



LCR convention brings prominent Republicans to Dallas

DADT attorney Dan Woods, former Congressman Bob Barr slated to speak at gay Republican gathering at the Anatole Hotel

Several prominent GOP members will be spending some time in Dallas this weekend to participate in the Log Cabin Republicans' annual convention, which will take place at the Hilton Anatole Hotel.

The event, that began Thursday, April 28, runs through Sunday, May 1, and includes discussions and speeches from politicians, lawyers and members of the media.

Dan Woods, lead attorney in LCR's lawsuit challenging the military's "don't ask, don't tell policy," will be speaking at the convention about the importance of the case, its current standing and some of the war stories involved in the suit.

"People think this case is over and it's not," Woods said in a recent interview. "Our case is

Dallas County adds transgender protections

Activists around Texas look to expand nondiscrimination policies after Dallas becomes first to add gender identity/expression

On Tuesday, April 26, Dallas became the first county in Texas to add gender identity and expression to its nondiscrimination policy. After listening to more than 30 minutes of public comments in favor of the proposal, the Dallas County Commissioners Court voted 3-2 along party lines to add trans protections.

The vote came five weeks after the commissioners voted to add sexual orientation protection to the policy

Commissioner John Wiley Price provided the third and decisive vote in favor of transgender protections this week, joining fellow Democrats County Judge Clay Jenkins and Commissioner Dr. Elba Garcia. Republican Commissioners Maurine Dickey and Mike Cantrell voted against the transgender protections.

The city of Dallas already had those protections in place, as does Dallas Area Rapid Transit.

Of the other 253 counties in Texas, only Travis County includes sexual orientation in its policy, although its county seat and largest city, Austin, does have protections based on sexual orientation and gender identity and expression.

After the Dallas vote, Chuck Smith, deputy executive director of Equality Texas, said that he spoke with leaders of the Transgender Education Network. He said that they are interested in working together to change the policy in Travis County. They plan to meet after the current legislative session ends in late May.

Mayor Annise Parker expanded the nondiscrimination ordinance in the city of Houston to one of the most expansive in the country soon after taking office.

Houston's Harris County, however, guarantees no protection based on sexual orientation or gender identity.

Tim Brookover of the Houston GLBT Gay and Lesbian Community Center said he didn't expect his county to follow Dallas any time in the near future.

Noel Freeman, president of the Houston GLBT Political Caucus said, "At some point in the future I intend to go down that path, but not in the

next couple of months, if not through the end of the year."

He said that Houston's local election activity is about to ramp up and his group won't have much time until January to pursue the county's policies.

Parker, the first openly LGBT person elected mayor of a top 10 U.S. city, faces re-election in November.

Fort Worth was the first city in Texas to ban discrimination based on sexual orientation. The city added gender identity in 2010.

Tarrant County, however, protects neither.

Tom Anable, president of Fairness Fort Worth, expects his county to follow suit soon, however. He noted that the new Dallas County guidelines are based on the new Fort Worth city policy.

Anable said his first step will be to take the Dallas County juvenile justice nondiscrimination policy to the Tarrant County juvenile justice system. His next step will be to approach the county.

Collin County has no nondiscrimination policy on its website and did not return a call.

Before the Tuesday vote in Commissioners Court, about a dozen people from the LGBT community spoke. Despite rumors that detractors would also appear, no one spoke against the

Gay couple found murdered in burned apartment

Two men found dead inside a burned Northeast Dallas apartment on Wednesday morning were a gay couple, Dallas police confirmed Wednesday afternoon.

The two victims, whose names are being withheld pending notification of their families, were found inside their first-floor unit at the Villa Joya Apartments, 11210 Woodmeadow Parkway, near Ferguson Road and LBJ Freeway.

After responding to a fire call at about 4:10 a.m., Dallas Fire-Rescue crews extinguished the flames before finding the victims — a 59-year-old black male and a 61-year-old white male — inside the apartment

Authorities say the men appeared to have died in a violent attack before the fire was set in an attempt to destroy evidence from the murders.

Sr. Cpl. Kevin Janse, a spokesman for DPD, told Instant Tea that detectives have no reason to believe the murders were a hate crime, but he added that the motive is unknown

"Yes, it does appear that they were in a relationship together, but that does not appear to have anything to do with this case," Janse said. "It is not being investigated as a hate crime or anything like that."

According to the Dallas Morning News, neighbors said the older victim was disabled and the other was his caretaker. Neighbors also told the DMN that the victims' apartment had an alarm and surveillance system and that the younger man would never open the door for someone he didn't know.

News reports indicate that the suspects likely knew at least one of the victims. Authorities believe one of the victim's vehicles is missing. Patrol officers are searching for it and hope to find the suspects in it.

UPDATE:

Police are still not releasing the victims' names because their bodies were so badly damaged in the fire that they're waiting on the medical examiner to positively identify them.

However, police have now released a description of the vehicle belonging to one of the victims, which is apparently missing. The vehicle is a silver, four-door 2002 Saturn L200, with a license number of 5CVDN. If you see it, call 911.

Again, police have confirmed that they believe the two victims were a gay couple, but they aren't treating the murders as a hate crime.

Police also say they don't know the motive for the crime, prompting some to question how a hate crime can be ruled out. We posed this question to DPD Sr. Cpl. Kevin Janse:

"Detectives will not elaborate at this time," Janse told Instant Tea. "It may hamper the investigation."





Two gay men among One Man Dallas semifinalists

Because women volunteer at a greater rate, group formed to encourage men to give their time

Two gay men are among the 20 Dallas men who have been nominated for the title of One Man Dallas, presented by an organization that honors men who volunteer. Because women volunteer at a rate five times that of men, One Man was created to encourage and honor men who volunteer.

The project began in 2009 with One Man Minneapolis. Last year the group added Chicago and this year Dallas.

From hundreds of applications, the field was narrowed to 20 semifinalists. Nominees had to be men between ages 24 and 44 who are affiliated

Hernandez has been a Habitat volunteer for about 11 years.

"One thing I do is serve as their banker and I work on homebuilding projects," Hernandez said.

Each year, Habitat provides about 100 homes for low-income people in Dallas.

Habitat is celebrating its 25th anniversary in Dallas this year. Since 1986, it has helped 850 lowincome families. They have invested \$95 million in Dallas in more than 20 neighborhoods and have increased the tax base by \$2 million annu-

When constructing new homes, Hernandez said that volunteers do everything that doesn't require a licensed contractor. He said there's a spot on a construction site for anyone.

