended the court for adding sexual orientation to the policy covering the county's 7,000 employees a few weeks ago. But she said the court did not go far enough with that effort.

"Transgender people are not the same as gay people," Busey said. "We need to be protected differently."

Busey said many transgender people are homeless after transitioning, often because of discrimination against them in the workplace.

"Without workplace protections, we cannot live

Out & Equal to Dallas County: Add transgender protections before fall

I received a copy of a letter from Selisse Berry, founding executive director of Out and Equal Workplace Advocates, to members of the Dallas County Commissioners Court.

Berry, a former Dallas resident, writes to thank the commissioners for adding sexual orientation to the county's nondiscrimination policy a few weeks back — and to strongly encourage them to add gender identity.

Out and Equal, a nonprofit organization dedicated to achieving full equality in the the workplace, will bring more than 2,500

business leaders to Dallas in October for its annual Summit, one of the largest LGBT conventions in the world.

community and its positive corporate environment," Berry writes. "The Summit brings together executives, human resources and diversity professionals, and openly lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender employees from the nation's largest corporations to strategize, network and engage new ways to bring full equality to the workplace for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people. When they arrive, we hope they'll see Dallas County as a model for fairness, with fully inclusive protections that include both gender identity and sexual orientation."

Klub Wet opens 6 mos. late

After six months of wrangling over parking requirements, the new gay bar Klub Wet is set to open on Maple Avenue next week, according to owner Keith Lackie.

Lackie initially planned to open the bar in late October, in the building that previously housed Illlusions, 4100 Maple. But at the last minute, the city refused to issue a certificate of occupancy, saying Lackie didn't have sufficient parking.

What followed was a protracted dispute involving the city, Lackie and Crow Holdings, which owns property across Throckmorton Street where Lackie had two remote parking agreements. In the end, Lackie said he decided to build his own parking lot on a parcel behind the bar that's owned by his landlord.

Lackie has said he spent \$150,000 remodeling the inside of Klub Wet, which will fulfill a dream he had his with late partner, Andy Primm. Lackie also plans to redo the outside of the building once the bar is open.

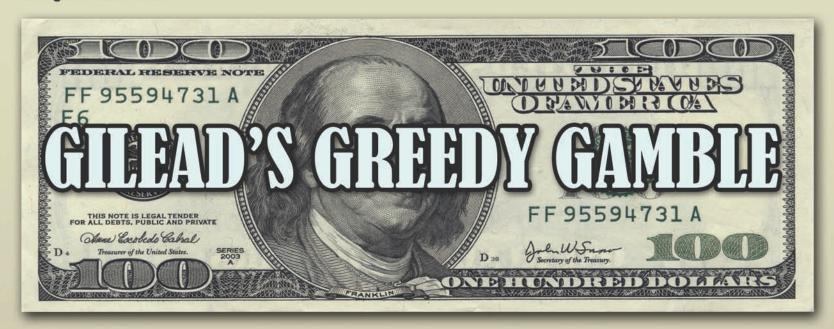


Gilead Sciences will soon apply to the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) for approval to market its HIV chemo-therapy Truvada to HIV negative gay men. Truvada is currently only approved for use in HIV+ patients. However, it can be prescribed off-label to HIV negative patients by any doctor who feels that their patient is at high risk of contracting HIV.

The multi-billion dollar profit that Gilead is currently making on Truvada is not enough for them. Bloomberg has estimated that Gilead would add \$1 billion in revenue if the FDA approves Truvada for use in HIV negatives. One billion dollars is more than the entire US government budget for HIV prevention.

Gilead is basing its application on a single study that found that it reduced infection by only 44%. What medication is approved based on only a 44% success rate? That means that 56% of the gay men who participated in the study were not protected.

The study itself is not reflective of the real world. The study participants were paid; they went to the doctor monthly and were tested for STDs and HIV monthly; they were individually intensively counseled to take their medication; the US participants were only drawn from San Francisco and Boston; and the overwhelming majority of study participants in the US were white and educated. Nevertheless, when their blood was tested, 51% of them had no Truvada in their system at all - they weren't taking the medication.



Gilead intends to charge \$10,000 a year for the drug as a preventative. It is highly unlikely that government programs will pay for it. There are already 7,000 HIV infected patients on waiting lists nationwide who do not have access to medication. So only the wealthy and insured would have access.


About 26,000 gay men are infected with HIV every year in the United States. More than half of these are the result of men who are positive but don't know it. If the majority of gay men were not currently practicing safer sex most of the time these numbers would be much higher.


If we tell gay men that there is a magic pill that will protect them, fewer of them will use condoms and more of them will become infected. Gilead is irresponsibly seeking more profits based on a single study with dubious results. We respectfully urge them to hold-off in applying to the FDA to use Truvada for prevention until extensive studies in real-life situations, with diverse populations have been completed.

The first obligation of healthcare providers is to do no harm. Gilead is playing a very dangerous game.



On a mission for progress

Lawrence Galloway says he is blessed to be the new ED for Legacy of Success Foundation

Legacy of Success Foundation is getting fired up for a new year, under the leadership of a new executive director.

Lawrence M. Galloway has been tapped as the organization's fourth executive director in its 10year history. He replaces Paul Lyons, who resigned last September.

Galloway, originally from Baton Rouge, La., has a bachelor's degree in economics, with a finance minor in management, from Southern University and A&M College. He currently works as



an online instructor supervisor for Learn-It Systems, based in Maryland, but previously worked as a math teacher in the DeSoto Independent School District's Amber Terrace Elementary School and at Hampton Preparatory Lawrence M. Galloway School in Dallas. He also taught math at Scot-

landville Magnet High School in Baton Rouge.

Galloway said he started attending LOSF's regular discussion forums for gay men of color after he moved to Dallas. That led to getting involved in the organization's other activities, he said.

