#### LGBT allies Hicks, Veazey seek new congressional seat

A federal court in San Antonio today released a map of proposed new congressional districts for Texas

The proposed map from the court (the North Texas section is shown above) includes four new congressional seats resulting from reapportionment. One of the seats is a Democratic district in eastern Tarrant County.

Shortly after the court released its map, Fort Worth City Councilwoman Kathleen Hicks announced that she plans to run for the new District 33 congressional seat. Hicks, whose district includes the Rainbow Lounge, was an outspoken supporter of the LGBT community in the wake of the police raid of the gay bar in 2009.

'The Federal Court in San Antonio has released new proposed maps for the 2012 Texas Congressional Elections.," Hicks said on Facebook. "District 33 has been drawn within Tarrant County and includes much of the City of Fort Worth. Today, I am announcing my intent to seek a place on the ballot with the Texas Democratic Party for this Congressional District, pending a final map from the court."

UPDATE: Gay Fort Worth City Councilman Joel Burns, who lives in the new District 33, announced he is not running for the seat. Burns said he'll instead endorse State Rep. Marc Veasey, who apparently plans to run against Hicks:

"To all who've called in the last hour, I am NOT running for new 33rd Congressional District announced this morning," Burns wrote. "[Husband] J.D. [Angle] and I both are proud to announce our endorsements of Rep Marc Veasey in his 1st run for Congress. I believe in Marc & know he will be a great Congressman & the best choice for Fort Worth & Arlington."

Veasey is also a strong LGBT ally. He has repeatedly sponsored a bill backed by Equality Texas calling for a study on implementation of the James Byrd Jr. Hate Crimes Act. Veasey also had an openly gay chief of staff, and he gave an impassioned speech on the House floor earlier this year against an anti-gay bill.

#### MLB to add sexual orientation after letter from RCD

Major League Baseball is set to ban anti-gay discrimination as part of a new collective bargain ing agreement to be released, following a request

from Resource Center Dallas. Last month, after the National Football League added sexual orientation to its nondiscrimination policy, Resource Center's Rafael McDonnell penned a letter to MLB Commissioner Bud Selig calling for pro baseball to follow suit.

McDonnell received responses from both Selia and MLB Executive Vice President Robert Man-

"While it is my policy not to comment on matters currently on the table, I think it is safe to say the issue you have raised will be addressed in a positive way," Manfred wrote to McDonnell on

The New York Daily News is reporting that the new MLB collective

bargaining agreement does in fact ban anti-gay discrimination. From the Daily News: Major League

issue. The new collective bargaining agreement adds "sexual orientation" to its section on discrimination, a person with direct knowledge of the agreement told the Daily News.

Article XV, Section A of the MLB's expiring Basic Agreement, in effect from 2006-2011, states: "The provisions of this Agreement shall be applied to all Players covered by this Agreement without regard to race, color, religion or national origin."

In the new agreement, which will be made public Tuesday afternoon, the words "sexual orientation" will be added to the equivalent section.

McDonnell has also written a letter to the National Basketball Association calling for the NBA to ban anti-gay discrimination, but he said he has yet to receive a response.

Major League Soccer added sexual orientation protections in 2004, while the National Hockey League did so in 2005.



## Valdez gearing up for re-election bid

Nation's only lesbian Latina sheriff to seek 3rd term says she expects to once again be a GOP target

Seven years ago, she became the first female, first Hispanic and — of course — the first openly LGBT person elected sheriff of Dallas County.

She remains the only lesbian Latina sheriff in the nation, and she's one of only two female sheriffs in the state.

But as she prepares to seek a third four-year term in 2012, Lupe Valdez said she no longer gives much thought to her pioneering status.

"I don't even pay attention to that anymore," the 64-year-old Valdez said recently. "What I want to hear is, 'She's a good sheriff.' What I want to hear is, 'She's making a difference.' What I want to hear is, 'Changes are for the better.' That's what I want to hear.

"It doesn't matter whether I'm Latina or les bian or whatever I am.

"The important thing is that we put in place a good, functioning sheriff's department, which is what we've done."

In 2004, Valdez was one of four Democrats — along with three judges — who broke a Republican lock on countywide elected office. Her victory over Republican Danny Chandler shook the Dallas establishment and served as a

## TX Dems won't vote on marriage in 2012

Party leaders opt against placing nonbinding resolution on primary ballot

AUSTIN — Democrats in Texas won't get to vote next year on whether they support samesex marriage, after the party's Executive Committee shot down a proposal to place a non-binding resolution on the March 2012 primary ballot.

Meeting in the capital on Saturday, Nov. 19, the State Democratic Executive Committee voted 33-22 against placing the resolution in support of same-sex marriage on the ballot, according to Dan Graney, president of the party's LGBT caucus

The resolution, backed by the Texas Stonewall Democratic Caucus, called for samesex couples to receive "equal access to civil marriage and all its benefits," and stated that "all state and federal laws denying such access

Should be repealed."

In addition to gauging

In addition to gauging support for marriage

equality among Democrats in Texas, the resolution was designed to boost interest and turnout in the primary, especially among young voters, given that President Barack Obama is running unopposed, Graney said.

However, some SDEC members feared backlash from the marriage resolution and said it could be used against Democratic candidates by their Republican opponents, Graney said.

"Unfortunately, many SDEC members are afraid to let Democratic voters have their say on issues they regard as too controversial," Graney said after the SDEC's vote. "Polling data shows that legal recognition of same-sex relationships is now supported by 63 percent of all Texans, so I don't understand the fear about allowing voters to weigh in on this."

Some openly LGBT members of the SDEC argued passionately in favor of the marriage resolution, Graney said. However, two openly gay SDEC members — both from Tarrant County — opposed it.

SDEC member DeeJay Johannessen, former president of Stonewall Democrats of Tarrant County, said he voted against placing the



## Gay couple shot near downtown apartment

Police say investigation is ongoing but decline to discuss details

David Zaragoza and Travis Vanderlaan were shot during a robbery near their Dallas Farmer's Market-area apartment at about 3 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 18

One of the victims was shot in the head and the other in the neck. Both are improving and expected to survive.

Two suspects were taken into custody soon after the incident.

According to friends, Zaragoza and Vanderlaan are a couple. The two live at the Camden Farmer's Market apartments in Downtown Dallas.

Police are releasing very little information about the shootings or the arrests.

"We don't want to jeopardize the investigation," said LGBT police liaison Laura Martin.

The names of the suspects arrested are being withheld by police, Martin said. Although she said that was unusual, she said it was because of the ongoing investigation.

She could not confirm if police are looking for additional suspects.

According to Dallas County jail records, however, one of the people taken into custody is Kyle Bibbs, 31, of Carrollton. He is being held in Lew Sterrett on \$100,000 bond for two counts of aggravated robbery.

Police would give no details about the robbery beyond what went into the police reports.

"The complainant was shot during the course of an aggravated robbery," said the police report. "Complainant was shot twice and robbed."

The report also indicates that a blue Puma messenger bag containing \$3,500 was taken during the robbery but recovered, apparently by police when they arrested the suspects.

Records from 9-1-1 indicate Vanderlaan called for help at 2:46 p.m. on Friday, reporting it as a shooting and robbery. Police were dispatched at 2:47 p.m.