"They take people based on expertise and put them in the right place," he said. "There's something that everybody can do."

For the more experienced that includes nailing framework and installing sheetrock, but for less experienced volunteers there's planting landscaping, painting and cleanup.

And as their banker, Hernandez works with each of the applicants for a Habitat home to ensure their success in the program.

Steve Weir has been the board chair for Legacy Counseling Center for several years. Legacy provides counseling services for people with HIV and a substance abuse program in Oak Lawn and operates Legacy Founders Cottage, a 24-hour supervised special care facility in Oak Cliff.

Legacy's executive director, Melissa Grove, called Weir an amazing volunteer who works throughout the community.

In addition to his work with Legacy, Weir has done fundraising for Lambda Legal, Legal Hospice of Texas and Home for the Holidays, been a team captain for LifeWalk and collected silent auction items for Genesis Women's Shelter.

Grove said, "I'd be tickled if a gay man won" the One Man title.

She credited the LGBT community with volunteering at a much higher rate than the general population and said that should be highlighted for the community. She was surprised more gay men weren't among the finalists.


Voting takes place on the OneManDallas.com site. Anyone can sign in and vote once a day.



alive and kicking."

Woods said there are two different things going on with the case: Although LCR won at trial, the government has decided to appeal the decision. After months of legal arguments and appeals from both sides oral arguments are supposed to begin next week.

Despite the legal battle and action in Congress to repeal the anti-gay law, Woods said as of this point the repeal of DADT is not in effect. He said that steps have to be taken to get the military ready and although there are some efforts in this area service men and women are still suffering from this legislation.

There is no timetable as to when this repeal will become affective," Woods said. "Although the numbers are smaller the government is still investigating people under 'don't ask, don't tell.""

Another problem Woods said he has run into is that many potential presidential candidates have made stopping the repeal part of their platform. Political issues are key in this legislation's evolution, according to Woods.

"The government has said they don't want the courts deciding how our military is run. What's really going on is President Obama wants to take credit for all this to help his next campaign,"

Woods said.

In addition to talking about the current status of DADT, Woods said he will talk about some of those suffering from this legislation.

"We are going to focus on stories about those affected by 'don't ask, don't tell' and the heartbreaking tales of how it impacted them and the unit they worked on," he said.

One such servicemember, according to Woods, was Alexander Nicholson, who was kicked out of the Army because he was caught writing a letter to a former boyfriend. Another story involved a lieutenant colonel in the Army Reserves whose name cannot be used.

"This is just another story where someone is being denied their constitutional rights while they work to protect ours," Woods said.

LCR Executive Director R. Clarke Cooper said the repeal of DADT is a front page and front burner issue for the organization.

"We can't take our eye off it," he said.

The convention will also feature as keynote speaker former Congressman Bob Barr.

Barr, who ran as the Libertarian candidate in the 2008 presidential election, served in the House of Representatives as a Republican from Georgia from 1995 to 2003. During his time in office he authored and sponsored the Defense of Marriage Act, which was enacted as law in 1996.

At the federal level the legislation recognized marriage as being between a man and a woman

and declared that individual states can choose not to recognize samesex marriages performed in other

Barr apologized in 2008 for his role in creating the legislation and now supports the Respect for Marriage Act, which would repeal DOMA.



Rob Schlein, Bob Barr president of the

Dallas chapter of Log Cabin Republicans, said Barr is one of the speakers he is most looking forward to hearing, since the former congressman switched his position on DOMA. Schlein said it's important for members of the LGBT community to hear this information due to misconceptions about the GOP's opinion toward LGBT people.

"The Republican Party is one of liberty and freedom," Schlein said. "Gay people should feel at home in the party."

Cooper said having Barr available to speak at the convention was a wonderful advantage since he was the father of DOMA,



"We started at the top," Cooper said. "It's antigovernment for the federal government to have such power over the states like what is granted in the Defense of Marriage Act. It's going to die, but when that happens is just speculation right now."

Cooper said communication is an important factor in battling for LGBT rights within the GOP.

"We need to let people know in the gay community who are businessmen, or servicemembers that they have a home in the GOP," he said.

Cooper said the general consensus surrounding the idea of a gay Republican has become a matter of levity to him.

"I joke for gay Republicans there is coming out twice," he said. "You come out first when you're gay and then when you're a Republican."

Cooper said marriage equality at large is a growing issue on a broader scale. Although it is unlikely that debate over DOMA will be seen on the floor this year, Cooper said events like these give Log Cabin Republicans a chance to educate the entire party.

"We use traditional conservative values from the 19th century," he said. "We should not regulate or impede on our neighbors' rights and someone born differently should not be treated differently."

Cooper said it is important for the entire GOP to know that Log Cabin Republicans are also in-

terested in pushing the party's larger and broader agenda.

"We want to educate while working with our fellow Republicans," he said.

Republicans will be responsible for giving members of the LGBT community the liberties they want, according to Schlein, who said that Democrats are the ones perpetuating limited rights.

"Democrats need these issues to keep winning elections," he said.

Even Democratic politicians at the top of the federal hierarchy are responsible for limiting LGBT equality, according to Schlein. He said President Obama could have easily repealed DADT when he had the support of a Democratic Congress during his first two years in office.

"He chooses not to repeal it, because he wants to enslave gay people," Schlein said.

In addition to hearing some of the speakers at the convention, Schlein said he will also go to board meetings since he does sit on the national board of the Log Cabin Republicans.

Cooper said recently the number of supporters and members of Log Cabin Republicans have been increasing somewhat dramatically. The development of LCR candidates is an important issue the organization is tackling according to Cooper.

LCR members are developing relationships in the GOP, but also getting members to run, Cooper said.

"Our numbers are starting to grow as more people come out of the closet and more members start to become more supportive," he said. "We are at a point in the organization where we have to say, 'It's just not enough to be visible. We need gay Republicans to run for office.""

Ken Mehlman, former head of the Republican National Committee and campaign manager for President George W. Bush's successful second run for president, will also be speaking at the convention

And former Sen. Norm Coleman was a late addition to the event. Coleman, who served as a federal senator from Minnesota from 2003 to 2009, now works as an adviser to the Republican Jewish Coalition. He was one of three candidates in the highly publicized 2008 senate election in which the Minnesota Supreme Court handed down a ruling declaring comedian Al Franken the winner of the seat.

Coleman will not actually be at the convention, but has recorded a video message in which he welcomes all members of the GOP into the Republican tent.





