





Parkland adds DP benefits; Dallas County won't

Fitzsimmons slams commissioners for failing to study issue

The domestic partners of gay and lesbian employees at Parkland hospital will soon have access to health benefits, after the facility's Board of Managers voted this week to approve a proposal first put forward nearly four years ago.

The Board of Managers voted 6-0, with one member abstaining, to offer DP benefits to gays and lesbians who are among the Parkland Health & Hospital System's 9,400 employees.

The addition of DP benefits at Parkland, which takes effect Jan. 1, is expected to cost \$696,635 in fiscal year 2012. But Dr. Lauren McDonald, who chairs the Board of Managers, said offering the benefits will make the hospital more competitive for workers and

DISD adds trans protections

Board votes to include gender identity and expression in harassment, retaliation and discrimination policies

Dallas Independent School District added protections for students based on gender identity and expression during its regular board meeting on Thursday, Aug. 25.

The six items expanding protection were initially part of the consent agenda. The items were pulled from the consent before the meeting for a separate vote and then all but two later returned to the consent agenda and passed unanimously.

Only one speaker addressed the issue in the comment period before the vote.

After talking about having been bullied in school, Omar Jimenez told the board, "Treat everyone the way you want to be treated."

The vote was delayed several hours by a discussion on redistricting of board trustee districts.

Two items passed later, one by a 6-3 vote. The other passed 8-0 with one abstention. The contentious issues involved substitute teacher contracts, not the transgender protections.

The discussion and vote on those items came after press time and will be reported on line.

The new policies relate to discrimination, retaliation and harassment by faculty and staff against students and against other faculty and staff.

Two weeks ago, the board discussed the entries on this week's consent agenda. Rafael McDonnell, strategic communications and programs manager for Resource Center Dallas, attended the meeting and said they were reviewed with little discussion and no dissent.

If Vasquez were to prevail in both the primary and general elections, he would become only the second openly LGBT legislator in Texas' history.

City Councilwoman Angela Hunt, whose district includes the first station, said this week that according to the latest she's heard, the truck is expected to stay put.


City Manager Mary Suhm conducted the city's first survey of equipment distribution in 25 years. The report showed a need for more fire equipment in the southern half of the city. Initial plans were to move one truck from the Oak Lawn station to South Oak Cliff

"The last I heard, it was not going to be moved," Hunt told us.

She said moving the truck was part of the initial plan but no final decisions have been made. Hunt's office was flooded with calls about maintaining safety in Oak Lawn.

"Nothing final yet," Hunt said, "But the latest is to keep it at the 11th."



David Hodge, captain of the E-racing Stigma team for Lone Star Ride, says cycling for the cause is in his blood

Lone Star Ride Fighting AIDS cyclist David Hodge is what you could call doubly positive: Not only is he one of the most upbeat, life-loving people you could hope to meet, he also happens to live with the very disease that LSRFA exists to

When he turned 40 five years ago, Hodge decided to mark his definitive entry into middle age with a celebration of physical fitness.

"I wanted to do something big and fantastic," the Parkland imaging specialist recalls. "Some friends of mine and I were talking about bicycling, [something] I hadn't even thought about for a while. I hadn't been on a bicycle in 20 years."

So Hodge immediately began training — but not for the LSRFA.

"We have a similar ride in Atlanta," he says. "The name of the event is the AIDS Vaccine (AV) 200 and [it benefits] the Emory AIDS Vaccine Center. I [started participating in] 2006."

As the name suggests, the Atlanta ride covers 200 miles, about 20 more than LSRFA. It also takes place in late spring (May) rather than late summer (September).

Hodge's resume also includes two appearances in the seven-day AIDS LifeCyle Ride, which takes place every year in June. The route covers approximately 600 miles between San Francisco and Los

Hodge officially began riding with the LSRFA just last year, when he moved from Atlanta to Dallas. But already he's doing double duty as the captain of one of the oldest teams to be saddling up for the event: E-racing Stigma, the LSRFA Positive Peddlers team.

"The whole concept [for the team] came from [a desire] to get the word out," he says. "Just because you have an [HIV] diagnosis, that is not a death sentence anymore so long as you take care of yourself. You really can be an active member of society and help out anywhere you can."

As team captain, Hodge fulfills a number of im-

"[I'm] the person who gets all the information out, whether we're having social events or training rides," he explains. "[I also have to] keep people motivated to get their fundraising done. [Our] team is also very involved in the closing cere-

Participating on a team like E-racing Stigma is a lot like riding with family. Members bond through similarities — in this case, positive diagnoses. At the same time, they also take care of each other on the road.


Says Hodge, "In the bicycling community, when you go and out and deplete your body of every ounce of water and electrolytes and food, [you're in danger of] 'bonking.' Your fellow riders watch out for those kinds of [potential prob-


A potentially deadly disease may reside in

Hodge's body, but so does an equally passionate dedication to cycling for the community he loves. In May, the E-racing Stigma team captain returned to Atlanta to participate in the 2011 AV200; and recently, the odometer reading on Hodge's current bicycle slipped over the 4,000-mile mark.

"[The cause] is something that's very dear to my heart, so that's why I keep doing what I do and cycling as many miles as I can," he says. "It's in my blood now and I can't stop doing it."

Seven Points' gay mayor, partner indicted

Charges reportedly stem from altercation at City Hall between Dobbs, Tayem and an investigator for the DA

SEVEN POINTS, TX — Gay Mayor Joe Dobbs and his life partner, suspended police officer Michael Tayem, have been indicted by a Henderson County grand jury on criminal charges in connection with an alleged incident at the Seven Points City Hall on Aug. 16.

Charges of assault on a public official, official oppression and interference with public duties were filed against Dobbs, 36, on Aug. 19, and a charge of interference with public duties was filed against Tayem, 29, on the same day, according to Henderson County judicial records.

Assault on a public official is a third-degree felony; official oppression is a class A misdemeanor and interference with public duties is a class B misdemeanor.

Judicial records show warrants for the arrests for Dobbs and Tayem are now closed. District Judge Dan Moore of 173rd District Court set bond for Dobbs at a total of \$13,500 for his three charges and \$1,000 for Tayem's one charge, according to published reports.

The charges reportedly stemmed from an altercation Dobbs and Tayem had with an investigator for the Henderson County District Attorney, who was serving a grand jury subpoena in connection with an ongoing investigation of city business being conducted with another law enforcement agency.

Additional charges reportedly may be brought against the Seven Points officials at a later date. The ongoing investigation has focused on allegations that city contracts were negotiated improperly by Dobbs and Tayem, who was in a management position on the police force before his suspension.

The criminal charges follow more than a year of controversy since Dobbs was elected in a landslide. He promised in his campaign to return integrity to the city of Seven Points on Cedar Creek Lake after several high-ranking city officials were indicted and convicted on criminal charges. An FBI investigation led to the prosecution of the former city officials, which included the former mayor, a municipal judge and a city council mem-

After his election, Dobbs managed city business on his own for a year after several members of the City Council boycotted meetings, preventing a quorum. The dissenting council members had supported Dobbs' opponent in the election.

Since Dobbs was elected, the city has seen two police chiefs terminated. One was fired by Dobbs and the other reportedly was asked to resign. The current police chief reportedly was also asked to resign recently and refused.

Dobbs, who is also chief of the city's volunteer fire department, allegedly tried to pressure Police Chief Curt Koger into resigning because Dobbs was angry about a police report detailing a citizen's complaint that Tayem had ridden a motorcycle through a neighborhood at a high rate of speed with red lights and a siren sounding, according to the Cedar Creek Pilot.

Dobbs reportedly asked Tayem to join him and help put out a fire.

Tayem was suspended from the police force in May after a citizen filed a complaint claiming that he was abused by the police officer while being jailed. That complaint has also been under investigation by state and federal law enforcement agencies.

Tayem managed Dobbs' campaign for mayor, calling himself Dobbs' "bulldog.

Dobbs said in an interview after his election that although he won the office by a large margin, a small group had tried to use his sexual orientation against him during the campaign. He claimed a former city official called him a "queer bitch" in a public setting.









Making up a winning team

Pekers gay bar sponsoring team of Dallas Police officers in softball league

When most people in Dallas think of nightclubs sponsoring a softball team, they think of the Pegasus Slowpitch Softball Association. But the owner of the gay bar Pekers, located on Oak Lawn Avenue, this year broke that mold by sponsoring a team of Dallas police officers competing in softball league that plays in Garland.

Frank Holland, owner of Pekers, said the partnership started after some of the officers responded to a call in his bar's parking lot. The extreme heat of this year's North Texas summer was taking its toll on the officers, so Holland's bar offer them water and food.

Not long afterward, "They actually came in and asked us if we would sponsor them," Holland explained. "They remembered how nice [the people at] Pekers were, and they loved the logo."

Holland also said the bar has gotten very good response from its patrons, who think it's great that Pekers is sponsoring the officers' team.

"Most of the gay bars have a really good rapport [with the Dallas Police]," Holland said. "We think it's a good thing for the community because it shows the police are not as homophobic as people think they are."

And the officers are happy with the arrangement, too.

Officer Brian Nolff, one of the softball team members, said that he and his fellow officers worked in the Oak Lawn area and had been look-

ing around at different sponsorship opportunities. The gayborhood had been kind to them in the past, Nolff said, so they figured Pekers' sponsorship of the team would be a good connection for them.

"It's been real positive as far as the officers [and the community] are concerned," Nolff said.

Nolff said it doesn't matter where the sponsorship comes from, as long as the team supported. The prospect of having a gay bar as a sponsor didn't deter any of the team members, he said, adding that they "haven't had an issue with it yet."

Pekers will be paying for the team's uniforms and other equipment, and club staff and patrons plan to caravan out to Garland to watch the games. The games will be held on Monday nights at Audubon Park at 7 p.m.

Last fall, board members discussed gender identity and expression during the debate on the comprehensive new anti-bullying policy.

"We did a good job of educating them on the topic then," McDonnell said.

