By the way, it is a given that having Annise Parker, a long-time GLBT community leader as the Mayor of Houston is something we are extremely proud of, this is a list of a few of the other things.

### The Gayborhood

"Montrose is a pocket of eccentricity and diversity where fine restaurants, antique stores, art galleries, tattoo parlors, vintage clothing boutiques, and some of the city's top art museums can be found" - The New York Times

Many of us know that Montrose is a state of mind as well as a physical location. Long called "Bohemian" this early "suburb" of central Houston has always had a certain flair and character. Even though it is not the area of Houston where the most GLBT people live (we are everywhere), it is our playground and is

the location of our community services. It remains the heart of the community and where the parade continues to be held by popular demand.

### The Celebration

For over 30 years, Pride Houston has worked at the heart of the local GLBT community to educate and celebrate the diversity within our city's large population. Every year, Pride Houston works hard with national sponsors and local volunteers to organize and produce a series of events that cater to and promote Houston's evergrowing LGBT community.

The parade and surrounding events for put together for a number of years by a loosely formed ad-hoc committee. Under the direction of Jack Valinski, the Houston Pride Committee became more structured, organized and cohesive. Now a new group of people have entered the picture to carry on the the tradition.

The Pride Festival and Pride Parade are at the center of the celebration and are attended by over 150,000 people every year from all over the world. That makes it the second largest parade in Houston, and the largest gathering of LGBT individuals in the southern United States. The

Houston Parade as of 1997, was the first Pride Parade in the United States to be held at night.

Pride Houston has been said to be "one of the Top 10 events to attend in Houston for 2010" by the Greater Houston Convention and Visitors Bureau. 2010 marks the 32nd anniversary of the Pride Houston LGBT Celebration.

The annual Pride Festival is a multiblock celebration of the GLBT community. Featuring a variety of performers on a number of different stages, the Pride Festival is a great way to experience the community, learn about it's history, and visit the many booths from local vendors and organizations.





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### **BEELINES**

I am turning my column space over to Cristan Williams. Here is her report

On Friday, June 11, 2010, a meeting was held at Covenant House to discuss their long-standing practice of refusing to house transgender youth. Those in attendance were Cristan Williams, Executive Director Transgender Foundation of America (TFA); Darin Quintero, Vice-President for Board of Directors of TFA, Jolanda Jones, City of Houston Councilwoman and her aide, Josephine; Houston Covenant House Director/CEO Rhonda Robinson and Josephine Tittsworth with the NASW-TX GLBT Equity Committee. The Director of Covenant House Houston, Rhonda Robinson stated that her position was that Covenant Houston does not refuse services to any child and that all children - even transgender children – are treated with dignity. She went on to state that their unwritten policy is that transgender children are placed according to their anatomical sex and not their gender identity. She went on to admit that Covenant House has no policy whatsoever concerning protecting GLBT youth and that equal treatment is, in fact, discretionary for staff. Council Member Jones took the Covenant House director to task and stated in no uncertain terms that transgender kids need to be housed in the gender they present, that they need to be referred to as the gender they present and that no child should ever be refused services due to their transgender status. Council Member Jones also stated that she knew transgender children were being turned away because the Harris County Juvenile Probation contacted her office after Covenant House told them that they do not house transgender kids.

While the Director of Covenant House believes that discriminatory actions by staff do not occur, TFA has received numerous reports in which transgender clients encountered discrimination.

On April 23, 2010, TFA received the following: "I received 'shelter' at covenant house for almost 1 week. I was told when I arrived that I could only be there if I stayed with the girls, because I was legally female. I agreed because I had no other option, it was there or the street. They roomed me with a female who said she felt uncomfortable being in the same room as me... the shelter's response was to pull me out of the room and insist that I sleep on the floor of the girls wing in front of the night staff. I was constantly

harassed by others in the shelter as well as the staff themselves. I was discovered to be physically intersexed by another shelter recipient who walked into the individual shower section I was in with the intent to start a fight. When I was later told that even though I agreed to be there as a female that I could not use the female restrooms or showers, I was instructed to use a single person bathroom and shower on the first floor of the building. I was happy about that because I was obviously not comfortable using the multi-person restrooms and showers anyway. When the girl who discovered I was intersexed told the staff, they made me get a 'physical' at the little medical place attached next door. When it was confirmed I was indeed intersexed, I was told I had to leave the shelter because they had no place for me. I was kicked out 2 days before my 16th birthday. It saddens me that shelters, especially ones aimed at youth, are allowed to be run this way."

On February 27, 2007, Cristan Williams received the following request for assistance from an HIV case manager:

"I'm hoping you may be of help with this. A young transgender, 18yrs old, is having a hard time finding someplace to stay. She mentioned trying Covenant House and not being well received, or even allowed to participate in their program due to transgender status. She mentioned encountering the same reception at shelters (Open Door Mission, Star of Hope)."

In response, Cristan Williams called Covenant House. Directly after speaking with a Covenant House representative, she preserved the conversation:

Cristan: (explains the situation)

Hay: Yes we do take transgenders, but he would have to program as a male.

**Cristan:** Ah, so you would have a certain set of gender stereotypes this youth would have to adhere to in order to access services.

CH: Well... um. Yah, I guess you could put it that way

**Cristan:** So, if this youth looks like, sounds like and walks like a female and has breasts you would make her sleep with men?