The vote came five weeks after the court unanimously added sexual orientation but not gender identity/expression to the policy covering the county's 7,000 workers.

LGBT advocates who attended Tuesday's meeting erupted in applause after the dramatic vote, and they gathered on the steps of the county administration building for an impromptu celebration moments later.

LGBT advocates spoke at each of the court's regular meetings since the vote to add sexual orientation to the policy, calling on commissioners to go back and make it fully inclusive. But no turnout was as large as Tuesday's, when LGBT advocates exceeded the time limit for public comment on the issue, prompting the Commissioners Court to vote to wave the rules to allow more speakers.

Those who spoke at the meeting ranged from pioneering Dallas lesbian activist Louise Young, to 24-year-old trans man Jeffrey Barnett, to wellknown trans fitness trainer Chris Tina Foxx Bruce, a former Dallas resident who flew in from San Diego for the vote.

Even Dickey and Cantrell, who voted against

the proposal, said they appreciated the public

"In the seven years I've been here, I don't believe I've ever seen a more meaningful and sincere group of people," Dickey said, adding that she supported the addition of sexual orientation to the policy. "I'm going to vote against [this] for one reason, and that is that I'm reluctant to add special protected classes under the umbrella of Dallas County policy."

"I've heard the speakers and I appreciate all that they've brought to the table today," Cantrell said in explaining his vote. "I didn't hear anyone talk about any other county that's passed this, so anyway, but my 'no' vote today will be based on the liability that I believe that it will cost the county and ultimately the taxpayers."

Price, who previously said he was undecided on the issue, said he initially thought transgender employees were included under sexual orienta-

But Price said he asked that the item be placed on the agenda for Tuesday after, in addition to hearing compelling arguments during public comments, he consulted with medical experts.

"I think there is a lot of medical evidence," Price said before the vote. "At the end of the day, it's about doing the right thing, and this court will do that."

Giving up on Gay Men

Recent headlines applauded taking medication as 'pre-exposure prophylaxis' to prevent transmission of HIV among gay men. The news came in a study of nearly 2,500 men in six countries that found that an average man taking the medication

was 44% less likely to become infected than a control group taking a placebo.

How very sad that we have come to this point. The applause for this approach shows just how disposable we consider the lives of gay men.

If we were talking about protecting the general population with a treatment that was only 44% effective, would we be celebrating? The 44% who received a benefit from the medications were intensively counseled monthly, with frequent blood draws and tests for sexual infections. This is in no way representative of any real world situation.

In the real world, why would anyone subject himself to drug therapy—with the potential of very serious side effects—every day if they had any intention of using condoms? If someone tells almost any man that it is safe to have sex without a condom, they will likely do so.


Kevin Fenton, chief of HIV/AIDS for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said: "Some studies suggest that even a small increase in risk behavior due to a false sense of security about the pills effectiveness could actually increase HIV infections, an outcome we cannot afford."

A large percentage of patients already infected with HIV do not take their medications. How likely are uninfected men to take pills every day for the rest of their lives to prevent an HIV infection? If the pre-exposure HIV medication is not at therapeutic levels in their system before they have sex, they will not be protected.

The potential use of drugs to prevent HIV infection is based on the premise that we cannot succeed in getting gay men to use condoms. Has an effective effort really been made to market condoms in gay-friendly ways? Are condoms readily available in bars, bathhouses and other meeting spots? Advertised on TV? Do our political, religious and community leaders speak out forcefully for protecting gay men from HIV infection? No.


Another question: who will pay for this \$10,000 per person, per year pre-exposure treatment?

I commend research into HIV prevention. But, our communities must consider these points if we are going to offer up hundreds of thousands of gay men for an unproven experiment.

Femme X provides service to people learning to be women

Starr says her service benefits trans women who want to present a more feminine appearance

Way back in 1996, Nikki Starr started Miss Victoria's Feminine Illusions, a business dedicated to helping those — male or female — who wanted to be more feminine in appearance.

Starr suspended operations in 2001 because she traveled quite a bit with her job as an executive for a software company dealing with supply chain logistics.

But with the encouragement of a friend, Starr decided to try again, and Femme X Studios has been up and running since 2006.

Starr said she works with a variety of people: Some might have a fetish; others are transgender women who know they are women but never learned how women's sizes work or how to put on makeup.

"They don't know where to start," Starr said.

While her target audience is varied, Starr said she rarely works with drag queens. She said she is not in business to help someone present an illusion or exaggeration of femininity.

"I provide a service as an image and style consultant," she said.

Some of Starr's clients are just coming out as transgender and learning to be more feminine. One client is a married cross-dresser whose wife does not know.

"She's just trying to figure it out," Starr said of

Much of Starr's business comes from people who are in the closet. Some are high-powered business executives who need a private, discreet place to explore.

Starr said she schedules three or four appointments a week and while an appointment may last up to eight hours, the basic appointment is usually three hours.

"Everything's included," Starr said. "They don't have to bring anything — clothes, shoes, hair, lingerie. What do they want? Photography? Makeup?"

Starr has release forms for all pictures on her website. To assure discretion, she said she'll use the client's own camera and hand them the memory card. But, she noted, photography can be useful for the client to see and compare differences in makeup or hairstyles. And some do want a glamour shot session.

Starr said that some clients are very nervous on their first visit. They might spend the entire visit

just drinking a glass of wine and talking. And Starr said she is careful to take that client through each step and talk about the experience as they go.

She also offers a very basic one-hour make-up class in which she discusses products, skincare and basic makeup application techniques.

Starr also helps her clients prepare for their own forays into the world of retail. Her advice for people shopping for the first time who have not developed a relationship with any salespeople is to call ahead.

"If you call ahead, they can prepare for you," she said

Starr used that same principle in planning an outing with a transgender group.

She made reservations for a group at the Uptown restaurant Sambuca and explained who they were. They told her, "as long as you're dressed appropriately." Starr said that when her group arrived, they were assigned a waiter who went out of his way to make the evening a lot of fun.

And while Starr specializes in image consulting, she refers her clients to a number of other people — including counselors, cosmetic surgeons and doctors to prescribe hormone therapy, as well as friendly gyms, retailers and restaurants.

Starr said that each of her customers is looking for something a little different and she said the key to success is spending time making sure she understands that client's needs.

"We can customize an experience that's right for you," Starr said.

Need to know

Trans women talk about how to come out, when, and to whom

Perhaps one of the greatest fears that transgender people face is losing the love and support of family and friends when they "come out" about their gender identity. For transwoman Jamy Spradlin, honesty has definitely been the best policy.

icy.
"I don't usually lie to people," she said. "Covering lies is difficult."