Bibbs' time of arrest is also listed as 2:47 p.m.


Bibbs has had several prior charges. One case

Bibbs has had several prior charges. One case was no billed by the grand jury. One was dismissed. In February, he agreed to plead guilty on a possession of marijuana charge. Dallas County records indicate he had probation revoked for possession of marijuana and possession of a prohibited weapon.

The incident is not being investigated as a random shooting

Zaragoza is listed on police records making two calls to 9-1-1 earlier this year. No details appear on the reports but the signal codes indicate that one was to report a major disturbance and the other a burglary.



harbinger to the countywide Democratic sweep of 2006.

Since then, the county has remained solidly blue, and with President Barack Obama again atop the ballot, the incumbent sheriff is a heavy favorite to win re-election.

But Valdez, long a preferred target for Republicans as they seek to win back the county, said she isn't taking anything for granted. For

one, there are rumors she could again face a challenge in the Democratic Primary— as she did in 2008.

The candidate filing period begins Nov. 28 and

runs through Dec. 15.

"I'm worried about both," Valdez said when asked whether she's more concerned about the primary or the general election. "I don't ever assume anything. That's how you lose, so I never assume anything.

"I'm really hoping that I don't have a primary opponent."

Not having a challenger from within the party would allow her to "focus and save

money and go ahead and gather more money so I can hit whatever's coming on" in November, Valdez said. She confirmed recent reports saying her fundraising is lagging and that she's failed to amass much of a war chest.

"We all know that I'm going to be the [GOP's] target for Dallas County," Valdez said. "Last time I was the target for the state of Texas. I wouldn't doubt that's going to be the case again."

"We know there's a pendulum switch every so often," she added. "I'm not going to assume anything, because I may be right on that pendulum.

"And even in 2004, when a lot of Republicans were elected, I was elected. So that says to me, whichever way it goes, I need to work so that I can get elected. I don't assume anything. The only thing that I'm assuming is that I'm going to work as hard as I possibly can

The only Republican who's publicly declared his intent to run for sheriff, former State Rep. Thomas Latham, said this week he doesn't believe Dallas County is as blue as some may think.

"I think what this county has is a large number of swing voters," Latham said. "I think the flow is going the other way."

Latham said he believes Valdez's Republican challenger in 2008, Lowell Cannaday, "got caught up in the Obama situation."

"There was so much enthusiasm for him [Obama], and I don't think that enthusiasm exists any longer," Latham said. "I think the enthusiasm is now on the other side."

Latham, 64, a former commander for the Garland Police Department, called Valdez "a nice lady" but said she doesn't have the experience to effectively oversee the department.

"I think there's a lack of leadership in the sheriff's department," Latham said. "I think there are some management issues down there that need to be addressed."

In each of her previous election campaigns, Valdez has come under attack for her sexual orientation, and she said she fully expects that to happen again in 2012.

"What can they attack me on?" she said. "They can't say I'm not doing my job ... so what are they going to attack me on? 'She's a lesbian and she's trying to push the gay agenda.'

"Please tell me what the gay agenda is, so I can figure out how not to push it."

Latham, for his part, said he doesn't plan to bring up Valdez's sexual orientation and doesn't think it's an issue in the race.

But he added that if someone else brings it up, he'll respond by saying, "I wasn't raised that way."

Asked what he meant by that, Latham said: "I'm Southern Baptist. Southern Baptists don't believe in that."

resolution on the ballot because he didn't think it would accomplish the stated purpose of increasing voter turnout.

Johannessen said valuable resources would have been spent trying to get the resolution passed, even though it would have no practical impact.

Johannessen was joined in voting against the resolution by openly gay Tarrant County SDEC member Mary Edwards.

"My thoughts are that we should be dealing with issues about jobs and education and the economy," Johannessen said. "We need to be focused on issues where we can affect change.

"It wasn't about marriage equality," he said of his vote. "It was about whether or not putting this on the ballot would bring more people out to vote, and I didn't think that would happen."

Graney said he feels the majority of SDEC members support same-sex marriage. But he said a majority, like Johannessen, opposed the measure for strategic reasons.

The state Republican Party has placed resolutions on primary ballots in at least the last two election cycles, but Democrats have not, Graney said

Other resolutions voted on by the SDEC last weekend called for abolishing the death penalty, legalizing marijuana, passing the DREAM Act, mandating affordable college tuition and legalizing casino gambling.

The SDEC approved the resolutions related to the DREAM Act, college tuition and casino gambling, and they will appear on the March 6 primary ballot.

Graney noted that the marriage resolution received more support than those calling for abolishing the death penalty and legalizing marijuana, which got only 14 and 12 votes, respectively.

He also commended Texas Democratic Party Chairman Boyd Richie and Resolutions Committee Chairman Dennis Teal for allowing the full SDEC to consider the marriage resolution even though the committee voted against it.

"We had a 45-minute discussion and debate on the issue," Graney said. "They could have squashed it, but they didn't."

Although their votes drew attention because they're openly gay, Johannessen and Edwards weren't the only SDEC members from North Texas who opposed the resolution.

In fact, only one of six SDEC members from Dallas County — Theresa Daniel — voted in favor of placing the marriage resolution on the ballot, according to Omar Narvaez, president of Stonewall Democrats of Dallas.

Daniel, a straight LGBT ally and Stonewall member, is running for the Precinct 1 seat on the Dallas County Commissioners Court in 2012.

Erin Moore of Dallas, vice president of the Texas Stonewall Democratic Caucus, is a non-voting SDEC member and spoke in support of the marriage resolution during Saturday's meeting.

"We just thought this was the perfect opportunity to get the pulse of the electorate again," Moore said of the resolution.

Regardless of whether the resolution appears on the ballot, Moore said, Republicans will try to attack Democrats over gay rights, and voters will ask candidates about their views on same-sex marriage.

Moore said she thinks the SDEC's vote against placing the resolution on the ballot amounted to Democrats "running scared instead of running strong."

"They're scared of losing what we've got, which is very little," she said.

The tally was based on a headcount of SDEC members who stood up, and there is no written record of how each person voted. But both Moore and Graney recalled a clear demographic split over the marriage equality resolution.

They said most members who opposed the resolution were older white males, and they called for the party to respond by electing more progressives and minorities to the SDEC next year.

"The SDEC needs to look like Texas is now, not like Texas was," Moore said.

Chuck Smith, deputy director of Equality Texas, said he also would have liked to see the resolution on the ballot.

Smith said opponents of LGBT equality frequently point to results from 2005, when three-fourths of Texas voters supported a constitutional amendment banning both same-sex marriage and civil unions.

"We would like to see every candidate for every office asked where they stand on marriage equality," Smith said. "It's a subject we need to talk about, and the more we talk about it, the more we're going to find how significantly the numbers have changed since six years ago."

## It's beginning to look a lot like Black Friday

Merchants talk about the importance of the day after Thanksgiving to the overall health of their business

Although most gay shopkeepers don't approach Black Friday with the same frenzied mentality as mainstream retailers, the day after Thanksgiving is nonetheless important to their

To get the edge of those holiday shopping dollars, big box stores have been opening earlier and earlier. Wal-Mart even announced its Friday hours will begin on Thursday this year.