He said these changes brought the harassment, retaliation and discrimination policies in line with the policies passed to combat bullying.

"They wanted to make the language match the anti-bullying policy," McDonnell said.

The only questions asked were about a provision on genetic information required by the federal government.

Federal law requires genetic privacy. The law was passed to protect people from insurance companies requiring disclosure of genetic testing to find predisposition to certain diseases.

But it also protects a transgender person from having an employer release genetic information about his or her birth gender that might differ from presentation.

DISD became the third school district in Texas

to include gender identity and expression in its harassment policies after Houston and Fort Worth ISDs. McDonnell said other districts were waiting to hear what changes in policy the legislature would require in the session that ended in May.

He suggested those districts look at the DISD policy, which he called the most comprehensive in protecting students, faculty and staff.

"Now the focus is how the policy is being used," McDonnell said. "Are the students protected?"

McDonnell also said that he participated in a training session with DISD security officers. The session was lively with a lot of questions, he said, which he believes means they are serious about stopping bullying and harassment in Dallas schools.

When Dallas schools opened this week, all students were given a code of conduct that contains the new anti-bullying policy. Each student had to return a signed form that they read and understood the policy.

The anti-bullying bill that was passed by the legislature in the spring goes into effect on Sept. 1. In Dallas, the policies are already in place.

Matlin has also been active in a number of charitable organizations, including Easter Seals, where she was named an honorary board member; the Children Affected by AIDS Foundation, Elizabeth Glaser Pediatric AIDS Foundation, VSA arts and the Red Cross Celebrity Cabinet.

She was appointed by President Clinton in 1994 to the Corporation for National Service and served as chair of National Volunteer Week.

Arnold described Matlin as a vocal supporter of LGBT rights.

Retired Marine Staff Sgt. Alva, a San Antonio native, was the first American serviceman injured in the Iraq War, losing his right leg when he stepped on a land mine while leading a supply unit in March 2003.

In 2007, Alva came out publicly as a gay man and has been working with the Human Rights Campaign since then to end the military's "don't ask, don't tell" policy which has kept lesbians and gay men from serving openly.

Although Congress voted last December to repeal DADT, the policy has remained in effect while military leaders conducted training to prepare the military for open service by lesbians and gays. The president and the chairman of the joint chiefs of staff certified repeal last month, and repeal takes effect, finally, on Sept. 20 — less than a month before Alva will accept the Elizabeth Birch Equality Award in Dallas.

"This is such an exciting time for him," Kouvelis said of Alva. "He has been working tirelessly since he left the service and came out to get DADT repealed. Now it's finally happening.

"We are just so thrilled with what he has done for our community, and so thrilled that he will be accepting this award. He is a real hero," Kouvelis added.

Arnold added that when DADT repeal legislation last December, Alva was "standing there, right behind him, looking over the president's shoulder as he signed it." She also said that Alva, who is featured in the current issue of GQ Magazine, was a special guest a previous Black Tie Dinner.

"It is so wonderful to have him back with us, especially at such an exciting time," Arnold said.







Oak Lawn retailer wholesales his own brand

David Richardson of Skivvies has designed a line of men's underwear that is now selling around the country

Dave Richardson not only sells underwear at his store Skivvies on Cedar Springs Road but now wholesales a line under the store's name.

"I've always wanted to create some underwear styles of my own," said Richardson.

This week he and his partner Todd Seaton are in Las Vegas at MAGIC, the largest men's apparel wholesale market, looking for new lines for their store and selling the new Skivvies line to other stores.

When it opened, Skivvies was the first men's fashion underwear store in the country, Richardson said. With its 5,000-square-foot space, it has remained the largest.

Richardson said that others have copied his idea and some individual brands have opened retail outlets. But his concept of selling underwear as fashion was new when he created the

About 30 years ago, Richardson began his retail career at TapeLenders with his partner, Steve Freeman. After Freeman's death, Richardson took over the rental outlet and expanded with a

New app offers safety in numbers

SafeTREC service now partnering with Lone Star Ride; adds a layer of security to life, company officials say

We all know what happens when you find yourself in an emergency situation at your home, and you pick up your landline to call 9-11 for help: The 9-11 operators can use their system to determine your exact location and send help, even if you aren't able to tell them where you are.

But what happens if you, like many people these days, use your cell phone as your home phone instead of having a landline? What happens if you are in your car, or perhaps walking or cycline?

Those locations can't be wired into the 9-11 system, and the best emergency operators can do is triangulate your location to within a three-, six- or nine-mile radius, depending on the circumstances. And when minutes count, that might not be good enough.

That's the problem that the people at Mobile-TREC were trying to solve when they came up with their SafeTREC and SafeKidZone applications for smart phones, according to Martin Lobe, MobileTREC's vice president of sales and mar-

while expanding Skivvies.

"I've learned what design aspects sell the best," Richardson said. "So in my new line I've combined the colors, fabrications, fit, pouch design and waistband materials that our customers like best."

Through a contact in the garment industry, he found a factory in Medellin, Columbia that is manufacturing the product in relatively small runs of 10,000 pieces at prices he can wholesale competitively.

After the first manufacturing run, Richardson and Seaton tested the brand in their own store.

"To my great surprise and pleasure, it's been selling very well," Richardson said.

Then they held their product launch party on the last Atlantis cruise and picked up a few retail accounts. Skivvies is now selling in stores such as LA Sporting Club in Los Angeles and Underwear Station in Miami.

For the Las Vegas market, they chose the top five models, counting on those models to catch on across the country.

Since "skivvies" is a military term, Richardson decided to use military terms for each of the designs in the line. "Rear admiral," he said, has the butt cut out.

Richardson said that when he got into the business, most underwear lines had two or three styles and colors.

"Now we get new styles in constantly," Todd said.

As for the wholesale line, Richardson said he's hoping to grow slowly and steadily.

"We don't want to be a flash in the pan," he

He said he doesn't want to overextend his company and would be delighted with about. ■

keting.

Users download the MobileTREC app they want to their smart phone and then pay a \$9.95 per month subscription fee to use the service. Lobe said the company is also working to finalize a family plan for \$19.95 a month that he hopes will be available within the next month.

To use the service, he explained, users designate a specific button on their phone as the "panic button," and in case of emergency, they push that button and the MobileTREC operators contact the appropriate responders. And the MobileTREC apps marry with the phone's GPS signal to send responders to the user's exact location, Lobe said.

Lobe said the applications and MobileTREC's subscription services can give users an added layer of security and some options that you don't get with 9-11.

With the SafeKidZone app, children can punch the panic button and that activates a whole community of responders — friends and family as well as police and fire — to come to their aid.

Lobe explained that users establish a network of contacts among family and friends, and if a child needs help, the SafeKidZone program sends an immediate text and email to the established "safety network" as well as to the company's 24-hour Response Call Center. Then the child, the "safety network" members and the Call Center are linked through a live conference call.

That lets everyone know what the child's situation is, allowing the closest family member or friend to respond immediately or if necessary, the Call Center personnel will notify 9-11 to send police or fire, giving them the child's exact location.

SafeTREC is the same sort of application and service, only geared for adults, such as college students, senior citizens, business travelers or those on vacation.

"Think about someone, an adult, who may have some sort of disability or illness, and they fall in their home and can't get up. They don't need medical attention, but if 9-11 sends an ambulance, they have to pay for that. With Safe-TREC, they push the panic button and the system sends someone in their safety network over to help them up," Lobe said.

"I have gay friends, and when I started looking into it, doing some research, I realized just how often gay bashings are happening, and how sometimes gay people are not getting the proper protection from police in some instances. And I knew that our service is something that could be very, very helpful to gay people," Lobe said. "We want to let the LGBT community know that this is available, that they are not alone."

The service is also perfect, Lobe said, for sports enthusiasts — like cyclists or runners — who might find themselves out on the road and suddenly in need of help. And that, he added, makes a partnership between MobileTREC and Lone Star Ride Fightings AIDS a perfect match.

MobileTREC CEO Don Ferguson explained that his company will be equipping every Lone Star Ride Fighting AIDS rider with the SafeTREC service, and will also donate \$1 from every subscription to LSRFA.

The two-day Lone Star Ride, scheduled this year for Sept. 24-25, raises money for three AIDS service organizations — AIDS Services of Dallas, AIDS Outreach Center of Tarrant County and Resource Center Dallas.

"I can see the Lone Star Ride is a worthwhile event where people are getting together to help others, and I am excited for SafeTREC to become a part of it," Ferguson said.

And helping people help each other, he added, is one of the goals of the company.

"Our system is designed not only to protect people when they are in danger but also to build a safety network so people are automatically looking out for each other," Ferguson said. "Man is not an island. We survive better together, and that is what we are doing at SafeTREC. We are creating a community of people looking out for each other."

Online revenge can now mean a felony conviction

Local officials stepping up enforcement of new Internet harassment law targeting those who harass, impersonate others online

Dallas police and the Dallas County District Attorney's office have begin stepping up enforcement of a 2009 Internet harassment law that makes it a felony to impersonate, imitate or otherwise harass others in e-mails, instant messaging programs and commercial social networking sites.

And some gay men who use online dating and social media sites are getting caught in the crosshairs.

"Word is getting out about the law," Dallas LGBT police liaison Laura Martin said, adding that she's spoken to a number of people who have been harassed with phone calls, Internet posts and fake Facebook pages.

"It usually happens when a relationship ends," Martin said, "[when] someone is seeking revenge."

She said that usually the person filing the complaint just wants the harassment to stop. And when she's made calls to the person, Martin said, it usually does stop.

But with the new Texas Penal Code 33.07, those using such sites to harass someone could be

charged with a felony.

Since the beginning of July, criminal defense attorney Chad West said he has signed four new clients charged under the law. Three of them are gay.

The cases are varied. One involves harassment through a Facebook page; another is a "text message situation," West said.