"I was really impressed with Legacy of Success Foundation and all the work the organization does in the community — things like the Hazel Hatcher Scholarship and the fundraisers," Galloway said. "So when [board chair] Chris Davis told me they were looking for a new executive director, I knew I wanted to apply.

"I believe I am truly blessed to have been chosen as the new executive director for this organization," he said.

Galloway said that as ED, he will focus on

working with the LOSF board of directors "to ensure that we are moving in the direction of fulfilling our mission statement."

The organization began as a business and cultural organization focused on bringing together North Texas' LGBT community of color, creating "an environment that will aide the LGBT and affirming community of color to be proud of who they are by empowering them to action through social activism and economic growth," according to the LOSF website.

The organization also works to eliminate homophobia and racism in the overall African-American community to break "the chains that bind our minds" and to promote social awareness and social justice.

"We want to focus on awareness, on bridging the gap between the homosexual and the heterosexual communities," Galloway said. "We want to collaborate with other organizations to bring our whole community together."

The board members Galloway will be working with include chairman Chris Davis, along with Kim Abernathy, Lamond Ayers, Willie Hall and Delbert Johnson. And LOSF's next event will be a membership round-up Saturday, April 9, from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Center for Community Cooperation, 2900 Live Oak St.

The organization's next big event will be the annual Juneteenth Celebration, on June 18, featuring a barbecue picnic at a location to be announced later, followed in August by the annual Heritage Celebration Honors Awards.

LOSF also sponsors a free community mixer on the third Wednesday of each month, from 6:30 p.m. to 10 p.m., at Catfish Blues, 1011 S. Corinth

And on the third Sunday of each month, LOSF holds The Set, a discussion forum for "matureminded" African-American men, and House of Glamour, a discussion forum for African-Ameri-

Changes coming on Cedar Springs

Warwick announces plans for Bronx location: JR.'s remodel starts: new restaurants opening soon

Two restaurants closed on Cedar Springs Road last weekend, but new businesses are opening, and at least one long-time club is being remodeled.

The Bronx, the oldest gay-owned business on Cedar Springs that had operated for 35 years, has been sold to the Melrose Hotel.

Officials with Warwick, the owner of the Melrose Hotel, released their plans for the real estate on Wednesday, April 6.

"The current plans call for a large and pillar-less ballroom which would be complemented by additional meeting and conference space in a nearby building. The construction of a spa and a swimming pool is also under study," Warwick said.

The property has a 10-story height restriction on the property because it is on the Love Field glide path. While the building occupied by The Bronx is in great shape, the attached building that was last occupied by Spanish Village, is not salvageable.

Both would likely have to be razed to make room for Warwick's planned improvements.

On Thursday, April 7, Rick Espaillat, a spokesman for Caven Enterprises, reports that work was beginning that day on a month-long project to remodel JR.'s Bar & Grill, which has been located on the corner of Cedar Springs and Throckmorton for 31 years.

The remodeling project will, among other things, give the club a ground-level patio along Cedar Springs Road.

The last time JR's underwent significant renovations was 1998, when the second floor and balcony were added, Espaillat said. The club will remain open during the project.

The other restaurant that closed last week was Hung*dingers.

Danny Sikora bought the lease from the former

owner and will move his restaurant, Thairrific, from its Forest Lane location to Oak Lawn. Despite its current location, hidden in a rundown shopping center in Far North Dallas, that restaurant won the 2011 Readers Voice award for best

Sikora said work has already begun on the move.

"We've gotten the space about 80 percent cleaned out," Sikora said.

He said that Hung*dingers installed a new kitchen when they opened less than three years ago. He expects his restaurant to be ready to open on Throckmorton Street in six to eight weeks.

Two other restaurants are under construction in the same building at 4000 Cedar Springs Road.

Scott Jones, owner of Macho Nacho in the original Hunky's location, said he is waiting for delivery of some furniture and expects to open around April 18.

Coffee Lab, in the former space occupied by Obscurities, is still under construction with no set opening date.

Issues with permits and parking have delayed any changes at another Cedar Springs Road business: Scott Whittall said that they are rethinking plans for Buli, the café which the owner had originally intended to turn into a piano bar by enlarging into the vacant space next door.



up to our potential," she said.

Dave Guy-Gainer spoke on behalf of Equality Texas. He told the commissioners about a poll conducted by Glengariff Group that sampled registered voters in Texas on 12 rights as they pertain to the LGBT community.

"According to the poll, 70 percent of all Texas voters support prohibiting employment and housing discrimination for transgender citizens," he said.

Gainer said that over the past three election cycles, Dallas County has voted for progressive government. He called Dallas County a leader for other jurisdictions across the area as well as nation-

Pam Curry, who is transgender, told the court she is a former part-time Dallas County employee.

"I was bothered when the non-discrimination policy was passed and I was not included," Curry said, going on to explain the difference between sexual orientation and gender identity.

"I urge the court to move quickly to correct the oversight," she said.

Rafael McDonnell, strategic communications and programs manager for Resource Center Dallas, spoke at the Commissioners Court meeting the previous week and by the court's rules is barred from speaking again for a month. But McDonnell promised to keep the issue before the court by lining up speakers for each weekly meeting.

McDonnell also forwarded to Dallas Voice a copy of an email he received from County Judge Clay Jenkins.

"I believe in equality for all," Jenkins wrote to McDonnell. "The new non-discrimination language was formulated by the county's human resources department at my request and was intended to prohibit discrimination against anyone. Our HR director informs me that her interpretation of sexual orientation includes gender identity and gender expression. Therefore, under our current policy, discrimination will not be tolerated.

