Baylor gym changes policy, but bias complaint still pending

The Tom Landry Fitness Center in East Dallas recently stopped offering family memberships, but the discrimination case filed last year after the gym refused to sell a family membership to a gay couple is still open.

The gym owned by Baylor Health Care System refused to sell Alan Rodriguez and his partner of 10 years a family membership in February 2011.

Phil Tyne, director of Baylor's Tom Landry Fitness Center, told Instant Tea that the gym stopped offering family memberships three months ago because it lowered overall costs and now only offers individual memberships.

"We decided to lower all rates across the board," he said.

Tyne said he was aware that the gym was involved in a discrimination case but said he did not know if the decision to change the membership structure was related to the case.

Rodriguez said he thinks the change means the discrimination issue is resolved, though he had not heard that the memberships were no longer of-

"Sounds like they both increased revenue and avoided providing discriminatory and potentially illegal services," he told Instant Tea.

Beverly Davis, assistant director of Dallas' Fair Housing Office, said the case still awaits a determination from the city attorney's office, which is the same status it had in June when it was featured in a Dallas Voice cover story about the 10-year anniversary of the nondiscrimination ordinance. Davis said she was unaware of any attempt at a settlement with Baylor regarding the case and said the membership decision appeared to be separate.

Rates of anti-trans discrimination generally higher in Texas

Transgender Texans generally face even higher levels of discrimination than transgender people nationwide, according to a state-level breakout from a national study conducted last year.

Equality Texas and the Transgender Education Network of Texas released the state-level figures Tuesday from the study by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force and National Center for Transgender Equality. The national study included 266 Texas respondents.

In Texas, transgender people faced higher rates of harassment and assault in school, Nationally, 78 percent reported being harassed, but in Texas 85 percent faced harassment. Physical assault was also higher in the state at 46 percent compared to 35 percent nationally. Sexual assault in school was comparable at 12 percent nationally and 9 percent in Texas

Texas doesn't have LGBT-inclusive employment nondiscrimination or anti-bullying laws. The state's hate crimes law covers gays and lesbians but not transgender people.

Equality Texas called the rates of workplace discrimination in the state "alarming."

Chuck Smith, Equality Texas interim executive director, said the report graphically demonstrates the discrimination faced by transgender Texans.

"In our state, where the right of self-determination is so valued, it is unconscionable that anyone would be denied the ability to earn a living, to live where they choose or to be educated," Smith said. "Equality Texas calls on the members of the Texas Legislature to join us in working to ensure that all Texans are given the ability to live as their authentic



LGBT turnout could swing key races

Contests still in play as early voting begins include 4 for House in Dallas County, 1 for Senate in Fort Worth, lesbian Ann Johnson's in Houston

Turnout is always higher in presidential election years, but voters don't seem as motivated as they were in 2008.

Although Republican Mitt Romney is expected to win Texas' electoral votes, Democrats — who haven't won a statewide race in 18 years — will be looking to cut into the 55-44 margin by which John McCain defeated Barack Obama here in 2008.

Meanwhile, in local races that are expected to be close, turnout in the LGBT community could be the deciding factor.

Texans will vote on Nov. 6 to replace Kay Bailey Hutchison in the U.S. Senate. Republican Ted Cruz is heavily favored over Democrat Paul Sadler.

In the U.S. House, Congresswoman Eddie Bernice Johnson, a Democrat who represents Oak Lawn and a large portion of Oak Cliff, is expected to win handily. Democrat Marc Veasey is expected to join Johnson in Washington representing a new district that winds its way from North Oak Cliff to gay neighborhoods in Fort Worth.

Every two years, all members of the Texas House of Representatives are elected. State senators serve staggered four-year terms except every 10 years when all senators are up for re-election because of redistricting. This year, a record number of legislators are running unopposed including Mary Gonzalez, an El Paso Democrat who won her primary and will become the first LGBT member of the Texas Legislature in a decade.

Gonzalez's situation is hardly unique. Of 150 House seats, 89 candidates — 63 Republicans and 26 Democrats — face no opposition on Election

"That's because the system's rigged," Dallas County Democratic Party chair Darlene Ewing said, referring to redistricting that packed districts to protect incumbents.

Only about a dozen seats statewide are considered in play. Several of those are in the Dallas area.


Ewing said it's unreasonable to ask someone to spend a year of their lives campaigning and raising money "to challenge someone who is unchallengeable."

Ewing credits Texas Republicans with single-handedly saving the Voting Rights Act.

"Republicans were so extreme, greedy and piggish, they proved to the courts that discrimination still exists," she said.

Despite Republicans' efforts, Democrats are expected to pick up at least three seats in the Texas House, causing Republicans to lose their 102-48

supermajority.

Several of the House seats Democrats have a chance to pick up are in North Texas.

In District 114 including the Lake Highlands area, Jason Villalba, who has been backed by gay Republican groups, faces former Rep. Carol Kent. In the primary, Villalba was attacked by his oppo-

nent for being described in the Morning News as "more moderate" and "more pragmatic."

Going into the final weeks of the election, Kent has more money on hand than Villalba.

"Villalba is definitely a rising star in the party," Dallas Log Cabin Republicans President Thomas Purdy said. "Not many people know it, but Texas is only a few years away from becoming a battleground state. The diversity of the party has got to match the diversity of the state."

In District 102 in North Dallas, first-term incumbent Republican Stefani Carter faces Democrat Rich Hancock.