**CH:** Well, yes. He would need to be housed with men.

**Cristan:** How would you go about ensuring her safety then?

**CH:** Well, the same way we go about providing safety for all the kids.

**Cristan:** I see. So would you force her to use the restroom with men, shower with men and... how would you protect her against rape?

**CH:** Hum... well. It is a matter of policy. All of the Covenant Houses are like this.

Cristan: Interesting. I know that the Covenant House in California accepts transgenders and houses them with the correct gender. In other words, a male-to-female transgender youth is housed with the females

CH: Well, it isn't supposed to be that way... but each place makes... they might have their own programs that are a little bit different from other locations.

Theatre New West along with Holocaust Museum Houston will present a MAJOR EVENT production of *THE LARAMIE PROJECT*. The production will have a total of 8 performances from June 24 thru July 24. Theatre New West produced BENT at the Museum in 2004, the run was SOLD OUT and brought back the following year.

TNW also presented *THE TIMEKEE-PRS* at the Museum in 2009. Director Joe Watts approached Susan Myers, Executive Director of the Museum, last fall and asked to present *THE LARAMIE PROJ-ECT* there. Susan replied "Why have we not presented *Laramie* at the Museum before since it is such a "perfect fit?" So it was decided to open the production during Gay Pride 2010, and the rest as they say is history.

The production will open on June 24 during Pride 2010.

THE MATTHEW SHEPARD FOUNDATION is very excited that Judy Shepard, Matthew's Mother, has been invited to be a part of this production. She will be in Houston from July 7 thru the 10.

She will speak at the "Max Kaplan Summer Institute" for Educators, held at the Holocaust Museum Houston on July 8. She will also speak before the Theatre New West/Holocaust Museum Houston production of *THE LARAMIE PROJECT* on Saturday, July 10. She will not see the play however, having only done so once. It is far too emotional for her.

There is also a book signing to be held in her honor for her book *THE MEANING* OF MATTHEW: My Son's Murder in Laramie, and a World Transformed.

SPECIAL NOTE: Houston Mayor Annise Parker has also been invited to attend the July 10th performance, she will introduce Judy and welcome her to Houston.

THE LARAMIE PROJECT - is based on interviews of the Laramie community after Matthew Shepard, a young, gay student at the University of Wyoming, was savagely beaten and left hanging on a fence to die. The interviews were conducted by the Tectonic Theater Company from NYC. When it first came out in 1998 it was the most produced play in America, both by regional theaters and at colleges and universities. It was also an international success, and made into a film, produced by HBO.

# Two On The Aisle

It's summer. People want some comedy, seriously, and maybe some serious comedy. Do you want just fluff, or do you want fluff with some substance? Or do you want someone to try to make you feel guilty for something you didn't do and can't change now?

Two very funny revues opened since our last issue. There is a musical revue, all lyrics and melodies by Tom Lehrer, at Main Street at their Chelsea Market location – Tomfoolery (playing through June 27). And there is a sketch comedy revue at Stages – The Complete History of America (Abridged) (also through June 27).

The zaniest, most hilarious of these is the first act of History. I was almost embarrassed that I laughed so hard and so loud. Kregg Dailey, Susan Koozin, and David Metranga get us involved with them quickly and keep us with them through some pretty off the wall stuff—like a white man doing Geraldine as Mrs. Amerigo Vespucci. You know, the map maker this continent is named after?

But you would have to leave at intermission to keep that good taste in your mouth.

During the second act, the playwrights – Long, Martin and Tichenor – slowly do everything in their power to divorce the audience from the cast. They push us away with all of their might. Sure they're willing to let us laugh now and then, but nothing like the first act. Director Brian Byrnes and lighting designer Frank J. Vela help them with that.

So, OK. They want to get serious. But the finale (actually an encore, in a way) will be a really funny zinger and send us home feeling good, eh? Ah, no. Actually, hell no. They take us along a reverse time line, going deeper and deeper back until they finally arrive at Columbus chopping the hands off of a lot of Indians. Pardon me. This is not my guilt and I'm not sure what I could do to rectify it for anyone. So, why did y'all dump it on me? That point, the one that would allow me to forgive you for rubbing my nose in it, is left unclear.

Oddly enough, Tomfoolery, which is all funny songs that were written in the 1950s and '60s, looks forward more than History does, even though its very current - hot in all the best regional theaters, with a pedigree that leads back to NYC. These songs meant something back then and, oddly enough, they still mean something now. A lot of the problems that Lehrer talked about are still with us, and most of them worse. But if we can make fun of them, gosh darn it, then it fills us with a feeling that we are not defined by our problems. We feel, optimistically, that there is something we can do about them. That, even at this late date, it's not too late.

Nothing in the show is quite as funny as the first act of History. Nothing is anywhere near the downer of the second act of History. It's very funny. And, as Folgers would have said, it's good to the last drop. So, of the two, I liked it better.

There is a very talented cast here. They can sing and dance, and act while they're doing it, and play instruments – a violin, a guitar, a trumpet.

Don't worry. They are backed up by a good on-stage pit band. The pianist/musical director, Miriam Daly, even charmingly plays the piano one handed while she sings a solo.

I really thought that another star of the show was the choreographer, Rob Flebbe. And, of course, nothing would have dovetailed so finely without director Matt Huff.

But all would have been for naught – that's wrong, these songs are always entertaining – if not for a great cast like Joshua Estrada (of the silly putty face), Daniel C. O'Brien (sardonic but sweet), local favorite Jonathon McVay, silly soprano Susan Draper, and Shondra Marie (about whom one can never say enough good things). Full disclosure – Shondra works quite often for my children's theater company, Thunderbird.