Dallas' LGBT retailers haven't turned the day into that kind of maniacal hysteria, but gay merchants on Cedar Springs Road and in the Bishop Arts District want customers to know they depend on good sales this weekend, too.

"Oh my God! It's very important," Skivvies owner David Richardson of the day-after-Thanksgiving shopping rush.

He said that he and partner Todd Seaton get to the store three hours early that day to start setting up, and business starts the minute they open the doors. He schedules extra help for the day and stays in the store himself from open until close to help answer questions, work the register and bag

"We'll have discounts on some groups of merchandise throughout the store," Richardson said, but every category sells well that day.

Black Friday accounts for as much as 20 percent of the Christmas season sales at Skivvies.

"It can be the biggest day of the year," Richardson said. Only the day before Halloween rivals it.

Nuvo salesperson Daneen Foster agreed. She said she expected her store to be busy from open until close on Black Friday, even without any spe-

cial promotions.

"We're just going to be here with our fabulous merchandise, free gift wrapping and a knowledgeable, helpful and friendly staff," she said.

TapeLenders owner Mark Milburn said, "This is the first time we've publicized Black Friday spe-

In the past, he hasn't noticed a big spike in business, but he said he thinks his "buy one, get one free" offer on adult videos and an additional 10 percent off on clearance items would especially

Things are a little different for OutLines.

"It's not one of our busier days, like at the malls," owner David Lester said.

He said that for the past three years, Black Friday has been no better than any other Friday at OutLines. However, to boost sales over the holiday weekend this year, Lester planned to open the store from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. on Thanksgiving Day.

During those four hours last year, he said, he did more business than on the traditional shopping day. He said that specials would be offered throughout the store during the weekend.

"But our biggest weekend is Pride," Lester said. "And First Wednesday is always a good night for





## **Buli now under new ownership**

New owners say they plan to update the interior but keep the Buli name and format.

Scott Whittall sold his Cedar Springs Road coffee shop, Buli, to new owners this week and will resign as president of the Cedar Springs Merchants Association.

New owners Robert Clawson and Rob Auman are partners and plan to retain Buli's format.

"These were two long-time, loyal customers who wanted to purchase Buli," said Whittall. "They want to see it remain Buli."

Last week, Clawson and Auman signed a lease with the property owner and Whittall got a release from his obligation for the store from the landlord. Sale of store assets should take place this

"In the beginning, we're going to run it the same way," Clawson said.

Over the next three to six months, Clawson said they would redesign and update some of the interior. He said that they plan to replace the bar top to give the shop a new look.

"But we're going to continue to be Buli," he

Whittall said they had talked about extending hours and some additions to the menu, but those changes would also not be immediate.

Dec. 1 is the planned takeover date, but Whittall will continue working at the café for several weeks after to help with the transition and to finish some planned events and catering jobs.

Earlier this year, Whittall tried to expand his business into a neighboring space formerly occupied by a hair salon. He applied for a liquor license but the city requires more parking for restaurants and bars than for retail and service

By doubling the space, Whittall would have had to provide four times as many parking

When he couldn't secure the necessary extra parking, Whittall was released from his option for the additional space and withdrew his Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission application. He said he thought about reapplying for a TABC license and turning his original space into a piano

During this time, Clawson and Auman told Whittall that they'd be interested in purchasing the café. Whittall told them at the time that it wasn't for sale.



## Republicans tout support for 'traditional values'

Candidates jockey for position as most anti-gay at forum sponsored by 'family values' groups

Current Republican presidential frontrunner Newt Gingrich used a right-wing Christian forum Saturday, Nov. 19, to claim "the left" is trying to "drive out the existence of traditional religions ... and use the government to repress the American people against their own values."

He made the comment in the context of a discussion about whether religious-oriented adoption agencies should be allowed to refuse adoptions to same-sex couples. Some states, such as Massachusetts, have cut off government funding to adoption groups that refuse to obey state laws prohibiting discrimination based on sexual


At that same event, Texas Gov. Rick Perry said that gay couples in Texas cannot adopt, which isn't true, strictly speaking. Gays and lesbians can adopt as individuals, and in most cases, that person's partner can do a second-parent adoption separately.

Without referring to gay groups or the LGBT community specifically, Gingrich lashed out against a movement that, since the 1960s, has gone from "a request for tolerance to an imposition of intolerance ... [and] closing down those with traditional values."

Gingrich said he would support a law that would cut off "all federal funding to any jurisdiction that discriminates against religious beliefs in that format."


The forum was the "Iowa Thanksgiving Family Forum," sponsored by the Family Leader group of Iowa, as well as the National Organization for

## Donovan says trans equality is a priority, not an issue

HUD secretary becomes first cabinet member to address transgender event with his speech at NCTE anniversary celebration

U.S. Secretary of Housing and Urban Development Shaun Donovan became the first United States cabinet secretary to address a transgender event when he gave the keynote speech Nov. 15 at the eighth anniversary celebration of the National Center for Transgender Equality.

Mara Keisling, executive director of NCTE, told Keen News Service, "Having Secretary Donovan keynote our event is an important symbolic and historic advance for transgender Americans."

Keisling said that having a cabinet member address the group "really shows tremendous societal movement." She attributes this progress to "all the great education that transgender people and allies are doing all over the country.

"It's added up to a lot more visibility and understanding," said Keisling.

Prior to Donovan's appearance, the highest federal official to address NCTE was Kathy Greenlee, assistant secretary for aging at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Greenlee spoke at the organization's policy conference in March.

And Lynn Rosenthal, the White House advisor on violence against women, met with NCTE staff and other transgender advocates Nov. 16 to discuss violence against transgender people.

But Donovan's speech, at the historic Mayflower Hotel in Washington, D.C., garnered almost no attention in the mainstream press.

HUD included a copy of his speech on its Web site. And, following his speech, Donovan spoke to a reporter from the Washington, D.C., gay newspaper Metro Weekly.

When asked whether he supports marriage equality, Donovan replied "absolutely." He also agreed with the reporter's suggestion that marriage equality should be the subject of "more work" in a second Obama administration.

But at NCTE's annual event, Donovan spoke of the Obama administration's accomplishments towards equality for transgender people. He said the administration is the first to view the fight for transgender equality "not as an issue — but as a priority."

Quoting figures from a February 2011 study by NCTE and the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, Donovan said an estimated 1-in-5 transgender Americans have been refused a

gender identity.

Such protections are needed, Donovan said, because of experiences such as that of Mitch and Michelle DeShane. When Michelle wanted to add her partner Mitch, a transgender man, to her housing voucher, the local housing authority refused because the couple did not meet its definition of "family." It referred them to a neighboring housing authority, which, they said, "accepts everyone — even Martians."

"That's just wrong," Donovan said.

Donovan said "the most significant step" HUD has taken to address this type of discrimination has been proposing new regulations to "ensure transgender individuals and couples can be eligible for our public housing and Housing Choice Voucher programs that collectively serve 5.5 million people."

The proposed rule would prohibit owners and operators of HUD-assisted or -financed housing from inquiring about applicants' sexual orientation or gender identity, and prevent them from excluding otherwise eligible families if one or more members is or is perceived to be LGBT.