"The best shot of getting rid of an incumbent is TURNOUT. Page 11



Coleman denies he was forced to resign

Former executive director speaks out about leaving Equality Texas, citing family reasons and calling separation 'mutually beneficial'

Speaking publicly about the matter for the first time, former Equality Texas executive director Dennis Coleman denied this week that he was forced to resign from the organization in August.

In a wide-ranging interview at Dallas Voice offices on Wednesday, Oct. 17, Coleman said family matters were behind his decision to step down from Equality Texas, which he led for almost two

Coleman said after losing a family member in May he began to struggle with how to balance commuting to Austin from Dallas for the job. Then, over the summer, he put both his grandmother and father in senior living facilities.

"I became the primary caretaker of not just my immediate family but other people. It was more about getting back here and taking care of family," Coleman said.

Wade Hyde, a former Equality Texas board member from Dallas, previously told Dallas Voice that a hastily organized conference call among board members on Aug. 17 ended with the decision to give Coleman the choice to resign or be fired. Equality Texas announced Coleman's resignation later that day. Hyde resigned from the board on Aug. 23, citing a lack of transparency.

Coleman said he could not speak to what happened on the conference call because he was not

"That was not how we separated from one another," Coleman said. "It was more of a personal matter as to why I was moving back here and I really wanted to wait until there was an opportune time to actually disclose that. Unfortunately things came out that I was not aware of and that were never brought to me. But at the end of day, we have no dispute. It was very mutually beneficial for everyone that this was a good time to make that separation."

As for whether he was given the option of resigning or being fired, Coleman said he couldn't "disclose what took place during that conversa-

"We have agreed that we will not disparage one another and that overall what we do, we wish each other well," he said. "Equality Texas and I do not have any disputes."

Coleman refuted allegations that Equality Texas was not successful financially under his



leadership. He noted that he was able to reinstate positions that had previously been eliminated due to budget constraints.

"I think that no one can dispute that the organization grew outside of Austin under my leadership," he said. "Money was coming in and more and more corporations were being introduced to Equality Texas than ever before."

Coleman said he oversaw the passage of two anti-bullying bills, the rebranding of the organization and laid the groundwork for businesses and corporations to become the voices behind a statewide Employment Non-Discrimination Act in the next legislative session.

Dallas Voice named Coleman 2011 LGBT Person of the Year for his success in turning the organization around.

"I think that probably in the short time that I was there I probably did more for the organization than any executive director that was there," Coleman said. "I would definitely say that I was successful and the organization was successful in the two years that I was there. I felt very comfortable in leaving the organization in a very sound

Coleman said the average tenure for an executive director for a statewide LGBT equality organization is 18 months, giving some perspective to the demands of the position.

Even with the separation, he said he was disappointed in the public attention that was brought to his leaving Equality Texas and for news to come out that the board was divided.

"I didn't like walking away," he said. "I really did love what I did. It doesn't mean that I'm not still going to be doing that in some way."

Coleman said he'll still visit Austin during the





Police arrest 26-year-old Dallas man in murder of 'life partner' in N. Oak Cliff

Dallas police have arrested a North Oak Cliff man suspected of killing his "life partner" on Monday.

Jonathan Stuart Kenney, 26, was arrested Thursday after the Dallas County Medical Examiner's Office ruled the death of 43-year-old Jesus Tovar, Kenney's partner, a homicide.

According to an arrest affidavit, an investigation into Tovar's death revealed that Kenney, who is listed as Tovar's life partner, slammed Tovar's head into the concrete in the 800 block of West Davis Street at 6:20 a.m. Monday. Kenney then continued to assault Tovar when they returned home to 918 W. 8th St.

Police then responded to a 911 call at about 4:20 p.m. at the couple's residence. The initial police report states that a man called 911 around 4 p.m. Monday after finding Tovar "not breathing and unresponsive." Dallas Fire-Rescue and homicide detectives responded to the scene.

The arrest affidavit states that Kenney did not tell police he and Tovar had a fight before he found Tovar. The apartment manager told police the two men were fighting between 8 and 9 a.m. and that he heard Tovar tell Kenney to "Get off me!" The manager told police he lives directly below the couple and banged on the ceiling to get them to stop fighting. He told police they "are always fighting and arguing."

Kenney provided a taped statement to police

Monday night, admitting that he slammed Tovar's head into the concrete at Tyler and Davis streets and that he continued to assault him after they arrived home at their apartment.

After the Dallas County Medical Examiner's Office performed an autopsy, Tovar's death was ruled a homicide Tuesday with the cause of death listed as blunt force trauma to the head, the affidavit states.

An arrest warrant was issued for Kenney on Wednesday. Police confirmed that he was in custody on Thursday morning..

2013 legislative session to keep an eye on the progress he helped start.

"There are still pieces of me, a great deal I think, that you will see in the legislative session that I had a hand in," he said.

As for Coleman's future, he said he's still "weighing his options" and discussing his opportunities with family. He said he has been approached about opportunities including working with corporations on diversity, starting a non-profit and even running for public office.

He said he wants his next career move to include part of the three things that are the most important to him: being active in the African-American community, LGBT advocacy and the city of Dallas.

"Whatever I do, it's going to have, if not all of those three, it's going to have some combination of those things that are important to me," he said.

Equality Texas has launched a nationwide search for a new executive director. Chuck Smith, interim executive director, said he applied for the position after consideration but said he did not know the status of the search or when the position would be filled.