West said one of his clients had been dating a closeted man for years. When the closeted man broke off the relationship, the two remained in touch for awhile, but then the closeted man wanted to cut off all communication.

West said his client told him his feelings had been hurt by his ex's actions and then "one night he did something stupid."

On Craigslist, the client posted his ex's first name, last initial and cell phone number with a picture of someone else. Within minutes the ex began receiving calls.

After talking to one of the callers, the victim found the page on Craigslist, printed it off and filed a complaint with the police who tracked the IP address.

West's client, with nothing prior on his record other than speeding tickets, was arrested and charged with a third degree felony. If convicted, he faces two to 10 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

In another case, one man was impersonating his boyfriend online. Using the victim's passwords, he signed onto dating sites such as Manhunt to find out if the victim was cheating on him.



Cheating is not a crime. Impersonating someone else online in Texas is. And that man has now been charged with a felony.

Manhunt does what it can to prevent that sort of situation, Manhunt CEO Adam Segel said. A button on profiles allows a member to report fake or malicious profiles.

"Whenever Manhunt receives reports of harassment between users, we investigate to the best of our ability and take whatever steps are necessary to rectify the situation," Segel said.

"This may include suspension or deletion of the offending user's account," he explained.

Segel said that Manhunt always cooperates with the police once officers have obtained a subpoena, but those instances are rare. "Fortunately this isn't something we hear about very often," he said.

West has spoken to the victims in all of the cases he represents. He said that all of them just want this to go away and that none seem interested in appearing in court to testify about intimate details of their lives.

And that's the best hope West's clients have.

Defending the charge is difficult when police have hard computer evidence of where the harassment originated and when a victim is willing to testify, West said.

The Craigslist case is furthest along and may be reduced to a Class A misdemeanor, but that still carries the possibility of up to a year in jail and a \$4,000 fine. Probation or deferred adjudication are possibilities as well. Even if dismissed, the legal fees can mount quickly.

West said one of the victims he spoke to isn't interested in putting his ex in jail but wants him to get counseling. Ajudge could set that as a condition of the probation or deferred adjudication.

Katherine Robinson is an assistant Dallas district attorney who prosecutes Internet crimes. She said that her office looks at cases like these very carefully, but because the law is still new, she hasn't seen any cases come to trial.

Robinson said the Texas law was prompted by

a 2006 cyber-bullying case in Missouri.

Megan Meier, 13, took her own life after being told online that the world would be better off without her by "Josh," a boy who friended her on MySpace.

"Josh" turned out to be Lori Drew, an adult woman. Megan was one of her daughter's classmates.

However, Drew had not violated any criminal law at the time. She was charged and acquitted of violating the terms and conditions of MySpace under the Computer Fraud and Abuse Act.

Robinson said that after that case, legislatures started enacting stricter Internet harassment laws.

"That case hit home how devastating it can be," Robinson said.

Assistant District Attorney Rick Watson has handled two cases under the Internet harassment law.

"I talk to the victim, balance what they want and make sure the public is safe," he said.

In one case, a high school student created a Facebook page with another student's information and made threatening remarks.

The student received four years probation but only after a psych evaluation to make sure he was not a danger.

Watson said the student thought he was pulling a prank, and had no idea he would be charged with a felony.

Watson said that although charges may be reduced, they're not likely to be dismissed.

West warned that although these cases may eventually be pled to misdemeanors, the arrest and associated costs can be enormous. He said that the potential is a felony conviction and with all the attention placed on bullying last fall, Internet harassment is being taken seriously by law enforcement in Dallas

And Dallas County is not the only place police are pursuing these cases. Of West's four clients, only two are in Dallas. One is in Denton and another is in Collin County.

improve the quality of care it provides to patients.

"I think if anything it eventually enriches us as opposed to costing us money," McDonald said after the vote, adding that DP benefits have been "a long time coming."

In September 2007, McDonald pulled a proposal to add DP benefits from the Board of Managers' agenda at the last minute, citing opposition from "ultra-right wing, homophobic" board members.

Parkland is Dallas County's public hospital, and the Board of Managers is appointed by the Commissioners Court, which was then controlled by Republicans.

"We opted at the time not to even bring it up," McDonald told Dallas Voice in 2008. "If you have a vote that's negative, you send a message."

After Democrats took control of the Commissioners Court at the start of this year, several new

members were appointed to the seven-person Board of Managers. The new members include Dr. Roberto de la Cruz, who is openly gay and made the motion to approve DP benefits on Tuesday.

"It's a big day," de la Cruz said after the vote, adding that he trained as an intern at Parkland in the 1990s. "It's a personal day for me because I come from here."

The Board of Managers member who abstained from Tuesday's vote was Jerry Bryant. "I don't want to discuss it," Bryant said when asked the reason for his abstention. Bryant was appointed to the Board of Managers by Republican Commissioner Mike Cantrell earlier this year.

Although Parkland is adding DP benefits in 2012, the Commissioners Court has no plans to do so for Dallas County's roughly 7,000 employees, County Judge Clay Jenkins confirmed this week.

Jenkins, a Democrat who chairs the Commissioners Court and supports offering DP benefits, said he was "very pleased" with the Parkland vote

and had lobbied for the change among appointees to the Board of Managers.

"I think that's the right thing to do for a variety of reasons," Jenkins said. "We've got to recruit and keep the very best staff, and this is an important component of successfully doing that."

But Jenkins noted that the county is facing a \$35 million budget shortfall this year and already plans to cut \$5.6 million in employee health care costs — under a proposal that's set to be voted on by the Commissioners Court next Tuesday, Aug.

Jenkins said he hopes to look at adding DP benefits next year, when the county's budget shortfall is expected to be smaller. He added that the Parkland board's vote will "put the county in a better position to favorably consider doing this."

"I will use the empirical data that arises from that decision in crafting a plan for the county," Jenkins said.

District Clerk Gary Fitzsimmons, who's openly gay, said a plan for the county to offer DP benefits should already have been crafted.

Fitzsimmons said he met with the newly elected members of the Commissioners Court — Jenkins and Dr. Elba Garcia — in January and asked them to initiate a study of the cost of offering DP benefits.

But when Dallas Voice inquired about the status of the DP benefits initiative earlier this month, it became clear that no such study had been conducted. Instead, a county spokeswoman provided the newspaper with "off the-cuff" figures, Fitzsimmons said.

The Commissioners Court voted in April to add sexual orientation and gender identity to the county's employment nondiscrimination policy. But Fitzsimmons called that move "largely symbolic" and said it has little potential financial im-

Are LGBT students safer this year?

A year after a rash of teen suicides focused attention on the problem of anti-LGBT bullying, some experts say it's true things have improved, but not nearly enough

Anti-LGBT bullying took the national stage last fall after the highly publicized suicides of several teens bullied for being or being perceived to be LGBT.

The relentless bullying, many believe, may have been one of the contributing factors in many of those youths' decisions to attempt suicide, and their deaths led to a surge of anti-bullying awareness campaigns and media coverage.

But will LGBT students entering school this fall be any safer after a year of heightened awareness about the issue? Two LGBT leaders are doubtful, although they acknowledge some positive changes.

Eliza Byard, executive director of the Gay, Lesbian, and Straight Education Network, said, "Last fall, the nation as a whole woke up to the potential consequences of this problem."

And this year, "more schools are aware of what they need to do, and there are more resources out there," she said.

But while "we've made progress" in people's understanding of anti-LGBT bullying and "ideas and policies are getting traction," Byard said, there is still "a lot of work to be done."

David McFarland, interim executive director/CEO of The Trevor Project, the leading national organization providing crisis intervention and suicide prevention services to LGBT and questioning youth, said he too believes there is a long way yet to go.

"We're not there yet because we're continuing to see anti-LGBT rhetoric and movement across this country that has a negative effect on young people," McFarland said. "There is greater awareness around this issue, but LGBT students still experience bullying and harassment at an alarming rate."

Research has shown the negative effects of bullying. GLSEN's 2009 National School Climate Survey found that nearly 9 out of 10 LGBT students experienced verbal or physical harassment at school in the previous year, which was related to increased depression and anxiety and decreased self-esteem.

And a study in the May 2011 Journal of School Health found that anti-LGBT bullying at school "is strongly linked" to negative mental health for its victims, including an increased frequency of sui-

cide attempts and increased risk for engaging in behaviors that can lead to infection with STDs and HIV.

The increased risks exist not only while the victim is in adolescence, but also in young adulthood.

At the federal level

Federal actions taken over the last year to address anti-LGBT bullying include, most promi-

nently, an anti-bullying conference hosted by the While House in March 2011, at which President Obama told attendees that bullying is "more likely to affect kids that are seen as different," including those who are different because of sexual orientation.

The U.S. Department of Education has also issued a number of letters to educators, reminding them:

• that federal laws require schools to take action

against bullying, including gender-based and sexual harassment of LGBT students.

- that schools receiving federal funds must provide equal access to school resources for all student groups, including gay-straight alliances, and that GSAs "can help make schools safe and affirming environments for everyone."
- that effective state anti-bullying laws include ones that specify "actual or perceived characteris-

Testing a new era: Who defines spouse?

Dispute over woman's estate between her partner, parents highlights the problems of DOMA

One obituary described Ellyn Farley as a happy, studious, pet-loving attorney married to her spouse Jennifer Tobits and only "reluctantly" wearing dresses to attend Mass.

The other described her as a fierce litigator and champion to the underdog, survived by her parents, her brother, various aunts and uncles, a godmother, and "good friends for life who will be in her heart forever, Jennifer and Nancy, of Chicago; and numerous cousins and other devoted friends."

The first was published in the Chicago Tribune, in the city where Farley lived with her spouse Jennifer Tobits. The latter was published in the Roanoke Times, in Virginia, where Farley grew up.

The first was drafted by one of the lesbian couple's friends and was reviewed and edited by Tobits.

The latter was coordinated by Farley's parents who, according to Tobits, did not consult her about its contents.

The first makes clear that Farley was married to a woman; the latter scrubs that reality out of her life story.