"Many people share your concern that the policy needs to be changed to specifically state that gender identity and expression are included. I have requested an opinion from the District Attorney's office about adding identity language to the county code and its overall impact; the first step in a proposed change," Jenkins wrote.

"The vote that passed last month is a positive step, which I consider a victory, and I am asking for your faith and patience as the process moves forward," Jenkins added.

On Monday, April 4, Stonewall Democrats of Dallas unanimously passed a resolution calling on the Commissioners Court to add transgender protections, according to President Omar Narvaez.

The resolution pointed out that "comprehensive nondiscrimination policies, including sexual orientation and gender identity/expression, decrease costs for employers, decrease regrettable loss, raise productivity, and increase recruiting efficiency," and "will serve to further the goals of economic development, marketplace competition, and improved quality of life."

The other victims of homophobia

Straight Spouse Network offers help to those whose partners have come out — without bashing LGBT people

Connie Marshall had been married to her husband for 30 years and had two children when, on the evening her older son returned from his honeymoon, her husband sat her down for a talk.

He told her he was gay and that he was moving to New York, and he handed her a list of what he wanted to take with him.

Marshall, who is now retired, owned several restaurants in San Antonio. Not only did her husband leave her with her business, but also with his car and their house to sell.


A few weeks later, her younger son left for college. So within a month, her household shrank from four to just one and she was suddenly facing

"This kind of divorce is so different from the run-of-the-mill divorce and those of us who have walked down that path need support," Marshall

The first thing Marshall assured is that Straight Spouse Network not about gay bashing. It provides support to the heterosexual current or former partner of a gay, lesbian, bisexual or transgender person to constructively resolve coming out issues.

In fact, Marshall said, the group encourages LGBT people to come out when they're young so that what happened to her doesn't happen to others. The heterosexual partner is just one more victim of homophobia, Marshall said.

When Marshall moved to Dallas from San Antonio several years ago to live near her older son, she was surprised that this city didn't have a straight spouse group. A group did exist in Dallas previously but disbanded. After speaking to members of PFLAG and people at Northaven United Methodist Church, she decided to start

Marshall points out that there are all sorts of groups for people in the LGBT community. Straight Spouse Network is the only organization that meets the needs of the heterosexual partner.

Her experience with the group is that some people who attend are angry but most just need the support of knowing they are not the only person that this happened to. Actually, she said, the group estimates that about 2 million people have found themselves in this situation or are still married to a gay or lesbian spouse.

Marshall said her former husband has always been a good father, and she wishes they had been able to maintain their friendship. She said that since he left 10 years ago she has reached out to him a number of times but he keeps his distance. She imagines that guilt on his part keeps him from re-establishing their friendship.

After being on her own for 10 years, Marshall said she has created a new life for herself. But she hopes to help others facing this situation.

The Dallas Straight Spouse Network will meet for the first time on April 12.

HHS announces plan to improve LGBT health

Move comes following release of study detailing 'research gaps and opportunities' related to LGBTs and healthcare

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services announced Friday, April 1, that it is making new recommendations for future action to "improve the lives of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people."

The announcement came on the heels of a federally sponsored report by the Institute of Medicine that identified "research gaps and opportunities" related to LGBT health. That report was released March 31.

It also came on the same day HHS Secretary Kathleen Sebelius announced a new policy "explicitly requiring HHS employees to serve all individuals who are eligible for the department's programs without regard to any non-merit factor, including race, national origin, color, reli-

gion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, disability (physical or mental), age, status as a parent, or genetic information."

A lengthy press statement released by HHS on April 1 mostly reiterated actions HHS and the Obama administration taken have taken previously to improve the health and equal rights for LGBT people. For instance, it noted President Obama had called for new guidelines to require hospitals receiving federal funds to allow LGBT patients to designate who could visit them in the hospital.

But among the new actions announced, the press statement said that later this year, HHS's website devoted to the new health reform law, the Affordable Care Act (HealthCare.gov) would provide "additional information of specific relevance to LGBT populations."

"In particular," noted the HHS statement, "the website will allow LGBT consumers to identity health insurance policies available to them that include coverage of domestic partners."

The announcement said HHS would also work to increase:

- the "number of federally funded health and demographic surveys that collect and report sexual orientation and gender identity data;"
- "evaluate ways its programs can ensure equal treatment of LGBT families," through such programs as the Temporary Assistance for

Needy Families, and others; and

• "encourage new and existing health profession training programs...to include LGBT cultural competency curricula."

The IOM report released March 31 was commission by the National Institutes of Health, an agency of HHS. The report recommended that NIH conduct more research to "advance knowledge and understanding of LGBT health" and that HHS surveys collect data "on sexual orientation and gender identity."

It also recommended "Data on sexual orientation and gender identity should be collected in electronic health records.

"Collecting these detailed patient-level data," noted the IOM report, "with adequate privacy and security protection as is needed for all data collected in electronic health records, could assist in identifying and addressing LGBT health disparities."

Local counselor Candy Marcum said she is not surprised by the findings in the study. According to the report, lesbian and bisexual women use preventive health services less frequently than heterosexual women.

Marcum said that when she first went to a gynecologist, the medical questionnaire asked how much sex she was having followed by what method of birth control she used. She said a major concern of the doctor is pregnancy.

"But that would involve having sex with a

man and that just doesn't sound right to me," she said.

So to get proper care from her doctor, Marcum said, she had to come out. She said that doctors and caregivers are the most compassionate people but coming out to anyone can be scarv.

Breast cancer and ovarian cancer occur more frequently among lesbians than straight women, the report said.

"You have the right for good health care," Marcum said. But to make sure a physician looks for those things, it's important for the doctor to know the patient's sexual orientation.

She said the doctor has to have the proper context


Marcum said another finding, that lesbians suffer from obesity more than women in general, is also not surprising. "Women are more accepting of the person they love," she said.