Equality Texas board Chairwoman Anne Wynne said the group hopes to announce a new executive director within 30 days. Fort Worth

board member Lisa Thomas, who is the chair of the search committee, did not return calls.

Coleman said the Nov. 6 election will be a major factor in determining where LGBT issues fall on the legislative agenda during the upcoming session. He said the new executive director will face the same challenges of trying to explain Equality Texas' successes and continue to advocate for LGBT-friendly legislators.

"I think Equality Texas is a great organization. I do think that there is a lot of work that needs to take place in the state of Texas," he said, adding that donors will want to see the strategy of the new leadership. "They want to see an aggressive organization, they want to know what the strategy is, they want to know how they can participate."

Coleman said his advice for the new executive director would be to have a plan in place and to go out and communicate that plan for future success to donors and supporters.

"Whoever comes into the organization is going to have to continue describing what that vision is. They have to continue to do that in order to shore up support around the state," he said. "They need to immediately get on the road and they immediately need to be armed with the accomplishments of the organization. And so they have to get out there, and I would say definitely they need to get to Dallas and they need to get to Houston."

after the first term when you have someone who is incompetent like Carter," Ewing said.

She said Carter won in 2010 by running the nastiest campaign in Dallas County.

In District 107 in East Dallas and Garland, incumbent Republican Kenneth Sheets faces Democrat Robert Miklos.

Sheets is better funded, but Miklos has knocked on 24,000 doors in his district.

In Irving's District 105, Republican incumbent Linda Harper-Brown is the odds-on favorite over Democratic challenger Rosemary Robbins. But Stonewall Democrats of Dallas President Omar Narvaez believes Robbins has a chance because she's running an active campaign.

"All the [House] races are looking very tight," Narvaez said.

In other House races around the state, Houston incumbent Sarah Davis is seen as vulnerable. Her opponent is lesbian Ann Johnson, who's vying to join Gonzalez and give Texas two out legislators for the first time.

Longtime ally Rep. Senfronia Thompson of Houston is expected to win re-election but faces a well-funded opponent for the first time. She has served since 1972 and is the ranking member of the Texas House.

The most-watched state Senate race in the state is between Tarrant County incumbent Wendy Davis and challenger state Rep. Mark Shelton.

Early voting dates, times

Early voting in Dallas and Tarrant counties is from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Oct. 22-26; 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Oct. 27; 1 p.m.-6 p.m. in Dallas County and 11 a.m.-4 p.m. in Tarrant County Oct. 28; and 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Oct. 29-Nov. 2. For more, go to DallasCountyVotes.org or TarrantCounty.com/evote.

Tarrant County Stonewall Democrats President Felipe Gutierrez said his group has donated more than \$20,500 to Davis' campaign, making it one of her top funders.

He said her campaign is the top priority for the group and members are supporting her on a daily basis doing everything from attending her debates to phone banking, stuffing envelopes and block walking. He said he believes she has broad support from Democratic groups but also from others in the city.

"She's very likeable," Gutierrez said.

Gutierrez added that he'll be delighted to see state Rep. Lon Burnam, one of the founders of Tarrant Stonewall, elected to another term, even though he's running unopposed.

Back in Dallas County, two-term incumbent Sheriff Lupe Valdez is taking her re-election seriously and working for every vote.

"She's in all the parades and goes to every Rotary," Ewing said. "She's well known." Narvaez said he hadn't seen much of a campaign from Valdez's opponent, Republican Kirk

"She's the first sheriff to get the jails to pass inspection in 20 years," he said. "She deserves reelection."

Valdez remains the only female sheriff in the state and only the second in the state's history. The first was Travis County's Margo Frasier, who was also openly gay.


Two seats on the Dallas County Commissioners Court are on the ballot. Democrat John Wiley Price is expected to win re-election handily in District 3, and Democrat Theresa Daniel is favored in the redrawn District 1.


For the first time, District 1 includes a portion of Oak Lawn and does not touch a county boundary line. Daniel faces Larry Miller, who told Dallas Voice he opposes taxpayer money being used for partner benefits. Daniel is a longtime supporter of equality.

Ewing called Daniel wonkish and said she'll be great at studying and coming up with solutions for Parkland hospital and healthcare delivery in the county.

"Miller? He'd be a dumber Maureen Dickey," Ewing said, referring to the Republican who's retiring from the seat. "And that's hard to do."

Daniel has been knocking on doors in Pleasant Grove, one of the most neglected areas of the city and part of the redrawn District 1. People have been telling her that no candidate has ever been by their house before.



Walk-in clinic at Legacy struggles to keep pace

Agency expects in-home HIV tests to further increase caseload, which has already jumped 60% since it launched new counseling service

Robert Giuliano might have eventually gotten counseling to deal with his drug problem and destructive relationship.

"I was in a weird zone," Giuliano recalled. More likely, Giuliano would have made appointments and broken them.

But last December, Legacy Counseling Center created a walk-in clinic to help people with their problems at the point of crisis.

Giuliano was one of the walk-in clinic's first clients and continues to see a counselor weekly. He credits his caseworker at AIDS Arms for sending him to Legacy directly from her office.

He said counseling helped him realize crystal meth was making his life hell.

"I've been clean for a while now," Giuliano says. "I'm happier now. I get to appointments on time, to work on time. I'm working on loving myself. I'm a better person because of Legacy."