That policy has paid off for her.

Jamy said her father, Gregg Spradlin, who lives in Illinois, came to recently Dallas to be with her through her gender reassignment surgery.

Gregg didn't think that was out of the ordinary. One of his children was having surgery. He's retired and free to travel, so of course he was there for her.

Gregg said he was glad to help Jamy through her recuperation, but the best part for him was that they got to spend two weeks together.

"My relationship with Dad is closer than it's ever been," Jamy said.

And Gregg agreed, saying that's because Jamy has been honest with him about who she is.

Although she has been honest with her father about her gender identity, Jamy is careful about telling others that she is transgender.

"I wait to tell people, let them get to know me," Jamy said. "If they have their own preconceived notion about what transgender is, they'll know me first."

But there are no set rules about who to tell or when. In fact, Spradlin broke her own rule about waiting when she went to buy her first bra.

Jamy said she went to Victoria's Secret where she found a saleswoman she was comfortable with and confided in. She said she had to be honest with the saleswoman and tell her that she had no idea how to measure herself for a bra or figure out what size she needed, because asking the saleswoman for that kind of help without any further explanation would be confusing: How could a woman Jamy's age not know anything about bra size?

But Jamy also knew that other transgender women have been thrown out of stores for no reason other than who they are. So she was relieved when her saleswoman smiled, told her to come to the back and promised to get her fixed up.

Of course, that saleswoman was smart. She gained a loyal customer.

In the workplace

Dee Boydston is facing a different type of coming out situation: She was married 20 years and has a 19-year-old son, and recently passed a mile-

stone in her life when she decided to live fulltime as a woman.

While her marriage is over, Boydston said, her son is completely accepting of her intent to transition.

Boydston works from home for a Fortune 500 company so transitioning on the job has not been a problem — until now.

"I'm at a point that I don't want to flip back and forth," she said.

Boydston communicates with other employees primarily by phone. She regularly talks to a company recruiter in Plano who recently suggested they get together for lunch.

And Boydston heads a team of employees who also work from their homes. The group will be getting together soon for a team meeting for the first time.

Both the recruiter and her team assume she's a man.

So Boydston took her first step at work. Before they met, she told the recruiter, "I have to tell you something"

She said the recruiter was totally accepting and their lunch meeting went fine. She's hoping for the same acceptance from her team.

Marla Compton, who heads the transgender group GEAR at Resource Center Dallas, works for one of the largest banks. She said that the major banks tend to be transgender-friendly.

"But just because the company is transgenderfriendly doesn't mean the HR person is," Compton said

After applying for one job, Compton said the HR person was showing her around the office and introducing her to people she would be working with.



"Then I told her I was transgender and I never heard from her again," Compton said.

But Compton thinks it's important to be honest with employers so that everything from insurance to social security is filed correctly.

Dating and relationships

Dating and relationships present even more coming out challenges.

Compton said that while coming out is a personal choice, "I always tell the other person right

She said she has heard stories of people going out. Then the relationship begins to get physical and the other person finds out in the bedroom.

"That can be very dangerous," Compton said. "I know of a person who kept it from a spouse for years — it was a very nasty situation."

Spradlin's advice is to be careful about where to come out. She said that many people meet in bars and come out where people are drinking. That might not be the best setting.

"Do it in a safe place," she said. "A public setting but not when you're in a position where you can be attacked."

Compton asks herself if she feels safe and comfortable with the other person.

"That's going to have a bearing on my choice,"

But if she's dating someone, she said she has to reveal her past. The other person will quickly realize something is missing when your past is left as a blank slate.

They'll ask, "Why don't you have graduation pictures? Childhood pictures?" Compton said. "If it's nothing to be ashamed of, we have nothing to hide."

Her best advice is to use common sense.

"There are men out there who are attracted to women who are pre-op," Compton said. "So it's case by case."

But she described situations when she was in a club and could have gone home with somebody

"I was glad I didn't," she said. "Trust your instincts. Sometimes we overlook the warning signs."

She said she doesn't date someone — or go home with anyone — she's not comfortable telling about her gender identity.

"If it's someone who cares about you, your gender identity won't matter," Compton said.

Her experience with coming out to others is that it doesn't faze some. She's found others attracted to her more.

"Some admire what we have to go through,"

The best therapy

Blair High, as CEO of a Plano-based corporation, was a bond trader responsible for billion dollar portfolios who had played football in school.

Today, High volunteers on the help line at Resource Center Dallas on Wednesday nights, giving information on transgender issues.

"The best therapy for anyone is to be yourself,"

High said that sometimes coming out can be as bad as suppressing. "Some people call [who are] thinking of killing themselves," she said. "They can't stand it anymore."

High recommends they come to a meeting and meet other trans people. She said sometimes they will come and just cry for the first 30 minutes they're there.

Often, the calls High takes are from men who are married with children. She tells them to come out to their wives. She said that they should tell the spouse that they're having these feelings and would like to go to some therapy.

High, who has been married for 18 years, said that's what she did with her wife.

"It was not an easy thing," she said. "It's still an

High said when she told her wife that she was having these feelings and wanted to go to therapy, her wife thought that was great.

"As time went by and things were the same, it wasn't so great," she said.

But they remain together.

"We love each other," she said. "We care about each other."

Trans woman Pam Curry said she "gave up trying to hide years ago."

She said she got advice from John Thomas, the first executive director of the Gay and Lesbian Community Center, who told her to "Be true to your cause."

Curry said she stopped worrying about it and stopped trying to be perfect.

Because she's so open about her gender identity, Compton said she gets lots of questions. She said she'll answer most but is surprised when she's asked graphic sexual questions, especially by someone she's just met.

Those are people she puts at arms length, she

"But I'm proud to be a transsexual," Compton said. "I'll never hide from it."

Allies on Council deserve our support

Openly LGBT candidates are great, but the community shouldn't turn its back on the allies who have been there for us all along

was surprised to learn this year that an openly gay candidate had decided to challenge Angela Hunt for the District 14 City Council seat in the Dallas municipal election on May 14.

The benefits of openly gay people serving in elected office are enormous to the LGBT community, but that goal should never cause us to abandon straight political allies who have served us

well. And for her three terms on the City Council, Hunt has been a strong advocate for the LGBT community.