Marcum said that the medical system is broken and that fewer people are accessing the system. But she said she is gratified that HHS was addressing the issues of the LGBT community.

2011 mayoral hopefuls reach out to LGBT voters like never before.

For the first time ever, all major candidates for Dallas mayor are actively courting the LGBT vote in 2011.

City Councilman Ron Natinsky, former Parks Board Chairman Mike Rawlings and former Police Chief David Kunkle each pledged their support for the community in recent interviews with Dallas Voice.

And all three sought endorsements from both Stonewall Democrats and the Dallas Gay and Lesbian Alliance, although Natinsky pulled out of Stonewall's candidate screening over questions about his eligibility for the group's backing.

Openly gay former City Councilman Ed Oakley, who was defeated in a runoff for mayor by "a watershed moment for the community."

Tom Leppert in 2007, called the 2011 mayor's race "It's unprecedented," Oakley said. "I'm very proud of Dallas that we have matured to this

point. The mayor down the road who doesn't

DGLA's endorsement questionnaire, which Oakley says should have been a red flag. Leppert also refused to answer when asked whether he was "gay-friendly," saying he didn't know what the term meant.

But Leppert vowed during his runoff campaign against Oakley to be the mayor for all of Dallas, and for his first two years in office, he appeared to live up to the promise.

Then, when Leppert began weighing a run for U.S. Senate, he joined the virulently anti-gay First Baptist Church. And later, after stepping down as mayor to run for Senate, he came out against both same-sex marriage and civil unions.

Leppert's shift to the right on LGBT issues left many in the community feeling angry and betrayed.

All three major candidates in this year's race insisted they'd never throw the LGBT community under the bus. But while they're all going after the gay vote, their records and positions on LGBT is-

something like Leppert's betrayal of the community never happens again, but he agreed that the episode underscores the importance of the mayor's race.

"We need to be supporting candidates that truly have a history in this community, not just when they're running," he said.

Ron Natinsky

Oakley is one of three openly gay former Dallas city councilmen who've endorsed Natinsky for mayor.

And Natinsky touted the support of Oakley and former Councilmen Chris Luna and Craig Holcomb when asked why the LGBT community should vote for him.

"It's a proven track record," said Natinsky, a regular at meetings of the gay group Log Cabin Republicans. "I've taken part in LGBT events, and I've been in the parade and I've gone to Black Tie. It's a proven element.

"It's really easy for people to say, 'Well, if you elect me, I'll go do these things.' It's another when you've been doing it for a number of years."

During his six years on the council, Natinsky never appointed an openly LGBT person to a city board or commission, but he said it wasn't for lack of trying.

Natinsky said he approached members of the LGBT community who live in his district, but they declined to serve due to business and personal obligations. He said he wouldn't hesitate to appoint openly LGBT people to boards and commissions as mayor.

In 2008, Natinsky voted against a budget amendment that would have restored \$250,000 in funding for HIV/AIDS services. He said he opposed the amendment, which failed 9-6, because he didn't believe the proposed funding source was reliable.

Natinsky, like the other two candidates for mayor, vowed to defend existing Dallas ordinances offering domestic partner benefits to city employees, and prohibiting discrimination based on sexual orientation in employment, housing and public accommodations.



He also said he would support the expansion of LGBT diversity training, currently conducted by the Dallas Police Department, to Dallas Fire-Rescue

Natinsky also said he supports the concept of requiring city contractors to offer domestic partner benefits, but would first want to research the legality.

"If there's not any negative repercussions, or some reason that we can't do it from a legal perspective, it's certainly something that we need to try to move forward on," he said.

Natinsky said he supports an ongoing review by two council members — Angela Hunt and

Pauline Medrano — of the city's handling of complaints under the nondiscrimination ordinance.

But he said he would be reluctant to create a council-appointed LGBT human relations commission due to its price tag.

Natinsky said while he's "open" to the idea, the annual cost in staff time for a commission can be up to \$250,000. He suggested that the same goals could be accomplished through regular meetings between the mayor and LGBT leaders.

"We have to be careful that we don't put another layer of institutional bureaucracy in place," Natinsky said. "If it comes down to whether we're going to lay off a police officer or have another board, that's kind of a tough decision to make."

Natinsky pulled out of the Stonewall Demo-

crats' endorsement process at the last minute because it appeared he was ineligible for the group's backing due to his Republican primary voting record.

He said he was somewhat disappointed that he wasn't able to seek Stonewall's endorsement, which he called a natural extension of his campaign. But he said he doesn't believe his party affiliation will hurt him among LGBT voters, and he dismissed any comparisons to Leppert.

For one, he said he doesn't have any political aspirations beyond the mayor's office.

"He's Tom and I'm Ron," Natinsky said. "I'm the guy that's running for mayor, and he's not, so I think you need to go on my track record and my reputation."

Natinsky is Jewish but said he is not affiliated with any congregation. Asked whether he supports same-sex marriage, Natinsky said: "This is not a city issue; it is handled at the state and federal level. I do have several longtime close friends, including Craig Holcomb and Hector Garcia, who are happily married. However, the mayor has no jurisdiction over these matters."

Like Natinsky, Kunkle pointed to his record of working with the community as one reason why LGBT voters should cast their ballots for him.

"I'm a known quantity," Kunkle said. "I have a proven track record. I'm very comfortable in the LGBT community.

"I believe that one of the things that makes Dallas a special place is the fact that our LGBT community is so large and accommodating. And it helps bring people to this city probably from throughout the United States, but certainly from throughout the Southwest part of the United States, to be able to come to a community where there's support and there are interesting, cool, things to do," he said. "I'm the known candidate. We want to work hard to make sure there's full

Kunkle, who received the endorsement of Stonewall Democrats of Dallas, said as police chief, he always took seriously the concerns of the LGBT community.