It would also prevent lenders from using the sexual orientation or gender identity of an applicant as a basis to determine eligibility for Federal Housing Administration mortgages, which represent one-third of all new mortgages in the country.

Donovan said that HUD is still reviewing comments before final publication of the rule.

A HUD spokesperson said that the agency can't say exactly when the final rule will be published, since it must also be reviewed by the Office of Management and Budget.





Marriage and Focus on the Family. Its format was an "around the family table" kind of conversation with Gingrich and five other Republican presidential hopefuls, including Ron Paul, Michele Bachmann, Rick Santorum, Herman Cain and Perry.

Mitt Romney, who has been eschewing most Iowa events, declined an invitation.

The candidates responded to questions from a moderator and from several representatives of the host groups, including Brian Brown of the National Organization for Marriage. The topics centered around such broad themes as values, morality and liberty, with a strong bent toward the view that the country is divided into conservatives — who are all happy, God-loving citizens — and liberals, who are all sad and out to destroy religious freedom.

As has become his routine, Santorum boasted about his superiority in the GOP field when it comes to opposing marriage between same-sex couples. Same-sex marriage, he said, "radically changes the entire moral fabric of our country.

"Gay marriage is wrong," said Santorum. "As Abraham Lincoln said, the states do not have the right to do wrong. ... America is an ideal. It's not just a Constitution."

But only Cain spoke up when Brown solicited responses for what each candidate would do, as president, if the U.S. Supreme Court should overturn the Defense of Marriage Act.

Cain said he would "lead the charge to overturn the Supreme Court." After some prodding from the moderator, Gingrich did offer up that he thought it important to "make DOMA not appealable" in the courts.

Brown's questions came near the end of the

two-hour event, held at the First Federated Church in Des Moines. His first, directed to Rep. Paul, was whether he would support an amendment to the federal Constitution to ban same-sex marriage. It was an odd question, given that Paul has for years been on record publicly as opposing such an amendment and voted against it in 2004.

Paul reiterated his opposition, noting that he believes generally that the issue should be left to the states or, preferably, to individual churches and families.

But Paul added that he does support DOMA. Brown then asked other candidates to explain why they believe a federal marriage amendment is necessary. Santorum jumped in with a recap of his strategy to "stop this problem" through battles state by state. Bachmann touted her own leadership against same-sex marriage in Minnesota.

The forum was marked by dramatically emotional moments in which the candidates shared personal stories related to their faith.

Santorum acknowledged having decided to keep an emotional distance from his infant daughter who he believed would soon die in order to avoid the pain of the potential loss.

Herman Cain talked about what it was like to hear that he had stage four cancer.

Michele Bachmann recalled what it was like, as a child, to watch her mother sell the family's dishes and other possessions after she divorced Bachmann's father.

The moderator, Fox News contributor Frank Luntz, and news reports indicated 3,000 people were in attendance at the forum. The chief sponsor, The Family Leader, helped organize last year's ousting of three Iowa Supreme Court justices who voted with the unanimous court to say the state constitution required equal treatment of same-sex and heterosexual couples under marriage laws.

with guidance that they can pursue cases of housing discrimination when a person's identity or expression doesn't conform with gender stereotypes, because such discrimination violates the Fair Housing Act's ban on sex-based discrimination.

The act is a pivotal civil rights act that prohibits discrimination based on race, color, religion, national origin, sex, disability and familial status — but does not specifically cover sexual orientationor gender identity-based discrimination.

Since that guidance was issued in July 2010, Donovan said, the number of complaints from LGBT individuals to HUD about housing discrimination has increased 15 times compared to the same date range the previous year, according to HUD.

Donovan also said that HUD is working to better understand the challenges that transgender people face. It included a session on gender identity- and sexual orientation-based housing discrimination in its annual National Fair Housing Policy Conference this year, and launched the first-ever

national study of LGBT housing discrimination.


A HUD spokesperson said the target date for publication of the study is late 2012.

Donovan also spoke of accomplishments by the broader Obama administration, where, he said, "the LGBT community has had a seat at the table since day one."

He cited the administration's "record number of LGBT appointments," including openly transgender appointees; the Office of Personnel Management's prohibition of discrimination on the basis of gender identity in federal employment; the Veterans Administration's directive for non-discriminatory care for transgender veterans; the State Department's efforts "to ensure greater dignity and privacy" for transgender passport applicants; and the Matthew Shepard and James Byrd Jr. Hate Crimes Prevention law.

NCTE's Keisling said, "Secretary Donovan's presence echoes what we at NCTE have long known about HUD and the rest of the Obama administration, and that is that transgender people matter. We are a priority for the administration, and it shows in the policies that we are winning."














DFW Sisters will once again mark World AIDS Day by taking their Veil of Remembrance into the community for signatures

Names have power. And for those who have lost a loved one to AIDS, being able to write those names down and know the memories those names evoke will be preserved and treasured in doing so, can be powerful medicine for healing.

The DFW Sisters, Abbey of the Lone Star, will once again give members of DFW's LGBT community the opportunity to exercise that healing when they take to the streets on World AIDS Day with their Veil of Remembrance.

"It's our way of honoring those we've lost and making sure their memories live on," explained Sister Ophelia Nutz, mistress of rituals and ceremonies for the DFW Sisters. The Veil is a plain white cloth that Sister Ophelia will wear attached to her headdress. Anyone who has lost someone to HIV/AIDS is welcome to write that person's name on the Veil.

The DFW Sisters, a fully professed house of The Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence elevated by The United Nuns Privy Council in October, created their first Veil of Remembrance last year as they marked their first World AIDS Day as an officially recognized Sisters mission.

"We spent most of the day last year at JPS Hospital in Fort Worth, participating in their World AIDS Day event," Sister Ophelia said. "They had just lost a fairly prominent community member there to AIDS, and once they found out what we were doing, what the Veil was for, everyone there wanted to sign it."

After that event, the sisters came back to Dallas, taking the Veil into the bars here.

"People reacted to the Veil as if it weren't that big of a deal really — until they thought of someone they had lost," Sister Ophelia said. "But when they were told that they could write that person's name on the Veil, that they could write down that memory, some people got very emotional. There's more than one tear stain on that Veil, I promise you. Some people were too emotional to even sign it themselves, so they asked me to write down a name and a date for them."

This year, she said, the sisters will start the day by taking the Veil to the noon hot meals program lunch at Resource Center Dallas. Then they will head to Fort Worth for World AIDS Day events at the Tarrant County Health Department, before coming back to Dallas to participate in the World AIDS Day events being held in downtown Dallas

The sisters will wind up the night by taking the Veil to the bars in Dallas.

"We'll just meander, handing out pens and gathering signatures on the Veil," Sister Ophelia said.

Sister Ophelia said that she wore the Veil throughout the day on World AIDS Day last year, and will do so again this year. But when the sisters head out next Thursday, they will do so with a new Veil, ready for more names and memories.

Last year's Veil, Sister Ophelia said, was retired at the end of the night, just as this year's Veil will be.

She said the sisters will start the day by "saying a few words to kind of sanctify the veil, make it ready to hold those precious memories." And at the end of the night, they will once again gather to honor the memories this year's Veil will hold.