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### BECAUSE WE ARE

This exhibition presents the work of 10 distinguished artists who are dealing with issues regarding Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Trangender civil rights. Fundamental concerns include gay marriage, the AIDS crisis, religious and legislative persecution, hate crimes and gay sexuality.

Gay marriage is a controversial issue and a subject that Brooklyn based artist Patricia Cronin personally confronts through her well-known classically sculpted funerary monument Memorial To A Marriage. She also presents her intimate series of erotic watercolors. The AIDS crisis devastated the gay community beginning in the 1980s. Outspoken artists affected by this disease explored its effects in their artwork. One of the most influential was New York based artist David Wojnarowicz. His "Untitled" (One Day this Kid...) reveals an intimate narrative that shows how devastating this disease is. More recently, Daniel Goldstein's Medicine Man approaches AIDS on conceptual level. The suspended human-shaped sculpture consists of steel wire threaded with nearly 300 donated empty HIV medication bottles and 139 syringes. The sculpture is beautiful in spite of its foundation in hopelessness and despair. Arthur Robinson Williams presents intimate portraits of transgendered individuals and couples undergoing physical and emotional transformation in his photographic series My Right Self. Zanele Muholi takes us on a photographic journey through post-apartheid South Africa focusing on the subjective experiences of black lesbians in two of her series Only Half The Picture and Being.

These 10 artists express their most intimate feelings and strive for recognition through their own fine art. This exhibition consists of a range of media including sculpture, photography, video, and mixed media. Coinciding with Houston's Annual Pride Festival, this exhibition shares aesthetic, philosophical, and political views and experiences from a legitimate segment of society.

### Hospitals to start adding Sexual Orientation to Patient's Rights and Policies

Human Rights Campaign's President Joe Solmonese Urges Action to motivate Texas Hospital Association

This is big. Sweeping new changes will soon dramatically transform healthcare in the U.S. for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) people.

The Joint Commission – the largest organization that accredits hospitals nationwide – has announced that, in the future, all hospitals in America will need to have a non-discrimination policy for LGBT patients on their books. Once the new rules are in place, the horror stories we've all heard of loved ones being met with hostility at the worst of times, of already heart-wrenching decisions made even harder, of people being denied care, will be a thing of the past – in Texas and every state in the nation.

But it will be years before every hospital is on board. To ensure these new protections are implemented in Texas hospitals as soon as possible, we need your help. The Texas hospital association will play a crucial role in communicating the new rules, and we need to ensure that new policies are put in place as soon as possible.

Tell the hospital association in Texas: families shouldn't be at risk of discrimination a single day longer. We need to implement these new rules immediately!

You might not have known it, but as an HRC supporter you've played an important role in the Joint Commission's new accreditation standards. They credited HRC as one of the organizations whose work for healthcare equality helped expose why these new rules were so sorely needed.

And it comes not a minute too soon. Just today, HRC released a new report showing that among 200 of the nation's largest hospitals, 93 percent do NOT have fully-inclusive non-discrimination policies that protect all LGBT people, and almost half don't include sexual orientation in their "Patients' Bill of Rights" or non-discrimination policy. Read HRC's Healthcare Equality Index 2010.

Though the Joint Commission's announcement came just before an important memorandum from President Obama on hospital visitation, far too many same-sex couples are still paying

the price for healthcare inequality. From the unfair taxation of employer-provided domestic partner health benefits, to

the fact that most health insurance plans do not offer domestic partner benefits or healthcare benefits for transgender Americans – the need for further progress remains urgent.

We can start by making sure the Joint Commission's new protections are implemented in Texas as soon possible, so that not one more family needlessly suffers. Write your letter to the hospital association in Texas today!

### This one is for the girls!



Professor Karen Schilt has a new book about Transmen who transition in the workplace coming out this winter

Kristen Schilt is a professor of Sociology at the University of Chicago. She received her PhD from UCLA in 2006 and then spent two years at Rice University. She has just finished a book, coming out this winter, about the workplace experiences of transgender men. She will be a special guest at a bar-b-que held at the TG Center, 604 Pacific Street ib Sunday, June 20, from 12noon to 5pm.

For this project, she interviewed transmen in Texas and California who were stealth at work and who had openly transitioned and stayed in the same jobs. As she believes it is very important to study non-trans people's attitudes towards transgender people, she also interviewed the co-workers of transmen when possible. Building on this research, she has been collecting data on how cisgender (non-trans) people understand the term "transgender."

For her next major project, she is interviewing transgender, including cross dressing, women about their transition experiences. In particular, she is interested in how making the physical transition into womanhood impacts daily interactions with friends, family, co-workers, and people on the street. As with her previous project, she is also interested in understanding how cisgender men and women understand transwomen. So, she is also asking transwomen who are interested in being interviewed to recommend two people who knew them "before and after" - whether a friend, a family member, or a co-worker - for interviews. For her, this addition is vital. As cisgender people, particularly men, are the main sources of violence and harassment toward transgender people, it is necessary to understand their beliefs and opinions on the transition process to get social change.

She will be conducting interviews with transwomen who are interested in Illinois and in Texas. She welcomes many questions about her research and hopes anyone interested (or just hungry) can make it to the bar-b-que on Sunday, June 20th.