Kunkle said he rode in the Alan Ross Texas

anybody, maybe even the mayor, because of what I represented as the police chief," Kunkle said.

During his tenure as chief, Kunkle was faced with requests from the community to convert the Police Department's LGBT liaison officer assignment from part time to full time.

Kunkle was initially reluctant to make the change because he said he didn't believe there was enough work for the officer to do, but he eventually agreed to the full-time assignment.

"I've always felt that ... having a full time police officer in the community was important as long as there was enough work to keep the person busy," he said.

Kunkle also frequently dealt with questions as chief about violent crime in an area near the Cedar Springs strip, which at one point ranked as high as No. 3 among the city's worst hotspots.

But Kunkle said it's been the very identification of those hotspots that helped lead to a 36 percent reduction in violent crime citywide over the last seven years. The Cedar Spring area has since fallen to No. 7 on the list.

"One reason crime reduction occurred is that we as a department got much better about targeting the highest crime areas," he said.

Kunkle said he would appoint openly LGBT people to boards and commissions, and supports the expansion of diversity training.

Kunkle also said he would defend the city's nondiscrimination ordinance and DP benefits program if they came under attack from the Legislature, council members or some other outside

He expressed support for the review by Hunt and Medrano of the city's handling of nondiscrimination complaints, but he said he's unsure about requiring DP benefits for contractors.

"I don't know that the city of Dallas should require it, but I think the fact that the city suggests it would be the appropriate thing to do," Kunkle said. "I'm not opposed to it, either. I just don't know legally what would be the impact of doing it, the consequences. I think on its face it seems like a good idea."





firmly supports the formation of an LGBT human relations commission.

"I think the funding would be minimal," he said. "I think the benefits could be great."

Kunkle said he believes council-appointed commissions could also benefit other "groups that tend to be underrepresented or may be forgotten."

He said an LGBT commission could help deal with issues like DP benefits for city contractors. A few years ago, the council signed a contract with Omni Hotels to operate the cityowned convention center hotel, but the company wasn't asked whether it offers DP benefits until after the fact.

"I don't know that I would have ever thought of it, but that's one advantage of having a commission, so that those kinds of issues can have a mechanism to be brought up," Kunkle said.

Kunkle had stepped down as police chief prior to the Police Department's controversial raid of a gay bathhouse last October. But he said he would not have signed off on the vice unit's operation at Club Dallas had he still been chief.

"I don't think that meets the definition of public lewdness in my mind," Kunkle said,



adding that police have "better things to do."

"If you have consenting adults engaged in activity, there's nobody who's going to walk into that environment who should be offended by what they see," he said. "It's not a public place."

Asked about Leppert's shift to the right, Kunkle said it's an example of why he's the best candidate.

"That's the reason I think you guys should vote for me, because I'm not going to change," he said. "I always have been consistent in what I believe in. I'm not going to change depending on which audience I'm in. I'm running as a nontraditional candidate, and it gives me some freedom to talk about and say what I really believe, without worrying about which of my financial supporters I'm going to offend."

Kunkle said he is a member of a Methodist church but has not been active for the last several years. Asked whether he supports samesex marriage, Kunkle said: "My beliefs and faith are one of tolerance and respect for people and the choices that they make. If I were confronted with and involved with that issue, that's the side I would come out on."

Mike Rawlings

Rawlings, the former CEO of Pizza Hut, acknowledged that he likely is the least known of the three major candidates to the LGBT community in Dallas. But Rawlings said his record in the private sector, as the city's homeless czar and as chairman of the Convention and Visitors Bureau should make LGBT voters comfortable supporting him.

"I was the chairman of [the CVB] when we started our first GLBT marketing campaign, to market Dallas as a truly cosmopolitan city with all the diversity this town has and offers to other people, and I think being part of that dialogue is extremely important," Rawlings said.

"While a lot of people don't know me, my three-and-a-half decades here in Dallas and my business relationships, my teams that I've worked with over the years, can pretty much speak to how I've lived my life.

"I ran the largest advertising agency in the South, and we had a huge community of GLBT associates and team members."

Rawlings said as homeless czar, he worked tirelessly on behalf of the city's most marginalized population.

"This is not a man who doesn't understand what it means to create dignity for individuals, so I would ask somebody to look at that track record, and say, 'Is it consistent that this guy's going to take a left-hand turn from the way he's treated people his whole life?'"

Rawlings was CEO of Pizza Hut from 1997 until 2003. Pizza Hut is owned by Yum Brands, which scored a 65 out of 100 on the Human Rights Campaign's Corporate Equality Index in 2010.

According to HRC, Yum Foods added sexual orientation to its nondiscrimination policy in

2004, and began offering DP benefits in 2006.

Joe Bosch, who was HR director at Pizza Hut when Rawlings was CEO, noted that the company is merely a division of Yum Brands. Bosch said although Yum Brands may not have enacted the two policies until after Rawlings left Pizza Hut, "He was definitely a champion of diversity."

Rawlings' assistant, Sandy Nelson, said the company where he currently serves as vice chairman, CIC Partners in Dallas, is too small with only 12 employees to have extensive LGBT-related employment policies.

Rawlings, whose high-profile LGBT supporters include Pam Gerber and Larry Pease, said he would be honored to participate in events such as the gay Pride parade and the Black Tie Dinner.

And he said he would not hesitate to appoint openly LGBT people to city boards and commissions. "I go for talent," he said. "Diversity is not a politically correct term for me. Diversity is the way we're going to be more competitive."

Rawlings also said he would support expanding DPD diversity training to Fire-Rescue. He said he wasn't familiar with the ongoing review of the city's handling of discrimination complaints, but he added, "If people are being treated badly, we need to get to the bottom of it."