Like her predecessor, former Councilwoman Veletta Forsythe Lil, Hunt has been as much of a part of our community and its events as the rest of us. With no openly gay people having served on the City Council since Ed Oakley left office to make his unsuccessful run for the mayor's job, we would have been lost without strong advocates such

as Hunt and District 2 incumbent Pauline Medrano.

I'm sure Hunt's openly gay challenger, James Nowlin, is an admirable candidate. Otherwise, he would not have received the endorsement of Stonewall Democrats, an action that Hunt admitted "disappointed" her. An "intense" debate reportedly preceded the decision to endorse Nowlin over Hunt.

Later, the Dallas Gay and Lesbian Alliance

threw its support behind Hunt and mayoral candidate Ron Natinsky, another strong LGBT advocate on the City Council, marking a striking split in the LGBT voting community. Stonewall Democrats endorsed former Dallas Chief of Police David Kunkle, who has also been a major LGBT advocate.

The DGLA's decision to back Hunt makes more sense to me because of the importance of remaining loyal to good political friends and also for its practicality. Hunt probably can't be beat in District 14 by any challenger.

If an openly gay challenger could have beat Hunt it would have happened when she ran for the seat the first time six years ago, when lesbian powerhouse Candy Marcum, through her reputation as a prominent psychologist and social stalwart, sought the office.

Marcum had enormous support in the community, but it could not propel her to victory.

It's more of a toss-up when it comes to whether the community should vote for Kunkle or Natinsky. They both have been good friends to the LGBT community.

In the District 7 council seat race, lesbian Casie Pierce is challenging incumbent Carolyn Davis, who to the best of my knowledge has not been

an LGBT advocate.

It's true that Davis has a larger black constituency in her district to occupy her time, but that never stopped her predecessor, Leo Chaney, from giving us much of his time and consideration.

proposed. Just as bad, some have even tried to dissect us and include gays and lesbians while leaving transgender folks out.

To add LGBT people to the list of victims of hate crimes apparently denies the far right their freedom to hate whoever they want.

• Ex-Gay Therapy: This discredited practice still gets funding and support from fundamentalist churches and right-wing organizations that are actively working to "cure" gays and lesbians. Our lives have been compared to the problem with "second-hand smoke" and devalued by rhetoric from the right.

They spread the lie that our sexual orientation is a choice, and therefore something we can change at will.

This list could go on and on, but the point is that for some reason the conservatives are spending huge piles of cash to actively deny us the rights and privileges they enjoy. Why do they spend so much of their time and energy working to take away rights from us?

Politically, it is an easy talking point. The right has found that anti-LGBT rhetoric can whip a

crowd into a frenzy faster than talking about real issues. In the world of media image, nothing is as valued by the right as a cheering crowd and a sound bite on TV or radio.

Economically, LGBT issues can make a quick buck for the right wing. Whether it is raising funds to "defeat the gay agenda" or funds to "rescue the poor sinners from the gay lifestyle," donations flow when the anti-LGBT rhetoric rings out.

And psychologically, it's an easy hot button. The whole existence of LGBT people makes many heterosexuals nervous. I am not a psychologist, but I would lay odds that for many there are insecurities around their own sexual orientation that drives this.

The mere fact that the "gay panic" defense works in the judicial system as an excuse for assault and murder points to this as an underlying

But I suspect the real reason the right has seized on LGBT rights as their favorite topic is more troubling: It's what I call the "bogie man" factor.

Fear is a very good motivator. Just look at how we Americans cheerfully gave up our privacy rights after 9/11. We were afraid and we were told giving up our privacy would get us security.

The results are still very much open for debate.

Meanwhile politicians, pundits and clergy have found their available list of "bogie men" dwindling. Back in the 1950s, communists were the enemy and the cause of every ill under the sun. In the '60s "hippies" were looked on as the root cause of problems.

In the last decade, "terrorists" became the main thing to fear, though it was a thinly disguised version of xenophobia and racism.

Now, one of the only things to fear is us, the LGBTS. We have become the bogie man for the current crop of fear mongers. We are being pointed to as the root of many of societies illsand that is scapegoating, plain and simple.

Scapegoats are an easy way to explain complex problems, and in a world of 20-second sound bites, they are all too tempting for politicians, pundits and clergy to ignore.

Well, it's time we goats stopped behaving like sheep and started butting our heads up against the people who would deny us our rights. If we do not continue to push back, we will continue to have our rights sacrificed on the alter of politics. And this goat is not ready for that.

etting cast in *Cabaret* was a plum gig for Walter Lee Cunningham Jr. Since moving to Dallas from his native Abilene in 2007, Cunningham has been performing around town in shows like *The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee* and *Caroline, or Change*. But he had taken off nearly a year before he auditioned for the Dallas Theater Center's spring musical.

So when he got that call that he'd been cast as Frenchie, "one of the dancers in the Kit Kat Klub," he was thrilled to be making his DTC debut.

Then he showed up for the first costume fitting, "That's when I found out I would be playing a girl," he says.

Yes, he *would* be in the ensemble — only not as a Kit Kat *boy* as he had assumed, but playing one of the female chorines.

That was a surprise for sure, but wasn't *such* a big deal for Cunningham: Since 2004, he's performed drag under the name Jada Fox at clubs around North Texas, including Station 4, the Drama Room and the Rainbow Lounge. No, it was really when he saw his costume that he had his first big *gulp!* moment — there simply wasn't that much of it.

"It kind of freaked me out a bit," he says. "When I do drag, I wear pads to give myself the physique of a girl. Without them, I have the body of a boy."

Being clad only in a bra, lace panties and sheer stockings didn't

give him much to play with — or hide behind.

As with drag, maintaining the illusion of femininity requires a man to, ummm, "tuck." That's not so hard when donning an evening gown for a 20-minute drag show; it's quite another for a two-hour musical that requires high kicks.

Let's just say Cunningham has to work harder than anyone else onstage not to let his Pride flag wave too proudly.

"I have to worry about my junk," he says frankly. "Something could very well pop out. You just have to make it work." (So far during previews, that hasn't happened, though it has occurred backstage at unexpected moments.) He also has to sing an octave above his normal range. All in all, it gives new

meaning to Faith Whittlesey's dictum, "Ginger Rogers did everything Fred Astaire did — only backwards and in heels."

Performing as a female impersonator certainly prepared Cunningham for this role. As with acting, drag requires the creation of a character, and Jada Fox has been described as "a black Barbie doll — I'm not the bitchy queen, it's just not me." (When pressed, he compares his persona to Sahara Davenport, the Season 2 contestant on *RuPaul's Drag Race*.)