### Hurricane season: Are you Prepared?

One of the rainbow of services MCC is offering is: *Are You Ready?* 

June not only is Pride month but it marks the beginning of the hurricane season, and although most hurricanes that impact the Texas Gulf Coast occur later in the year, it's never too early to prepare in the event of a hurricane or other disaster. Because Montrose Counseling Center has been a hub for members of the GLBT communities following hurricanes Katrina, Rita – and most recently Ike – we have put together a disaster preparedness guide.

The guide provides some basic information about putting together a plan should you need to evacuate or shelter in place.

It is not always easy for our target population to receive the same level of services when facing a disaster, so it's important to do some legwork ahead of time. For example, when people evacuated to Houston from Hurricane Katrina, nobody anticipated the levees would break and that people would be away from their homes for an extended period of time. Mass public shelters are a stressful environment for anyone, to be sure, but evacuees who identify as gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, or HIV+ face some additional issues. Are you able to stay with your partner like other families that are kept together? Can you openly hold hands and hug? Cuddle one another? What would the reaction of the shelter workers be, especially if it's through a faith-based organization. What would the reaction of the other shelter residents be? What if you are transgender and need to shower? What if you're taking HIV medication and you left home with only what you would need for a couple days and didn't have your prescription with you? If you had to relocate to another state, would you be able to get those prescriptions filled readily? And what if you take medication that needs to be refrigerated and the electricity goes out and ice is scarce? What if you need to take your medication with food and the stores are closed for days? Do you and your partner have all the legal documents you need to establish your relationship, such as wills, power of attorney, and advanced directives?

Even if you've been out for years, you may be faced with disclosing your sexual orientation or gender identity in ways that are not comfortable in order to get the assistance you need. These are concerns that aren't always discussed when preparing for a disaster, and situations that may make you feel vulnerable. The most critical part of preparing in advance is to have a plan. Know ahead of time that there may be circumstances in which you have to ask for help from others, which isn't easy.

Get a copy of all your prescriptions and write down what they are, what you take them for, what the dosage is, and what happens if you don't take the medication. Keep it in a water-tight container, along with important phone numbers for any doctors you are seeing, your therapist or psychiatrist, and the pharmacy where you get your prescriptions filled.

Put together a phone tree of contact information; including cell phone numbers, since it is sometimes easier to text message one another when the cell phone network is overwhelmed. Make sure you and your loved ones have some basic text messaging ability so that you can check in with one another.



# **Know Your HIV Status. Get Tested.**



June 27 marks the 15th year for National HIV Testing Day. Begun in 1995 by the National Association of People with AIDS, organizations across the country, including Montrose Counseling Center, offer free HIV Testing to promote early diagnosis.

It is estimated that one quarter of a million people living in the United States are HIV positive and unaware of their status. That means that they are at risk for infecting others and are not receiving any form of treatment.

In observance of National HIV Testing Day, Montrose Counseling Center will offer free HIV testing on Monday, June 28th. Walk-ins are welcome to come between 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. to the first floor GLBT Cultural Center at 401 Branard, to get tested. MCC uses the OraQuick ADVANCE Rapid HIV-1/2 Antibody Test. You can expect us to take a swab of the inside of your cheek. Before you take the test and while you wait for the results, we will talk to you about behavior and reducing your risk for HIV infection. We can tell you your results in about 20 min-

If June 28th is not convenient for you, please call our outreach department at 713.529.0037 to schedule an appointment to get tested. Montrose Counseling Center offers additional services to those who test positive, including support groups, case management, and both individual as well as couples counseling.

Finally, remember to take care of your emotional wellbeing. Consider the stress impact a disaster imposes on individuals, couples, families and extended relationships. Some people may never show any sign of stress. Some are able to handle it by talking about it with friends, while others may need the help of a professional therapist or clergy member. Some people turn to coping mechanisms such as drugs and alcohol, and that can lead to a whole host of issues, such as financial stress, fidelity problems, anger, resentment, aggression and even domestic abuse/violence. Stress may take days, weeks and even months to show up. If you do need to talk to someone who understands what you are going through, please give us a call and make an appointment. ### Cooking Capers with Dr. Dave

Hello ladies and gentlemen,

I hope you enjoyed your Memorial Day celebrations as much as I did mine. There were some wonderful "sites" down here on the island. Summer is here, so if you don't live in Galveston, come and see us!

#### CHILLED CUCUMBER AND SHRIMP SOUP

Well ladies and guys, this soup has a "little" something in it for lesbians and gays; straight folks like it too! It has those long, slender, cukes that can be used quite imaginatively, and then eaten! It also has a little "fresh fish" for the girls, and what gay boy doesn't like putting succulent, sweet things in his mouth--even if they are called shrimp? Trust me and my Jewish grandmother, try it; you'll like it.

This cool, beautiful soup requires almost no cooking, and it's ready in just minutes. Because it is so light but rich and filling, it is a perfect summer soup. Enjoy!

2 large cucumbers (about 2 pounds), peeled and coarsely chopped

1/4th. cup red wine vinegar

- 1 Tablespoon granulated sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 pound raw shrimp, the smallest you can find, peeled and deveined
- 2 Tablespoons sweet butter
- 1/4th. cup dry white vermouth

salt and freshly ground pepper to taste

1 1/2 cups buttermilk, chilled

3/4ths. cup chopped fresh dill, plus additional dill for garnish

Toss the chopped cucumbers with the vinegar, sugar and 1 teaspoon salt and let stand for 30 minutes. Rinse the shrimp and pat them dry. Melt the butter in a small skillet. Add the shrimp, raise the heat, and toss until they turn pink which should be about 2 to 3 minutes. Remove them with a slotted spoon and reserve. Add the vermouth to the skillet and boil until it is reduced to a few spoonfuls. Pour over the shrimp and season them with the salt and pepper to taste. Drain the cucumbers and transfer them to the bowl of a food processor fitted with a steel blade. Process briefly, then add the buttermilk and continue to process until the mixture is smooth. Add the dill to taste and process for about one to two seconds. Pour the soup into a bowl, add the shrimp and their liquid and refrigerate, covered, until very cold. Garnish the soup with additional chopped dill and serve in chilled bowls.