Rawlings vowed to defend both the nondiscrimination ordinance and DP benefits if they came under attack. But he said he would not support establishing an LGBT commission, because he prefers human relationships and accountability over bureaucracy.

"When I was on the parks board, I really questioned, what are we doing here as a parks board? It didn't set budget, it didn't set policy, so I'm a believer in fewer versus more in that regard," he said. "I'm a believer in getting the job done, as opposed to acting like the job's getting done."

Rawlings also said he would be reluctant to require contractors to offer DP benefits, because such an ordinance would amount to playing "the ethics police."

"I would not be for it, probably, because we've got way too many hurdles everybody's got to jump over to get money into this town," he said

Rawlings said he attends First Presbyterian Church and believes discrimination against LGBT people is "one of the worst parts" of Christianity.

He said he had an employee who was beaten to death in an anti-gay hate crime in the 1980s.

"One of our top creative people was killed over on Cedar Springs one night," he said. "It changed my perspective on things a lot."

Asked about same-sex marriage, Rawlings said he believes the issue is "divisive' and shouldn't be used as "a litmus test."

"I think it's one of the most irrelevant issues for the world," he said. "I think we should get beyond it and let people do what they want to do. Some of my best friends have been married, and I'm pleased that they have been, and so I'm really happy for them. I've supported their marriage, but it's not the mayor's job to say, 'We need to do this.'"

'Democrat' doesn't always equal 'gay-friendly'

Comments by Bexar County
Democratic Party chair — and the response to them — shows LGBTs have to work across lines of race, party to make progress

Much has been said about the chairman of the Bexar County Democratic Party, Dan Ramos, who last month made headlines with a rant in which he called LGBT people "Nazis" and "termites." But as things develop, we shouldn't just write

Ramos off as one county chairman gone crazy. Lessons can be learned here about politics, race, and the fight for equality.

On April 5, the Bexar County Democratic Party precinct chairs held two meetings, both claiming to be official. The San Antonio Express News reported that the larger meeting, from which Ramos was absent, had about 75 precinct chairs that voted to put Ramos on trial for rule violations.

The smaller meeting, which Ramos attended, was comprised almost exclusively of Hispanic precinct chairs giving him, reportedly a "hero's welcome"

In March, a local news survey showed that only 54 percent of viewers believed that Ramos should resign his post — a far cry unanimous agreement.

This got me thinking: Is there a quiet, but significant group of people who aren't that upset with Ramos?


Ramos' comments have become increasingly racially charged. Further, Ramos has maintained his position opposing gay marriage and adoption represents the true sentiments of Bexar County residents.

What if Ramos is right, and what if race is a bigger player than initially thought?

The Pew Hispanic Center, the leader in Latino research, reported that 56 percent of Hispanics oppose gay marriage, compared to only 42 percent of non-Hispanics; 43 percent of Hispanics believe that abortion should be legal compared to 60 percent of non-Hispanics.

These number are in stark contrast to a 2010 Gallup poll showing 56 percent and 87 percent of Democrats support, respectively, gay marriage and some form of legal abortion.

According to Pew, Hispanics tend to identify with the Democratic Party 66 percent of the time, double the rate by which they identify with the

Republican Party. And, the Latino population is the fastest growing minority in the country — seeing a 56 percent increase from 2000 to 2010 in Southern states.

What this means is that the fastest growing population, which overwhelmingly supports the Democratic Party, significantly breaks with the Democratic platform on issues like gay rights and women's right to choose.

So maybe, the conflict in Bexar County is just a sample of more intra-party disputes to come as the Latino populations grows and realizes more leadership positions in the Democratic Party.

To the people ready to accuse me of lumping all Latinos into one big bag: Cool down; I'm not. I'm suggesting that, as the Hispanic commu-

nity becomes larger and more politically active — flexing its muscle on issues like immigration and education — we shouldn't assume that a "D" or "R" next to someone's name automatically reveals their position on gay rights.

As a community, we need to be reaching out to all communities, and we should never assume that one group is automatically in our corner.

The leaders of Stonewall Democrats of San Antonio are right: Dan Ramos is a dinosaur who will soon be extinct.

But I caution against assuming that when dinosaurs die there will automatically be political oil to drill. The numbers show that is not guaranteed.





Some things a-Foote

Festival of Texas writer's work continues with hits (Uptown) and misses (WTT)

As the Horton Foote Festival progresses among the local theater community, Dallas is privy to some of the Texas-born writer's other works that might get eclipsed by his more famous works, the films *The Trip to Bountiful* and *Tender Mercies*. Despite not much that's gay in the Foote oeuvre, Uptown Players digs out the one show with that certain touch with the Pulitzer Prize-winning **The Young Man from Atlanta**.

An older Houston couple has some issues to iron out when the title fella comes to visit. Will Kidder (T.A. Taylor), the patriarch of a well-to-do family in 1950s Houston, is talking to his like-a-son-associate Tom (Kevin Moore) about the death of his son Bill, who drowned. The gist of the play happens when we've already glimpsed the title character reaching out to the family. The Kidders first meet Bill's "friend," Randy Carter, at his funeral, where his constant contact unnerves Will but touches his wife, Lily Dale (Lucia A. Welch). Lily Dale even loans the man a large

sum of money from her Christmas allowance, which Will later needs access to.

We're supposed to get the impression that this young man was more than a roommate to Bill and that the Kidders just aren't going to speak that-which-must-not-be-named. But as Lily Dale talks about the money she's given him for his mother's operation and sister in dire straits, we can't pinpoint if Carter is a scammer or something more important.