Giuliano is one of many success stories at Legacy's walk-in clinic, which was launched before the holidays and made permanent due to high demand.

The clinic has resulted in a 65 percent increase

in clients at Legacy this year — as well as a budget shortfall.

Melissa Grove, Legacy's executive director, said when the program started, she expected to see a number of new people dealing with immediate crises related to their HIV infections and substance abuse problems.

But she was surprised that so many became regular clients.

"At Legacy, we pride ourselves on being responsive to client needs," Grove said. "It's important to catch people at the moment they're ready for help."

She said that often people have to be in a great deal of emotional pain before they'll come to deal with their problems.

"Even waiting a week, the immediate crisis could pass and we could miss the opportunity to engage with them and get them the help they need," she said.

Grove said some are so depressed, they can't muster the energy to make a phone call. But when possible, she encourages people to call first to minimize the wait — and so she can make sure someone is available when they get there.

"We were accidentally keeping people away," Grove said

Grove said that if someone is suicidal, they can't wait for an appointment.

She said more doctors with little HIV experience are testing for the virus in general exams. When someone gets a positive result, they need to talk to someone experienced in the field.

Another Legacy client who asked not to be

identified agreed that the walk-in clinic saved his life.

"The day I found out I tested positive, I was in total shock and the doctor who told me suggested I go to Legacy immediately because he could tell I was not taking it well," the client said.

The doctor called ahead to let Grove know he was coming.

"I was scared because I had never been to counseling before," he said. "The therapist really helped me deal with the news. I thought my life was over, but now he helped me understand that everything is going to be OK, and that I can handle it."

Grove said there are other counseling clinics in the area, but Legacy is HIV-friendly and LGBT-friendly.

She gave several examples of clients' experiences elsewhere. One therapist used Windex to clean the chair after the person revealed his HIV status. Another counselor — a licensed therapist — told the client, "It's God's wrath against gay people."

Since the walk-in clinic began, Grove said her agency has seen about 40 new walk-ins each month in addition to the regular client load. But many that have turned into return clients have put a strain on her agency's resources.

Grove expects to see another surge beginning this month. That's because OraSure began selling a home HIV test last week. Using the new kit,

people will get results alone at home and without counseling or information about available services

Grove said she plans to distribute business cards to as many pharmacies as she can, starting in Oak Lawn and spreading throughout the city. She hopes to insert one of her cards into every test sold.

She said she hears recently diagnosed people say, "My life is over." That's followed by a list of other fears — "No one will love me," "My family will reject me" and "I'll be fired from my job."

She fears that when people who are not prepared for a positive result begin testing at home, there will be a rash of suicides.

She hopes that the walk-in clinic and the emergency hotline that is answered 24 hours a day will save lives.

To cover the additional patient load, Legacy hired additional therapists that Grove said "ex-

ploded the budget."

The annual Red Party in September filled some of the funding shortfall. Red Party co-founder and President Jared Pearce said he's a fan of the new clinic.

"As a result of this amazing new service, they are running a deficit for the first time in a decade," Pearce said.

Grove said while the Red Pary made a difference, Legacy has scheduled another fundraiser this weekend.



"From the moment a person is diagnosed, to telling a partner and family members, to how to cope on the job," Grove said. "As crises pop up through life, we'll be there."

"I love these people," Giuliano said. "I consider them my family."

Group targets transgender healthcare disparities

Trans Pride Initiative's Nell Gaither hopes Saturday's breast cancer screening event at UT Southwestern will expand into annual health fair

October is a popular month for cancer screenings for women because it is Breast Cancer Awareness Month, but many masculine women and transgender people won't undergo them because of fear of discrimination and embarrassment

That's why Nell Gaither, president of Trans Pride Initiative, said she planned a Chest & Breast Wellness Day at UT Southwestern Medical Center on Saturday, Oct. 20. Gaither said the event is intended for gender non-conforming individuals to have access to healthcare without feeling uncomfortable or facing discrimination at a doctor's office

Gaither started the nonprofit Trans Pride Initiative in August 2011 to end the disparities in trans

healthcare. She then quit her job this past June to focus on the organization's goals to end discrimination in healthcare facilities and provide better information and access to care.

"A lot of times people will avoid healthcare out of concerns for discrimination. There's a high level of not getting healthcare in the trans and gender non-conforming communities," she said. "They may not be comfortable in that (traditional) setting, so it's them being considerate of others, as well as them not wanting to be exposed to that type of situation."

The event is the first local cancer screening day for these groups, but Gaither has worked with the transgender healthcare program at Nelson-Tebedo Clinic for about five years. While she is still active in Resource Center Dallas' Gender Education, Advocacy & Resources Program, or GEAR, she said her nonprofit works primarily to address the healthcare needs of the community.

Gaither said there is always a sense of anxiety because of discrimination or violence from healthcare employees and other patients who overhear that someone is trans in the waiting room.

"Whenever I go to some sort of healthcare setting, you run the chance of being outed no matter

what setting you're in, especially for people whose legal names do not match their preferred names, and I'm in that case," she said. "But I kind of want to be in that position to see what people are experiencing. I want to have to continue to experience that."

Gaither started working with UT Southwestern in March to plan a mammogram day for the trans community and masculine women. She said the administration wasn't interested at first, but after some personnel changes, the new person she was put in contact with was on board immediately.