#### DR. DAVE'S OSSO BUCO

Well folks, what lesbian or gay guy have you met who hasn't put her or his foot in their mouth on certain instances following too many cocktails? Well, this recipe is intended to be savored in the mouth! It's wonderful and "almost" better than anything I've ever had in my mouth!



1 cup all-purpose flour salt and freshly ground pepper for sea-

soning 16 sections of veal shank (12 to 14

- pounds), each piece 2 inches thick
- 1/2 cup extra virgin olive oil
- 4 ounces (1 stick) sweet butter
- 2 medium-size yellow onions, coarsely
- 6 large garlic cloves, peeled and chopped 1/2 teaspoon dried basil
- 1/2 teaspoon dried oregano
- 28 ounce canned Italian plum tomatoes, drained
- 2 cups dry white wine
- 2 cups beef broth (canned broth is fine) 3/4ths. cup chopped Italian parsley grated zest of 2 lemons

Season the flour with salt and pepper and dredge the pieces of veal shank well. Heat the oil and butter together in a large casserole or Dutch oven and sear the veal, browning it well on all sides. Transfer the veal to paper towels to drain. Add onions, garlic, basil and oregano to the casserole and cook, stirring occasionally, for 10 minutes. Skim off the excess fat. Add the wine and bring to a boil. reduce the heat and simmer uncovered for 15 minutes. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Return the veal shanks to the casserole and add the beef stock just tot he point the veal is covered. Place a lid on the casserole and bake for 1 1/2 hours. Remove the lid and bake uncovered for another 30 minutes until the veal is very tender. sprinkle with chopped parsley and grated lemon zest and serve immediately. This recipe will provide 6 to 8 portions.

Cristan: Hum. In any event, so if I refer this person to you, you all will force them to live as a male? It has been my experience that doing that to trans youth is extremely psychologically damaging. How would you address that?

CH: Well, I don't... My boss and I have had discussions about this. This is our policy. I mean, can't you imagine... If we house him with the women... What if he... you know, one night decides that he.... You know.

Cristan: Wow. I can't recall ever hearing a case like that anywhere. Ever.

CH: Well, we have to prevent that...

Cristan: I understand, but at the same time it seems that your policy seems to be based more on fear than on rational facts. We are talking about someone who has been chemically castrated – their penis does not work.

CH: Uh, well. We are a Catholic organization... you have to understand. We are against abortion, we...

Cristan: So, if I am understanding you correctly, you are saying that your policy - a policy that results in child homelessness and/or psychological trauma - is based upon your organizations interpretation of the Bible.

CH: Well, I wouldn't put it that way.

**Cristan:** I mean, the principles your policy is based on are biblically inspired, right?

CH: Well, yes. The thing is, this policy comes from New York.

Cristan: I see.

CH: Things are changing, but it will take a

Cristan: Okay. Well, can you refer me to another agency that will help this child?

CH: Hum. I don't know of any. Have you tried [names off a few providers who also refuse services to transgender people].

Cristan: Well, I appreciate your time. Actually... Would you be willing to advocate for this child. They need help maybe...

CH: Well, again... these things take time. Really, this policy is set by New York.

Cristan: I see. Okay. Well, thank you for your time.

CH: Well, okay.

Cristan: What was your name again? Could you spell it or me?

CH: Victor Hay... H-A-Y.

Cristan: Okay... Thank you. Bye.

On June 14, 2010 at 3:30 PM - 3 days after the meeting with Covenant House – a Transgender Center representative contacted the Covenant House intake and spoke with an intake specialist named Angela:

Acting as a secret shopper, the Center representative called Covenant House Houston and stated that they were a case manager and had an 18 year old transgender youth who needed housing. Angela stated, "He can come in but because there's no room in the men's dorm, he'll have to sleep on the floor in the intake area." The TG Center representative asked, "I wanted to be clear, my client is a female-to-male transgender." Angela became flustered and

stated that she thought that the client was a male-to-female transgender youth. She then went on to state, "They'll have a physical and be housed by what's down there." The TG Center representative asked, "By what name will you refer to when working with this client? I ask because the name everyone knows this female-to-male transgender youth is a boy name. Would you be willing to call this FTM client by the name they are known by, or will you refer to them by their birth name?" At this point, Angela relayed the question to another Covenant House staff and replied, "No. We only go by what's on their identification."

City of Houston Councilmember Jolanda Jones informed all of those present at the meeting that the Houston Covenant House is receiving federal funding through the City of Houston and stated that she will take this issue up with the national headquarters for the Covenant House located in New York.

Covenant House was unable to identify any written policies on how to work with transgender children in intake, assessment, placement, and other services. Currently, all treatment is all based on subjective interpretations of what is believed at the time by the staff. The Director of the Covenant House, Rhonda Robinson stated the she sincerely wants to do what's best for transgender children and agreed to work with us, the transgender community to create policies to present to their Board of Directors, in September. The Transgender Foundation of America and the NASW-TX GLBT Equity Committee have taken on the task of helping draft policies to be added into the Covenant House policies. The next meeting is scheduled for July 6 at 11:00 AM at the Houston Covenant House in order to discuss possible policy implementation.