Young Man gets off to a weak start with talky exposition, but we get drawn into the Kidders' emotional evolution through Willi's layoff and their mourning. Will has more insight to why his son would walk into a lake until the water was over his head without liking to swim; Lily Dale is in more denial. And while they have lived the high-life for such a long time, the Kidders discover they may actually have to live a life without facades.

What sounds like heavy drama is punctuated by nice bits of humor and lightheartedness, so



they play is never weighed down like it could be.

The play pretty much belongs to Taylor, though the supporting cast is strong. Welch be-

haves with appropriate Southern housewifery, mostly smiling through the pain of their late son, who drowned. When she's not around her husband, she longs with graceful sadness around her housekeeper Clara (an excellent Yolanda Williams). As her stepfather Pete, Gordon Fox strikes the right balance of crotchety and tender.

Moore's performance is a bit too much, with the overdone facial gestures and deep-voiced acting. On the opposite end, Stan Graner's work in a brief scene as Kidder's boss is nuanced to perfection. With subtle posturing and inflection, he delivers authority, friendliness and discomfort in having to fire Kidder. Tippi Hunter and Amanda Denton enter the show briefly as the Kidders' former housekeeper and Will's secretary, respectively. It felt as though Hunter's appearance was supposed to have more meaning, but we never quite see how that scene moved much forward. Blake Blair as Pete's nephew is a

made a dramatic gem in helping us trying to figure him out and giving us a bit more insight into Horton Foote's works.

The actors in **The Traveling Lady** all suffer from a bad case of Foote-in-mouth disease: The tendency of all Southern accents to bleed together. There are Texas

twangs and Tennessee drawls and a whol' passel'uh cornpone variations in between, but wouldn't it be nice if a cast of characters from the same small town sounded like, you know, each other?


That's perhaps a minor point, but the pacing of this entry in the Foote Fest, courtesy of Water-Tower Theatre, doesn't leave much else to think about as it dries on stage like oil-based matte paint: slowly, and with a dull finish.

Foote's style has been described as Chekhov-meets-Faulkner; personally, I prefer my Chekhov fighting Klingons — even when it's bad, at least something happens. Nothing much happens in Traveling Lady, a fact emphasized by Marion Castleberry's sluggish direction. He seems to know more about the text of the play than the texture of theater — there's a lugubrious, academic tone to this trite 1954 story about the awkward reunion of a wife and her husband, who's been in prison. (The demonization of alcohol makes it feel like a PSA for the Temperance League.)


As storytelling, it's OK; as a play, it's old-fashioned and stodgy, with too much standing around, not enough moving around (where's the traveling promised, even if it's just across the stage?). Why don't the characters *do* anything, even if it's just drying dishes? Clare Floyd Devries' marvelous set is much more interesting than anything the actors are doing.


It probably wouldn't matter much if they did bother acting. Other than Dorothy Deavers as a dotty old woman, there's almost no comedy in this lazy stroll down Tobacco Road. The lady can travel if she wants; I'm staying put.



'Bill Cunningham New York' turns the camera on fashion's most influential paparazzo

Maybe *Project Runway*'s to blame, maybe *The Devil Wears Prada*, but for the past few years there has been a surplus of documentaries about the fashion industry, with profiles of designers like Valentino (*Valentino: The Last Emperor*), Yves Saint-Laurent (several in fact), even young designers (*Seamless*) and Vogue magazine's editor (*The September Issue*). (By contrast, I can only recall one fashion doc from the 1990s: *Unzipped*, about a young designer named Isaac Mizrahi.) Is

there really that much to say about dressmaking?

Maybe not, but while **Bill Cunningham New York** fits
broadly within the category of
fashion documentaries, its subject
is unusual because he eschews

the trappings of haute couture even as he's inextricably a part of it — a huge part, really.

If you don't read the New York Times, you might not recognize Cunningham's name, and even if you do read it, it may not have registered with you. For about, well, maybe 1,000 years, Cunningham has chronicled New York society with his candid photos of the glitterati on the Evening Hours page. At the same time, however, he has documented *real* fashion — how New Yorkers dress in their daily lives — with his page On the Street, where he teases out trends (from hats to men in skirts to hip-hoppers allowing their jeans to dangle around their knees). Anna Wintour may tell us what we *should* wear; Cunningham shows us what we *do*.

"We all get dressed for Bill," Wintour observes

What makes Cunningham such an interesting character is how impervious he seems to the responsibility he effortlessly wields. He loves fashion, yes, but he's not a slave to it himself. He scurries around Manhattan (even in his 80s) on his bicycle (he's had dozens; they are frequently stolen), sometimes in a nondescript tux but

mostly in jeans, a ratty blue smock and duck shoes, looking more like a homeless shoeshiner than the arbiter of great fashion. He flits through the city like a pixie with his 35mm camera (filmloaded, not digital), a vacant, toothy smile peaking out behind the lens, snapping the denizens of Babylon whether they want it or not.

One of the funniest moments is when strangers shoo him away as some lunatic paparazzo, unaware how all the well-heeled

doyens on the Upper East would trade a nut to have Cunningham photograph them for inclusion in the Times. Patrick McDonald, the weirdly superficial modern dandy (he competed as a wannabe designer on the flop reality series

Launch My Line a few seasons back), seems to exist with the hope that Cunningham will shoot him. And shoot him he does.

Many artists are idiosyncratic, even eccentric, but Cunningham is supremely odd by any standards. He lives in a tiny studio near Carnegie Hall filled with filing cabinets cluttered with decades of film negatives on the same floor as a crazy old woman, a kind of urban variation on Grey Gardens. He knows tons of people but most of them seem to know very little about him. By the time near the end when the filmmaker, director Richard Press, finally comes out and ask him outright whether he's gay, Cunningham arches in that prickly New England way, never really answering outright, though he says he's never — never — had a romantic relationship. Things like that were simply not discussed by men of his generation.