It's all part-and-parcel with the concept of the show, a sexed-up, wildly racy updating of "the divinely decadent Sally Bowles," a British showgirl living in Weimar Germany when everyone was sleeping around with everyone else — male, female ... even Nazi.

Joel Ferrell directs and choreographs, turning the floor of the Wyly Theatre into a real cabaret with some café-table seating. That gives Cunningham the opportunity to interact with the audience in ways neither he nor most of the attendees are quite used to.

"There's definitely a game of 'spot-the-boy," he says. "I can see the audience, especially the women, trying to figure me out, It's kind of funny. It gives me a bit to play with. I'm not trying to freak anyone out, but there was this number [at a preview] where I was looking at these guys and they refused to look at me." He took it as a challenge.

It becomes easier to spot-the-boy during Act 2, where *Cabaret* ventures toward *Zumanity* territory with explicit nudity — none of which bothers Cunningham.

"I personally don't care — I'm very comfortable with my body," he says. (At 25, he says he eats all he wants to and only occasionally works out and yet still maintains his lean physique.)

So, is Frenchie a real girl, or just a cross-dressing guy living the gay life in decadent interregnum Berlin? Even Cunningham's not sure.

"They never told me exactly what they wanted," he says. "It's a choice I get to make. I kind of play with it — sometimes I'm really a girl and sometimes not."

Unless, of course, he pops out of his costume during a performance. At that point, the audience pretty much gets to make the decision for him.

I wouldn't call Red Light Winter the most enjoyable 2-1/2 hours I've spent at the theater recently, but it certainly ranks among the most memorable. I mean both in the best sense: This is serious theater full of ideas and deep emotion and handled with a power and sensitivity that can be arresting. It's also a brutal mindfuck that feels borne of genuine ache.

Matt (Drew Wall) is a tortured playwright vacationing with his best friend Davis (Alex Organ) in Amsterdam. During the wordless opening sequence, we see Matt seized with such pain he makes a lame, failed attempt at suicide. Then Davis arrives with Christina (Natalie Young), a prostitute from the city's famed red light district, who agrees to sleep with Matt to get him out of

What is intended by all parties as a meaningless shag, though, escalates into a complex love triangle, as Matt becomes smitten with Christina (by Act 2, it has reached the point of obsession) and Christina finds she holds undeniable feelings for Davis, who is himself married to Matt's ex-fiancee. All that's missing is

Jerry Springer. On paper, Red Light Winter might sound like a Hollywood romantic comedy, but despite a

strong thread of humor, it's a dark, fatalistic view of love.

The greatest weakness of the play is one of its essential conceits: The relationship between Matt and Davis. Davis is such a amazing prick, so effortlessly evil and self-involved, you cannot imagine the circumstances that would have led him to befriend Matt in the first place. We all have youthful friends we have outgrown, and have seen those types who bully their ways into the lives of weaker men, but those relationships, however dysfunctional, need to feel rooted in a shared past, a symbiosis where each feeds an emptiness in the other. It's basically the only relationship Neil LaBute can write.

But there's no hint of that here; when Matt describes Davis as "like a brother to me," it rings hollow — family you're born with, but why hang out with abusive assholes? Why does he keep Davis close him? And if they truly are so close, why is Davis surprised by Matt's fixation

The play's own self-referentiality doesn't help. This is a play about a guy writing a play about the events of the play. It's difficult not to read a degree of autobiography into Adam Rapp's script, which basically presents us as an audience with the dilemma of the unreliable narrator: Could the real Davis be this bad? Or the real Christina this self-destructive? Or the real Matt this fragile and victimized?

As fundamental as these shortcomings are, ultimately they do not detract significantly from the skillful handling of the rest of the material. Organ is infuriatingly effective, using his insincere, Palin-esque demagoguery to emotionally rape those around him. He uses coarseness and promiscuity as badges of honor, degrading people with his insulting, reductionist language. It's a testament to Organ's performance that more than once, you wanna step out of your seat, walk

on stage and kick him in the nuts.

But the heavy lifting of the play is borne on the backs of Wall and Young. Wall's always felt like a tightly-wound spring on stage, his nervous energy burning off all fat until he's left with a lean,

translucent frame from which his id is ready to burst. This is his most sophisticated role, and he's excellent. Young, who resembles Maggie Gyllenhaal, has an amazing stage presence, her sadness drawing you in. Together they share a stark, naked (literally) intimacy that includes the most frank, explicit onstage sex since Avenue O.

Regan Adair's direction is unrushed and visceral, letting the action build and play out silently but with a stinging sense of desperation. Red Light Winter isn't easy to watch, but you can't look away.

ince she was last in Dallas almost two years ago, shock comic Lisa Lampanelli has become a changed person. She's slimmer and no longer wears frilly petticoats. She settled down and married her boyfriend, and he's — get this — not black. She's adopted a Yorkshire terrier mix puppy. She appears on the way to blissful domesticity. In fact the last time we talked, she called me a "big dirty homo." This time, she was *nice*.

All of which led us to wonder: Has Lisa Lampanelli gone

No fuckin' way.

In her latest comedy special,

Tough Love, Lampanelli rails on the gays in her audience, calling them bun splitters, tush ticklers, fudge nudgers, semen demons and "David Archuletta."

But the truth is, she is a softie — in her own

"I love the cornholers," she says. "If you hate gays, get out — you're not allowed to be my friend anymore. Without the gays, who would watch Bravo TV? Without the gays, who would run Bravo TV? Without the gays, who would say

But married life — and quasi-parenthood (she adopted a puppy) — have brought out a different side to her.

"It's hard to justify being 'I was edgy and suddenly I'm transformed.' But there's enough crap that pisses me off every single day. What has softened me a little is we adopted this 7-lb. Yorkie. Jimmy brings him on stage and I turn into the biggest fag in the world. We named him Parker, after Sarah Jessica Parker because they're both ugly-cute."

One other thing: She's beginning to develop a (gulp!) conscience.

"I don't know what it is about aging, but I've begun to think, 'Maybe I hurt her feelings —I

hope not.' I feel terrible if I make a joke about someone, like Sarah Jessica Parker, whose not an asshole but a really nice person." She even met the Kardashians after mocking them for years, only to be charmed by them in person.

"They were so goddamn nice to me, it took me four years to work up the nerve to do jokes about them again," she says.

Some celebs, though, she doesn't worry about pissing off, as the closing "roast" LISA LAMPANELLI on her comedy special will attest.

"I loved doing that," Lampanelli says. "I had all these great jokes about all these idiots in the entertainment field — and I use

that term loosely — that I would never get to do, so I just let loose."