#### **An Active Arts Community**

Houston is blessed in having a ballet, a symphony, and an opera as well as a number of other venues where one can experience excellent theater. Some of these, including The Alley, Stages, and Diverseworks, have GLBT themes in their productions and certainly have gay actors and theater staff. But we are doubly blessed to have two theater companies that are GLBT specific. Joe Watts has been producing gay theater in Houston since the Seventies. The Laramie Project that will be stages at the Holocaust Museum as part of Pride Month promises to be one of the most important works ever staged in Houston. More recently Unhinged Productions has presented popular and critically acclaimed work.

Bayou City Performing Arts which started as the Gay's Men Chorus has become a multi-faceted performing arts company. It includes the Bayou City women's Chorus and the Bayou City Chorale. Their productions at Jones Hall drawn a diverse and appreciative crowd.

The Houston Pride Band has been presenting music for 32 years in Houston and around the country. They are part of every Pride parade, hold a number of concerts during the year. The recent *No Strings Attached* concert at Zilkha Hall at Hobby Center featured the Gay's Men Chorus as guest performers. This pairing is something the two groups might consider for a once a year joint event. They will join with other member bands of the Lesbian and Gay Bands Association at the Gay Games in Cologne, Germany this year.

### **Organizations**

The HGLBTPC is the South's Oldest Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, and Transgender Civil Rights Organization. Founded in 1975, the Houston GLBT Political Caucus is dedicated to eliminating prejudice, violence, and injustice against gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender people through education, activism, and political advocacy. It is well known that Mayor Annise Parker and Council member Sue Lovell both served as President of this organization. The Caucus as it is most often referred to, has built a reputation for its endorsement process and the resulting endorsements have proven to have a visible effect on electoral politics. While the Caucus is non-partisan, Houston also boasts an active Stonewall Democrats club. Community members are active and welcome in a number of other organizations such as ROAD

Women (River Oaks Area Democratic

Women) and 007 Democrats (no it is not a James Bond thing, it is for folks who live in the zipcode 77007).

Houston's branch of the Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRC) is one of the most active in the country and was recognized as The Steering committee of the Year by the national organization with particular acknowledgement of the committee's diversity.

#### We include the "T"

The Transgender Unity Committee has worked to bring together the diverse facets of the Transgender community and other organizations in the community. The results have been a cohesion not found in some other major cities. Members of the Trans-community are active in many other groups and have a true presence in Houston that means there is never a question as to their place as part of the queer community. Houston is home to one of the few Transgender Centers in the country.

#### The Women's Community

AssistHers, and the Lesbian Health Initiative (LHI) provide valuable services to other women. AssistHers helps women who face chronic or life threatening conditions in order to improve their quality of life. LHI, hosts health fairs and provides free mammograms to help glbt women be and stay healthy.

LOAF, is Lesbians Over Age Fifty. This is mainly a social group but also provides a support system for older Lesbians. There are meet and greets each month and other social gatherings. The groups publishes a monthly newsletter.

The Women's Group, is a feminist group that is open to all women-identified women. It is a diverse group that includes Lesbians and non-lesbian women. It meets every Sunday morning at 10:15am at the First Unitarian Church (it is an independent group not affiliated with the church). The group has proved to be a valuable resource for women who are in the coming out process and for those that are interested in discussion and dialogue about women in society today. Social connections are made and other groups and activities have spun off from The Women's Group.

There are so many more queer things to be proud of in Houston that I can not list them all here so I will save that for another issue of the Montrose GEM.

# The Dream of Fatherhood made real

Buton Bagby-Grose and his partner Ron became the proud parents of a little girl just over a year ago. Burton shared with the Montrose GEM his story of how they came to be Dads.

**GEM:** What made you decide to become fathers? Was it something you had always wanted?

BB: As far as what made us decide to become fathers, God blessed Ron and I with such wonderful parents, so we have always wanted to pass along those marvelous gifts of love and care to children. That's one reason I worked in Vacation Bible School at South Main Baptist Church as an openly-gay teacher for so many summers.

We also saw the joy that our siblings' children brought to their lives and vice versa.

**GEM:** You made a big career change, going into the ministry. How has that affected the decision to parent?

**BB:** When I finally decided to answer God's call to pastoral ministry, we knew that life would be more complicated in many ways and we accepted that reality. Certainly the great gift of being a parent complicates our lives, but when God blessed us with the opportunity to become parents, we knew we had to say yes. We really believe that there are so many gay Christians like us here – people who want to follow the way of Jesus in a loving and inclusive church environment. We hope to help create that in a Baptist congregation or perhaps a United Church of Christ community.

**GEM:** Why did you wait until your Forties to do this? Was it through a surrogate? Is Rosalee's birth Mother involved in her life at all?.

BB: I guess we waited because it was easy. Easy to just let the years pass and focus on our civil rights and church involvement. God just literally dropped this blessing into our laps — it was like God said, "Okay you've been talking about this for years, now it's time to put action where your mouths have been all this time. We adopted a young family member's child. The biological mother sees the baby regularly.

**GEM:** Did you have a preference for the sex of the child?

**BB:** We had no preference for the gender of the child; our only hope was that the baby would be healthy. We're really loving having a little girl to dress up – she loves wearing hats!