Now, Farley's surviving spouse, Jennifer Tobits, and her parents, Joan and David Farley, are squaring off in two different courts over their different portrayals of Farley.

In probate court in Illinois, they are fighting

over Farley's will. In a federal court in Pennsylvania, where Farley's law firm is headquartered, they are trying to influence a judge's determination of who should properly receive the benefits of Farley's profit-sharing plan.

"This is the new era," said Shannon Minter, legal director of the San Francisco-based National Center for Lesbian Rights. "We are all familiar with hearing stories about parents stepping in and not honoring their children's relationships and trying to take all the assets. Now that so many couples are in marriages or civil unions or domestic partnerships, it's still happening; but we have a degree ... of legal protections that we didn't have before."

But in this new era of litigation, Minter said, "there is a lot of confusion" caused by the federal Defense of Marriage Act.

DOMA

DOMA is the federal law that prohibits the federal government from recognizing marriages between same-sex couples. It has two sections.

One states, "No state ... shall be required to give effect to any public act, record, or judicial proceeding of any other state ... respecting a relationship between persons of the same sex that is treated as a marriage under the laws of such other state, territory, possession or tribe, or a right or claim arising from such relationship."

The second section reads, "In determining the meaning of any act of Congress, or of any ruling, regulation or interpretation of the various administrative bureaus and agencies of the United States, the word 'marriage' means only a legal union between one man and one woman as hus-

band and wife, and the word 'spouse' refers only to a person of the opposite sex who is a husband or a wife."

Farley's parents, represented by the right-wing Thomas More Society, a pro-life law firm, say DOMA precludes the courts from awarding any of Farley's death benefits to Tobits.

Minter of NCLR, which is representing Tobits, says DOMA does not apply to private employers, such as Farley's law firm.

"[P]rivate employers cannot use that as an excuse for not honoring our marriages," said Minter.

Nevertheless, Farley's law firm, Cozen O'Connor, has asked a federal court to settle the dispute for them.

The Tobits/Farley case

Jennifer Tobits and Ellyn Farley were married in Toronto on Feb. 17, 2006, and made their home in Chicago. Just a few weeks after their marriage, Farley was diagnosed with an aggressive form of cancer, which she battled for four years.

She died on Sept. 13, 2010.

Shortly after Farley's death, her parents, Joan and David Farley of Roanoke, Va., petitioned an Illinois probate court for the right to take over administration of their daughter's estate. They also sought the assets of a profit-sharing plan Farley had, as partner of the Cozen O'Connor law firm.

The firm filed a motion on Jan. 24, 2011, asking the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania to determine who gets the benefits payment.

"In the last week of her life," said Minter, "Ellyn wrote a will because she feared her parents would try to take everything from Jennifer.

"Ellyn appointed her close friend Nancy [Tuohy] to be the executor of the estate," he explained. "Initially, Nancy accepted that position and acted as the executor but declined the responsibility later after she realized that she would need to hire an attorney in order to resolve the Farleys' various claims to Ellyn's estate.

"The Farleys knew that Jennifer and Ellyn married," explained Minter. "But they take the position that the marriage is not valid and are arguing that it should not be legally recognized because of DOMA."

What will Illinois do?

The underlying issue in this case is whether Illinois will recognize the marriage, said Minter.

A civil unions law took effect in Illinois on June 1 this year, and, according to James L. Bennett, Midwest regional director of Lambda Legal, "Illinois recognizes marriages performed in other states or countries, even Canada, as civil unions in Illinois."

Under that law, said Minter, Tobits would be preferred over Farley's parents to be administrator of Farley's estate.

The law firm states, in its document to the federal court, that the firm "had not received a valid designation of beneficiary form from Ms. Farley prior to her death."

Following Farley's death, said the firm, Farley's parents presented them with a beneficiary form "purporting to show that Ms. Farley had designated them as her beneficiaries ... and had represented her present marital status as 'single.'"

The form was dated Sept. 12, 2010, the day before Farley died.

But Cozen also notes that, "inconsistent with the declaration" that Farley was "single," the beneficiary form submitted by the Farleys "also purports" to have the notarized signature of "Ms. Farley's spouse."

The firm says the form "is not signed by [Farley's] spouse."

"Accordingly, Cozen O'Connor cannot determine the validity of this designation of beneficiary form," states the firm's document to the court.

Tobits, in documents she filed with the federal court, denies ever signing the beneficiary form, but she also acknowledges obtaining a "blank designation of beneficiary form" for Farley's father the day before Farley died.

Tobits said she did this because the father had instructed hospital staff that the parents — and not Tobits — would make medical decisions for Farley and because she "feared" the father "would refuse her access to Ms. Farley's hospital room unless she complied."

"Wanting to see her dying wife and to avoid a dispute in the hospital with her wife's parents," said the documents filed by NCLR, "Ms. Tobits went home to retrieve the form."

Tobits said she was not present when Farley purportedly signed the form and that the form "was signed" about 30 minutes after Farley had begun vomiting blood.

Farley "fell asleep that night" and died the following morning.

Tobits claims that Farley "suffered from weakened intellect," that Farley's parents exercised "undue influence" over Farley, and that Farley did not sign the form of her own free will.

"Ellyn did not have to fill out a form for her spouse to get the benefits," Minter said. "Under the plan, the benefits go to an employee's spouse unless the employee designates someone else and

Judge apologizes for delay in ruling on trans inmate's case

Kosilek's case demanding that the state pay for her gender reassignment surgery dates back to 2006

BOSTON — A federal judge has apologized to a transgender inmate who has waited years for a ruling on whether she can get a taxpayer-funded sex-change operation.

Michelle Kosilek, a convicted murderer, first sued the Massachusetts Department of Correction 11 years ago.

Two years later, U.S. District Judge Mark Wolf ruled that Kosilek was entitled to treatment for gender-identity disorder, but stopped short of ordering surgery to complete Kosilek's transformation into a woman.

Kosilek sued again in 2005, arguing that the female hormones she was receiving were not enough to relieve her anxiety and depression. Kosilek argued that the surgery was a medical necessity and that the Department of Correction was violating her constitutional rights by refusing to provide the operation.

Since 2006, Wolf has heard hundreds of hours of testimony from medical experts and others, but has not issued his ruling.

On Thursday, Aug. 18, as Kosilek's lawyers made additional arguments citing recent rulings in other transgender cases, Wolf apologized for taking so long.

"I deeply regret that my decision in this case has not yet been issued," he said.

Wolf, the chief judge at U.S. District Court in Boston, has handled a number of noteworthy cases recently.

He presided over the trial of former House Speaker Salvatore DiMasi, who was convicted in June of conspiracy, extortion and other charges.

He also is scheduled to rule on a request for a new trial in the federal death penalty case of Gary Sampson, a drifter from Abington who was sentenced to death after killing three people during a weeklong crime rampage in 2001.

Wolf told attorneys for Kosilek and the Department of Correction that he knows the case "is extremely important ... to all parties."

"I will continue to keep that in mind," he said. Kosilek, born as Robert, was convicted of killing his wife in 1990.

Kosilek, now 62, legally changed his name to Michelle in 1993. She has received hormone treatments and lives as a woman in the state prison in Norfolk, a medium-security, all-male facility.

During the Aug. 18 hearing, Kosilek's lawyer, Frances Cohen, said a recent ruling by the 1st U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in the case of another

transgender inmate bolsters Kosilek's claim that prison officials are violating her constitutional rights by denying her the surgery.

In the ruling, the appeals court upheld a lower court judge who found the state Department of Correction had shown deliberate indifference to inmate Sandy Battista's medical needs by repeatedly denying her request for female hormone treatments.

The court found that the department's claim that its decision was based on security concerns had been "undercut by a collection of pretexts, delays and misrepresentations."

Prison officials have cited similar security concerns in the Kosilek case, saying that allowing her to have the surgery could make her a target for sexual assaults by other inmates.

Cohen said the security concerns were also a pretext in the Kosilek case.

"It is remarkably similar to what we've been hearing in this court for quite some time," she said.

But Richard McFarland, a lawyer for the Department of Correction, said the prison officials are genuinely concerned about security problems if Kosilek is allowed to have the surgery.

He cited the testimony of former DOC Commissioner Kathleen Dennehy, who said the department's decision to deny the surgery had nothing to do the costs — about \$20,000 — or the political ramifications of allowing an inmate to have a taxpayer-funded sex-change operation.

McFarland said the DOC has given Kosilek hormone treatments, female items and psychotherapy to help her deal with gender-identity disorder.

Elmhurst College becomes 1st to ask about sexual orientation

Students who identify as LGBT might qualify for scholarships, can be directed to campus groups, president says

ELMHURST, Ill. — Elmhurst College in suburban Chicago has become the first in the country to ask students directly on admissions applications about their gender identity and sexual orientation.

The application asks: "Would you consider yourself to be a member of the LGBT (lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgendered) community?"

Students who answer "yes" may be eligible for a scholarship that will pay up to a third of tuition, said Gary Rold, the college's dean of admissions. The information also will help officials direct incoming students to services and groups that could help them on campus, Rold added.

"Increasing diversity is part of our mission statement," Rold told the Chicago Sun-Times. "This is simply closing the loop, in many ways, of another group who has a very strong identity. It may not be race and religion, but it's an important

part of who they are."

The question will appear on applications for students hoping to start in the fall of 2012. Like questions about race and religion, answering is optional and will not affect admissions decisions.

Elmhurst College is a private, liberal arts college that has 3,300 undergraduate students. It is affiliated with the United Church of Christ.

"It is kind of a pleasant surprise that Elmhurst College in Illinois is the first campus to ask an identity question," said Shane Windmeyer, executive director of Campus Pride, a national nonprofit group. "Some of the leaders in college admissions have done similar stuff but never asked the question."



"We argue that the treatment provided to Miss Kosilek is adequate" and the surgery is not a medical necessity, McFarland said.