The event progressed into a full day of chest exams in October because it is Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Gaither said she wants to expand the day to an annual health fair at UT Southwestern for other areas and exams like pap tests and pelvic exams.

Screening costs at the event are covered for Dallas and Tarrant County residents if someone's insurance won't cover the cost or if someone doesn't have insurance. Residents of other counties should call first, she said.

Dr. Oliver Blumer, who is the vice chairman of the Transgender Education Network of Texas, or TENT, said data released this week shows that Texas transgender people face more discrimination than national numbers. The study was conducted by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force and the National Center for Transgender Equality, but TENT and Equality Texas broke down the statewide numbers for Texas.

Among the study's findings, 19 percent nationally and 16 percent in Texas reported being denied healthcare because of their gender identity. Both nationally and in Texas, 19 percent postponed medical care because of discrimination.

Blumer said aside from discrimination, many transgender people avoid healthcare because they are uncomfortable going to a doctor for routine exams because their anatomy doesn't match their gender identity.

But Blumer cautioned the trans community against shying away from healthcare. He said hormone therapy and family history of breast cancer can affect men who have transitioned to women. And female-to-male transgender people are at risk because even if they've had their breasts removed, their chromosomes can still carry genes that make them vulnerable.

He said many trans people don't have primary care physicians for wellness treatment, which is why events that target helping the trans community are so important because they provide training to doctors, make them aware of how to use pronouns and help members of the community feel more confident receiving medical care.

"Being a male in a women's waiting room to get a breast exam is scary," he said, adding that a smaller waiting room on a Saturday will prevent some of the anxiety. "This setting will help them feel more at ease.'

Liz James, executive director of the Lesbian

Chest & Breast Wellness Day

The event is from 7:30 a.m. to noon Saturday, Oct. 20, at UT Southwestern Medical Center, 2201 Inwood Road on the third floor. Screenings will remain open until 5 p.m. if there are enough appointments or people waiting. Appointments can be made by calling 214-645-2526, but walk-ins will also be accepted.

Health Initiative of Houston Inc., has been working with her organization for years to eliminate healthcare barriers for LGBT women. Over the last year, she said the organization has helped trans men gain access to healthcare and advocacy pro-

James said the largest problem she faces is people who are uninsured, and LGBT people are twice as likely to be uninsured. So she started partnering with hospitals several years ago for cancer screenings and other vital tests for women.

"All of these barriers prevent people from going to the doctor and they end up in care when they're symptomatic," James said.

In the last few years, the organization has started two multi-provider clinics a year in the Houston area, teaming up with several hospitals to provide a variety of exams and screenings.

James said the event at UT Southwestern is certainly just the beginning of Gaither's future success with accessible healthcare options for the North Texas LGBT community.

"Nell is identifying those barriers and eliminating them," James said. "By doing that, you create cultural competency for our community."

Gaither said the timeline for a health fair is still uncertain, but she wants to work closely with UT Southwestern to make it a reality in the future. She also said she wants to work with the medical university to have transgender and LGBT issues taught, ending a lack of awareness about health needs for LGBT people.

"I feel like we are actually making a difference," she said. "We're really hoping that this brings a lot more attention to the disparities, so we really hope this is the beginning of something fairly big and fairly long-term."

An anti-gay hoax at UT

Mark Regnerus' flawed study on gay parenting — paid for by anti-gay Witherspoon Institute — casts dark shadow over University of Texas

notorious, scientifically unsound University of Texas study on gay parenting funded by national anti-gay-rights moneybags is being wielded as a political weapon against LGBT victims in U.S. courts and elections, as well as abroad. Any decent human being will be horrified, disgusted and outraged that this commissioned hate speech was produced on the grounds of a public university in the 21st century.

With UT's Mark Regnerus as lead investigator, the project — called the New Family Structures Study — was funded chiefly by the Witherspoon Institute, which is joined at the hip to the National Organization for Marriage. It must not be ignored that in letters to the Texas attorney general, UT has described itself as a co-investor in Regnerus' study. That is to say, UT has conflicts of interest in making any inquiry or investigation into, and/or public statements about the scientifically invalid genesis of this blatant hoax.

Regnerus and his funders are fraudulently alleging that no funding agency representative was consulted on study design, which documentably is booby-trapped against gays. The intent of their

lie is to mislead the public into believing that Regnerus carried out his project independently of the cashrich political anti-gay-rights figures who commissioned it from him.

Here is how we know that Regnerus and his funders are lying:

Witherspoon's 2010 IRS forms describe the study as "an achievement" of the Witherspoon Program for Marriage, Family and Democracy. In 2010, the director of that program was W. Bradford Wilcox. Wilcox recruited Regnerus to do the study,

and then Witherspoon gave Regnerus a \$55,000 planning grant. Wilcox, in his capacity as Witherspoon program director, subsequently collaborated with Regnerus on the study design. After Witherspoon approved the study design for full funding, Regnerus received a known total of \$785,000.

Wilcox additionally is documented as having worked with Regnerus on data collection, data analysis and interpretation. Moreover, he is on the editorial board of the journal that published the study, Elsevier's Social Science Research. And, Wilcox is a longtime crony to Regnerus and the journal's editor, James Wright.

Make no mistake about it: For Regnerus to have published first that his funders were not "at all" involved in his study design and for him



then to publish that "no funding agency representatives were consulted about research design" — when in reality they were — is a serious infraction against science publishing ethics.