**GEM:** What has been the hardest thing? The best. How has life changed in the Bagby-Grose household?

BB: We keep waiting for the hard part and we're sure it will come. She has slept through the night since she was two months old. We have become much more homebound, but so many friends from church and others visit so often, we are all pretty heavily socialized. The best thing has been to see how this sweet little baby has brought out the best in our friends and family. It has been truly overwhelming how loving and supportive people have been.

When we were returning from a family reunion last week, we stopped for dinner at a charming little pizza parlor on the town square in LaGrange. A woman walked up to us and told us that we must be wonderful parents since we had such a happy baby. When her two teenage daughters arrived, she brought them over to introduce them. Who would have thought we're run into such love and acceptance in that small Texas town?

# Kitty's House of Horrors by Carrie Vaughn

Kitty Norville is famous for two things; being an overnight radio talk show host who covers all things supernatural; and being a werewolf. So it comes as no surprise when she is tapped to participate in a reality show that is supposed to enlighten the general public about the paranormal.

At first Kitty is skeptical about doing the show, especially considering that some of the producer's past efforts have been less than stellar; but after they throw around a few other famous names from the paranormal world, including some whom Kitty knows and trusts, she decides to participate.

The area where the show is being filmed is very remote, but after a grueling day of private plane flights, adjusting to the cameras, meeting the other supernatural guests (some vampires, a fellow were, an empath, a psychic ghost hunter, a magician, and a bona fide skeptic) Kitty finally settles in for what is supposed to be a relaxing week in the wilderness.

The first two days are relatively uneventful, and Kitty actually begins to enjoy being out in the middle of nowhere with no cell phones or other distractions. But then on day 3 the group wakes up to find no power, no radio communication, and, most disturbing of all, one of their fellow guests dead in the woods.

Kitty and the others try to go for help, only to find that the camera crew has also been murdered. It is at this point that they figure out that they are not part of a TV program, but have been tricked by a right wing militia group that used the "reality show" story (and set up) to lure a bunch of "abominations" out into an area where they could easily be killed one by one.

As the group tries to work out how they might escape from people who know all their weaknesses and seem to always be one step ahead of their "prey", they find themselves facing down not only the prejudices of their would be killers, but their mistrust and misunderstanding of each other.


While not quite as adept as Charlaine Harris (True Blood) at tying the prejudice against supernatural beings and shape shifters into the arguments against the GLBT community, Vaughn still does a good job of painting the parallels. For instance, in one scene in the book, Kitty suggests that the resident skeptic is probably safe given that he has no supernatural powers and therefore is not considered "tainted" in the minds of the captors. His response is that, as an atheist, he's considered just as "unnatural" (and therefore in just as much danger) as the supes.

The characters here are vivid, with no disposable "red shirt" types, and Vaughn really knows how to build tension. There are scenes in this book where I literally found myself holding my breath, heart pounding, as I waited to see what would happen next. The author is also very good at tempering excitement with humor, which keeps the novel from becoming too dark.

Like *Dead until Dark* (renamed *True Blood* due to the success of the TV show) the Kitty Norville books are a series, but don't let that discourage you. The stories are written in such a way that readers can easily start with any of the books and not have a problem catching up with characters or "leftover" storylines.

Interesting, scary, exciting and loads of fun, *Kitty's House of Horrors* is a great addition to a great series, as well as a really fun summer read.

# The Psychology of Want by Daryl Banner



Author Daryl Banner Graduated from the University of Houston. A PFLAG/HATCH Scholarship helped him get through school.

Something is wrong with him. He just is not sure what it is. And neither will the reader be for sometime into this first novel by Houstonian Daryl Banner. It is not because he is gay.

Well, there is that matter of how much time he spends seeking time alone in his dorm room with his right hand. But is that really what is wrong with him? There's that seductive demon, and the story about the Lovers at the Lake and the tragic girl who cries every night in the dorm lounge, and the girl that stalks him but runs away when he spots her.

Soon you start thinking that there is much more than one thing wrong with him. You almost shout out loud "GET HELP!".

But, you see he has a big distrust of "the goblins", as he calls those in psychology. There is a horrific gay-bashing incident that makes you think there is something much more wrong with him than you would have ever suspected. This is when he is forced to see a school counselor, which eventually lead through some breakthroughs.

I must tell you that I liked this book very much because Banner is a really good storyteller. I would not use the word brilliant, but he is very clever in weaving his tale. I got the book on a Sunday and was finished reading it by Thursday evening, and it is a decent sized novel at about 360 pages.. That being said there were a few issues for me with the book. Part of it is with style which I think stems from a generation gap. I don't really know this style, which is one I think would appeal to a younger person. It is kind of a shorthand of talking. Whatever.

Another place where these seems to be a disconnect is that the main character is a theater major, yet seems to lack a true passion for involvement in it. Many assume that theater means acting, and while it is true that the character does take an acting class in the second semester of his sophomore year his interest is theater may well be in the other aspects of theater, such as scenery, lighting, directing, costuming, or as in the case of the author, as a playwright. But we don't really know that. He does not convey that his major is a result of a 'want'.

Banner creates a protagonist who is at first, very hard to like but that you find yourself caring about. You want to know what happens to him and you want him to be OK. The young man definitely has problems. He is very self-absorbed and thinks himself to be very self-aware, but I think that is where he is woefully lacking. He thinks he doesn't feel, but maybe he feels too much and when that sort of repressed feeling finally surfaces 'it ain't pretty'.