Wolf asked both sides to submit additional arguments in writing by Sept. 16. He tentatively scheduled another hearing for Oct. 11.

Voluntary manslaughter conviction an option in McInerney trial

LOS ANGELES — A California judge has decided jurors may consider voluntary manslaughter in the trial of a teen accused of murdering a gay classmate at school.

Ventura County Superior Court Judge Charles Campbell decided Tuesday, Aug. 23, the panel could opt for the lesser charge rather than first-degree murder if they find Brandon McInerney guilty of killing 15-year-old Larry King.

The Ventura County Star reports Campbell felt that not allowing jurors to consider voluntary manslaughter would be problematic if there is an appeal.

The shooting occurred in February 2008 at E.O. Green Junior High School in Oxnard. McInerney, who is now 17, did not testify.

Closing arguments were expected to begin Thursday, Aug. 25.

The trial was moved to Los Angeles because of pretrial publicity.

Officer who produced anti-gay videos can stay in the Navy

NORFOLK, Virginia — A Navy panel says the former commander of a nuclear-powered aircraft carrier who produced raunchy videos aboard the ship can remain in the service.

The board of inquiry issued its recommendation Wednesday, Aug. 24. It had been looking at whether to dismiss Capt. Owen P. Honors from the Navy.

Honors was relieved of command in January after media reports about the videos surfaced. The videos included simulated same-sex shower scenes, anti-gay slurs and references to prostitution in foreign ports.

Honors says the videos were made to improve morale while teaching important shipboard lessons. He helped produce and appeared in the videos that aired on the ship between 2005 and 2007, when he was the ship's executive office.

Both sides satisfied in talks over school district policy

ST. PAUL, Minn. — Both sides say they held productive talks toward settling two lawsuits

against Minnesota's largest school district challenging its policy requiring staff to remain neutral when sexual orientation is discussed in the classroom.

The plaintiffs say the policy prevents the Anoka-Hennepin School District from protecting kids perceived as gay from bullying and harassment.

Both sides issued a statement Tuesday night, Aug. 23, after talks mediated by U.S. Magistrate Judge Steven Rau in St. Paul saying they "look forward to future constructive dialogue." They also say they've agreed not to comment further on the settlement process.

No new talks are scheduled.

The lawsuits were filed this summer on behalf of six former and current students by the Southern Poverty Law Center and the National Center for Lesbian Rights after previous settlement efforts failed.

Gay council candidate says he is target of anti-gay messages

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. — A gym owner who says he's the first openly gay candidate to run for Charlottesville City Council says he's been receiving anti-gay messages.

James Halfaday told the Daily Progress one of his fliers was returned Aug. 7 with a disparaging message and his face crossed out. He said he sought legal advice but was told the defaced flier didn't constitute a threat, so there was little he could do.

Halfaday said the flier is the latest in a string of attacks, including a July 31 email accusing him of "promoting perversion" and an insulting Facebook message in May. The Facebook message was configured to make it look like it was sent by Kathy Galvin, one of Halfaday's six opponents in the Democratic primary, but both campaigns and party officials say Galvin had nothing to do with it.

A letter to Halfaday and Galvin from Charlottesville Democratic Committee co-chairs Tom Vandever and Jim Nix says the message was likely generated "by an unknown third party" with the goal of damaging the campaigns of both candidates.

Nix and Vandever urged both campaigns to keep the incident quiet to lessen its impact.

Halfaday said he originally wanted to keep the hate mails quiet because he assumed they would die down and he didn't want to start an "uproar" in the gay and lesbian community.

He said he chose to come forward now because he's run a successful campaign despite the negatives, adding that he's not going to be intimidated

Jonathan Stevens, a Galvin campaign adviser, said he thought the Facebook issue was a "dead letter" a long time ago.

"It was put aside as one of those nasty little things that can happen on the Internet," Stevens said.

Nix said that, to his knowledge, Halfaday is indeed the first openly gay person to run for City Council.

"This is 2011, it's not 1970 or something like that," Nix said. "Sadly, we do still live in an age where some people just don't accept that and do mean things."

Philadelphia trans inmate being moved to men's prison

PHILADELPHIA — A transgender woman who has been incarcerated at Riverside Correctional Facility, the city's only prison for women, for the past 14 months is being moved to a facility for male prisoners after complaining that a corrections officer had forced her to perform oral sex on him, according to reports by The Advocate.

Jovanie Saldana, 23, who has been living as a female since she was 12, was charged in June 2010 with felonies including armed robbery. Prison officials reportedly did not know Saldana was transgender until they recorded a telephone conversation between her and her mother while investigating Saldana's allegations against the corrections officer.

The Advocate reports that Saldana, who has not had gender-reassignment surgery, should have undergone a cavity search when she was first incarcerated in the prison, and then again each time she returned following outings for court appearances.

Lorenzo North, president of the union representing corrections officers, has said that the error in searching Saldana is proof that the officer Saldana accused of sexual abuse is innocent, according to the Advocate.

Teacher didn't violate policy with anti-gay Facebook post, officials say

Lake County School District Superintendent Susan Moxley has reinstated Mount Dora High School social studies teacher Jerry Buell, suspended after making anti-gay posts to his Facebook page, saying the posts did not violate the school district's code of conduct, WFTV.com has reported. Mount Dora is in Florida.

Buell, the district's former teacher of the year, was transferred to an administrative position while district officials investigated complaints over his Facebook page. Buell allegedly posted on Facebook that same-sex unions are a "cesspool" that make him want to throw up. The posts reportedly angered a number of his Facebook "friends," including current and former students.

Mount Dora High School graduated Brett Winters filed the complaint against Buell, saying that his Facebook posts indicated he was "dangerous to gay students."

Buell insisted he was "exercising my [free speech] rights as a citizen of this country."

The district is still investigating comments Buell made on a school web page and a class syllabus, and the teacher has been given a list of directives to follow, although that list has not been made public.


Fred Karger invited to California GOP's convention

Openly gay Republican presidential candidate Fred Karger has been invited to speak at the upcoming California GOP convention, according to reports by On Top Magazine. The invitation came within an hour of the publication of an article in the San Francisco Chronicle in which Karger accused the party of giving him "the cold shoulder."

Karger has said that his 2 percent showing in several recent polls marks him as a legitimate candidate, and State GOP Communications Director Mark Standriff said Karger has always been welcome in the California GOP.

But Jimmy LaSalvia, executive director of the gay Republican group GOProud said Karger is not a credible candidate.

"Unfortunately, Fred Karger is playing a stunt, and his stunt has run its course," LaSalvia told On Top.



tics of students who have historically been targets of bullying," such as sexual orientation and gender identity.

In the states

On the state level, since last fall, Arkansas, Colorado, Connecticut and Rhode Island enacted anti-bullying legislation that explicitly prohibits bullying based on sexual orientation and gender identity, as recommended by the Department of Education, making a total of 14 states that do so.

The others include California, Illinois, Iowa, Maryland, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Oregon, Vermont and Washington.

An additional two, Massachusetts and Wisconsin, specify sexual orientation, but not gender identity.

North Dakota and Texas enacted anti-bullying laws in the last year, but those laws do not enumerate sexual orientation and gender identity.

And Byard said there has been "tremendous activity at district and local levels" across the country to address bullying.

McFarland, too, stressed the importance of

"Schools and communities need to take concrete steps, creating safe spaces where youth can receive support from caring adults," he said.

Both the Trevor Project and GLSEN are among the organizations that provide training to help them do so

Byard said, however, that, "The biggest problem we have right now is that schools are in crisis because of the economy. We've got to make sure schools that want to do the right thing are not prevented because of a lack of resources."

It may be tough going. The federal Fiscal Year 2011 budget drained more than \$100 million from the two primary federal grant programs that address bullying. And state education budgets continue to face cuts.

McFarland noted that, in some districts, the problem may be attitudinal as well as budgetary, especially in states and school districts with "no promo homo" laws or policies preventing schoolbased instruction that could be interpreted to be positive about homosexuality.

Eight states — Alabama, Arizona, Louisiana, Mississippi, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Texas and Utah — have such laws statewide, according to

But individual school districts in other states may have similar policies, as does the Anoka-Hennepin School District in Minnesota, part of which is in the congressional district of presidential candidate Rep. Michele Bachmann, R-Minn.

The National Center for Lesbian Rights and the Southern Poverty Law Center recently filed a lawsuit against the district, claiming the policies "exacerbated" anti-gay harassment. This caused some students "serious emotional harm, including anxiety, anger, and depression, which led some of them to consider or attempt suicide."

In the nine months between November 2009 and July 2010, at least four LGBT students within the district died by suicide.

Federal anti-bullying legislation "would make an enormous difference," said Byard.

Three pairs of bills in the U.S. House and Senate would address anti-LGBT bullying and harassment in schools and universities. But the bills seem unlikely to pass the current Republican-controlled House, despite having a handful of Republican co-sponsors.

Still, Byard and McFarland feel the efforts over the past year have had some positive effect.

"After last year, more doors are open," Byard said. "People know this needs to be done."

McFarland added, "For the first time, the challenges of LGBT youth are no longer invisible on a local, state, or national level."

the spouse gives written consent, which must be notarized," he explained.

"The Farleys filled out the form and pressured Ellyn to sign, but Jennifer did not" give her written consent, said Minter.

Cozen O'Connor court documents confirms, "Ms. Tobits' signature does not appear on the designation of beneficiary form in the space reserved for spouse consent to beneficiary designation."

Marriage discrimination

Evan Wolfson, founder and president of the National Freedom to Marry organization, said the dispute "highlights how unfair marriage discrimination is, adding to tensions and bad actions even within families."

And DOMA, he says, "gives those who would tear families apart an extra weapon to use even if the weapon itself is not appropriate."

The Farley parents' attorneys say DOMA is im-

plicated because the benefits they seek to acquire from Farley's law firm are part of an ERISA plan.

ERISA — the Employee Retirement Income Security Act — is a federal law that sets minimum standards for pension plans in private in-

NCLR's Minter acknowledges that ERISA governs many aspects of how benefits must be structured.