As University of Arkansas sociologist Lori Holyfield said: "It is especially unacceptable that the conflicts of interests were hidden, and that there is an ongoing attempt to deceive the public about them. It adds insult to that injury, that what was produced was a methodologically invalid study that perpetuates negative social stereo-

types. This is a very malevolent situation; something must be done about it."

No qualified professional without a conflict of interest in evaluating the Regnerus study considers it scientifically valid. Erik Olin Wright, president of the American Sociological Association, is among more than 200 researchers who signed a letter calling Regnerus' study groupings "absurd." A court brief filed by eight major organizations including the American Medical Association ana-



Holyfield does not mince words about UT's culpability in the Regnerus scandal. She said: "Politically-motivated groups bend facts all the time. The difference here is that this took place at a research university, which absolutely should have measures in place to ensure that this kind of thing doesn't happen. It sounds like there was some social networking going on, and that the \$55,000 planning grant from The Witherspoon

Institute got talked about, and then the work with the full \$785,000 in funding followed. Somewhere along the way, though, the relationships that allowed this unacceptable thing to happen in a research university got obscured."

Michael Schwartz, chair of the department of sociology at Stony Brook University, is calling for the Regnerus study to be retracted from publication and for Wright, the journal editor, to be replaced "with a new editor who will not violate the norms and values of scholarly publication."

It nonetheless remains evident that some levels of UT administration are actively shielding Regnerus from academic accountability for his dishonesty in reporting his research. Presented with Freedom of Information Act requests related to the study, UT engages in obstructionism, asking the state attorney general for exceptions.

In late August, UT concluded a sham misconduct inquiry into Regnerus and the study, without making public the fact that Regnerus' funding agency representative collaborated with him on the booby-trapped study design. A foul, dark shadow of disgrace is looming over the university. The push to get the Regnerus study retracted, and editor Wright fired, will continue. If UT is not more forthcoming with documentation related to the Regnerus hoax, it is likely that advocacy groups soon will join the effort to get the documentation released. Whereas the school now should be cleaning out and disinfecting from the Regnerus excrement, it is instead ludicrously kicking its hind legs backwards over the carpet, as though nobody could see the stinking mess lying there.

Anybody at UT who believes that this gaybashing assault on scientific integrity has not very significantly cheapened the school's reputation is severely deluding themselves.

What do Del Shores, Oscar-winner Octavia Spencer and a trailer park have in common? A masterful Texas tragedy

he first time Emerson Collins met Del Shores was opening night of the Dallas premiere of Shores' play Southern Baptist Sissies. Collins played one of the leading roles, and Shores was in town for the opening. So impressed was Shores by the young actor that a week later he emailed him with this promise: If Collins ever moved to Los Angeles, he could perform in an upcoming L.A. production of Sissies. Collins was packed up and moved within weeks.

That was seven years ago, and much has happened in that time for both men. But no period has been more fruitful — or harried — than the last 18 months. In that time, Shores (as writer-director) and Collins (as actor and producer) have toured with Shores' one-man show, produced several standup DVDs and prepped the Dallas debut of his newest play, Yellow, for early next year, which Shores will direct. All of this has brought the two Texas natives to Dallas numerous times.

But their biggest achievement — and what will bring them to Dallas again later this month — is the release of the film *Blues for Willadean*, which plays for a week at the Angelika Film Center in Dallas starting Oct. 26. (Shores, Collins and several others involved in the film will attend Q&A screenings on Friday and Saturday.)

Willadean is a battered woman living in isolation in a rundown trailer park somewhere in North Texas. The only contact she has with anyone other than her drunken, philandering husband J.D. (David Steen) is

LaSonia, who shares her love of daytime talk shows. Willie tries to make a home out of her hovel, though J.D. forbids her from communicating with their gay son, whom he kicked out at age 16, or even getting a part-time job down at the Value Village. Willie — via Beth Grant's heart-wrenching performance — engages in a nightly dance, trying to allay J.D.'s vitriol and his left jab while reciting silently to herself the mantra, "I will not

shrivel up and die, I will not shrivel up and die."
The screen adaptation of Shores' play *Trials*and *Tribulations of a Trailer Trash Housewife*, it was
filmed 18 months ago in Georgia in a frenzied
two-week shoot that reunited most of the cast
from the original Los Angeles stage production
in 2003. And what a cast it is: In addition to char-

acter actresses Beth Grant (in the title role of an abused wife) and Dale Dickey (as slutty cocktail waitress Rayleen), it also stars this year's Oscar winner Octavia Spencer as the sassy-talking neighbor LaSonia (pronounced, in true Shoresian style, "Lasagna").

"It was challenging to make it in the time and budget we had," Shores says. "We shot it in 15 days with two cameras on 16mm film — my first time as a director to use film. Emerson is the one who said we should shoot this kind of like a *Cops* episode. It feels

almost too gritty. We scouted two or three trailer parks, and that was the most upscale! It was so sad. We didn't have to do much set design with the exteriors. One had all these years of stickers with Republicans they'd voted for! How can they not *see* what they are doing to themselves?"

If getting the film made took serendipity, reassembling the cast

— filled as it was with in-demand actors — took a miracle. For all of them, it was a labor of love. Shores has a way of generating such devotion. Grant, Spencer, Dickey and Collins join folks like Leslie Jordan, Tate Taylor, Caroline Rhea and Rosemary Alexander as a kind of unofficial production troupe — the Lord Chamberlain's Merry Minstrels. And it's a boon not lost on Shores himself.