You never learn the names of anyone in the book because the main character just refers to them as by their descriptions: "Big, ugly, fat guy", "the boyfriend", "my roommate", "Mom", "Dad", "Tragic Girl", "pimple face", "Elfy girl", and the "the guy with the pretty lips", etc. The only name given in the entire book is that of the sister he never knew he had.

As the story unfolds, you can understand where his problems stem from, what with a dysfunctional family of origin such as his. A pill addicted Mother who is seldom fully present and a father who is distant and busy indulging in an affair with a neighbor. There is more to the mystery than that though.

I think everyone can understand the concept of "want" and at times there is a certain psychology regarding why we want what we want. But is it healthy to want it, is it healthy to have it? Banner draws out the mystery well. Food for thought is provided also because it prompts one to think about their own wants and the why of them.

The book ends on an uplifting hopeful note. You are left feeling that "he"is going to be all right in the long run, with his demons behind him he is moving towards a future that looks a lot brighter.

At UH Banner did several productions as an actor and a writer (two plays and a musical, all produced in the Blackbox Theater) While there, he met friend and mentor, Pulitzer-prize winning playwright Lanford Wilson who encouraged him in his writing.

### Pride in the Park

Earlier this year, members of the Houston Astros sales team became aware of the Houston Convention & Visitors Bureau's online MyGayHouston campaign. This was the original catalyst for a member of the sales team at the Astros to contact one of the profiled members of the CVB's campaign, Trevor Eade and set-up a group night event to celebrate Houston's LGBT community at Minute Maid Park.

"I was thrilled to hear that members of staff at the Astros were taking an interest in Houston's LGBT community" said Eade.

After a couple of planning meetings with the Astros sales team, it became clear to Eade that 'Pride in the Park' had the potential of becoming a mammoth event. "I needed expert help" Eade said, and called in the support of well known Houstonian and philanthropist, and fellow MyGayHouston profiled individual, Edward Sanchez.

"With Edward's expertise, I knew we would have the wherewithal to create an event Houston's LGBT community would be proud of; we both agreed from the get go, this was an opportunity not to be taken lightly – as the potential for giving back to the community was enormous."

Sanchez and Eade leveraged the world of Social Media to receive some initial feedback, and within 72 hours of launching an event page on Facebook more than 1,000 people had responded in a positive manner. To date, this number continues to grow, this is a perfect example of how, in today's digital world Social Media is a necessary vehicle – so long as it is done correctly, and it appears Sanchez and Eade have achieved this.

Cyd Zeilger from OutSports.com is quoted to have said in a recent article "The event's Facebook page shows 1,100 confirmed guests and another 1,500 "Maybes." It remains to be seen how many of those people will actually purchase tickets, but if just half of those do it will be one of the largest gay events ever at a Major League Baseball game."

During the following weeks, further meetings were held at Minute Maid Park, and the programming became clearly defined, with ticketing options from the \$95 VIP level to a more modest \$10 View Deck ticket level. Eade pointed out, "Our goal was to ensure that everyone could come to Minute Maid Park for this inaugural event without breaking the bank, this ticketing model is slightly different than other groups have done at other MLB games". He continued, "The Astros Group Sales team have been great to work with – they set-up a vanity URL for us: www.astros.com/pride to purchase tickets online... but, it is important that the user type in the code PRIDE when promoted, so they get the discounted ticket, and a portion of their ticket goes to the beneficiaries.

Mayor Annise Parker will have a chance to recall her softball skills when she tosses out the first pitch at the "*Pride in the Park*" night at the Astros game on July 10th, benefitting community groups.

The Astros have also assigned an individual on staff to manage Group Ticket sales, for groups more than 20 people; they should call Joe Schiavi at 713.259.8314".

Eade and Sanchez also pointed out that Pride in the Park is a family friendly event.

Since the original planning meeting in January, Eade and Sanchez have been busy holding planning meetings with the seven beneficiaries for Pride in the Park.

Eade continued "Earlier this year, we received a lot of applications from various LGBT not-for-profits in Houston, and while we wanted to include everyone, this event is in uncharted waters, so we didn't want to dilute the proceeds, by adding too many beneficiaries" he continued "there was a very complex voting mechanism put in place to choose the top 7 beneficiaries, and I am delighted with the diverse outcome."

The Seven Beneficiaries are:

PFLAG, Out and Equal Houston, Bayou City Chorale, Pride Houston, Bering Omega, Legacy Community Health Services and Bunnies on the Bayou.

The group of beneficiaries are now assisting in the promotion and marketing of this inaugural event. At the recent record breaking (in attendance) Bunnies on the Bayou event, the Pride in the Park team had a tented area, and received more than 500 requests for more information about the event.

Up next is the Pride Festival and Parade. "The timing of this is no fluke – the choice of holding the game on July 10 was a strategic decision, as we wanted to make sure we had a presence at the Pride festivities. We have a booth where attendees will [hopefully] be able to purchase tickets on-site, which would be fantastic; in addition we will be in the Parade in the evening, we have some great giveaways, and some 'special guests' on our float" continued Eade.

On game day, some of the programming highlights include Mayor, Annise Parker, throwing out the opening pitch. And the 160 members of the Bayou City Chorale (Gay Men's Chorus and Bayou City Women's Chorus) will sing the National Anthem.

Both Eade and Sanchez are hopeful that this will become an annual event and a tradition for Houston's LGBT community. The planning duo has since been approached by the Houston Rockets to help produce a similar event later on this year, during the Basketball season at the Toyota Center .