She had one of her most surreal experiences when she recently did The Comedy Central Roast of Donald Trump with Jersey Shore's Mike "The Situation" Sorentino, whose routine was such a bomb, you could hear crickets chirping.

"Did you see that train wreck?" she squeals. "You thought it was painful for you guys to watch? Imagine being there. It wasn't fun to watch. It's weird to watch somebody bomb, even if you don't like that person. But what is stupid about him is, he's so delusional he comes up to me after and says, 'That went pretty well,

Lampanelli has been on the receiving end of barbs for herself, and she admits the jokes can get brutal.

"It's always a struggle. You get made fun of for certain categories — they never say unfunny or dumb because I'm clearly funny and really smart. For me, it's fat and ugly. They will be like 'that fat cunt' unless I am a size 6. My favorite one ever was when Artie Lange was at his obese, ugliest worst and he said, 'Someone came up to me and said, 'Aren't you Lisa Lampanelli?"

It's one reason she has no sympathy for Sarah Palin when Bill Maher called her a cunt.

"People are so fucking stupid," she says with the decorum that has made

her a hit at christenings and golden wedding anniversaries. "Choice of words is the most ridiculous thing to attack when we have freedom of speech. I hate the Westboro Baptist Church, but letting them have GodHates Fags.com allows me to do what I do. And Sarah Palin is a cunt, by the way. I'm just sad I didn't get in more trouble

when I called her a 'retard producer.'"

The reason Lampanelli's acts works is *because* she's an equal opportunity offender. And *that* only works when people laugh at themselves.

"Hispanics in general are very much more open with a sense of humor about themselves than other groups. Gays are great, of course. A few Asians will laugh it up at gay and black jokes and then I say 'chink' and they say, 'No, that's going too far.' The jokes I get in trouble for are autism and retarded kid jokes. But people have come to me to say, 'My kid is autistic; thanks for including us.' It's the least form of prejudice. If you're gonna make fun of blacks, Asians and gays, you gotta laugh at everybody."



the final product.

The video hasn't been seen too much in local gay bars, but she had a tearful moment when it played in, of all places, Pontiac, Mich. After a gig in the drabby city, Wasser and her band went to eat at a bistro called Liberty Bar.

"We very quickly realized we were in a gay bar," she recalls. "They were playing Gaga and Pink videos, so we explained that we just played

a show and I have this video. I got to watch these guys appreciating the video and clapping. It was the most beautiful moment! I almost started crying."

Joan as Police Woman plays Friday at club Dada, bringing

her indie sensibilities to town, but not without some major queer cred behind her. Having worked with Antony Hegarty in 1999 and then with Rufus Wainwright on his 2003 tour, she came out of her shell as a solo artist. Shattered by her boyfriend Jeff Buckley's death in 1997, she and a new band tried to release an album, but it was a scary time for her and the songs were kept to themselves.

Then she joined Antony and the Johnsons. With some budding confidence, she eventually dipped her foot in the waters of going solo. Then Rufus happened.

"He had asked me to join his band to tour

with and also open as a solo artist," she says. "I had to take the chance at some point and opening in front of his crowd — a crowd of music lovers would be amazing."

Four albums later, her latest release *The Deep Field* finds Wasser at her most confident. The package of experimental indie pop is challenging yet accessible. She's mellow without being boring and she can rock without trying to prove

something. But mostly *Field* reflects a newfound fortitude and poise.

"This record was like a declaration of freedom for myself," she explains. "I spent a lot of my life up confused, fearful. Once I made the choice to be happy, things fell into place. I hate to make it sound

oversimplified, but if you wish to feel good, happy, and free from worry, you can if you just decide."

But for the record — and despite her hanging around muscled men and queer artists like Hegarty and Wainwright (oh and living with Scissor Sisters' Del Marquis) — the one thing Wasser is *not* is a fag hag.



Out DJ Alyson Calagna travels the world, but spinning at Dallas' Purple Party which starts Friday — is still one of her favorite gigs

lyson Calagna has truly earned her spot as one of the most prominent DJs in today's dance music scene, whether she's spinning at her homebase of Miami or touring in Asia. What makes Calagna distinctive from other DJs isn't that she's a woman in a male-dominated field, or that she's an out lesbian. It's that she's developed a specific style and grown that into marquee status. She doesn't want to be one of the boys, but she does have them opening for her.

Before her headlining set at the Purple Party Weekend Tea Dance at Plush this weekend, Calagna took a break from her duties in China to offer some insight to today's DJ scene. She approaches both her music and the industry with a certain amount of spirituality — and balls.

Dallas Voice: You said recently it's a lot easier to be a girl DJ. Has that worked to your advantage in your career? Calagna: I'm sure I said it's easier nowadays compared to what it was like coming up. It used to be very tough to try and break into a male dominated scene, but now it's not unusual to see a girl in the

Where do you see DJ culture is now, at the level you're in? I think it has become a bit pop-driven, meaning it's the "cool" thing to do and be now. I was looking at a SkyMall in-flight magazine and there was an ad for a tiny mixer attached to a laptop with a header that says "Be A DJ!" It's pretty funny when you

Does that bug you, minimizing the talent it takes to do your job? I still believe that it takes a certain type of DJ to really break through and stay through. A true DJ can stand the test of time, play for different audiences and adapt and evolve in the moment.

How do you tweak your style for Dallas audiences?

The great thing about Dallas is there is no tweaking. I have been very fortunate in Texas and I absolutely adore my Texas tribe. They have heard me for years and they know and trust me. It's truly one of my favorite cities to play in.

So it's fair to you say you like playing the Purple Party? I feel that Purple is part of my family, they are really good to me and in return I'm good to them. It's a give-and-take relationship between the board, the boys and the music. I am always so excited to play for them!

You always seem to be playing "for the boys." Being a lesbian, do the ladies ever try to pull you back in? I have played for girl events before! But I prefer to be with crowds that are more dance-driven. I find the lesbian audiences are more into hip-hop and pop and that really isn't my thing.

Yeah, the ladies at Sue Ellen's love them some Jay-Z. So, not to bum you out, but do you ever think about what you'll be doing when perhaps you're not DJing anymore? Sure, all the time. I know music and sound will be in my life forever. Music truly is my dharma and I know it will evolve as it should. I do a lot of studio work that is non-dance related. I create music for TV and I would love to do some film.

Any type of film in particular? I like creating really epic, cinematic and dramatic music. I imagine I will eventually head down that road when the club thing doesn't fulfill me anymore.