"Afterwards, in a more private ritual, we will gather to read the names on the Veil and to light candles in their memory," Sister Ophelia said. "At the end, we will have a ceremony to fold the Veil and put it away. We take good care of the Veils; we hold them close and dear to us, just like those who signed it hold their lost loved ones close and dear."

#### The Sistory

The Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence were born in San Francisco in 1979 when, tired of the monotony of the city's ever-present "clone" trend, three men donned nuns' habits (given in 1976 by a convent of Roman Catholic nuns to a group in Iowa called the Sugar Plum Fairies for a production of The Sound of Music, and a year later transported to San Francisco by Ken Bunch, who later became Sister Vicious Power Hungry Bitch) and headed out to the local nude beach on Easter weekend.

By the end of the year, their ranks had grown and they chose the name Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence, adopting as their mission statement, "to promulgate universal joy and expiate stigmatic

The sisters participated in a variety of activities, from performing their pom-pom routine at the first Gay Olympics (now the Gay Games), to protesting the Three Mile Island nuclear plant to staging a gay disco/bingo fundraiser for gay Cuban refugees.

But by 1981, AIDS had begun to emerge as the LGBT community's biggest, most devastating threat, even though it wasn't yet called AIDS. The sisters produced the world's first fundraiser for an AIDS organization that year, a dog show that featured singer Sylvester as one of the judges.

By 1982, San Francisco was at crisis levels, and two sisters, Florence Nightmare and Roz Erection, both registered nurses, worked with other medical professionals to create "Play Fair!," a safer-sex pamphlet intended to help curb the spread of "the gay cancer" and other STDs.

As the epidemic grew, the sisters fought harder, doing their best to spread the word not just about preventing AIDS but about LGBT equality in general. But the disease was taking its toll: "In 1984, '85, the sisters in San Francisco had about 16 members. Within a year, that number had dropped to four, because people were dying so fast from AIDS," Sister Ophelia said.

"That's why the sisters always have a purse full of safe sex kits," she added. "And since the Dallas County health department stopped doing it, we are the only ones in Dallas handing out free condoms."

#### More than camp

While many people may think of the Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence as little more than campy entertainment, for the sisters themselves, it is serious business, Sister Ophelia said.

"For a lot of us, for most of us, this is a real calling, a way to give something back to the community," she said. "This isn't just something we do for fun. And it's not something just anyone can do. There's a whole process you have to go through to be a sister, and we have a packet that everyone who wants to be a sister has to read right at the start that explains the cost, so that they know what is involved.

"There's just so much more to it than people realize," Sister Ophelia added. "People just don't realize everything that goes in to being a sister."

She points to another "veil" the sisters offer up - the Veil of Shame — as an example of how the sisters serve their community as so much more than just comic relief.

On the Veil of Shame, Sister Ophelia said, the sisters invite people to write down "every hateful, mean thing that has ever been said to them or done to them, to write that down and let it go. We offer to bear that burden for them, and afterwards, we take the veil out and we have a ceremony to burn it, to release all that negative energy and to let that

"The last time we did the Veil of Shame, I had several people tell me how much easier they felt after writing that stuff down," she added. "And I have to tell you, to wear that veil, to carry around all that pain — it took everything I had in me not to break down and start bawling my eyes out."

Even without the Veil of Remembrance or the Veil of Shame, Sister Ophelia said that when the sisters go out in their garb, they often serve as a kind of spiritual advisor and confessor for the people

"If I go out to a bar in my regular clothes, just as myself, I am not going to have strangers walk up to me and start telling me their problems. But when we go out as the sisters, people come up to us all the time and they will tell us their deepest, darkest secrets. And we have to be ready to help them," Sister Ophelia said.


"We've all had what we call 'a sister moment," when something like that has happened to us," she continued. "Maybe it's because of the sense of anonymity we have when we go out in our makeup and our habits. I think that maybe that makes it easier for people to approach us. At least, it's easier for those who aren't afraid of clowns!"

And despite their camp antics and outrageous makeup and costumes, despite the fact that they are just men looking for a way to give something back to their community, Sister Ophelia said, when someone comes to them in need, whatever the need is, the sisters will answer the call.

"We have to be able to offer them help, to give them resources, to give them somewhere to go to get the help they need," she said. "After all, that's why we're there."

## Knowledge is power

A generation of young people have never known a world without AIDS. but their complacency means new infections continue

eople who weren't yet born when AIDS first emerged are today most at risk for becoming HIV positive — an alarming development that underscores how essential

awareness is, especially as we approach World AIDS Day, Dec. 1.

From 2006 to 2009, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported that the HIV incidence rate for Americans between 13 and 29 years old increased by about 21 per-

cent. In fact, most of the new HIV infections reported in this country involve people under 30.

Americans under 30 have never known a world without AIDS. At the same time, they've



never really known a time when effective treatment for HIV and AIDS wasn't available. This hasn't always been the case. As this disease turns 30, we need to ensure that people — especially younger people — remain aware of AIDS and how to prevent it.

AIDS awareness is one of the biggest challenges we face when trying to prevent it. After 30 years of addressing what was once considered one of America's most pressing health problems, AIDS is no longer front page news. But on this World AIDS Day, let's not forget that about 56,000 Americans become infected with HIV each year, according to the CDC, and that more than 14,000 Americans with AIDS die each year.

Thanks to more effective and more available treatments, more Americans who have HIV and AIDS are able to live. The CDC estimates this number at more than 1 million nationwide. Regularly testing people most at risk for HIV - and then providing antiretroviral drugs for HIV/AIDS patients — dramatically reduces the number of new infections.

Preventing HIV is not complicated. If you're sexually active, get tested. Don't use IV drugs or share needles. Abstain or practice safer sex.

With preventive care, patients and their health care providers can fight and manage this disease and slow its spread. But we can't allow today's more effective treatments to make us complacent or ambivalent, or to lessen our resolve to find a cure.

## The Republican shuffle continues

Presidential candidates' standing in polls undergoes another change as 'fringe' candidate Paul rises

or entertainment's sake, it just doesn't get any better than watching Republican candidates vying for the 2012 presidential nomination give it their all — or lack of it — for a national TV audience.

Texas Congressman Ron Paul, who is now polling as a frontrunner in Iowa and New Hampshire, is the most recent to take center stage after months of sharing his political views on the sidelines and being dismissed as a "fringe" candidate by the political establishment and the national media.

Judging from his appearance on CBS' Face the Nation broadcast Sunday, Nov. 20, he intends to make the most of it.

TV news host Bob Schieffer often showed signs of exasperation as he struggled to get in the last word during the interview with the

because of the influence of "flawed" U.S. foreign policy on other nations, and he placed the blame on U.S. "policy makers."

The nation's 12,000 diplomats should be put to work in improving relations with countries like Iran rather than trying to scare other countries' leaders into submission, said Paul, who is a medical doctor in addition to being a politician. Sanctions against other countries are a bad idea because they are a preamble to war, he

In connection with his peaceful approach to foreign affairs, Paul said if he were elected president, he would close the 900 military bases the U.S. now operates in 130 countries and bring the troops home to protect the country. Because the U.S. is "bankrupt," Paul said he also would shut down several federal agencies, including the departments of energy, education, interior, commerce, HUD and FEMA.