"But the plan here," he said, "defines spouse for itself, which is perfectly acceptable under ERISA."

And DOMA "does not apply," said Minter, "because [the law firm's beneficiary plan] is pri-

"Jennifer meets [the law firm's plan] definition," said Minter. "ERISA does not dictate how private employers define spouse or prevent them from treating married LGBT employees equally. Likewise, because there is no need to look beyond the plan's clear definition of 'spouse,' it is irrelevant whether Pennsylvania law would define it differently in some other setting."


The 'fundamental' issues at hand

When those on the religious right attack, their hatred is born of fear and frustration. But we have to remember not to react in kind

This weekend I watched some clips of rightwing evangelicals on YouTube. Aside from raising my blood pressure a few notches, it gave me an insight into the reason these folks are so angry — and more specifically, why they are so angry at LGBT people.

Imagine you are a fundamental-That means you say you believe that everything in the Bible is literally true — the great flood, Jonah and the big fish, Noah and the ark, Adam and Eve, all the miracles, etc. It sounds com-

forting at first, to

believe in a world where everything is in God's control and our fates are decided. But if everything in the Bible is "literally" true, then we are stuck with a paradox: The God who Jesus depicts as loving and filled with grace, becomes an almost psychopathic killer if all the stories of the Old Testament are true.

Suddenly you are standing on shaky ground.

Furthermore, to really believe the literal interpretation of the Bible, you have to live in a cognitive dissonance, where in your daily life you confront a reality that does not match what you read in the "literal" Bible.

That takes a lot of work to keep things straight and to keep reality from seeping in to what you say you believe.


I think this is why fundamentalists as a group always seem so angry. They are exhausted and

Imagine how difficult it would be to read a story about God creating the world in six days while at the same time seeing scientific evidence that creation took billions of years.

You begin denying science and slide down the slope into creating justification for why there are creatures like dinosaurs which never are described in the Bible. You come up with things like, "The fossils were put on earth to test our faith."

Frustrating isn't it?

What's more you begin to suspect that the real problem is that some people, yourself not included, are making God mad, and if the Old Testament is to be taken literally, you don't want to do that!



Who are these people? Well, they are anyone different from you, obviously, and LGBT people fall smack in the middle of that group.

It really is little wonder we as LGBTs are being scapegoated by these fundamentalist folk. They are seeking a way to explain away the problems of their world, and since we are so obviously different from them, we must be the problem.

That's why they are so adamant about "defending marriage." If we LGBT people start getting married and have our relationships accepted as mainstream, it chips away not at their heterosexual marriages, but at their lock on being favored by God.

Remember: They believe only a small group of righteous people will be saved when the grand finale comes. In the mind of these people there has to be a group who is "worthy" and a group who is "unworthy." If we start paring down the qualifications of what makes a person worthy, it lessens their chances of being in that group.

Now before you go wondering if I am some kind of atheist heathen, I assure you I am not. I consider myself a follower of the teachings of Jesus, and that makes me a Christian. And that's the real point of this whole discussion.

As a gay man who is Christian, I am a double threat to the fundamentalist right-wing. I am stripping away another of their "get into heaven free" cards, and this makes them even more angry.

My problem as a Christian is remembering Jesus' most important teaching — that whole "love thy neighbor" thing. It's really hard to do when your neighbor would just as soon see you disappear.

But the alternative is to live with the same anger and frustration as the fundamentalists, and that just doesn't seem to be a very good alternative.

So what I have resolved to do is this: The next

time I am angered by someone thumping their Bible on TV and ranting about the "evil homosexuals" who are leading the country to ruin, I will see through their hatred and recognize the scared and vulnerable person underneath who is fighting against the wind of justice.

I will try to remember that their struggle is ultimately futile. I will try to find some love in my heart for them.

Then, I will promptly get online and donate money to a worthy cause that works for real justice for LGBT people and

make that donation in their name. Kind of poetic justice isn't it?

Tothing makes you feel older than an album from your youth celebrating a milestone anniversary. Nothing! Those defining tunes as you came of age may be timeless, but it's a reminder that you aren't.

As the seminal '80s band the Go-Go's celebrates three decades since *Beauty and the Beat*, time seems to have hardly touched guitarist Jane Wiedlin. With her little girl voice and sassy wit, Wiedlin has kept the same spunk she had when the iconic girl group burst onto the scene.

"In some ways it feels like three years ago and other ways, like 300 years ago," she says.

Wiedlin wants to make one thing clear: The concert she and her bandmates will give this weekend is *not* part of a reunion tour — there's nothing to reunite. Rather, the Go-Go's just aren't "a very active band" who have taken "a big chunk of time off."

Whether or not she's kidding, the tour has injected the band with a vigor that they'll put on display Friday at the House of Blues. Dallas thought they might get a nostalgic taste of the band when they were set to perform last year. But Wiedlin unintentionally derailed that.

"It was the day after my birthday and a few of us decided to take a midnight hike up to the top of this hill," she explains. "We wanted to have this epic light saber battle. But as we walked home, I literally fell right off a cliff. I heard my knees explode; I was rolling through poison oak! I went and found the cliff and I had fallen about 15 feet."

Such an anecdote reveals several things about Wiedlin: She's an

admitted *Star Wars* geek, and she's the adventurous type. She has a limp now, but otherwise, she's back in the game. The time off gave her some time for introspection — about touring in the early days, the fun the ladies had on the road and the experience of putting those shows together. Even with the ups-and-downs of the band, she thought everyone was having the best time possible — why not again?

"You know, I get sucked into the minutiae of being onstage, but it's extraordinary," she says with little gasps. "Our intention is to make this tour the most fun we've had in decades, which will make it fun for other people."

Which seems like a given with such musical faves like "We Got the Beat," "Vacation" and "Head Over Heels." But is new music in sight for the band that never really broke up? Wiedlin and the gang aren't ruling it out.

"It looks possible to record together, even though we don't have to have a major label," she

says. "That used to be such a big deal to make music, but now with the web, it's very DIY. Like getting back to those '70s punk rock days. Charlotte [Caffey] and Kathy [Valentine] just wrote a new song for the band."

Wiedlin gives the impression that she can't sit still, whether she's a star in the comic book Lady Robotica, partaking in her admission that she's a BDSM perv or acting in indie films, Wiedlin's voice suggests she may never stop working — whatever the work may be.

"I'm working all the time. I just wrote and directed my first sci-

fi movie, *The Pyrex Glitch,*" she says. "That's on the film fest circuit. Hopefully people will find it as funny as I do. But we're all really busy. Belinda [Carlisle] has her jewelry and textile company and Gina [Schock] is been writing songs for Miley Cyrus. Everybody is still so active even though we're old."

Wiedlin has discussed her bisexuality, although she prefers to stay away from labels. In an interview with AfterEllen.com, she told the site she's had sex with both sexes, but that "bisexuality is such a loaded term." But she loves her gays and as Prop 8 played out in California, she experienced both the joy of gaining equality and the disappointment of marriage privileges being taken away.

"For a few months in the summer of 2008, we got equal rights," she says. "I wanted to be part of that celebration! But then Prop 8 happened and I've been fighting it ever since. I became an ordained minister to marry same-sex couples. I'll go anywhere to do that so people can be together as they should be. Oh, and as a disclaimer, I'm completely non-religious."

Her focus is now on the tour and even with her bum knees, she laughs off any obstacle that would keep her from enjoying giving a good show. And while the audience will hear Go-Go's hits and perhaps even Carlisle's, don't be so sure on hearing Wiedlin's one-hit wonder song "Rush Hour." The pop confection made a top 10 splash back in 1988. In fact, she's almost betting on it.

"You know, that song has been a thorn in my side," she chuckles. "It is so hard to play live because it has like millions of synths in it. I've never been able to crack it to make it sound good, but I'd love to hear Belinda sing it."

We'd go for that.

Lexus series adds queer event to upcoming season of musicals

he Lexus Broadway Series offers a muscular lineup of shows that feature classic stories and contemporary rock 'n' roll. Best musical Tony winner *In the Heights* details the immigrant experience as characters find a new life in their new country. *March* 13–25.

Alt-rockers Green Day went Broadway with *American Idiot*, touted as a mashup of a rock concert and staged musical. *May 8*–20.

The season concludes with *Jersey Boys* and Frankie Valli and the Four Seasons. Classic hits like "Big Girls Don't Cry" and "Can't Take My Eyes Off of You" tell the tale of this well-accomplished music group from the '50s. *June* 12–*July* 15.

Ferrell decided to take a breather when in 2008 he received a call from Moriarty, who had only recently been appointed the new A.D.

"He asked, would I choreograph *The Who's Tommy*. It became very apparent he was testing the waters with me, to see if it made sense for me to be connected with the Theater Center. Even still, coming on staff? I did not see that coming."

Ferrell thinks Moriarty has been instrumental in "making the Theater Center more relevant to Dallas than it had been in a long time, arguing that it should be doing innovate stuff and regain a national footprint. It feels like we've made some great progress in that way," he says.

As for Ferrell himself, he's still excited about his new role in shaping the North Texas theater scene, and has found a sense of serenity.

"There was a time when I thought the amount of shows I did was the barometer of my success," Ferrell admits.

Not so much anymore. He'll take quality over quantity any day. If only he could just slow down.

Queer highlights from the upcoming theater season

nticipation should be strong for the upcoming theater season in general. Ambitious shows like *Giant*, *The Tempest*, *West Side Story* and *Hairspray* all dot the stage horizon. But we also like to see some of our own up there. As we look over the upcoming offerings from local theater companies, we always ask, "Where's the gay?" In addition to Uptown Players' first Dallas Pride Performing Arts Festival, here are some of the others.

Fall

Singer-songwriter Duncan Sheik gave an indie music flair to the musical adaptation of the 1891 play **Spring Awakening**. Set in 19th century Germany, *Awakening* follows a group of youths as they discover more about themselves and their rapidly developing sexuality.