Please tell me you don't listen to dance music when not DJing? I usually don't listen to dance music unless I'm in work mode or the gym. I tend to listen to everything from indie pop, jazz, chillout, downtempo, mantras - and of course, country. A Southern girl is always a Southern girl.


Oooh girl, dish. [Silence.]







Although Steve Williford never felt any homophobia directed at him when he lived in southwestern Indiana, his perception of what others thought of him as a gay man was something that

stuck with him for many years. At dinner parties and social events, his sexuality was a subject that came up often, usually as a result of others' curiosity.

"Months went by and I cast members in attendance. started to wonder if I was the poster boy for gay," he says. "I always wondered what would happen if something in my life happened that brought my sexuality to the forefront,

like if I was at a party and kissed my partner." That question would eventually lead him to his first feature film as a director, The Green, currently on the festival circuit and screening at USA Film Festival Saturday. The screenplay is written by Paul Marcarelli, best known as Verizon's "can you hear me now?" guy, who recently came out publicly.

The story they ended up with concerns a high school teacher, played by Jason Butler Harner, who is accused of an inappropriate relationship with a male student. It causes tension with the teacher's partner, played by out Broadway hunk Cheyenne Jackson (also known for his recurring roles on 30 Rock and Glee), and in the community.

Williford directed nearly 150 episodes of the recently axed soap opera All My Children from 2004 to 2011, but his background is in theater (he directed a production of Driving Miss Daisy in the early 1990s at Dallas' Park Cities Playhouse, back when it was called the Plaza Theatre). So

it's not surprising that his cast is filled with actors who come from the theater world, too — not just Jackson, but Harner, who played Hamlet at the Dallas Theater Center in 2003. That may ex-

plain why Williford's film has something in common with several plays, notably Lillian Hellman's The Children's Hour. Arthur Miller's The Crucible and John Patrick Shanley's Doubt. "We're a proud cousin of all of

those works," Williford says. "We are trying to examine a situation that can illustrate to us how slippery truth and clarity really is and how quickly it can slip away from us."

"Paul and I are both big lovers of ambiguity to a certain degree," he adds. "I had always modeled this story in my heart and mind on what I love about the Chekhov short stories: We leave certain things open and free to be interpreted. For the bulk of the story, you're really not sure if he has done what he's being accused of, but there are some significant issues that do get resolved, quite clearly I think."

And of course, he knows the audience won't trust if they don't believe in the relationship as portrayed by Harner and Jackson, and takes a dramatic turn from the comic roles he has done

"I completely believe in Jason and Chevenne as a couple. That's one of my complaints when I see LGBT couples represented in film: I feel like there's a link missing a little bit. I don't feel that way about them, in the work environment or what has come together for the film."






Screen legend Shirley MacLaine talks about everything under the sun and a few things beyond it

aybe Shirley MacLaine is onto something with all her talk of otherworldly topics. When I asked the screen legend about her iconic status in the gay community — due to appearances in such films as *Steel Magnolias*, *The Children's*

Hour and even *Postcards from the Edge* — her phone cuts out. She doesn't skip a beat on the return call.

"See how it went dead when you said the word 'iconic?' That's a sign!" she says with a true guffaw.

At 77, MacLaine is still a spitfire who can quickly turn a question back on the interviewer. She's a veteran at talking about her work and life, but admits that there are some things she doesn't know about herself.

"I don't know why the gays might think of me that way. What do you think?" she asks. The humor for one thing, I say — and

how gays can't resist a good, strong-willed woman.

"I'm curious what strikes me and what doesn't," she says. "Oh, and I think *Madame Sousatzka* is also popular. It's the humor and that's what I loved about those parts. There's nothing more sophisticated than the gays' sense of humor."

this world, nothing more sophisticated than the gays' sense of humor."

So true — especially when it comes to Broadway. MacLaine raves enthusiastically over *The Book of Mormon* by *South Park* creators Matt Stone and Trey Parker and the musical version of *Priscilla, Queen of the Desert*. Both show an irreverence as well as artistic merit, which MacLaine thinks is just what art needs right now.

"I just got back from New York and the audiences were so receptive," she says. "Mormon is quite astonishing. You've just got to see it. You know, the world is in such bad trouble that [artists] don't give a shit anymore. The feeling is, 'We'll make humor out of it.' And Priscilla was moving and well done and over the top. It was such an exercise in imaginative clothing and shoes and humor. I had no idea."

She has less to say about *Promises*, *Promises*, the musical revival based on her famed film, *The Apartment*. "Everyone keeps asking me that, but I just haven't seen it," she says.

MacLaine is onstage in North Texas with her show *An Evening with Shirley MacLaine*, which stops at Bass Hall Saturday. Despite her musical theater cred (she *was* Sweet Charity, after all), don't expect singing and dancing — she's over

all that. Instead, the Oscar winner will talk about her movies, her life and her loves.

She's been doing that a lot lately. She's been making the media rounds lately for her 13th book, *I'm Over All That: And Other Confessions*, including a spot on *Oprah*. But the show isn't necessarily the live version of her latest autobio.

"The show is really fun and just a retrospective of my life — I tell stories about my films and Broadway, television, travels, love affairs," she says. "It's just me and a remote control up there."

Hopefully that will includes anecdotes about

another screen legend, her late friend Elizabeth Taylor. MacLaine was part of the Golden Age that introduced the world to the likes of Paul Newman, Jack Lemmon and Taylor. But Liz's passing (from

this world, at least) struck MacLaine the hardest.

"That affected me more than I thought it would, to tell you the truth," she says. "I met her when I was 20. I knew how she was feeling and I knew this would happen. I've been calling her and am talking to her still, but I don't like to think of a world without her in it."

Umm, still talking to Taylor? Well, MacLaine is almost as famous for her new age beliefs as for her acting prowess. She has written books that cover topics such as reincarnation, spiritual exploration and transcendentalism. So when she says she's talking with Elizabeth Taylor ... well, who can doubt her? A headline in a British tabloid recently labeled her "kooky," but that's nothing new to her. For years, she's been mocked about her beliefs, but she uses the same thick skin needed for her acting career and she never let the media get to her.

Even having reached living legend status, MacLaine says that there is one thing she still hopes to accomplish in *this* lifetime.

"I'd like to go into space," she says. "But not with an astronaut — an extraterrestrial spacecraft. I know a lot of people who've been taken aboard one. I haven't done that yet in this lifetime."

Of course, there's always the next one.