On top of that, Paul said he wants to reduce the federal workforce across the board by 10 percent.

Clearly, Paul has thought his proposal through more carefully than Gov. Perry, who near-fatally embarrassed himself in a recent debate, because the congressman can remember the names of all the agencies he wants to close.

But what on earth is going to happen to all of those federal employees when they are put out of work, and what is to become of the programs they administer?

This can't be a popular idea with federal employees, who make up the largest workforce in the U.S., and members of the U.S. Armed Serv-

ices. When you add in all of the relatives and friends of people who are on the federal payroll, it's possible that Paul's numbers are going to fall as fast as they suddenly rose.

Paul's stand on LGBT issues didn't come up during the interview, but they wouldn't appeal to anyone who considers advancement of them critical in voting for a presidential candidate, according to his past statements about marriage equality.

Paul is opposed to legalization of same-sex marriage, and he supports the Defense of Marriage Act.

In contrast, Paul opposes a constitutional amendment to protect the current definition of marriage, but that is likely based on a wide-spread belief that the document should be inviolate.

He did support the repeal of "don't ask, don't tell" so he has gained some LGBT voter support.

On other progressive issues, Paul's views are similarly divergent.

With a medical background in gynecology, he is pro-life and opposed to abortions, yet he supports home-schooling and the legalization and regulation of marijuana and other drugs.

At this point, the most recent national poll by USA Today/Gallup is showing that former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney and former House Speaker Newt Gingrich, at 20 percent and 19 percent respectively, are tied for the top spot in the race for the Republican presidential nomination.

They are trailed by businessman Herman Cain at 16 percent, Paul at 10 percent, Perry at 8 percent, Minnesota Rep. Michelle Bachmann at 5 percent and former Utah Gov. Jon Huntsman and former Pennsylvania Sen. Rick Santorum at 1 percent each. And with the exception of Paul, they are all virulently anti-LGBT.

Of course, those figures could go absolutely anywhere during the next year.

Perry and Bachmann were once frontrunners, and Gingrich has seen his fortunes rise, fall and rise again since he announced his candidacy.

Allegations of past sexual harassment will likely bring down Cain, and Gingrich's past association as a highly-paid "consultant" for federal housing agencies Freddie Mac and Fannie Mae will likely prove to be his undoing.

Rep. Ron Paul

Romney's numbers have remained more stable than the other candidates, and he seems to carry less baggage. That has led many to speculate that the former Massachusetts governor

But for now it's Paul's turn in the spotlight, and that's likely to make for some pretty intriguing debates when the seven candidates get on stage together in the coming days as the media pays more attention to the Texas congressman.

will eventually wind up with the nomination.

It will be interesting to see if they remember their goal is to prevent President Obama's reelection or if they succumb to another dogfight.

## Let 'em eat cake

Drag-queen-cum-pastry-chef **Chad Fitzgerald** rocks TLC — and now Oak Lawn — with his baking prowess

In what used to be a butcher shop, Chad Fitzgerald sits in the back room of a storefront now called The Cake Guys. The dark red walls of the bakery make for a cozy, elegant ambience, but the cakes take center stage: Towering confections with ornate scrollwork, rhinestones, peacocks and chocolate-covered strawberries are jaw dropping. Despite his calm demeanor as he strolls through his shop, Fitzgerald and his cakes are about to be seen on a much bigger stage.

"The producers told us when the show airs, life will change," Fitzgerald says.

"The show" is the second season of *Next Great Baker*, which debuts Tuesday on TLC, with Fitzgerald among the contestants.

The path from kitchen to TV studio has been a long one for Fitzgerald. As a kid, he would head to his grandmother's house after school in Hereford, Texas, where he picked up her creative skills. At her knee, he learned ceramics and sewing, but it was her baking that really nabbed his attention.

"She completely influenced that," he says. "She bought me pans and decorating tips and my first mixer while I was in high school. I ended up going to culinary school at Oklahoma State University but I didn't like it — I already knew how to make cakes; I didn't want to do any of the other chef stuff."

Fitzgerald received a degree in education at West Texas A&M. Baking became a hobby as Fitzgerald took up teaching for 21 years. Bak-

ing re-emerged seriously in 2003, when he and his partner, Edward Navejas, began The Cake Guys out of their garage.

It quickly boomed. They opened a full-service shop in Duncanville in 2008, and have just expanded to Oak Lawn, which led Fitzgerald to make a major decision.

"There were not enough hours in the day and I was overwhelmed," he says. "I'd teach, bake till 3 a.m. and get up to go to work. When I resigned this month, everyone told me they were surprised it wasn't sooner."

The Duncanville location is now a production facility; they handle all the cake orders — mostly from bridal parties — out of their Oak Lawn location.

A few years ago, Fitzgerald and Navejas started applying to appear on chef-based reality shows. They had the talent, but never made the cut, until a casting director for TLC called to ask them to try out for *Next Great Baker*.

"I got that call and I told them that we'll apply," he says. "But they needed something by that night. This was in May or June. It was a very long app, but I stayed true to myself."

By staying true, he means he let his natural tone come out, freely peppering *LOL* and *LMAO* throughout his answers, and not sounding pretentious. But it was the question "What would set you apart?" that acted as a mini-crossroads. In other applications, he'd held back, revealing some personal details, thinking his baking skills should be all that mattered. This time, he decided to go all-in.

"It was do-or-die, so I sent in pics and videos of me doing drag," he laughs. "I also bawled talking about my grandma, who died two years ago. It was about 6:30 p.m. when I sent it

in, and the casting agent called me around 7:15. She told me was the best application so far." With more than 10, 000 applicants in the mix, Fitzgerald "started feeling good about it," he says.

Fitzgerald then flew to New York for a screen test and oncamera interview. There he met Buddy Valastro, better known as the Cake Boss.

"I had a fabulous time doing that," he smiles. "And they made me do a drag number on video — as a guy! I had told them I was Miss Texas USA At-Large and Miss USA At-Large in 1996 as Stacy Holiday." On July 31, Fitzgerald got the phone call.

"They said 'Congratulations, you're one of the Season 2 contestants,'" he recalls. "I started crying, of course. I called the staff and just said 'I made it! I made it!"

Typical of reality TV, the show only now is airing, though the competition ended weeks ago. Fitzgerald has been baking away, waiting to see how life just might change as a result of the competition. He's already noticed some changes (a

few autograph requests), but he'll know better once the series begins airing.

"Other contestants thought I was a cheater because I had my trinkets and gadgets," he says. "But I'm a planner. Other contestants

came with three bags [of supplies]; I shipped 38 boxes. I took an aquarium, strobe lights, anything that could go in a cake. This is the biggest thing in my life — why wouldn't I prepare?"

Fitzgerald says he never became a character. Although he was the only gay contestant and was occasionally encouraged to "gay it up" for the camera, he stayed true to himself.

"I kinda became the go-to guy," he says. "People would ask me for advice and that's just pure respect. I was the nice guy of the group, but I was definitely the crybaby on the show."