The original Frank Wedekind play was controversial in its day, depicting abortion, homosexuality, rape and suicide. Now the show just has an added rock 'n' roll score. Along with Sheik's musical perspective, Steven Slater wrote the book and lyrics in this updated version which debuted in 2006 on Broadway and won the Tony for Best Musical. Kevin Martin directs.

A spooky mansion. Chiaroscuro lighting. A child whisked into a world of phantasm by otherworldly creatures. Ah, the unnerving joy that was Guillermo del Toro's *Pan's Labyrinth* — or, for that matter, *The Orphanage*, which he produced. Both those films where among the most frightening of the last decade. Del Toro showed a skill at tapping into something primal about children in danger that speaks to a universality about the vulnerability of youth.

If only **Don't Be Afraid of the Dark** came anywhere near that.

It starts off promisingly, more than a century ago, as a scullery maid descends a dark, stone staircase into the basement of a madman, only to have her teeth chipped from her skull. It's a harrowing scene, but nothing that follows ever

approaches it for real thrills.

Based on a cheesy 1970s TV movie that clearly kept little Memo del Toro up at night, *Don't Be Afraid of the Dark* is basically about how the Tooth Fairy is really a coven of disgusting little rodents who terrorize children.

DON'T BE AFRAID OF THE DARK

Bailee Madison, Katie Holmes,

Sally (Bailee Madison) has been sent by her mother to live with dad (Guy Pearce) and his girlfriend (Katie Holmes) in the fixer-

upper Rhode Island estate they are restoring to its former grandeur. Like all movie children of divorced parents, she retreats from human contact, discovering a nest of creatures living in an ash-pit under the house.

Surprisingly, these nocturnal, fanged, batlike

gremlins who whisper subversive comments to Sally ("They don't love you! Come live with us! Don't turn on the light!") and shred clothes are not friendly! That's a conceit that has never made sense in bad movie: How kids are not afraid of clear dangers like monsters lurking in the shadow, but are afraid of bearded handymen and talking stuffed animals... both of which this movie has.

Del Toro, who wrote and produced, and Troy Nixey, who directs, seem more concerned with gross-outs and the cinematic equivalent of yelling "Boo!" from behind a door than telling a sensible story. That might be acceptable if the scares were authentic, or even scary. But once we see the gremlins, they seem more laughable than

terrifying: Troll dolls who can't handle a little flashbulb. (The script relies on the use of a Polaroid camera, long since gone, for its one stab at plot development.)

Holmes turns in a better-thanit-deserves performance as a step-

mom who comes to believe a raving little girl, and the house itself evokes images of Henry Miller's *Turn of the Screw*. Unfortunately, the rest of the film is close to the Karen Black thriller *Trilogy of Terror* than serious horror. Unlike the gremlins themselves, this film lacks teeth.

QUEER CLIP: 'OUR IDIOT BROTHER'



If Jesus came back today, I think he'd be a lot like Ned Rochlin (Paul Rudd) in **Our Idiot Brother**, stumbling through life while erring on the side of putting too much faith in humanity ... kinda like the first time around.

After eight months in prison for a dumb mistake, Ned finds himself with no home and no money. Life with his (s)mother (Shirley Knight) is unbearable so he moves on to his three sisters, wrecking each of their lives in the process.

Natalie (Zooey Deschanel) is a "former bisexual" in a lesbian relationship with a lawyer (Rashida Jones), while Liz (Emily Mortimer) has a sleazy husband (Steve Coogan) and a son and Miranda (Elizabeth Banks) is a writer nearing a career breakthrough.

Ned's experience with his more worldly siblings leads to mixed results. When he's unable to function in a three-way with a woman and another man, Ned feels guilty about it until a neighbor (Adam Scott) consoles him: "Just because you're straight doesn't mean you're homophohic"

How the women deal with their brother — the sweetest, most honest guy in the world — makes for pleasant entertainment. It introduces so many good characters it could be a sitcom pilot ... if any network could afford that cast.

Dallas Voice: What was the best 7:30 p.m. \$15. TheKessler.org part of your Last Comic Standing ex-

perience? Notaro: I wasn't on for very long, maybe two or three episodes. To me it was kind of a ridiculous thing. There were so many comedians who took it very seriously. I guess it's a good opportunity for people to burst onto the scene out of nowhere. For me, I was kind of glad I didn't get into the final round I enjoyed that I just made it to the semi-final round. When you get to that level, you're just on for three minutes, just doing a set. It's kind of like doing a latenight talk-show set. That was the best thing. And I made some good friends out of it. I'm doing this Podcast now with David Huntsberger, who I met on Last Comic Standing. In general, it's kind of a blur to me. It happened so quickly in such a short amount of time that it wasn't this monumental thing that happened. I kind of forget that I was on it.

Who are your comedy inspirations? Before I got into standup, I was really into Richard Pryor and Joan Rivers and Paula Poundstone and Steve Martin, people like that. It changed when I got into standup. I really started to be inspired by my peers that I was coming up with — Maria Bamford, Zach Galifianakis and Sarah Silverman. That's who started influencing and inspiring me after I got started. Your tastes get so refined. Not that I don't think the others were great still, but I would rather listen to my friends these days.

How does it feel to be the first comedian to release a comedy album on uber-hipster indie label Secretly Canadian? I'm thrilled. I feel so honored and lucky. I'd been offered deals with different comedy labels, but it just didn't appeal to me. I know I'm not the biggest comedian ever [though] if people are into comedy, they probably know who I am. When Secretly Canadian offered me a deal, my manager said, "We'll look at [the deal] and I'll talk to the label." I said, "You can talk all you want, but I know in my out that I'm signing." They've been so supportive and helpful. They've carried out every part of what they've promised. It's just cool. It feels good.

How did you decide what material to include on something as significant as your debut album Good One? I wanted to mix in some things that I had written in the past year that was a little newer. But then I also wanted to put some less popular, older bits of mine on there. I was [recently] in Philadelphia and for my whole show, this woman kept saying "No moleste," which I guess is my signature bit. She kept

turning to her husband saying, "When is she going to do it? I can't wait until she does 'No moleste." I was like, "Lady! Shut your trap!" I feel

like I had to put certain bits on there and for my own good I wanted to put in some newer stuff. There's also some improvisational things that were more in the moment. That's how all my shows are - new stuff, old stuff, right on the spot.

So "No moleste" is your "Free Bird." I guess so. But I feel like my Taylor Dayne story that I wrote in the past year is creeping up on that popularity.

Do you know if Taylor Dayne is aware of being the subject of a comedy routine? Has she contacted you? Yeah, her agent contacted my manager a month or two ago. Her agent told my manager that Taylor wanted me to know that she heard through the grapevine that I was telling this story about her and that she's a fan of mine and that she'd like to work with me one day [laughs]. I don't know what on earth we would do together, but I know I don't need a comedy partner. And I also know I can't sing. But, yeah, it's the weirdest and funniest thing that has ever come my way. The Taylor Dayne story just won't stop giving.

The deluxe edition includes the "Have Tig at Your Party" DVD, described as the "human equivalent to the 'burning log' DVD." What was the inspiration for the concept? Touring so much, I missed so many parties and get-togethers. This friend of mine, years ago, was having a party. And I was sitting in my hotel room thinking, what if I videotaped myself in my hotel room and I just mailed that to her and she could just play it at her party. I didn't do it, but it inspired the idea of me making that DVD. And every time I mentioned it to people, they would laugh and say, "You have to do that!" So I did and hopefully people will enjoy it. It's me standing there and I say very little every now and then.


You are going to be on tour for the next several months. What are you looking forward to about being on the road? When I'm doing my college tour, I'm bringing my old friend Tom Sharp as my opener. He's such a funny guy. We came up in comedy together. He used to write for Zach Galifianakis. With the regular tour dates, I'm hitting a lot of major cities and I have so many friends in those cities. I'm going to be doing venues that I've never done, even though I've been to those cities before. I'm anxious to see some old friends, hit some new venues. I think it's going to be a good time.



Such is the case with this month's fitness profile: Curtis Cook and Shane Friesenhahn. The lads have been together for just three months, but the real number that caught our eye was their collective body fat: 19 percent and shrinking by the day. How do they do it? Diet, exercise and rewarding a great workout with a sexy new swimsuit rather than a hot fudge sundae.

Names and ages: Curtis James Cook, 24, and Shane Friesenhahn, 37.

Occupations: Cook: HAMP processor at Nationstar Mortgage; Friesenhahn: owner of Silk Sculptures, a floral design studio.

Length of relationship: Three months

Sports and activities: Pool volleyball and Dr. Peay's Booty Camp

Exercise regime: Cook: I attend Dr. Peay's Booty Camp two days a week and go to L.A. Fitness a couple times a week. When I go to the gym, I always do abs first, then either upper body or legs followed by 15 to 20 minutes of cardio. My workout usually totals around an hour to an hour and a half. My goal is to go to the gym on my days off of [boot camp], but it doesn't always happen.

Friesenhahn: [Boot camp] five days a week, which consists of cardio, Plyometrics and light resistance training.

Upcoming fitness goals: Cook: I'm lean, but I want to be toned. My goal is a slightly bigger chest and defined mid section. I also want my body fat around 8 percent; as of the beginning of July it was 12 percent. I think my goal of toning up will automatically help me reach my body fat percentage goal.

Friesenhahn: I'm currently right below 8 percent body fat, but my new goal is

to boast a "lean and mean" 6.5 percent — a little bones showing never looked so good! I will say that making better nutritional choices, mostly organic, really helps.

Best "eat this, not that" tip: Friesenhahn: Well, instead of Krispy Kreme donuts or a starchy cereal, I replace it with whole fruits such as blueberries, a Pink Lady apple or grapefruit. As for my sweet tooth, I am in love with organic crunchy peanut butter with a banana or a piece of gluten free bread that has live sprouted grains. Friesenhahn: Evenings mostly, but just to mix it up I do like to attend the "crack of dawn" morning workouts as well.