"I love good actors. I always say, when an actor sings my song, I hear it," he admits on the phone from his home in California. "And boy! Does Beth Grant sing my songs. These [my actors] are authentic Southerners — Beth's from South Carolina, Leslie and Dale are from Tennessee ... When I hear these words, they say them like I hear them."

The result is perfect casting.

"When [Del] told me he wrote Rayleen for me, I didn't know

how to react," Dickey laughs. "I did dress like a bad hippie girl, but that's where the similarities stop ... although I guess sometimes my stories *seem* about that tragic."

Revisiting the role has been "familiar but also strange" for Dickey. "There are a lot of blessings about having done a run of these shows before this one. When the film came together, it happened so quickly, so having all of that history was great — it's muscle memory. It's amazing how much of it comes back to you."

Getting Spencer to do the film was a gift as well. "She has already done *The Help* and we had very little money but she came and did nine days for us," Shores gushes. "Then we rode along with Octavia all through that process. When she won the Oscar, it was thrilling to all of us."

For Grant, the passage of several years helped her refine her performance.

"I think I was probably more willing to trust Del and go more to the victim than I was and to let my inside out," Grant says. "I've only heard more stories [of abuse] and met more [battered] women in the interim. I've never been beaten by a man, but have had violence in my life."

Shores based the story loosely on a true story from his life, but it



is hardly unique. And that can make it especially hard to watch — even for the cast.

"They get desensitized," Grant says of abused women. "The 'victim's mask' is on their faces. It takes years if not forever to get that look to go away."

Grant tears up, her voice cracking, as she recalls leaving the most recent screening of the film and passing by a Greyhound station.

"I saw a woman who was overweight, unattractive with a big black eye carrying a trashbag with all her stuff in it. I don't know her story, but the way she looked at me, we both knew: She got punched and she was getting the hell out of North Hollywood. She had few prospects but she had to leave."

Grant insists that, as much as she loved playing Willadean, she won't be watching the film again anytime soon.

"It is much easier to play that role than to watch that movie. I can't watch it anymore. I've said goodbye to her. I like to think she has a future, because I love her. That doesn't mean that she shrivels up and dies. By the end, she's found her spirit."

Willadean is heavy stuff, especially for those who think Shores writes nothing but gut-busting farces like Sordid Lives and Daddy's Dyin', Who's Got the Will? But even Sordid — and his other popular play, Southern Baptist Sissies — has a dark underbelly, especially in his critique of religious extremism, homophobia and the travails of the working class. Yes, there are many hilarious moments ("She is trash that will not burn," Spencer clucks), but they punctuate an otherwise

somber, observational drama about the 47 percenters.

And a lot of the authenticity Shores is able to create comes from his own background, growing up as the preacher's son in rural Winters, Texas.

"I grew up with relatives who were Willadean and I didn't want to lie," Shores says. "I knew to get this movie made I needed to embrace what was already there."

"Del has a unique voice," says Grant. "I tell him, you're just as much a preacher [as your father] — a different message, perhaps, but as strong as any fundamentalist minister."

Shores is delighted to be preaching that sermon back in his second home of Dallas.

"We're doing week-long engagements in cities where we have strong fanbases," explains Collins, who produced *Willadean*.

"When everything went down with *Sordid Lives: The Series* and my finances were a shambles, my fans just rallied, and nobody tops it like Dallas," Shores says. "The four shows I performed at the Rose Room are my first, second, third and fourth highest-grossing shows." He plans to film another standup special here again next year.

Until then, though, Shores is focused not only on *Willadean* but in rebuilding his life after a messy divorce less than a year ago. That includes more touring, filming a "*Playhouse 90*-style" film of the play version of Southern Baptist (with Collins reprising the role he played in Dallas), readying to direct *Yellow* at the Kalita Humphreys in the spring and enjoying single life again. But if there's anyone familiar with trials and tribulations and how to overcome them, it's Del Shores.



It's about time

'Keep the Lights On' joins 'Weekend' and 'Shame' in the pantheon of new films making honest statements about sex and longing in the modern age

Serious gay cinema has gone through a lot of changes since the days of Rainer Werner Fassbinder's Fox and His Friends (1975) and Frank Ripploh's Taxi Zum Klo (just out on a remastered DVD) — much of it not good. Early films were frank, often angry portrayals of the gay subculture not accessible to most people. They had passion and energy and often lots of sex — warts-and-all portrayals of specific people.

But storytellers have gotten lazy. They've settled into predictable melodramas, or seem happy churning out self-indulgent comedies instead of thoughtful dramas. (Maybe AIDS made it harder to be so aggressively sexual.)

Then last year's *Weekend* — and, in a smaller way, *Shame* — ushered in a new aesthetic, which is actually sort of an old one: Explicit, honest dramas about the way gay folk (OK — gay *men*) actually deal with relationship issues.

Add to that list **Keep the Lights On**. It's 1998 in the East Village, and Erik (Thure Lindhardt), a documentary filmmaker and photographer, is looking for sex. On the phone. In the age of Grindr, it's hard to imagine when people used to *talk* to find a hookup. Other than that, not much has changed in 15 years: Gay men are still horny, but also some, like Erik, are looking for a genuine connection.

He may have found it in Paul (Zachary

Booth), a closeted lawyer who seems to love Erik but whose drug habit becomes a hindrance.