Of course, how he fared remains to be seen as the season plays out. For now, Fitzgerald knows he and Navejas have a good thing. Win or not, The Cake Guys know one thing for sure.

"I don't want people to buy our cakes just because I was on TV," he says. "But once you try our cake, you'll be hooked." ■



## **Plain Jane**

Lesbian fiction author Ellen Hart loses her way with latest Jane Lawless mystery, 'Lost Women'

The Lost Women of Lost Lake, by Ellen Hart. Minotaur Press (2011), \$26, 320 pp.

Cordelia Thorn figured she would just lend a quick hand. Tessa Cornell, Cornelia's old friend in the northern Minnesota 'burg of Lost Lake, had taken a tumble and hurt her leg. Tessa was directing the community play, so somebody needed to finish the job while she was healing; Cornelia volunteered, and invited her best friend, Jane Lawless, along. Jane, a restaurateur and part-time private investigator, was still mourning the death of her long-time partner; a trip would do her good.

Tessa was happy to have help with the play, but she didn't need any company - definitely not some P.I. wannabe.

Jonah Ivorsen hated moving, so when he decided to hitchhike from St. Louis to Lost Lake, he was sure his aunt Jill and Jill's wife, Tessa, would let him stay with them. But then a body was discovered and another one followed it fast. The authorities were zeroing in on a mysterious fire, and Tessa was obviously lying to everybody. Can Jane Lawless sort things out before someone else dies?

Oh, how I love books with Jane Lawless in them! Jane is an unlikely heroine and reluctant private eye who doesn't seem to want her hobby to turn into work, yet there's a will-she-make-itpermanent thread in this book that's satisfactorily solved. There's also a possible romance angle that slyly teases readers.

But as much as I love Ellen Hart's main character, the supporting cast in The Lost Women of Lost Lake almost all need to take a dive. I had to work to keep my eyes from rolling, not only because of the cliché peripheral characters but also for the cliché things they say. Triteness definitely taints this otherwise fine mystery.

Fans of the Jane Lawless series should be able to overlook these faults, but if you're not already a fan, start with another book. For you, The Lost Women of Lost Lake will not be looked upon swimmingly.

Local actors get in the Christmas spirit with 'Holidazzle Act II' release

Two years ago, local actors, musicians and other theater folk banded together for Holidazzle, a CD of Christmas music that featured some amazing voices in town while benefiting the charity Jonathan's Place. It was a win-win for carol-loving Dallasites.

Now another, bigger chorus of actors is back with a healthy collection of holiday tunes. Holidazzle Act II is filled with heart, but

not without a few bumps. The disc opens strong with "That's What Christmas Means to Me" featuring Denise Lee, Jeff Kinman, Susan Mills and Darius-Anthony Robinson and impressively displays a crisp production value — from the percussion to the vocals, the sound is crystal clear. It's a promising start as the music is layered well but with a nice

simplicity. And Kerry Huckaba's bass

ends up as a star here.

I have to admit I was worried about their take on "You're a Mean One, Mr. Grinch," especially after reading that Jim Johnson, K. Doug Miller, Gregory Lush, B.J. Cleveland and David Coffee were all doing vocals. We've all heard it with the signature deep voice, but these guys pull off a great jazzy rendition with different but appropriate personalities for the tune. It's really hard to get through this one

without a smile. "Snow" from Irving Berlin's White Christmas movie soundtrack should win over die-hard fans, but at first, this version seems to have too many voices; they eventually come together in a beautiful, cheery mix. The added chorus gives it an old-fashioned, charmingly seasonal touch. This is what you want to hear while gleefully shopping at Macy's without a care in

The group knocks it out of the park with the hilarious "Twelve Daze of a Theatrical Christmas." It may sound inside-jokey, but clever lyrics by Miller make this a viable comedic

piece. If you think you'll be over the repetition of the usual lyrics, don't worry. They give the song as many twists as possible and they all work.

They also succeed in "God Rest Ye, Merry Gentlemen/We Three Kings." While practically a carbon copy of the Barenaked Ladies/Sarah McLachlan version, it works so well one could easily listen to it over and over.


But the album is not without misses. The cover of Celine Dion's "The Prayer" has a personal tone but with six voices doing the work, it derails into a mess. While the harmonies are beautiful, the song's intention is flooded over. Then there's "Silent Night." It's a carol everyone wants to put their stamp on, but it's also the one listeners tend to want to hear a traditional version of. The chorus here is a bit too chipper; "Night" needs a more Zen-like

feel, and the harp challenges the voices rather than working in agreement with them. Even if they wanted to continue in this tone, the song is not audibly smoothed out.

Other tracks lack the lead-in's excellent production quality. Gary Floyd, Sonny Franks and Todd Hart do sublime a capella work on "I'll Be Home for Christmas," but the voices get tinny in the mix at times. Julie Johnson gives an ideal performance in the fun "Christmas Eve," but the turned-up bass distracts. The Patty Breckenridge-Ashley Puckett-Gonzales duet works well for the dramatic "Where are You, Christmas," but the music begins to overrun their voices despite Scott Eckert's emotional arrangement and direction.

Despite these issues, the album as a whole works magic. There is enough tradition here to appreciate the songs with added freshness on other tunes to make it interesting.





## Life as a Cabret

Scorsese shows a soft side with the children's fantasy 'Hugo;' von Trier mixes opera with sci-fi in the navel-and-star-gazing drama 'Melancholia'

It would be nice to blame J.K. Rowling for ruining children's literature for all time, but in fact Roald Dahl, C.S. Lewis and others bear some of the responsibility. It has become now all-too-formulaic how (popular, at least) kid fantasy stories play out: An orphaned or neglected moppet (who came from the most loving family imaginable before falling on hard times) discovers a new friend, a nemesis who eventually

becomes a friend, and an antagonist while living in a magical, Gothic castle that brings him extraordinary abilities.

Go ahead. Apply it to any kid's fiction. I dare ya.

Hugo, the film adaptation of Brian Selznick's graphic novel *The Invention of Hugo Cabret*, cleaves so closely to this recipe, it would be momentous if even one second of the plot were able to catch you by surprise. It does not.

Hugo (the impossibly saucer-eyed Asa Butterfield) lives in the walls of a Parisian train station (circa 1930), surreptitiously winding the giant clocks so no one will know his caretaker-uncle has disappeared and send Hugo to an orphanage. He scavenges food and supplies from shops in the station, eventually getting caught

by Georges (Ben Kingsley), a curmudgeonly tinkerer and toy salesman. Georges has a secret (in this genre, *everyone* has a secret that could be easily told, except it wouldn't leave any mystery; it's borne of an WASPy sense of emotional repression and a desire to allow the plot to stretch out), so Hugo enlists Georges' ward Hermione... er, Isabelle (Chloe Grace Moretz) to help him retrieve the notebook the man took from him.

The notebook, of course, is just another storytelling device (the McGuffin) that ultimately proves irrelevant, as so much of *Hugo* is. The film's real goal is to stand as

a paean to the silent film era, and

especially the work of pioneering French filmmaker Georges Melies.

And that's where *Hugo* begins to get interesting.