In some ways, we never really know any more about Cunningham at the end than any of his friends do, and perhaps even him. Cunningham comes across as defiantly non-self-reflective. He lets his work do all the talking for him. And that work has a lot to say on its own.

The lap of luxury

With Spa Week, luxury facilities like V Spa seek to 'queer eye' us all

Damn those *Queer Eye* guys. When they emerged in 2003, they gave away some of our best secrets, teaching straight men to get in touch with their metrosexual side and embrace skin care and days spas.

Only not everyone got the message — and sometimes, not even gay men. A massage is one thing, but a facial? A mani-pedi? But even those treatments are getting their play in the male psyche.

Sarah Long, the spa manager at the Hilton Anatole's V Spa (which opened about three years ago), says nowadays it is easier to get men in to enjoy the range of services offered.

"A lot of it is they are either scared and don't know what to expect with a lot of guys there's a whole stigma of going to the spa—it's not manly," says Long. "But absolutely men do this, once they get past that wariness at the beginning. When they are in the first time, you don't need to give further incentives."

In order to incentivize that first visit, however,

spas like V populate their menus with services such as the "gentleman's facial" (a lush and soothing skin treatment) to let men know some treatments are intended just for them. And with Spa Week upon us, this might be just the time to check it out.

Spa Week has been undertaken for a while, says Long, usually with twice-a-year windows (in Dallas, April and October) when spas offer a selection of their high-end services at a discount price to encourage new clients.

"We drop the price point for that week on two to three services for \$50. It's really a good opportunity to try out something new without spending a lot of money," Long says.

This season's offerings at V Spa include the "restorative facial," the "revitalizing back treatment" and the "rose-scented pedicure," all for just \$50. "We do try to switch up the services we offer so those who show up every Spa Week can try something different," Long says.

Whatever gets you in there, V Spa does provide a spectacular service. Not all spa experiences are comparable (though often their prices are). The common areas can make a difference,

as well as the treatment room facilities and perks. V Spa, for instance, has a waiting area with an Asian influence (bamboo, dark woods — just like the rest of the hotel) and complimentary nuts and champagne. A technician even gives you a foot bath while wrapping your neck in a warm buckwheat pillow before you slide between high thread-count sheets on a damask-covered massage table. Such luxuries provide added value.

"Especially right now, a lot of us are cutting back, but there are things we had to keep," Long says. It all serves the main point of a day at the spa: Escape.

"I think relaxation is a huge thing," says Long. "You should be able to walk in and leave your life for a little bit — have that time for yourself, a moment of piece ... like a mini-vacation. You need to know it is gonna be relaxing."

That means no matter what service you buy, you get all the extras, including access to the health club and pool, the sauna and showers, the robes and cucumber water all for one price. It really can be a Calgon moment that lasts all day.

Bells in the air 'Kidpreneur' Dallas Crilley has a heart on for men's balls. But not in a gay way

Dallas Crilley stops by my office unannounced one workday morning, asking me to write a story about him. That takes balls.

Then again, balls are very important to him right now. You might say he has balls on the

Crilley, the son of former local TV personality Jeff Crilley, is only 18, but he has big ideas. And the one he's been working on lately is a fundraising effort for testicular cancer: Putting the statement "I heart balls!" on wristbands.

"It kind of started as a joke," Dallas says. It was *not* an original idea: There were already wristbands announcing "I heart boobies" meant to raise money and awareness for breast cancer. "Somebody said to me, 'Why not an 'I heart wieners' wristband?" I'd heard the joke so many times, it began to sink in."

Dallas changed the logo to "I heart balls" in order to target testicular cancer.

"I didn't want it to be a parody. Cancer isn't funny, but the 'I heart boobies' [bracelets] are ingenious because they made the subject of cancer something people could talk about at the dinner table," Dallas says. "But the undertones are definitely serious. This year, 8,000 men will be diagnosed with testicular cancer and 300 will die. It's the most common form of cancer for men aged 18 to 35." Which puts Dallas himself in the risk group for his foreseeable future.

Crilley is putting his money where his wrist is. Last month, his company made its first donation to a cancer charity — before he had even paid for the cost of producing the bracelets, he says. He wanted people to know he is serious about doing good deeds and is not some kid with a gimmick.

"We are not a non-profit yet, but we are in the process. Until then, it doesn't mean we can't donate," Dallas says. "Me and my girlfriend and my friend walked into that American Cancer Society's Dallas chapter with a check for \$1,000. They were like, 'Oh my gosh! We don't usually get walk-in donations that big.""

He plans to make donations to a variety of testicular cancer-research charities and forums, including some that are Internet-based, to "show them all some love," he says.

"So far, his success is totally through word-ofmouth," brags dad Jeff. "This is the first interview he's conducted about his product," which launched in November. "Everything has been viral. He mails out three or four packages every day. I'm proud of him as a dad."

The bracelets are available in a variety of colors, including orchid — the official testicular cancer ribbon color — which is the most popu-

Most of the orders, Dallas notes, have been from girls, but they cross a gamut socially and geographically: He's shipped packages as far as the U.K., Australia and New Zealand. And he thinks his efforts at awareness would be of serious interest to the gay community. (Next year, he hopes to have wristbands for sale at the Texas Bear Round-Up, and possibly other gay events before that.)

If you're impressed that an 18-year-old would start a company, it's old hat to Dallas Crilley. He wrote his first book, Kidpreneur, at age 15, a guide to teenaged entrepreneurship. (He beat his dad by 30 years, Jeff jokes.) That makes him, before he can even legally drink alcohol, a serial entrepreneur. He even has some other business ideas on his mind. But he's not talking specifics.

Hey, the first lesson a magnate learns is, don't give away a million-dollar idea.


TRAVEL DIARY: COLOR YOUR WORLD