How do you survive an outdoor workout in the Texas heat? Friesenhahn: My exercise group works out in the shade, unless we are running the typical mile required. Everyone brings the essentials like water and Gatorade. Sometimes [our trainer] brings ice when it's really hot. The main thing is to read your own body and take mini breaks to regroup. Other than that, I really enjoy sweating and releasing toxins.

Favorite spot in North Texas to exercise indoors: Cook: The L.A. Fitness by my work in Lewisville, because I don't feel like I'm being cruised the entire time.

If you could become an Olympian in any sport, what would it be and why: Cook: I've always wanted to do gymnastics. The parallel bars and tumbling are my favorite. I even took tumbling private [lessons] for a month when I was 20 and learned a back handspring in only four sessions.

Friesenhahn: Ice figure skating. The blend of artistry and athleticism is super challenging. I used to roller skate my long drive as a kid and pretend I was practicing for the next Olympics!

How do you reward yourself for a great work out: Friesenhahn: Two ways. First is a trip to Yumilicious. Then on to find an even more "skimpy" swimsuit to wear at the next pool get together.

Cook: I definitely don't eat badly afterwards because then I feel guilty and it's as if I just negated the entire work out. I reward myself by maybe buying something a little smaller and more fitting because I know I will look good in it. I also like to go lay out in my Speedo after a good week of working out because I feel confident with my body. Basically I reward myself by showing it off.


What do you jam out to? NPR or BPM on satellite radio. Sometimes it's Beethoven or Lady Gaga.

Queer punk pioneer Bob Mould turned an abusive childhood into a musical movement, but memoir targets hardcore fans



It all starts with "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star." It continues with the itsy-bitsy spider, the ABCs and being a little teapot. From there, you embrace whatever your older siblings are listening to

until you develop your own musical tastes. Maybe you started with records, moved on to the cassette tapes, CD and now, your iPod is full.

The point is, you've never been without your tunes.

But what about the people who make the music you love?

When Mould was born in 1960 in the northernmost end of New York, he entered a family wracked with grief: Just before he was born, Mould's elder brother died of kidney cancer. He surmises that the timing of his birth resulted in his being a "golden child," the family peacekeeper who sidestepped his father's physical and psychological abuse.

"As a child," he writes, "music was my es-

Mould's father, surprisingly indulgent, bought his son guitars and young Bob taught himself to play chords and create songs. By the time he entered high school, Mould knew that he had to get out of New York and away from

his family. He also knew he was gay, which would be a problem in his small hometown.

He applied for and entered college in Minnesota, where he started taking serious guitar lessons and drinking heavily. His frustrations led him to launch a punk rock band that made a notable impact on American indie music.

Named after a children's game, Hüsker Dü performed nationally and internationally, but Mould muses that perhaps youth was against them. He seemed to have a love-hate relationship with his bandmates, and though he had become the band's leader, there were resentments and accusations until the band finally split.

But there were other bands and there were other loves than music, as Mould grew and learned to channel the rage inside him and the anger that volcanoed from it.

'I spent two years rebuilding and reinventing myself," writes Mould. "Now that I've integrated who I am and what I do, I finally feel

this book. For most readers, though, See a Little Light is going to be a struggle. Mould spends a lot of time on a litany of clubs, recording studios, and locales he played some 30 years ago which is fine if you were a fellow

musician or a rabid, hardcore fan. This part of the book goes on... and on... and on, relentlessness and relatively esoteric in nature.

Admittedly, Mould shines when writing about his personal life but even so, he's strangely dismissive and abrupt with former loves, bandmates, and even family. I enjoyed the occasional private tale; unfortunately there were not

Overall, See a Little Light is great for Mould fanboys and those were heavy into the punk scene. For most readers, though, this book is way out of tune.





porary but by a refreshingly new, gay (and far hunkier) version of, say, Michael Bolton or Phil Collins. Well-polished songs beautifully showcase Zarley's vocal talents, on songs like "Perfect" and "Forgive Me (For Not Forgiving You)" which evidence a tenderness that makes it almost hard not to swoon along.

Dance tracks, though, don't do him justice nor add much to the album. His sexy talk in "Trust Me" is unconvincing. As the fifth song, *Change*, marks a small decline in making a bigger impression. The previous ballads, and even the album opener "WTF," are en-

gaging enough, but from "Trust" on, the songs almost disappear

"Apology" and "I'll Always Remember" display sweet emotion, but with ordinary skill. This is a shame; the album is well paced before it downshifts at this point. The fault though, is in the music. Lyrics resonate strongly and are probably my new go-to when I can't find the words to appease an angry or hurt boyfriend.

The title track suffers from cheese factor, but it is less a

Matt Zarley may be all scruff and muscle, but he has a sweet delicacy to his voice that's properly displayed on his newest album, **Change Begins With Me**. He's the product of Broadway, but it would seem his sights are on the music charts.

Back in May, Zarley previewed his album with "WTF," a whimsical dance track that pitted an earnestly lovestruck singer against the man who done him wrong. The song is borderline silly, if fun, though the accompanying video was painful to watch.

For the most part, the tone of *Change* is adult contem-

self-help tune than an admission of bad love-life decisions. Zarley holds himself accountable for mistakes he made as a gay man — I'm not sure I've heard that message recorded before. Sure, "Change" swells into a clichéd climactic chorus, but it's a fascinating juxtaposition from the lead song.

I'm not a big fan of remixes, but the two bonus tracks of "WTF" surpass the original. The beats are a helluva lot of fun to groove to. Instead of reworking the song into an unrecognizable version, the remixes amp up the rhythm and scale back on some of the gimmickry of the original.

With bumps along the way, Zarley provides a collection of songs that start him in a bad situation and result in a brighter tomorrow ... so much so that it may beg for an immediate second listen with some songs making more sense.

SHATTERED ICE

Adam Tyler

Adam Tyler describes himself as a pop music geek and it shows on his debut release **Shattered Ice**. This is a good thing. He sidesteps a lot of easy traps to deliver 11 tracks of wow.

On first impression, Ice opens as any other dance album in the "dime a dozen" category, but quickly, the opening track, "Like a Drug," moves into a techno-rock hybrid, hitting many correct notes. Tyler gives an onslaught of an opener that is held up by subsequent tracks.

The album leans more into electronica elements, but Tyler treats them with care, layering

bass-lines and blippy flourishes into solid sounds. "Music Freak" could have easily been a pedestrian effort, but he saves it by not adding extraneous effects. Tyler has a gift for letting the song build itself rather than throwing everything against the wall to see what will stick.

Tyler doesn't have the vocal strength of Zarley, but he belts within reason and recalls some of the quality of Paul Lekakis. He has enough depth to go slower on the opening of "I Won't Let You Go," while offering a healthy set of lungs on the title track. There isn't a lot of sur-

prise in his vocal spectrum. This provides a particular comfort and even consistency, as his music should keep listeners on their toes.

The blemishes on this album are minimal and perhaps expected from a debut. "Forgive Me" is weak with middle school lyrics. "Touch"

is a misguided track that begins with a keyboard track that sounds like a child trying to play ABBA's "Lay All Your Love On Me." Here, he makes the mistake of adding a little too much flair, and to a slower beat, it misses the bullseye.

The album recovers immediately with strong tracks like "Taking Back My Love" and "Let Me Breathe."

Shattered Ice finishes with minimal versions of previous tracks that calm the robust energy down. "I Won't Let You Go" on piano is a gorgeous ballad and "Forgive Me" fares far better as an acoustic tune than it did before in its electro incarnation. These add to Tyler's versatility.

For a debut, Tyler seems to have set a goal and met it, which would explain the amount of confidence in Ice. His songs don't play as mere musical byproducts in search of superstardom. He has a true genuine sound that pulls you in and when it lets go, you almost wish it didn't.

Thank goodness for the repeat button.

Son of a beach

A family vacation proves unexpectedly gay as Myrtle Beach, S.C., gets Pride

The trip to Myrtle Beach, S.C., had more to do with a family reunion than finding a good destination for gay travelers. After all, Myrtle Beach is a pretty lazy, conservative town in the perennial Red State, one where teenaged spring breakers and families gather to enjoy the warm surf and the resort-town appeal of seafood and beach-combing and overpriced cocktails. Queer travelers can hit one of the three gay bars, all within blocks of each other — Club Traxx, Time Out! and the Rainbow House (a lesbian club).

But the weekend I arrived , just by coincidence, it turned out to be Gay Pride.

Keep in mind, the gay community in Myrtle Beach is small, so "Gay Days," plural, felt more like Gay Day, singular: One major event and then life as usual in Coastal Carolina.

The major event, though, was an ambitious one: Gathering members of the LGBT community and their allies to form a "human rainbow flag:" People signed up to wear a pastel-colored T-shirt and arrange themselves in the traditional configuration. A few others wore black, forming the flagpole.

The entire event was threatened by showers late Friday and early Saturday, but despite a slightly muddy field, nearly 200 people turned out, huddled closely on a muggy afternoon, while a photographer flew above in a helicopter.

Numbers weren't uniform; there were too many reds and too few purples; but the effect was one of a flag waving in the breeze.

In order to do the shoot, members faced each


other before bending forward to allow the broad field of their shirts to form the colors. Directly across from me stood Elke Kennedy, a resident of Greenville in the Upstate. Elke and her husband established SeansLastWish.org, raising awareness of anti-gay violence, after their gay son was beaten to death and his killer spent less than a year in jail.

Elke spoke at a rally following the photoshoot, and dozens in attendance listened to her recount

her son's harrowing attack and death before two drag queens performed and a DJ spun dance hits. People started to file out after a while, off to the beach, or the clubs, or even the boardwalk, where the Texas Star-like Skywheel gives great views of the beach ... and sits next door to the campily named souvenir shop the Gay Dolphin.

The latter was always may favorite place when I was growing up; you'd think my parents would have caught on sooner.