The mushy themes and soft sense of innocent delight are ill-fitted to the director, Martin Scorsese, whose most prominent use of a child prior to this was probably Jodie Foster's teen prostitute in *Taxi Driver*. Scorsese doesn't approach most of the material with that harsh eye of his; he actually seems lost in it, charming





himself with the story's doe-eyed wonder. (The train station is as improbably kooky as the Wonka Candy Factory.)

But Scorsese sustains the film during its more familiar and less compelling periods with a movie fanatic's appreciation for the art of the silent film. It is a victory of form over substance, as Scorsese recreates the visual cues first explored by the likes of Melies, as well as Chaplin, Keaton, Harold Lloyd. Indeed, two key scenes mirror one another: One where Hugo takes Isabelle to her first movie (Lloyd's *Safety Last*, where the comedian dangles dangerously from a tower while holding on to the hands of a clockface), and one later, where Hugo does the same thing while being chased by a station cop (Sacha Baron Cohen, whose rubbery face was made for silent film).

The structuring, photography and editing are such loving and eerily accurate reproductions of film classics, you're tempted to hold your hands over your ears and experience *Hugo* the way Melies' audiences would have *A Trip to the Moon*.

Still, a tone of wistful nostalgia permeates *Hugo*, and eventually dominates it. The fact it was made in (admittedly effective) 3D, however, only highlights its failings: Melies didn't have such technology to keep audiences in awe. We may have come a long way since 1895 in some particulars, but originality of story is still in short supply.

There's a difference between the nostalgia of *Hugo* and **Melancholia**, the new drama by Danish filmmaker Lars von Trier. Von Trier was one of the founders of the Dogme 95 filmmaking philosophy that touted minimalism over arti-

fice, but his career has been a testament to the theory's unworkability. Even in the wedding scenes in *Melancholia* that seem lifted directly from *Festen* (the first true Dogme feature — significantly, from a different director) reveal how the idea of steering clear of genre pictures is a boondoggle: Dogme 95 has become a shorthand for uncomfortable family get-togethers. (In the U.S., *Rachel Getting Married* felt like a Dogme film.)

When Von Trier is being minimalistic, he composes scenes steeped in pain and awkward, raw emotions, but his flamboyant side cannot resist peaking through, as it did in his masterpiece, Breaking the Waves. Melancholia begins with an extended sequence of still shots, supersaturated in colors that make David LaChapelle photos look washed out, all set to a long, graceful overture from Wagner's Tristan and Isolde. This isn't film, it's opera — big and bold and crazed with

feeling.
Only it takes too much to get going. The confrontations —
Charlotte Rampling giving an inappropriate wedding toast,
Kirsten Dunst chastising Stellan
Skarsgard and having her wedding called off, Charlotte Gains-

bourg staring at something off-camera with a perpetual grimace clenched on her face — roll out with slow deliberation. There's a lot going on here — not the least of which is a huge planet called Melancholia hurtling toward the earth, about to destroy all life on the planet — but it's all so clinically presented, you don't get caught up in it. End of the world scenarios, from Last Night to Deep Impact to Armageddon, always trigger some amount of introspection, but Melancholia could use a little extroversion. It's as caught up in itself as Hugo is the kid-lit genre, with no escape velocity.

# Papa bears

Gays love a big softie — tough but tender. These kick-ass cars have muscles over gentle souls

In one of my favorite movies, *Latter Days*, the character Christian describes getting hypothermia and being rescued by a big warm guy holding him naked in a sleeping bag. He felt loved, warm in the arms of a big ol' papa bear.

Like the ranger, these muscular mighties will hold you safe, but also respect a little nature along the trail.

**VW Touareg**. At the recent media launch for the VW Passat in Chattanooga, Tenn., the P.R. team had journalists riding in the back of VW Touaregs. Getting onto the freeway, our driver put the



big SUV into a sweeping uphill curve at high speed with confidence rarely seen off of a racetrack. I was in awe of his driving skills and the Touareg's ability to carve up Appalachian highways. Turns out, the driver was a state trooper working part-time. I never felt safer.

This SUV flaunts a cabin built to Bentley standards, but flexes a range of powertrains. Base models offer a 280hp 3.6-liter V6 that achieves 16/23-MPG city/hwy., but the tree hugger in our beefy driver was a big fan of diesels and hybrids. VW's turbo diesel generates 225hp and 19/28-MPG. The supercharged hybrid manages 380hp and 20/24-MPG.

Prices range from \$44,500 for a V6, \$48,000 for the diesel and \$61,000 for a hybrid.

GMC Yukon Denali Hybrid. GMC. Yukon. Denali. Just the name sounds tough, doesn't it? But *Hybrid*? Sounds like a Muscle Mary — where do we go with this? Probably to a good place. Despite an interior that spoils with heated leather seats, Bluetooth, DVD player, sunroof and a YMCA locker-sized center console, the full-size SUV achieves 20/23-MPG city/hwy. — comparable to a mid-size sedan.

Without diminishing its gleaming Denali looks, engineers coerced some hard engineering out of this softie. The core of its professional grade persona is a 332hp 6.0-liter V8 that can shut down four cylinders during cruise. There's also a battery pack two-mode transmission that can vary depending on workload.

Yukon can drive up to 30mph on electricity alone for very short



distances. Revised air dams, running boards and rear body enhance aero. Best yet, the Yukon Denali Hybrid is a local boy, built here in Arlington. You'll have to bring at least \$59,000 to play.

Ford F-150 EcoBoost. This F-150 is kinda like that furry bear who started jogging, lost a little pudge and trimmed the foliage: He's still tough, but has taken a liking to more contemporary ex-

EcoBoost, in Ford speak, means smaller engines with turbos for maximum fuel economy and power. In fact, the turbo V6 in the F-150 generates 365hp – more than the base V8. It is as smooth as a twink's legs as it eases itself around town and steps up briskly when hitting the freeway. Low-end throbbing from the turbos is an absolute joy.

It's also pretty sexy. A big chrome grille flashes bling like diamonds while the interior is industrial chic with silver panels, leather seats, SYNC voice-activated infotainment and space for friends. (If you like the engine, but want a more compact ride, the EcoBoost V6 is also found in the Taurus SHO, Flex, Lincoln MKS and Lincoln MKT; four-cylinder EcoBoost engines will soon be in the Ford Explorer, Edge and Focus.) Life in Turboland is pretty snug. Want more

proof? The Texas Auto Writers Association just named the F-150 "Truck of Texas" at its annual Truck Rodeo.

This F-150 starts just under


Honda Ridgeline. Nothing is more papa bear than a hard-working pickup that is soft at its soul. Based on the popular Pilot, but with a reinforced under-frame, the Ridgeline is essentially a fuel-efficient crossover with a bed. It is the only pickup with an independent rear suspension for the best of rides. An in-bed truck is large enough to hold a cooler

Moving the marbles is a 250hp 3.5-liter V6. AWD is standard. Authentically capable, the Ridgeline also looks handsome with its chiseled, integrated bodysides, beefy front profile, flying buttress sail panels and off-road rubber. Inside, navigation, 115v outlet, 160-watt audio, moonroof, Bluetooth and back-up camera satisfy. Honda isn't exactly blowing Ridgelines out the door, but that's only an opportunity to end up in the arms of a very loving truck without a lot of guilt.