And so if goes, over years of their relationship — Erik works on his latest film, Paul undergoes rehab and they both ... well, that's the story.

Written and directed by Ira Sachs, *Keep the Lights On* hops along almost too quickly though always fluidly as Erik copes and struggles and in many ways comes into his own. Like Michael Fassbinder's character in *Shame*, Erik struggles with conflicted feelings through an often wordless portrayal.

Sachs doesn't over-explain what his characters

are thinking (although he does occasionally dip into the familiar trough of gay melodrama — drugs, HIV, infidelity), which allows Lindhardt to carry the film through his naturalistic performance. Erik is petulant, needy, hon-

est, confused and passionate in turn, as we all are, and Lindhardt doesn't shy away from showing it all.

Sachs' visual style, almost documentary in nature, conveys an unobtrusive intimacy, which is especially effective in the borderline-explicit sex scenes. Despite great leaps in time, the pacing is unrushed and plays out with great authenticity.

Perhaps the best thing, though, about *Keep the Lights On* (which debuted earlier this year at Sundance) is that it seems to mark a new dedication to making movies about gay issues that neither pander nor resort to time-worn clichés. It's about time for a renaissance in gay film; this may be among the signal entries that usher it in.

Gotta see a woman about a horse

For Robin Cagle, serving on the IGRA royalty team is a personal mission

Most folks in the gay community are familiar with pageant titles like Miss Gay America (drag) or Mr. Dallas Eagle (leathermen). But what about "MsTer?"

It's a title Robin Cagle didn't even understand a few years ago.

Now, Cagle can't help but understand: She is the current MsTer IGRA 2012 First Runner-Up and just last weekend was crowned MsTer TGRA 2012.

"It's the opposite of a man who dresses in female attire — it's more of a female into dressing butch," she explains.

Of course, when you're a rodeo champ like Cagle — she will be competing in four events in this weekend's World Gay Rodeo Finals in Fort Worth, the capper of the International Gay



Rodeo Association's season — dressing in butch attire is kinda par for the course: Jeans, starched shirts, Stetsons and Tony Lamas are practically uniforms.

But for Cagle, serving on the IGRA's royalty team is less about accumulating sashes than it is accumulating converts to the rodeo. (And money, but we'll get to that.)

Cagle grew up in rural Louisiana and from early childhood was reared around livestock; she routinely competed in rodeos well before graduating from high school.

Then she moved to North Texas, and owning

and stabling a horse wasn't as easy (or affordable) as when she was younger. It took her 11 years to acquire the resources to get back in the saddle. And rodeos weren't far behind.

"I met some friends in Corsicana [and they convinced me] to compete in the Austin rodeo in 2003," she says. "That was the first gay rodeo I attended; I did barrels, poles and flags as a kid so I knew the events. I've been really involved with those speed events ever since."

She admits she was slow getting into the gay rodeo scene until about 2008. Then Cagle was

asked if she and her partner would be interested in running for IGRA royalty.

"I had no idea what it was — it was new to me," she now admits. When she realized exactly what the position entailed, she became quickly hooked.

"There are two main duties of royalty: Being out on the rodeo circuit representing IGRA and the royalty program, and raising money — not just for IGRA but for the charities we have chosen. It's pretty amazing once you see the money you are raising go to the charities in need. And doing the onstage questions even helps me build myself professionally."

While HIV charities have been frequent beneficiaries in the past, Cagle says the IGRA has expanded its reach. This year's royalty team continued the previous class' choice of the It Gets Better Foundation, but also added the National Ovarian Cancer Coalition. It's a charity close to Cagle's heart.

"My own partner is battling ovarian cancer,"

she says. "This is a way of giving back." (Her partner's prognosis is good, she says.)

That's a lot on Cagle's plate: During the finals this weekend, Cagle will not only compete for four titles (in addition to the speed events, she also qualified for calf-roping on foot, a popular sport with the "Six Old Heifers," a pet name for the friends — including Cagle — who enjoy the event), Cagle also has duties as a member of the "royal" family.

"I'm in the arena competing, but between events I'll be in the stands talking to folks. From

a royalty perspective, [a lot of what we do] is getting people involved is going to different communities — the bears, the leathermen, Tarrant County Pride [where she's from] and building bridges" ... as well as awareness

that the rodeo is open to everyone.


"I guess you could say women are a little bit of a minority — or you'd think it," she says. "But when I picture the Kansas City Rodeo over Labor Day weekend, there were 20 male barrel racers but still 13 or 14 women. It's a very welcoming community. We call it our rodeo family."


Cagle's title of MsTer IGRA First Runner-up ends this weekend, but don't expect to see her on the podium when the 2013 team is announced. She's sitting this year out. But she'll be back next year.

"I will be running for MsTer IGRA 2014," she says. "I will be going for a red sash — black's not good enough."

Sounds like someone with a competitive spirit. And the rodeo loves a competitor.

Sexy 'Peer Gynt' opens TBT's season

Speaking of bad boys ohhh, that Peer Gynt. A rascal, a womanizer and a well-traveled heel, for 150 years he has been one of theater's most compelling antiheroes. So Sir Ben Stevenson's version of the notorious but compelling character is an enticing start to Texas Ballet Theater's 2012-13 season, which starts on Friday at Bass Hall in Fort Worth before moving to Dallas' Music Hall next weekend.
